School Board Starts Disposal of Property

Steps were taken Tuesday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education to transfer ownership of the East Tawas athletic field to the City of East Tawas. City Attorney Richard Newman and Herbert Hertzler, attorney for the board of education, are to draw up a deed for the transfer of property.

The deed will stipulate that the field would be used for recreational purposes and would revert back to the school district should it be needed for construction of school buildings.

Several members of the Tawas Township Board met with the board of education to make arrangements for transferring ownership of the Vine school to that township for use as a township hall and community building. It will also be stipulated in this deed that the property would revert back to the school district if needed.

Tuesday night's action was taken as a result of the recent school election which gave the board of education the authority to dispose of any school property which had been declared surplus as the result of consolidation of school districts in 1952.

The board of education entered into an agreement with Consumers Power Company for extending a power line to the new football field.

WANT SAGINAW BAY FERRY

Port Austin to Tawas Ferry Still Has 'Life'

Although not much has been heard here recently on a proposed ferry boat service between Port Austin in the Thumb and the Tawas, the proposal may still have "life" and will be followed up by businessmen and civic leaders from both communities.

At a meeting of the East Tawas Retailers' Association last week, Clarence Pisula of Port Austin outlined recent actions and resolutions taken by that community to further the proposal.

As a result of the meeting, businessmen from the Tawas area and Port Austin are to take further steps by urging the state legislature to utilize one of the recently retired state ferries at the Straits of Mackinac for such service.

During hearings last year with a special committee of the state legislature, attended by hundreds of residents of both areas, it was pointed out that a ferry service between Port Austin and the Tawas, across Saginaw Bay, would be a great convenience to the public. It would aid in the development of the resort industry, save a great many miles of highway travel, which would result in increased safety to the traveling motorist, and increase the state revenue.

It was pointed out that a regularly scheduled ferry crossing would be one of the outstanding tourist lures in Michigan. The diversion from highway travel for a vacationer, as well as the citizens of Southeastern Michigan and the eastern half of the state, would be appreciated, from the standpoint of a pleasant, safe boat ride, the relaxing time period of crossing.

This tourist attraction it was stated would play a very important part in keeping Michigan's second largest industry climbing back to its rightful position in the nation.

According to a transcript of testimony taken during the hearing, it was stated that the state ferry, "Vacationland," would be the most ideally adaptable for this particular ferry service.

It is believed that the ferry crossing from Port Austin to the Tawas would be heartily accepted by the tourists as one of the great "tour lures" of the state and that the capacity of this boat would be required to accommodate the demands of this crossing.

The Vacationland, costing Michigan \$4,600,000, is the newest and largest of the state ferries at the Straits of Mackinac. It is an ice cutter of modern design and was put into service in 1952. It is the most powerful commercial ship on the Great Lakes, generating 10,000 horsepower with its four diesel engines. It is 360 feet long and carries 105 vehicles and 600 passengers.

Businessmen and civic leaders from both the Thumb and the Tawas areas will attend the January session of the state legislature to urge that the proposed service be instituted.

Three 16-Year-Olds Returned Here on Car Theft Charges

Three 16-year-old boys were returned here from Delta County, Upper Peninsula, by state police officers Sunday to face possible car theft charges committed in Tawas City last week. The boys are being held at the Isoco County Jail while awaiting a decision of the Isoco County Probate Court whether they will face criminal charges.

The youths, two from Linwood and one from Ohio, drove off in an automobile owned by Lloyd Stamm of East Tawas last Friday night. Stamm was visiting friends in Tawas City when the car was stolen. The car was unlocked and the keys were in the ignition.

The three boys were later apprehended in the Upper Peninsula by state police officers.

Police learned that the trio had taken a car owned by a sister of one of the boys in Linwood and started north. They parked the car south of Tawas City after running into mechanical difficulty and hitch-hiked to town.

