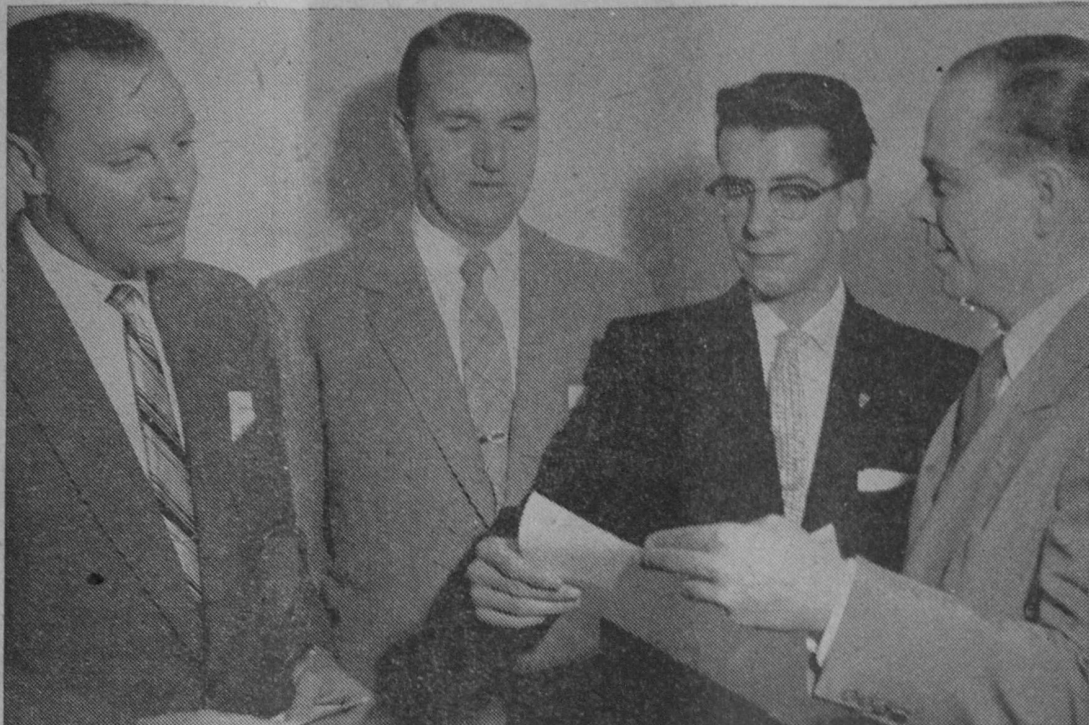

Want Relics for Display in Iosco Centennial Exhibitions

According to word from E. H. (Bert) Stickney of the Iosco County Centennial Committee, plans for the week-long observance of the county's birthday are now completed except for the final day. The complete program will be made public next week.

Arthur Leitz, chairman of the pioneer exhibits committee, announces that on Monday, June 24, space for displays of relics will be available at the East Tawas Community Building and in the lobby of the Iosco County Building, Tawas City.

He urges that everyone who possesses relics of any description pertaining to pioneer way of

life or of historical interest bring entries to either display center on Monday, June 24.

Entries should have a label firmly attached bearing the name of owner and information as to its original use and historical import.

Mr. Leitz has arranged to have the display guarded and cared for during the period June 24-29 and until owners reclaim their entries. Walter Champion, parade chairman, urges that individuals or organizations wishing to enter floats in the centennial parade contact him at Tawas City (FO 2-3511 or 2-3726) as soon as possible.

Mr. Champion reports that parade plans are rapidly coming to the final stage of completion and asks

that entries be listed without delay.

In conjunction with the Iosco County centennial, the Oscoda-AuSable Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a canoe race on the AuSable River Wednesday, June 26. Cash prizes totaling \$200 will be awarded.

There will be both junior and senior events. Canoeists must register at the chamber of commerce office at Oscoda by June 24.

The race will start from the Foote Dam pond at 12:45 p. m. with the finish line at the old US-23 bridge in Oscoda.

