A head-on crash on the Wilber proval Monday afternoon. Road last Thursday resulted in the fatal injury to a Dearborn man and minor injuries to a serviceman stationed at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda. The crash occurred 2.3 miles north of the Monument Road intersection.




Former Tawas City Man Died Nov. 17

Dale H. Fillmore, Dearborn corporation counsel, and one time Masonic Temple. resident of this city, died November 17, at Dearborn. Coronary thrombosis was the cause of death. Born August 4, 1901, at Petersburg, Michigan, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles Fillmore at one time prominent Whitney Township farmers and for several years residents of this city. While here he and his brothers and sisters attended the Tawas City Public Schools. He was a graduate of Ferris Institute, Albion College and the law department of the University of Michigan.

Following his admission to the bar, he practiced law in Detroit. While associated with John McNeil Burns, in 1942 he was appointed attorney for the Dearborn Charter Commission and later corporation counsel for that city.

Surviving are his wife; four children, Mrs. George Ferns of Williamston, Lucille, a teacher at Ann Arbor, Marjorie, a student at Albion. and Howard, a junior at Miami University; two sisters, Margaret and Frances, and three brothers, Millard, Frank and Charles.