Tawas Junior Braves Post Perfect Record for Season

Tawas Area High School's Junior Braves won undisputed first place in junior varsity play in the Northeastern Michigan Conference with a perfect seven win, no loss record. This is the first perfect sports record of any team since the reorganization of Tawas Area Schools in 1952.

In its final game of the year last Thursday night, the junior varsity won over the Pinconning JV's, 13-6, in the team's closest squeak of the season.

Tawas took an early lead in the first quarter when Harry Woolhiser, speedy halfback, scored the first of his two touchdowns of the night on a 45-yard run. The eventual winning point after touchdown was booted between the goal posts by Arnie Stump.

Both teams played on even keel during the second and third quarters. Pinconning scored its lone

TD of the game in the final three minutes of play. Tawas, deep in its own territory, attempted to punt on fourth down but a pass from center went over Jim Campbell's head where it was recovered by a Piny player for a TD in the end zone.

With three seconds to go in the game, Woolhiser scored the last TD of the season for the Junior Braves on a 35-yard run. The extra point was missed. Pinconning had one golden opportunity to score in the fourth quarter. With the ball on the Tawas eight-yard line, Piny went seven yards for a first down. The Tawas defense then stiffened with its back to the goal line and three Pinconning back four yards to take over the ball on downs.

The Tawas JV's played without the services of their regular quarterback, Pete Bolen, who moved up

to the varsity squad for Friday night's tilt against Oscoda. Filling in very capably for Bolen was John Sass, who had only three days practice in the quarterback slot.

In their seven-game winning skinn, the Junior Braves rolled up 273 points as against 25 points for the opposition.

Composed entirely of freshmen and sophomores, only about six of the younger members of the junior varsity are expected to remain on the squad next year as the remainder of the team will make a step up to the varsity.

Named as honorary captains Monday night were Woolhiser, Bolen and Dwayne Sanders. Woolhiser, who scored 16 touchdowns in the seven games this year, was selected by his teammates as the most valuable player.

LeRoy Pickett Killed in M-65 Auto Accident

A 27-year-old Whittemore man, LeRoy W. Pickett, was killed in a truck-car crash last Thursday morning on M-65 north of the M-55 intersection. He died from extensive head and chest injuries suffered in the crash.

Pickett, driving a convertible, ran into the back end of a dump truck driven by George A. Grets Jr. of Decker. The impact from the crash completely demolished the car.

Grets told investigating police officers that he was headed south on M-65 at a slow rate of speed. This section of the road is under construction by the Michigan State Highway Department.

Watson Named to Head 1958 Winter Sports Committee

Donald Watson, Tawas City motel operator, was appointed chairman of the Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee this week by Osman E. Ostrander, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce. Watson took over his new duties at Monday night's regular meeting.

Other officers named to serve with Watson were: Russell Meyers, secretary; L. G. McKay Jr., treasurer; and Edward Seifert Jr., chairman of the ski patrol at the valley. Operation of the toboggan slides at Silver Valley this year will be assumed by Donald Hogaboam of East Tawas. The entire operation, including maintenance, will be undertaken by Hogaboam and his crew. Receipts from the toboggan rides will be on a percentage basis with the winter sports committee.

The toboggan slide operation had been a stumbling block this year as the winter sports committee prepared to start making plans for the coming winter sports season. At one time the committee recommended that the slides be discontinued because of lack of necessary operating funds.

Hogaboam, a general contractor at East Tawas, offered to take over the operation in order to give his crew of carpenters work during the winter months.

Final arrangements for this operation were made after Monday night's meeting when a special committee consisting of Watson, McKay, John Pinter, Conrad Carlson and Ostrander met with Hogaboam to iron out details. On hand during the regular meeting was Harold Klump, who was appointed last week as park supervisor. Details of his salary and duties have not been announced as yet.

Klump, who was employed at the winter sports area two years ago, told members that it would take about three days to get facilities at Silver Valley in shape for the season. His suggestions included that the sand base in the toboggan slides be leveled, returns be repaired and a shaft on one of the ski tows be rebuilt.

