

# Rages Out of Tawas City and East Tawas Enter Water Purchase Pact

Final water purchase negotiations between Tawas City and East Tawas were completed last Thursday night at a special meeting of the East Tawas Council and water

Mayor Elmer Werth of East Tawas inked in his signature on the legal documents, thus binding the two communities to a 30-year pact in which Tawas City will purchase water from its neighboring community's new water filtration plant, now under construction.

Tawas City Mayor George Tuttle had signed the contract a week ago Tuesday night, subject only to a review of any possible late changes in the wording of the contract.

Said Mayor Tuttle Monday, "The signing of this contract is the approval of three years work by the water board, whose aim was to find an ample supply of pure, soft water at the least cost to the consumer. They are now free to give more time to the extension of our water mains and to the adequate enlargement of our sewage disposal plant."

According to terms of the contract, a joint board is to be established to carry out the terms of the contract. By ordinance, the mayor of each city will appoint three members to the board.







# **Warning in State**

em by which the country can be alerted in eight minutes as compared to 20 minutes under the former plan has been cut in with a test that proved a success.

Under the former system, Michigan received its alert from two different points. The state was divided into eight districts, the first six receiving the alert signal from the 30th Air Defense installation at Belleville, while districts seven and eight in the north received theirs from Truax Field, Madison, Wisconsin.

The new system divides the country into three sections, the western, central and eastern. Michigan is in the eastern section, as are 25 other states. All warnings come from a central point at Colorado Springs, Colorado. Communication to Michigan is by a telephone circuit kept open on a 24-hour basis.

When the warning from Colorado Springs is given to East Lansing headquarters of the state police, this headquarters will then be polled from a headquarters point in the eastern air warning circuit, as will other states in the area, to make certain it has been received.

With a foot control the connection is broken between East Lansing and the eastern station. and the way is clear for the state police to poll all eight districts in the state to determine if they have received the alert. During this period, communications with the central installation at Colorado Springs remain intact, and Michigan is able to monitor any information from that point.







### Catholics Plan **New Seminary** Near Saginaw

A new, seminary for educating young men for the Catholic priesthood of the Diocese of Saginaw is being planned here, according to announcement by the Most Rev. Stephen S. Woznicki, bishop of Saginaw.

The building, which will house up to 180 students, will be located on a 52-acre site at the corner of Wieneke and Weiss Roads, two and one-half miles west of Saginaw.


