Former Tawas City Man Died Nov. 17

Dale H. Fillmore, Dearborn corporation counsel, and one time resident of this city, died November 17, at Dearborn. Coronary thrombosis was the cause of death. Born August 4, 1901, at Petersburg, Michigan, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles Fillmore at one time prominent Whitney Township farmers and for several years residents of this city. While here he and his brothers and sisters attended the Tawas City Public Schools. He was a graduate of Ferris Institute, Albion College and the law department of the University of Michigan.

Following his admission to the bar, he practiced law in Detroit. While associated with John McNeil Burns, in 1942 he was appointed attorney for the Dearborn Charter Commission and later corporation counsel for that city.

Surviving are his wife; four children, Mrs. George Ferns of Williamson, Lucille, a teacher at Ann Arbor, Marjorie, a student at Albion, and Howard, a junior at Miami University; two sisters, Margaret and Frances, and three brothers, Millard, Frank and Charles.

Funeral services were held at Mt. Olivet Methodist Church November 20. Last rites at the grave were given by United Craft Lodge, F and AM.

National Gypsum Gets Federal Approval for New Loading Dock

Notification was received here Monday from Albert Short, assistant secretary of the army, that a bill was signed Monday afternoon allowing construction of National Gypsum Company's proposed lake loading facilities south of Tawas City.

C. H. Hill, plant manager at the National City plant, said Tuesday that the company's Buffalo, New York, office had received official confirmation of the federal approval Monday afternoon.

"Work will start immediately on the project," stated Mr. Hill. Sorenson and Gross Contractors, Flint, are prime contractors of the new dock and have already started to move equipment in.

"The management of National Gypsum Company appreciates the efforts of businessmen and private individuals who assisted in obtaining the permit," stated Mr. Hill.

Final action on the proposal has long been awaited here. A hearing was held September 9 proposed in March 1956 to construct an aerial tramway into Saginaw Bay to allow loading of ore carriers.

Since that time National has started to develop its newly acquired 70-million ton gypsum deposit here, along with the necessary rail spurs, rail sidings and buildings to house ore processing equipment at the quarry.

Work is presently underway on a US-23 underpass south of Tawas City for a belt conveyor system to carry gypsum rock to the lake loading site.

Property owners adjacent to the lake loading site objected to a peninsular-type dock which National later proposed. The Michigan legislature approved a bill, signed by the governor, allowing construction of the dock in state waters. Property owners then commenced suit against Gerald Eddy, director of the Michigan Department of Conservation, to prevent the dock's construction.

Prior to the September hearing, National asked the corps of engineers for permission to construct an overhead conveyor 375 feet lakeward from shore to a pier of some 676 feet in length. Also to dredge to a depth of 19 feet a turning basin on the north and a mooring basin on the south of the installation.

Hurts Received in Crash Fatal to M. T. Arcy

A head-on crash on the Wilber Road last Thursday resulted in the fatal injury to a Dearborn man and minor injuries to a serviceman stationed at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda. The crash occurred 2.3 miles north of the Monument Road intersection.

Mitchell T. Arcy, 39, of Dearborn died at Tawas Hospital Thursday from chest, possible internal injuries and shock. His death came several hours after the crash, which occurred at 5:05 o'clock.

Kenneth Beals, 28, stationed at Wurtsmith, was released from Tawas Hospital after treatment for severe bruises and shock.

State police at East Tawas said that Arcy's car, traveling north, had attempted to pass another car and crashed head-on into the vehicle driven by Beals. Beals told officers that when he saw the oncoming vehicle in his lane he turned sharply to the right and dropped to the seat of the car.

Officers said that the highway was wet and a light snow made visibility poor at the time of the crash.

All three cars were badly damaged in the crash. DeSantos was ticketed for making an improper turn in front of traffic.

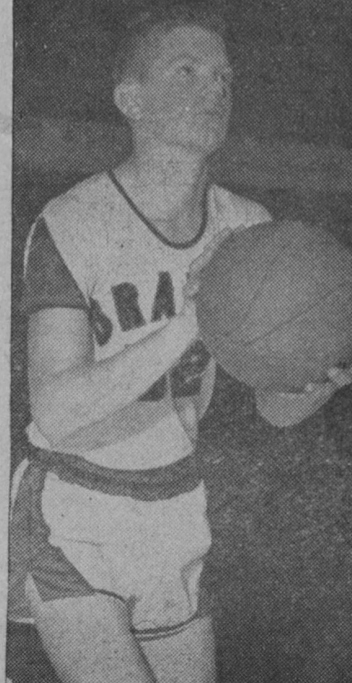

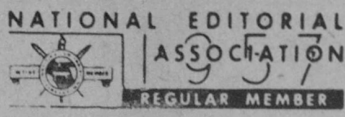
In the team's first scrimmage against competition from another school last week Wednesday, the Braves looked weak against a surprisingly strong Alcona High School team.