A financial report by McKay indicated that the Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee has an outstanding debt of about \$3,000 remaining from last year.

400,000 Hunters Take to Michigan's Forests

Michigan deer hunters, some 400,000 strong, will take to the woods Friday with an eye out for a wily white tail buck. It is estimated that approximately 73,000 legal deer, including antlerless, will be harvested before the end of the season.

Hunters will face a number of new restrictions and new liberalizations in Michigan conservation laws this year. One of the most important is that hunters are required by law, at all times, to have guns in cars in fastened cases or disassembled or in the trunk.

Another first for the season will be the thousands of hunters who zip across the new Mackinac Bridge on their way to favorite hunting spots in the Upper Peninsula.

Another serious problem is the number of hunters killed by gunfire each year. Too many hunters are known for their readiness to shoot at any moving object. The number of hunting accident deaths is boosted each year by heart attack victims. The conservation department points out that it is important to a hunter to know about the condition of his heart. This means seeing his doctor for a checkup before going in to the woods.

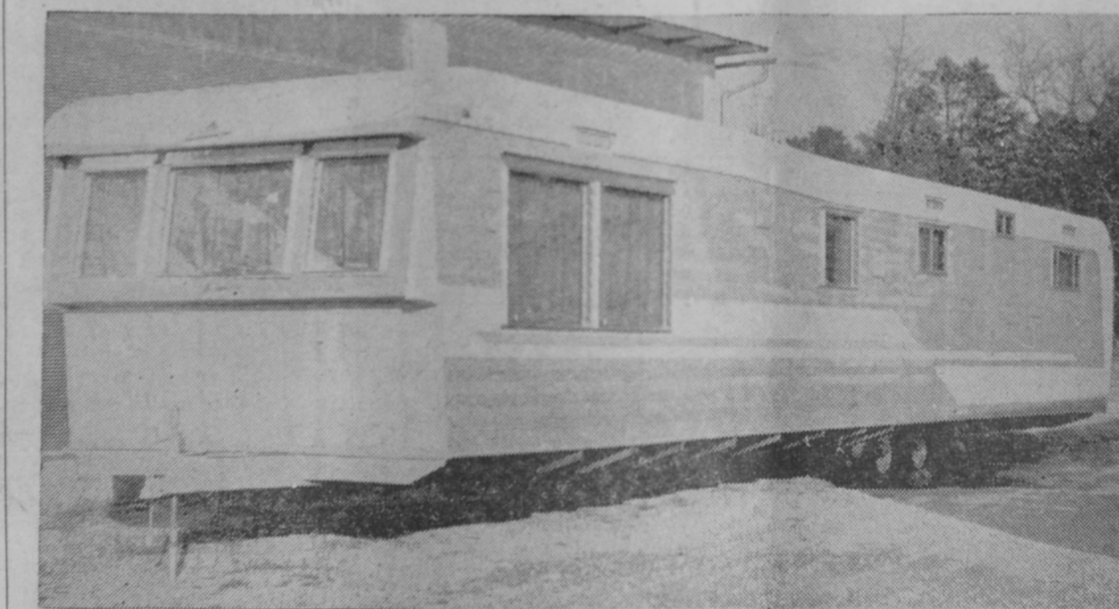
Finish Blacktopping Job on Brigger's Parking Lot

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### Christmas Seals Now Arriving in Isoco Homes

Gleaming Christmas tree ornaments reflecting the gleeful face of a little girl and a joyful Santa adorn this year's tuberculosis Christmas Seals, now arriving in homes in Isoco County.

Santa reflects the joy and satisfaction of the giver, and the little girl portrays the delight and thankfulness of the receiver, according to Theo V. Eddy, president of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association.

"We urge every family in the county to make Christmas Seals part of its giving because the seals give the greatest gift of all—health, life, itself, to so many," Eddy said.

