ent in Northern Michigan Myrton M. Riggs, Cheboygan publisher and chairman of the council, in his plea for an all-out community drive in every city and village of northern counties, declared that many prospects for new industry can be found among the state's thousands of summer visitors.

The council emphasized that every community through the local chamber of commerce, business association, government officials and individuals should do everything possible to find visiting executives who like to vacation in the region and sell them on the numerous advantages of doing business where they love to go for their recreation.

"Many industries and business firms are decentralizing their operations or establishing new offices and factories in smaller communities or rural areas," Mr. Riggs declared. "We should locate these business executives and acquaint them with our unlimited resources, both human and material, for manufacturing and doing business in this growing state.'

It was pointed out that the screening program was launched in 1950 by the Michigan Economic Development Department and has resulted in location of many new industries in resort areas where the citizens and organizations got busy and sold their com-munities to visitors.

Three Injured in **Crash Near Hale**

Three persons were injured Thursday night near Hale when the driver of the car in which they were riding swerved in an attempt to miss a deer standing on the road and rolled over in a ditch

Injured were Deputy Sheriff Gene Ballinger, 22, driver, head and nose injuries; Thomas Bradford, 28, Alpena, member of the secretary of state's office, and Donald R. Church, 21, Tawas City. The latter two men received serious back and neck injuries,

The men were taken to Tawas Hospital by Forshee ambulance of Hale. Ballinger was released after treatment. Bradford and Church are still confined at the hospital. Ballinger told state police officers that he lost control of the car after driving out on the soft shoulder. The accident occurred on Long Lake Road at the Putnam Road curve, one mile west of Hale.