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Fitting Time to Think of Feeding Birds

Thanksgiving is a fitting time to think about the rugged little birds that hang on in the face of Michigan's wintry blasts instead of heading for the southland.

Charles Shick, extension game management specialist at Michigan State University, says the nut-hatches, blue jays, brown creepers, chickadees, juncos, grosbeaks and other birds do not really need any help but a bird feeding station adds color and life to the landscape when many of the birds are off down south.

A feeding station is a good place to learn to enjoy birds and animals.

If you start feeding the birds, you are obligated to continue. They become used to being fed, the bird population builds up in the area and if you stop feeding it creates a hardship for the birds.

Cracked corn, suet, bread crumbs, small grains and weed seeds are all good bird foods. Grit should also be available.

A wooden tray can be placed on a window sill or mounted on a post about five feet above the ground. A discarded Christmas tree makes a good place to hang suet or toast.

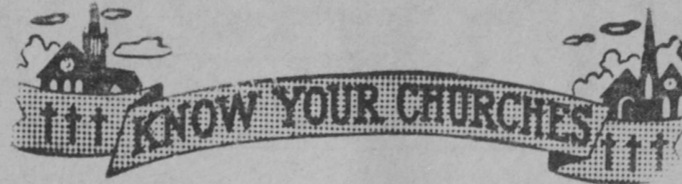
Auxiliary Formed at St. Mark's Mission

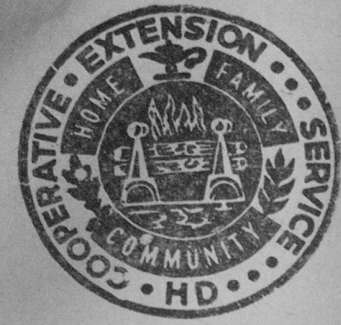

Yes, indeed we do shop with cents, but do we shop with sense? Buying food is a pretty important business. As much as one-fourth of our total incomes are spent for food. Usually this is enough to keep our families well nourished if we shop wisely. This is a big if because many times we fall short of doing the job.

Every family member needs the same basic foods, the amount of each depending on age and activity. To review once in awhile, things which we know, is a good plan. The basic food groups are:

Meat, poultry fish, eggs; milk, cheese, ice cream; leafy green and yellow vegetables; citrus fruit, tomatoes, raw cabbage, salad greens; potatoes and other vegetables and fruits; bread, flour, cereals; butter or fortified margarine.

Remember, the food in each of these groups has a special job to do and that is why some of each should be eaten every day.

Following are a few money-saving tips to aid in the wise spending of food dollars:

In season and abundant foods offer food shoppers opportunities to get good values for their money.

Consult food ads for special sale items when planning your weekly menus.

Larger food units usually cost less per pound than smaller units, but if larger units result in waste, the savings may be lost.

Meat prices are usually lowest at the following time:

Beef—early in the year. Veal—the last half of the year. Lamb—during the winter.

Pork—during the autumn.

Shopping for the family's food is an enjoyment of it can affect both our health and disposition.

Plenty of the right kinds of foods go a long way to insure a bright smile, a clear complexion, a happy word, a better job of work and play.

Storage Suggestions for Children's Toys Given

Where do you want storage for children's toys? The kitchen, bath, living room and child's sleeping area are probably the main places say Coral Morris, extension specialist in home management at Michigan State University.

The child needs storage where he plays. This makes it easy for him to "be good" and put his things away. It also keeps things handy for him to use and makes it easier for you to keep the house neat.

Shelves are probably the best storage as the child can learn to arrange things neatly. He can take pride in keeping toys and books in order.

A box can serve as a place to put things, but it does not encourage neatness. When his toys are thrown in a box he is less likely to learn to take good care of them. If space is limited you may need to use a sack, hung from the wall, but with the top open so he can reach in easily. Similar to the box, it does not encourage being careful of the toys.

A drawer in the bottom of the cupboard or dresser can be used, too. Be sure it is low enough for the child to reach easily.

Children like to be near you so you will want some storage in the kitchen. Let him have a bottom drawer or a low shelf away from the stove and from your busy area.

In the bathroom you will only need a small amount of storage for tub toys.

A closed shelf or drawer will help keep play things in the living room neat.

Postmaster Kasichke Says—'Everything Geared to Very Heavy Christmas Mail'

Postmaster Kasichke said today, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas. Post office facilities have been expanded, extra help will be available, and everything is geared up to handle a record Christmas mail in Tawas City this year."

The postmaster suggested that you take special care in preparing gift packages for the mails. Make sure that all addresses are legible and complete.

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the post office before attempting to mail them," the postmaster warns. The limits on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where you mail your package.