For 50 years, the seals have supported the case-finding, health education and research programs of the voluntary TB associations. Eddy said that TB deaths have been cut 94 percent in those 50 years, and although tuberculosis has seldom yielded dramatically, progress has been constant.

State-wide, TB deaths are at their lowest point in history, but

the number of new cases is decreasing more slowly. According to Eddy, the TB picture here is similar. Deaths are down, but the number of new cases remains high.

The three-year total of TB deaths for this county from 1954 through 1956 is zero compared to six, the total for 1944-1946. The total of new cases for the last three years is five, compared to eight 10 years ago.

State-wide, about three-fifths of new cases are active TB. "On the average in Michigan, about 10 new active cases of tuberculosis are found every day," Eddy said.

"Modern treatment is saving lives. Christmas Seal dollars must now work to prevent the disease to save the months and years of necessary treatment."

The Christmas Seal sale runs from November 15 through Christmas. County residents are asked by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association to answer their Christmas Seal letter as soon as possible.

Challenge Comes When Wife Prepares Prize

A Bay City hunter, requesting the conservation department's game recipe leaflet, sent the following letter:

"Dear Sirs: I would like to ask you for the game bird recipe book. You see, my wife doesn't know how to cook. We were just married yesterday and she told me she could cook, but I found out different. She cooked the bird I shot yesterday with the feathers and insides still in it. Boy, did that taste lousy."

"If you would, please send that book. Please hurry, I am going hunting tomorrow. Send the book to my wife."

The free leaflet, which contains recipes for pheasant, grouse and duck, was sent immediately to the new bride. Of course, her cooking may have been a reaction to a husband who went hunting on his wedding day.

The recipes can be obtained by sending a post card to "Game Cooking," Michigan Conservation Department, Lansing 26.