If prospective junior racers do not have sponsors, the chamber of commerce will furnish one.

Services Held for Former Iosco Sheriff

Funeral services were held last Saturday afternoon at the Tawas City Baptist Church for John F. Moran, former Iosco County sheriff. He died Wednesday, June 5, at the Odd Fellows Home, Jackson.

Born November 5, 1886, in Huron County, he had been a resident of Iosco County for more than 40 years. During his earlier years he had resided at Harbor Beach and on March 17, 1910, he married Miss Harriet Morrison, who preceded him in death about five years ago.

A former employee of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company, he had served as chief of police at East Tawas for a number of years before his election to the office of sheriff in 1934. Taking office January 1, 1935, he served the county as sheriff for 14 years.

Surviving are a son, Robert Moran of Bay City; two daughters, Mrs. Irene Freel and Mrs. Hazel Brown of Tawas City; seven grandchildren and four great grandchildren; a brother, Harland Moran, and a sister, Mrs. Cecil McCullough of Harbor Beach.

The services Saturday afternoon were officiated by the Rev. Charles Mercer. The honorary pallbearers were: Sgt. James McDonald, Sgt. Joseph Svoke, Sgt. Lynn Smith, Detective Nick Reechke, Capt. Vincent Neering, Sgt. Frank Roti, Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell, Undersheriff Leon Putnam and Chiefs of Police George Ruth and Harry Pelton.

Interment was in the Tawas City Cemetery with last rites by Baldwin Lodge, IOOF.

Peoples State Bank Marks 30th Anniversary of Service

June 14 marks the 30th anniversary of the Peoples State Bank of East Tawas. On this date it will begin operating under its new 30-year charter which was approved and granted by the state banking commission recently.

Mr. McKay and Mr. Shattuck have been executive officers of the bank since organization. Miss Esther Look completes 27 years as an assistant cashier on August 4. John Hoshbach has been with the bank 13 years as assistant cashier.

The officers and directors feel a great satisfaction in having been able to assist in the tremendous growth of the area which was made possible only through the loyal support of its patrons and for this patronage the bank is deeply grateful.

Water Restrictions Go Into Effect in Tawas City

Effective immediately, water restrictions go into force in Tawas City, according to a report by Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works.

Bublitz said that Monday of this week was the first day this spring that the city's wells had been operating continuously all day. He said that this could be traced to residents who watered lawns during the dry weather.

"The water level was not down to a dangerous point Monday, but the situation could become serious if later use is not curtailed," stated the superintendent.

Watering hours for the summer months are as follows:

First Ward—Monday, 6:00 p. m. to 9:00 p. m.

Second Ward—Tuesday, 6:00 p. m. to 9:00 p. m.

Third Ward—Thursday, 6:00 p. m. to 9:00 p. m.

Bublitz said that water restrictions are to be rigidly enforced this year. "Water service will be

discontinued and not restored until a \$5 fine is paid by the violator," he stated.

Bublitz warns that whenever the fire siren sounds, all sprinkling and outside use of water must cease, regardless of the allotted hours for watering.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE PLANS WATER CARNIVAL

The Tawas Chamber of Commerce is planning a water carnival during the latter part of August. "We feel at that time of year our tourists should have an extra added attraction placed before them to draw them into our area," stated Osman Ostrander, chamber president.

"We would like the cooperation of all boat owners and water skiers. If they would let us know of their willingness to help we know we could put on one of the most outstanding events of its type," he said.

Would Organize TA Athletic Boosters Club

An open meeting for the purpose of organizing a Tawas Area School athletic boosters club will be held at the new school cafeteria Tuesday, June 18, at 8:00 p. m.

The proposed organization met with the enthusiastic approval of the Tawas Area Board of Education at its regular meeting Tuesday night of this week.

Four of the club's organizers, Cecil Cabbie, Maynard VanOrnum, William LaCourse and A. W. Saur, attended this week's meeting and outlined plans for the proposed organization.

Mr. Cabbie, spokesman for the group, said that the principal objective of the new organization was to lend assistance to the board in securing a lighted athletic field for the new school.

