





Officer Leitz **Investigates** Fish 'Kill' in River

Report of a mysterious fish kill at the Tawas River mouth is being investigated by Conservation Officer Arthur Leitz. Several reports were received Thursday by Michigan State Police and the conservation de-

partment that fish were coming to the surface of the water at the river mouth. Although several persons said

they had seen the fish come to the surface, only a few dead shad were to be found on the river bottom a short time later. One person is reported to have caught several pike by using his bare hands.

Although not being able to determine the cause of the incident because none of the larger fish are available for analysis, Leitz said he had received one call of this nature in the AuSable Point area. There, fish surfaced because the hot weather had reduced the amount of oxygen in the water.
