At the end of 1956, monthly benefit payments were going to 193 wives or aged dependent husbands of aged widows or dependent aged widowers and parents in Isoco County.

Noting that OASI coverage has taken hold rapidly in recent years, Mr. Ellifritz pointed out that three-fourths of the men becoming 65 this year will be eligible for social security benefits.

In December 1956, 109 children in Isoco County were being paid a total of \$4,402 monthly. These were largely minor children of a deceased insured parent; a smaller number were children under 18 whose insured father or mother had retired.

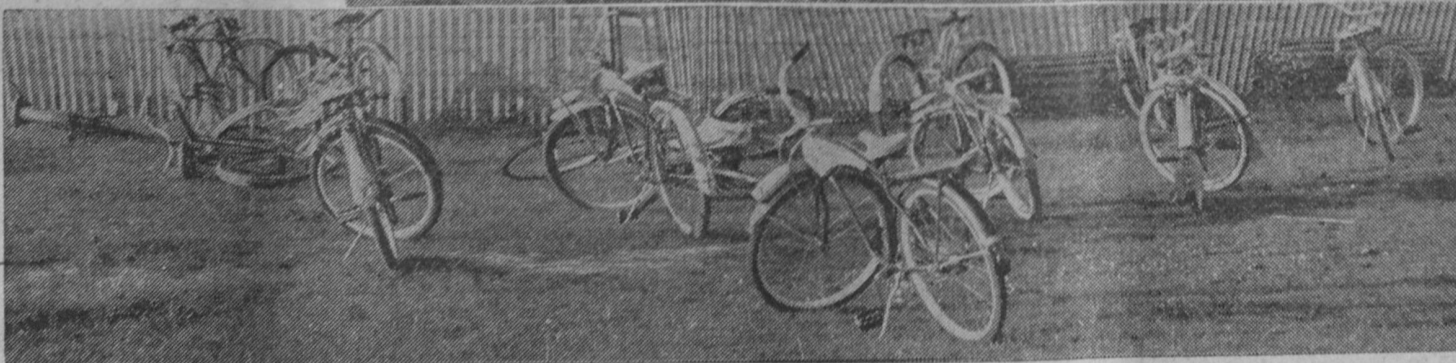