Through this combined effort of all who are interested in high school athletic activities in the Tawas area, they hope to see the lighted field completed and ready for use this fall.

The men said that such a field would help to make the high school's athletic program self-supporting, saying that the anticipated increase in attendance at football and baseball games would help to offset the cash outlay for such a project in a few years.

Although the new group does not expect to offer actual financial assistance toward securing the field, the four men indicated that much could be accomplished toward improving the athletic program through the moral support of all those in the area who are interested in athletics.

They said that many persons would be more than happy to donate labor for construction of the field, should it be needed.

A complete outline of the group's program will be made next Tuesday night, as well as election of officers. All interested sports fans are urged to attend.

Dehnke Has Full Docket in Court

Judge Herman Dehnke disposed of a number of cases in Iosco County Circuit Court on Monday and Tuesday of this week.

A condemnation suit against Matt Loffman was dropped by the County of Iosco. The county had brought proceedings against Loffman earlier this year for acquisition of land for an addition to the county airport. The defendant was awarded costs of \$367.50 by the court.

The case against four persons charged with theft from an auto was heard. Edward Fraser was arraigned and pleaded guilty to the charge; Ronald Norris pleaded not guilty; Donald Bessey was placed on two years probation, to serve 30 days in the county jail and pay \$75 costs; Gary Kerwin was placed on two years probation, fine and cost to be fixed if he does not return to school.

Dear Editor,

I noticed the old time picture of the logging train in last week's issue of the Herald.

It might be of interest to you and the readers of the Herald that my father, William L. Hinman, was a brakeman on this railroad (the AuSable and Northwestern) in 1889. He tells that no one ever worked as a brakeman on that road long. They either got killed or scared off the job.

It seems that there were no air brakes on the cars in those days and when they were going down hill the brakes all had to be applied by hand and often the cars would buckle and jump the track thereby causing a wreck and often

seriously injuring, if not killing, the brakeman.

He left the railroad after several months and then operated a store at Thompson's station which is now South Branch. He will be remembered by Tawas residents for the years he was manager of the United States Gypsum Company store at Alabaster (1914 to 1926). He has been in Hastings in business since 1926, until his retirement in 1953.

At present he is with his daughter, Mrs. Martin Musolf, at Bay City (2146 Third Street). I am sure he would be glad to hear from any of his friends in the Tawas area. He is now 88 years of age.

I have followed your centennial plans with interest and hope I can be there for the big program.

