Memorial Day services at Tawas City and East Tawas cemeteries will be held Thursday (today). The public is invited to attend these services and all ex-servicemen are urged to participate.

## Tawas City

The Rev. Ralph Edwards, pastor of the Methodist Churches of the Tawasies, will be principal speaker at services to be held at the Tawas City Cemetery.

The program, under the auspices of Jesse Hodder Post, American Legion, will commence with a parade of veterans at 9 o'clock starting from the American Legion Hall. The Tawas Area High School Band will be in the formation.

Invocation and benediction at the cemetery will be given by the Rev. Charles Mercer, pastor of the Tawas City Baptist Church. Ceremonies will be held at the Mathews Street Bridge honoring naval dead.

James Dillon will be officer of the day and John N. Brugger will have charge of the firing squad.

## East Tawas

Chaplain (Capt.) Clinton Wendland will be principal speaker at services to be held at Greenwood Cemetery, East Tawas.

Held under the auspices of Audie Johnson Post, American Legion, the parade will form at the American Legion Hall at 10:30. In the formation of marchers will be members of the American Legion and Auxiliary, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and Auxiliary, Boy Scouts, Campfire Girls and the Tawas Area High School Band.

Anderson Tells of Misunderstandings--

## Clarifys Expansion of National's Facilities

Several misunderstandings and misconceptions pertaining to the current expansion program of the National Gypsum Company in the Tawas area were cleared up this week in a report by Wells Anderson, vice president of the company.

Mr. Anderson said that the company's present expansion program calls for an expenditure of \$23,000,000 in the Great Lakes area. This includes \$6,000,000 for the new quarry operation and dock facilities, with its conveyor belt system and storage area, south of Tawas City.

The remainder of the expansion program will include new plants at Lorain, Ohio, and Waukegan, Illinois. Rock from the new National City quarry will be used to supply the present National City plant and the two new plants.

"We are interested first in Michigan and the other two plants, and then in the entire country, because we have a substantial operation," stated Mr. Anderson.

"In planning this new operation we are increasing the opportunity for the National City plant. We will improve and enhance the overall picture for our company by providing rock for the three plants in a more economical manner. This, in effect, will play a part in the future of the National City plant," stated Mr. Anderson.

### No Word as Yet on Governor's Signature

Charles H. Hill, plant manager at the National City plant, said that as of Tuesday morning Governor Williams had not signed House Bill No. 558 which would allow the conservation department to lease the submerged lands in Saginaw Bay for dock facilities.

The bill, passed by both the senate and house of representatives, went to the governor for his signature on May 23. It will become law within 10 days from the time it was placed on his desk. The only chance for delay would be a veto, which would require another vote of the senate and house.

out that the 300 or more employees to be added in the expansion program will not all be in the Tawas area. "We expect that locally, total employment will be provided for up to 100 men, through increased employment in National's expanded facilities, and through additional requirements in suppliers and the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company, which will haul our rock from the quarry to the stockpile," he stated.

He said that he had spent the entire previous day with Malvern Obrecht, one of the owners of property adjoining the dock site. He also said that Melvin H. Baker, chairman of the board, had advanced several suggestions which he hoped might lead to an equitable solution to the problem for both the residents of the area and the company.

"The gypsum in the ground has no value. We must get it from the ground through the quarry, to our plants and to the market before the operation is a success. We are making all these changes in our program so that we will be in a better position in our highly competitive industry," Mr. Anderson stated.

Commenting on the trouble which has arisen on the part of residents of the area in which the company proposes to build a tramway into Saginaw Bay, Mr. Anderson said:

"We believed we were doing things the right way. We have to go after things in a straight line. We could not afford to let everybody in on what we were doing, or the land we needed would have been prohibitive in cost. We believe that the dock installation will be of such a type and nature that it will not be harmful to the surrounding property, in spite of what the adjoining property owners fear."