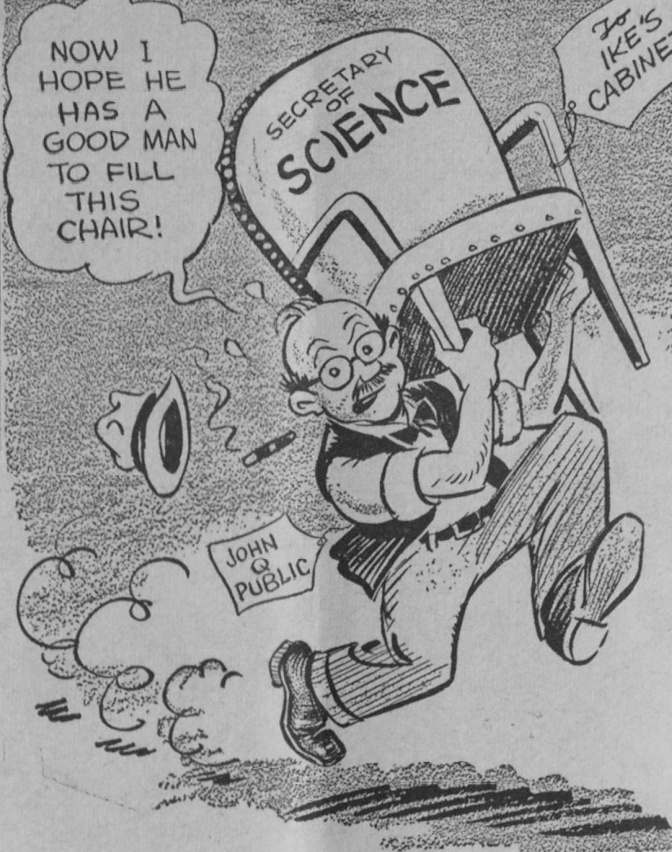

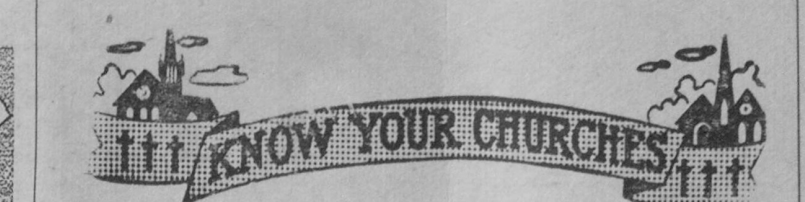

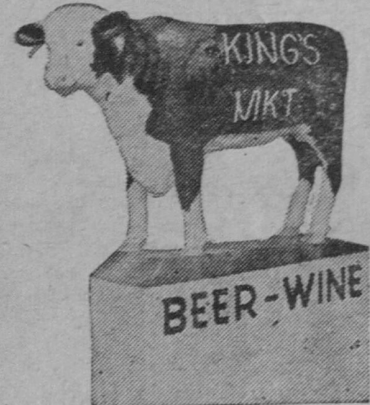

There's always bound to be a lot of interesting activity going on around such signs, and your finished roll can turn up with some fine dramatic pictures. Men in overalls, a steam shovel and a mountain of rubble and dirt may not sound very exciting—but just wait and see. Good composition and a low camera angle can do wonders with this type of material. Choosing a low angle will give an impression of how small a man can be against huge machines and the universe in general. Yet, in effect, your picture will show that he directs these machines and even a part of the universe despite his small size.

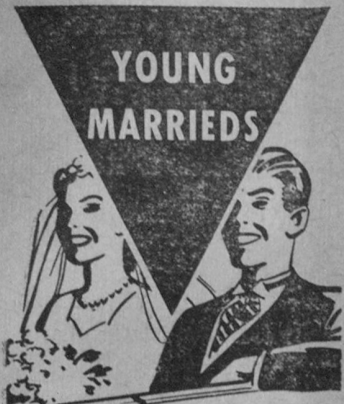

The dates of the health council meetings will be printed on the community calendars for 1958, with members approving funds for payment of this expenditure.

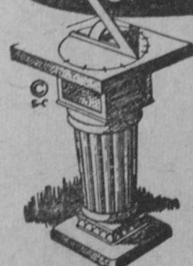
Better medical facilities and a medical center are in the council's plans for the future as the community is expected to expand in the next 10 years.

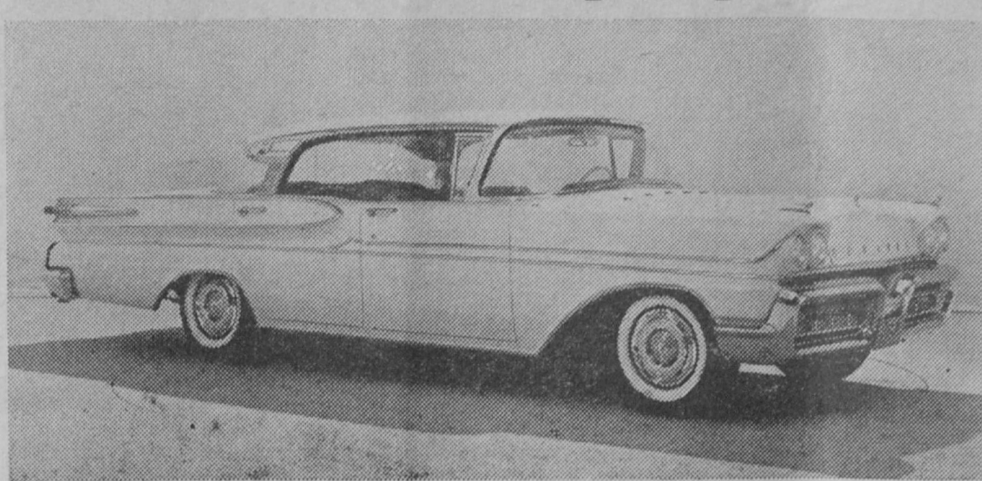

# New Cadillac Now on Display at McKay's

The 1958 Cadillac, which went on display Wednesday at McKay Sales Company, Tawas City, has a new look of luxury, both inside and out.

