Governor Signs Dock Bill; Way Paved for National

Governor G. Mennen Williams signed into law Tuesday, House Bill No. 558 which authorized the Michigan Conservation Department to sell a 600 by 800 foot tract of submerged land in Saginaw Bay, located south of the Tawas River mouth, to the National Gypsum Company.

A company spokesman said Wednesday morning that it is expected that construction will begin in the very near future, with a definite date to be established soon.

The governor had until 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon to either sign, veto or pocket the bill which had won overwhelming approval in the state legislature.

With the governor's signing of the bill, the way is paved for National Gypsum Company to set into motion its proposed \$6,000,000 expansion program in Iosco County. The land was needed as the site for an 800-foot loading dock for shipping gypsum rock from newly developed quarries located a short distance inland.

More than 140 persons converged on the state capitol Monday afternoon to attend a special hearing on the bill called by Governor Williams.

The governor heard both sides of the story on the proposal from cottage owners in the affected area and from company officials.

Also attending the hearing was a large delegation of Iosco citizens who have taken personal interest in the development of National Gypsum Company's facilities here. Included were members of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors, educators, representatives from Tawas City and East Tawas businessmen's associations, Tawas Chamber of Commerce, Tawas City Council members, farmers from Tawas, Alabaster, Plainfield and Burleigh Townships and Whittemore and Hale businessmen.

Wells F. Anderson, National Gypsum vice president in charge of operations from Buffalo, New York, told the governor that his signature on the bill would launch a \$6,000,000 expansion program in Iosco County. He said the project

would eventually increase employment here by at least 100 men through increased employment at National's facilities and through additional requirements of suppliers and the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company which will transport rock from the quarry to the stockpile.

Annual payroll for 100 additional men would amount to as much as \$350,000, stated Mr. Anderson.

Arguments against the project were heard from cottage owners along the shoreline, who said that the project would harm real estate values and that noise and dust would create additional problems.

Maureen E. Brown of Saginaw, a

lakeshore property owner, was spokesman for the cottage owners. He urged the governor to veto the bill, forcing the company to build its dock elsewhere, saying that constant dredging needed to clear a channel for ships would be a hazard to swimmers.

Anderson said that fears of the cottage owners were unfounded and that to make an installation elsewhere along the shore would cost at least \$1,000,000 more than the chosen site.

Among other cottage owners heard from were the Rev. Fr. Robert Neuman and M. E. Obrecht.

John T. Damm of Flint, company attorney, said if the project is not started it will jeopardize the company's economy and that of

the lake shore community.

After hearing from both sides in the matter, Governor Williams called on senators and representatives attending the meeting to give opinions.

Senator Charles T. Prescott of Prescott, Republican, gave a resume of the bill which passed in the senate 95 to 0 and in the house with only two dissenting votes.

The 10th district solon, a native of Tawas City, said that both houses gave long and thorough study of the bill in committee. "You can retard progress but you can't stop it," he told the governor.

Representatives Walter G. Nakula of Gladwin and Emil A. Peltz of Rogers City, both Republicans, urged the governor to sign the bill.

Firemen Say Area Residents Hamper Work

After answering a call on the Townline Road Monday night, Tawas City volunteer firemen could only shake their heads and wonder what would have been the result if the fire had been of a serious nature.

Within two or three minutes after the alarm sounded, the Tawas Township fire truck was on its way to the scene. By the time it had reached the John Hackett home a long string of passenger cars was following close behind.

The people in these cars were not all members of the volunteer fire department, many were curious residents who "just came along for the ride."

Fire Chief Fred Musolf, who was trapped in the middle of this string of cars, along with other firemen, when the procession turned off on the narrow two-lane Townline Road, said that curiosity on the part of these Tawas area residents may be costly one of these days.

He cited the fact that if there had been a serious fire, the fire truck could not have returned down the Townline Road for more water . . . it was nearly blocked with cars.

Fire Chief Musolf said the fire department is hampered by these thoughtless persons. "The situation is getting worse," he said. "We have tried a couple of methods of discouraging people from following the fire truck, but evidently they have not worked."

Two members of the department are also city police officers and deputy sheriffs, authorized to make arrests either in the city or elsewhere in the area. They have been instructed to start issuing summons to those who interfere with the work of the fire department. Chief of Police George Ruth is also going to cooperate in this crack-down on curiosity or "thrill" seekers.

Chief Ruth Disagrees With Action--

Corner Parking in Tawas City OK'd

At the request of businessmen Monday night, the common council authorized the department of public works to add extra parking spaces at the corners of several streets intersecting US-23 in Tawas City.

Archie Ruckle, former councilman and manager of the Alpena Candy Company's Tawas branch, and Carl Wise, grocery store owner, appeared at the session on behalf of Tawas City businessmen.

The two men urged the council to rescind its action of last summer whereby the restricted parking area on several intersections was lengthened to two car lengths. Ruckle said that the extra restricted space has created an additional parking problem in the already limited parking area of the business district. He said he had seen no decrease in accidents at these corners since the plan was put into effect.