### BACCALAUREATE SERVICES HERE SUNDAY NIGHT

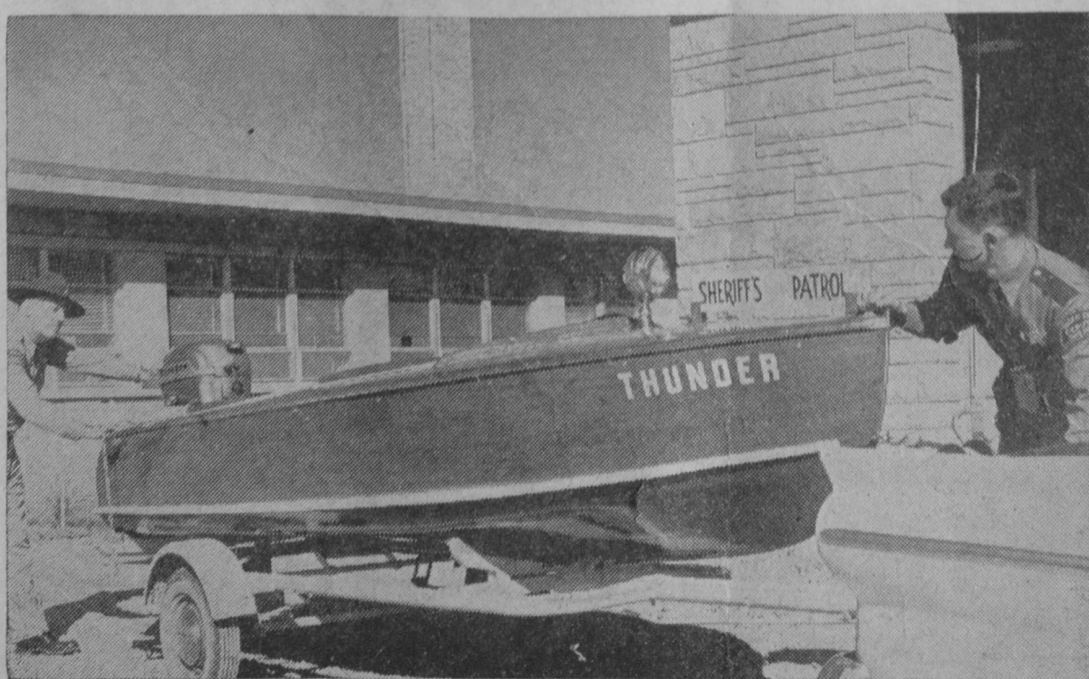
Graduation week at Tawas Area High School will start next Sunday night, June 2, when baccalaureate exercises will be held at the Tawas Area auditorium.