Accounting for this 1958 look are a new "going away" tail fin, the four headlamp system, sweeping low lines, a dramatically different over-all profile and the finest interiors ever offered by Cadillac.

Included in the 12 models is a new extended deck sedan in the popular 62 series.

The big engineering news for Cadillac in 1958 involves suspension advances. These advances result in better and softer ride and improved control and handling.

The basic factor in the improved suspension is the use of four-link rear suspension on all models. By using this new linkage, the Cadillac is adaptable to either coil spring suspension, which is standard, or optional air suspension.

The exterior differences result from the inboard fin treatment of the rear quarter panel and the wrap-around three-section bumper. A new bumper bar is added to the 1958 Eldorados and vertical molding strips are included between the outer bumper sections and the middle portion which houses the license plate.

Among the exterior features which distinguish this model is an extruded aluminum shield across the lower rear quarter panel. The grooved effect of this molding is carried around to the rear deck also where it runs between the two back-up lights inset in the deck.

Other distinguishing 60 Special features are a wide stainless steel rocker sill molding which covers the lower edge of the doors and vertical chromed blades which are added to the rear bumper on either side of the license plate opening.

The 60 Special, too, attains new heights of interior luxury. There are 13 interior combinations with this model, including three wool broadcloth options in a strikingly handsome biscuit and button combination.

Twenty-four exterior colors are available on all models other than the Eldorado Brougham. Five of these are long-life, high-lustre acrylic paints which are standard with the Eldorado Biarritz and Eldorado Seville and available as options on other models. The Brougham has 15 distinctive acrylic colors of its own.