Chief of Police George Ruth said he was opposed to adding the extra parking space on corners because he felt this would jeopardize traffic safety. Ruth said, "We can't expect down-state drivers to drive through a parking lot," (indicating conditions on US-23). He cited the need for more off-street parking.

Chief Ruth agreed with councilmen and the businessmen representatives that parking time limits in certain areas should be shortened.

Ruckle also urged enforcement of no truck parking on street corners, saying this problem was the greatest danger to anyone attempting to enter US-23 from a side street.

As the result of council action, parking space will be lengthened one car length on each side of US-23 corners at Mathews, Whittemore and First Streets. No truck parking will be enforced on corners and a 30-minute time limit will go into effect at Whittemore and First Streets.

Reduction of one car space on corners went into effect late last summer after a survey was conducted by the council's street committee and city police department. Recommendations made by the committee were approved by the council at that time.

In other business at Monday night's session, the council set up a special cemetery fund to make the Tawas City cemetery self-sustaining. During past years, receipts of lot sales went directly into the city's general fund. Councilmen and members of the cemetery board were of the opinion that this money should go directly toward cemetery improvement as is the case with the park finance, instead of doling out money from the general fund.

Two building permits were approved. They are as follows: Fred Brabant, 228 Second Street, replace wooden steps with new ones of concrete; Elmer Burrell, Burrell's Subdivision, home and garage, 24 by 52 feet, \$10,000.

Plastic colored pennants for street decoration purposes for use during Iosco County's centennial may be purchased from Regina Publitz, superintendent of public works. Price of a 25-foot string is \$1.25. Businessmen are urged to buy these strings and to install them this week-end.

'Beard' Violators Fined by Hale JP

Justice of the Peace Andrew Matthews of Hale "cracked-down" on a number of would-be offenders of a recent proclamation of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors. He fined five men 50 pennies each for "failure to either grow a beard for the county centennial celebration or else wear a shaving permit."

The JP, dressed in coonskin coat and top hat, rode into Hale Saturday night on horseback and declared court in session at a special stand constructed for that purpose on Hale's main street.

With double-barrel shot gun in one hand (Judge Roy Bean style), Justice Matthews brought down his gavel five times and "prisoners" paid out fines and purchased shaving permits before being released from the town lockup, a stockade constructed of slab wood.

Before adjournment, however, Justice Matthews set Saturday, June 8, at 7:30 p. m. as the time for hearing two special jury trials for those who plead "not guilty" to the charges.

Ernest Herzog of the Hale Telephone Company asked for a trial by his peers, as did Joseph Bannister, also of Hale. Undersheriff Leon Putnam, who was arrested later in the evening, will also be arraigned.

Herzog and Bannister were required to have two bondsmen each before being released. Justice Matthews commented that "the bondsmen must be worth at least 50 cents" before he would release the prisoners.

Iosco County Prosecuting Attorney William R. Barber will present the county's case against Herzog and Bannister. Attorney

Herbert Hertzler will be the defense counselor.

Some of the centennial police were Vern Ranger, Dennis Chivria, Orville Armstrong and Perry Sheltonberger. The latter sported a luxurious growth of chin whiskers. Dale Bradley, Hale banker, was bailiff during the court proceedings.

The "kangaroo court," all in fun of course to draw attention to the forthcoming county centennial celebration, June 23-29, attracted a large crowd of spectators. Chivria, who is chairman of Hale's participation in the program, said that several hundred shaving permits had been sold in that community.

He sends an invitation to anyone in the Tawas area who sports a centennial beard to be on hand at Hale Saturday night to act on the jury.

Reading clubs begin in June and continue through August and are held at the seven branches of the regional library and at the bookmobile stops of Isoco and Arenac Counties.

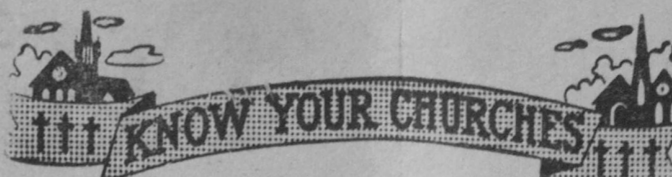

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to construct, maintain and use electric lines consisting of poles, masts, towers, crossarms, guys, braces, feeders, transmission and distribution wires, transformers and other electrical appliances on, along and across the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places in the CITY OF WHITTEMORE, IOSCO COUNTY, MICHIGAN, and to do a local electric business therein, for a period of thirty years.

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SECTION 3. No highway, street, alley, bridge or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary during the work of construction and maintenance, and shall be restored to the same good order and condition as when such work was commenced.

SECTION 4. All poles, masts, towers and other supports shall be set and all wires shall be suspended in a careful and proper manner so as not to injure persons or property. The Grantee shall have the right to trim trees if necessary in the conducting of such business, subject, however, to the supervision of the Street Commissioner of the City. The Grantee shall at all times keep and save the City free and harmless from all loss, costs and damage to which it may be subjected by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the poles, masts, towers, wires and other structures and appliances, the erection and maintenance of which are hereby authorized.