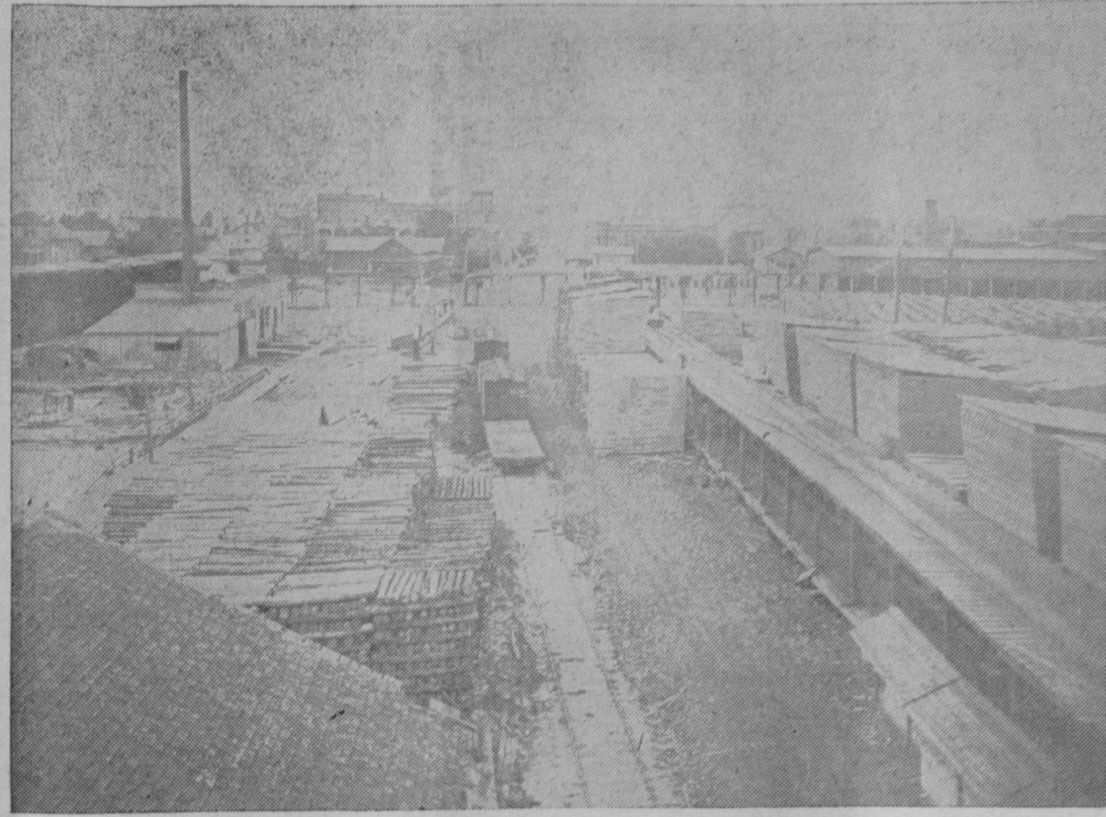

### Research Shows that Faulty Clothes Dryer Usually Users Fault

Quite often we hear homemakers express dissatisfaction with their automatic clothes dryers for this reason or that.

Many times, not always, but more often than not, the fault is with us and not with the dryer. This seems to be a conclusive fact because tests, conducted in reliable, impartial research laboratories, have proved: Clothes will look whiter, be fluffier, have less wrinkles and last longer, if dried in an automatic dryer rather than on a clothesline. Colored garments are less likely to fade.

The work done by these research laboratories has been gathered together for our help in following the "10 commandments for automatic clothes drying."

1. Be sure the drum is wiped clean before using. (Dirt or grease in the dryer will get on clothes.)

2. Sort clothes for washing and drying at one time in one operation. Similar fabrics require the

same drying time and temperature. It is easier to transfer load directly from washer to dryer than sort wet clothes.

3. Do not overload. Complaints about slow operation are usually due to overloading the dryer and not allowing clothes sufficient room to tumble.

4. Always follow manufacturers' suggested temperature settings if dryer has temperature selection controls.

5. Do not overdry. Overdrying causes static electricity in synthetic fabrics and also causes wrinkles to set. Limp linens, too, are also the result of overdrying.

6. Dry starched clothes with other starched clothes. (In the case of nylon or dacron curtains, for example, put a couple of dry terry towels in with the curtains. Towels will absorb excess starch and leave a crisp finish on curtains.)

7. Allow trace of moisture to be

left in knitted fabrics. (Since T shirts and knitted undergarments will shrink slightly when wet, buy T shirts one size larger to allow for shrinkage. Wash and dry before first wearing.)

8. Remove clothes from dryer as soon as dryer turns off—that is, unless you plan to dampen and iron them later.

9. Use top of dryer for smoothing and folding surface. Heat of the dryer aids in smoothing clothes. It is seldom necessary to iron flat work if removed from dryer while still slightly damp, smooth out and fold immediately.

10. Check and clean lint tray frequently. If lint is a problem, remember that most of it was formed before the drying process. "Automatic" drying is easier on clothing than line drying. However, lint is blown away during line drying while in automatic drying it settles in the lint trap.

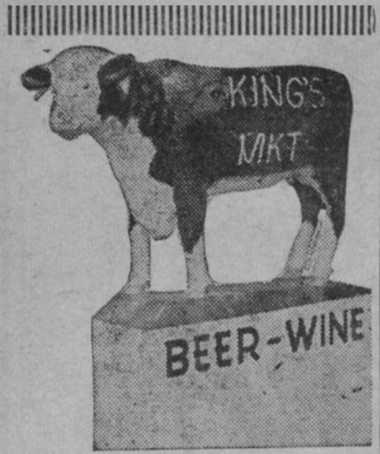

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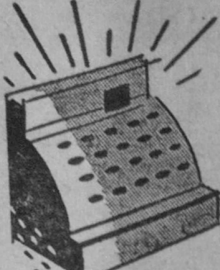
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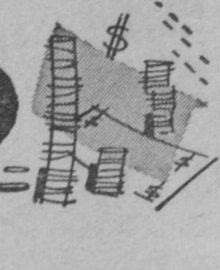