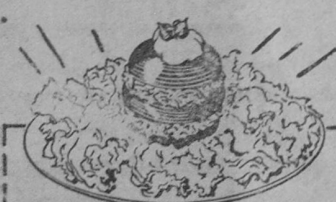

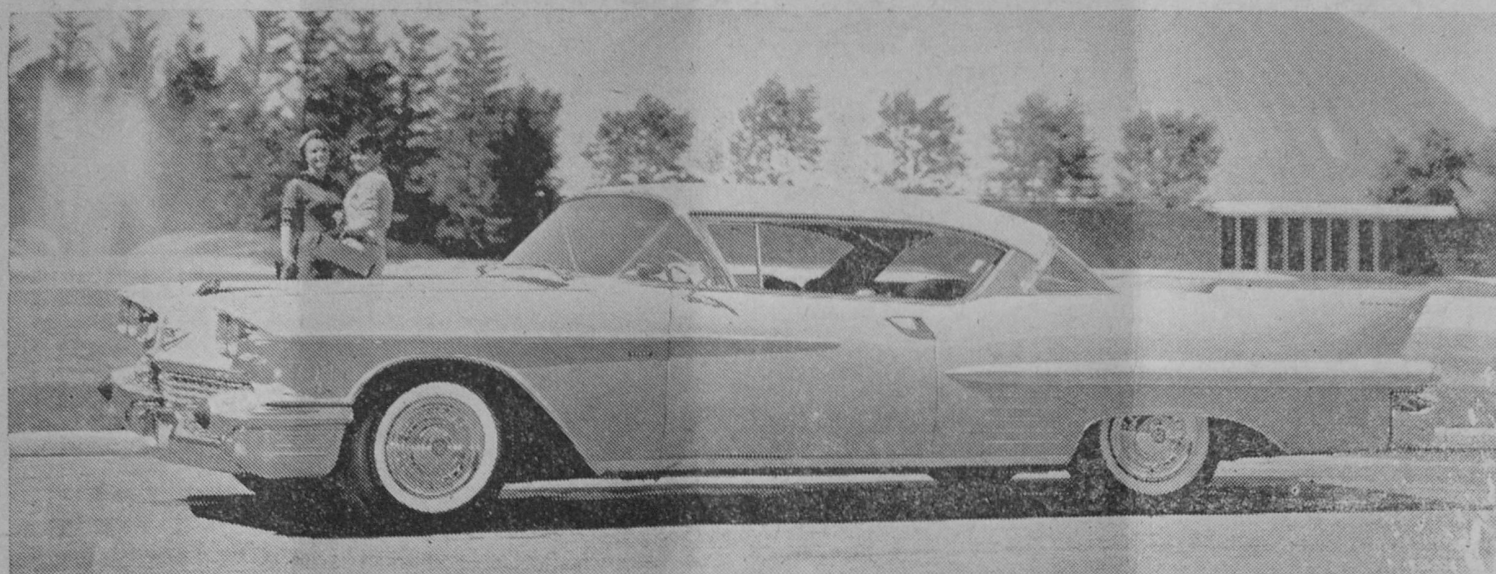

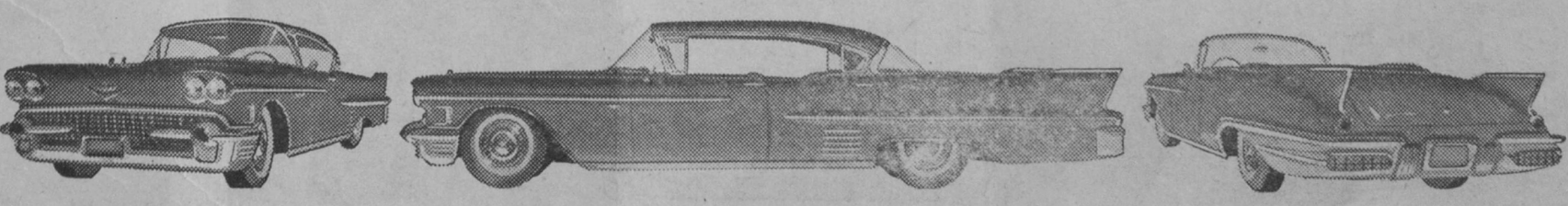

MARVIN DAVENPORT SAYS—

4,173 Feeder Cattle Sold in Northern Michigan's 4 Sales

A total of 4,173 feeder cattle sold for nearly half a million dollars at northern Michigan's four cooperative feeder cattle sales, reports Wilton Finley, Michigan State University extension beef specialist.

Some 2,067 steer calves averaging 408 pounds sold for an average of \$27.43 per hundredweight or \$112.05 per head. A total of 1,534 heifer calves averaging 391 pounds sold for \$24.06 per hundred weight, an average of \$94.06 per head.

Yearling steers averaging 684 pounds brought an average of \$22.05 per hundred pounds with the

383 head averaging \$150.88. A total of 189 yearling heifers averaging 628 pounds sold for \$19.43 per hundredweight or \$122.05 per head.

Last year, heifer and steer calves averaged a little lighter in weight and sale prices were around \$3 to \$4 a hundred pounds less.

Sales were at Gaylord, West Branch, Alpena and Ontonagon between October 10 and 17.

Mr. Finley feels that this feeder cattle industry in the northern part of the state fits Michigan very well. There is plenty of good hay and pasture on which cow herds do well.

Some dairymen have bought and successfully stored wet brewer's grains in a silo during the summer. The wet grains become sour but this does not impair their feeding value.

Malt sprouts are not very palatable. However, when fed in limited amounts of not more than two pounds per cow, they are very good dairy feed.

Feeding live yeast to dairy cows to increase milk production or feed efficiency is a waste of time and money.

Tests at Michigan State University this past year show that feeding live yeast under controlled conditions has no effect on milk production, butterfat test or feed efficiency.