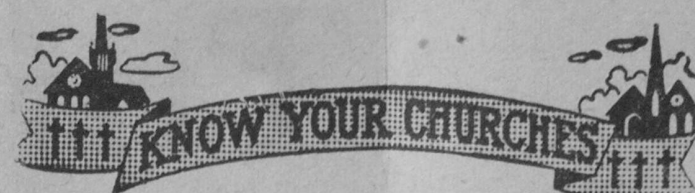

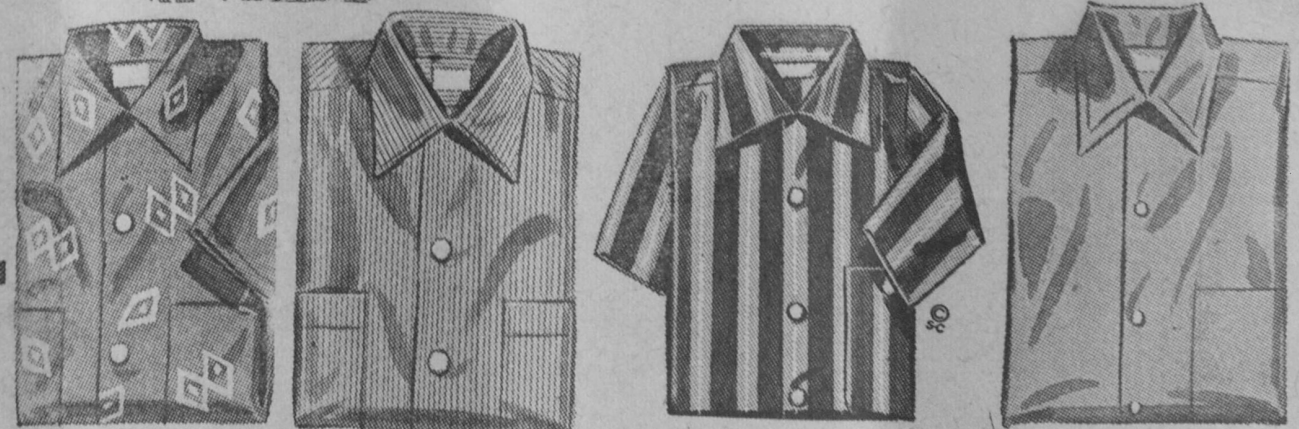

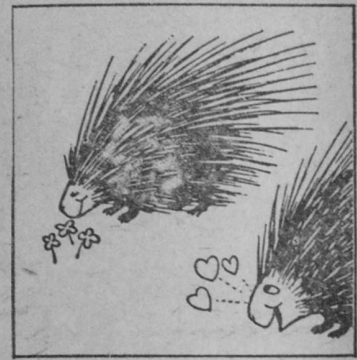

Farmers to Decide on Two Issues in Wheat Referendum

Farmers have two issues to decide in the June 20 wheat referendum, according to Earl M. Partlo, chairman, Iosco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The first issue is whether marketing quotas will be in effect, carrying with them penalties on "excess" wheat from farms (with more than 15 acres of wheat harvested as grain) on which the allotment is exceeded. The second issue is the level of the available price support.

The voting place for the June 20 wheat marketing quota referendum will be at the ASC county office in the Federal Building, East Tawas. The poll will be opened at 8:00 a. m. and closed at 7:00 p. m.

A two-thirds favorable vote is required to approve wheat marketing quotas in order to put them into effect on the 1958 wheat crop. If quotas are approved, penalties for production in excess of the farm's quota are in effect for all farms in commercial wheat states which harvest over 15 acres of wheat for grain. Penalty for excess wheat is determined at the rate of 45 percent of the parity price for the 1958 crop.

Under quota, price support on the 1958 wheat crop will be available to farmers who comply with their wheat allotments at a national average of \$1.78 per bushel, which represents 75 percent of parity.

If more than one-third of the voters disapprove quotas, the quota will not be in effect and no penalties for excess production levied. However, acreage allotments will remain in effect and the price support will be available at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law, to those farmers who comply with their allotments.

D and M Rides Ties Produced from NEM Forest Products

The Detroit and Mackinac Railway rides the rails that ride the ties that are products of the great forests of the Northeastern Michigan country it serves.

In earlier days of the D and M such was not the case. Ties made from durable red and white oak, beech, maple and birch had to be purchased outside at higher costs.

Now second growth timber in the Northeastern Michigan area along with technological advancements have provided the D and M with the material close to its base of operation. Today, with pressure treatments of Osmo salts, ties last up to 30 years. That is twice as long as the untreated ties of earlier days.

However, the cost of tie-replacement still runs high. In 1956, for example, D and M spent \$146,000 for ties at the rate of about \$4 each. If these new ties were used in one continuous section of the railway system, they would cover about 11.6 miles of road.

To avoid creating a problem in arithmetic, the D and M reports, it takes 3,168 ties to lay one mile of railroad track.

State Police April Arrests Increase 61 Percent

State police made 22,179 arrests in April, an increase of 61 percent above 13,796 in April of 1956, according to the department's monthly statistical report.

The figure includes 20,819 traffic arrests, but not the arrests of 764 juvenile traffic offenders and delinquent and wayward minors.

The increase principally reflects more manpower.

During the period, 37,599 property and 4,630 liquor inspections were made. Complaints totaled 8,826, a 21 percent increase over April of last year.

Department vehicles traveled 1,732,529 miles. The identification bureau at East Lansing headquarters received 10,298 sets of fingerprints, of which 4,214 were non-criminal.