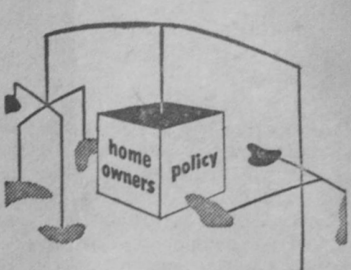

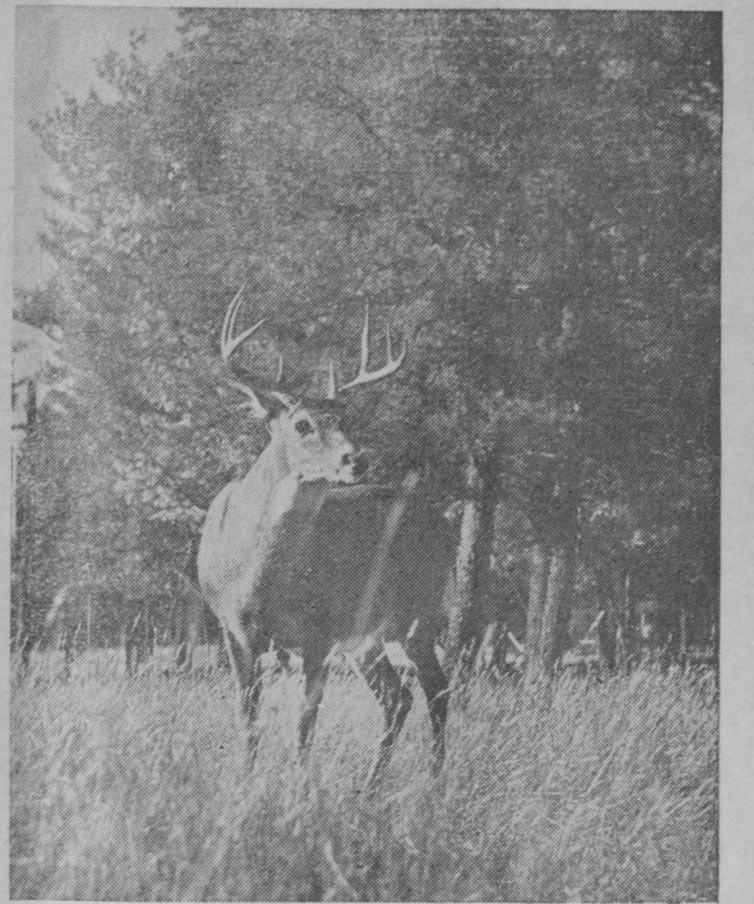

P-TA Program

Some of the rules governing the riding of bicycles, together with a brief list of safety rules as prepared by the state police, are as follows: Unless local ordinances provide otherwise, always ride on the street or highway; bicyclists must keep to the right, staying as closely as is practicable to curbing or side of road; bicyclists must ride with careful, attentive regard for persons and property.

Bicyclists must be able to stop within the assured clear distance ahead; they must have their wheels under control so that they can stop as promptly as the operator of a vehicle ahead does; they must ride at a prudent speed which will permit them to avoid collisions with pedestrians, other subjects and vehicles ahead which may be stopped suddenly.

Signals must be given before starting, stopping or turning from a direct line; stop and go lights, blinker lights and stop signs must be observed; stops are required when entering streets from private drives; observe right of way rule which provides that, when two vehicles approach at intersections at about the same time, the one on the right shall have the right of way; never attempt to pass a moving vehicle at an intersection; never hitch to other vehicles.

Bicycles ridden after dark must carry a front lamp and a rear lamp or reflecting device; bicyclists may ride only upon permanent and regular seats, and no more persons may ride upon a bicycle than for which it was built; bicyclists must not ride more than two abreast unless they are upon paths or parts of highways for the exclusive use of bicyclists; no person riding a bicycle may carry any package, bundle or other articles which prevent him from keeping both hands upon the handle bars; every bicycle must be equipped with a bell or horn capable of giving a signal which can be heard for a distance of at least 100 feet. Sirens or whistles are unlawful.