When wrapping gifts for mailing, it is always better to use corrugated cartons, especially where there are a number of various sized objects in the shipment. Use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper for extra protection against shock, and securely wrap each package or carton in heavy paper, and then tie it with strong cord. Be sure to include an extra label with your return address and the recipients address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

Another good idea is to place a piece of transparent cellophane tape over the address portion of the label on your package to prevent defacing in transit, and always make sure to include the recipients full name, street address, city, zone and state.

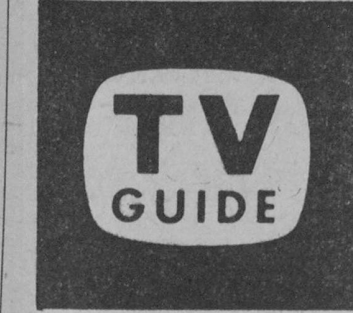
The post office will supply Pamphlet No. 2, telling you all about packaging and wrapping parcels for mailing and Pamphlet No. 3, giving full details on domestic postage rates and fees.

When mailing your Christmas cards, use the free labels from the post office reading, "All for local delivery" and "All for out of town delivery." By sorting your Christmas cards and tying them in two separate bundles, with the addresses all facing one way, you are sure to speed their arrival.

All Christmas cards should be sent by first class mail, and be sure to put your return address on your Christmas card envelopes.

Christmas cards and packages for out-of-town destinations should be mailed well before December 10, and your Christmas mail for local delivery should be sent at least a week before Christmas.

Concluding his appeal for your help in "Mailing early for Christmas," the postmaster said, "I am counting on 'the lady of the house' to really make this campaign a big success. She is usually the one who selects the Christmas cards, buys most of the gifts and sees to it that the Christmas mailing list is up-to-date."

ORDINANCE NO. 142

CITY OF TAWAS CITY

An ordinance authorizing the acquisition and construction of additions, extensions and improvements to the water supply system of the city of Tawas City; To provide for the issuance and sale of revenue bonds to pay the cost thereof pursuant to the provisions of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended; To provide for the fixing, collection, segregation and disposition of the revenues of said water supply system and payment of said bonds out of the revenues thereof; And creating a statutory lien on said revenues.

Whereas, it is deemed necessary that additional water facilities be acquired and constructed by the City of Tawas City in order to provide water service adequate for the needs of said City, said facilities to consist of extension of water mains to serve new customers, the construction of the water main and meter pit to connect to the distribution system of the City of East Tawas and the purchase and installation of 500 meters to complete the metering of the Water Supply System;

AND WHEREAS, the City of Tawas City has heretofore entered into a contract with the City of East Tawas for the purchase of an adequate supply of filtered water to serve its needs from the water filtration plant of the City of East Tawas now under construction, which contract is for a term of thirty (30) years from and after the completion of the construction of said plant, presently estimated to be on or about April 1, 1958;

AND WHEREAS, the City of Tawas City proposes to finance the cost of construction of the proposed additions, extensions and improvements, estimated to be Sixty-five Thousand (\$65,000.00) Dollars, by the issuance and sale of revenue bonds under the provisions of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended.

THE CITY OF TAWAS CITY ORDAINS:

Section 1. It is hereby determined to be necessary for the public health and welfare of the City of Tawas City to acquire and construct additions, extensions and improvements to the Water Supply System of the City listed as follows:

First Street, North Street to Burrell's Subdivision, 1338 L. F. of 6 inch main.

Elms Avenue and Crocker Boulevard, 1106 L. F. of 6 inch main.

Ninth Avenue, Fifth Street to US-23, 1506 L. F. of 6 inch main.

Spruce Street, Extended to M-55, 351 L. F. of 4 inch main.

Elms Avenue, Crocker Boulevard to Grove Avenue, 801 L. F. of 6 inch main.

US-23, Elms Avenue to 200 feet North, 2100 L. F. of 6 inch main.

US-23, Oak Street to City limits, 960 L. F. of 8 inch main.

One Master meter pit with two 6 inch meters (one to serve as a stand-by).

500 five-eighths inch by three-quarter inch water meters installed together with necessary appurtenances and attachments thereto.

Section 2. The plans, specifications and estimates of cost of such additions, extensions and improvements, prepared by The Spicer Engineering Company, consulting engineers, of Saginaw, Michigan, are hereby approved, and the total cost thereof, including engineering, legal, financing and incidental expenses, is estimated to be Sixty-five Thousand (\$65,000.00) Dollars, and the period of usefulness of said additions, extension and improvements is estimated to be not less than forty (40) years.

Section 3. To pay the cost of acquiring and constructing said additions, extensions and improvements, including payment of engineering, legal, financing and incidental expenses, it is hereby determined that the City of Tawas City shall borrow the sum of Sixty-five Thousand (\$65,000.00) Dollars and that revenue bonds of the City be issued therefor, under the provisions of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended, which said bonds are sometimes referred to in this Ordinance as "the bonds."

Wherever the words "the System" or "System" are used in this Ordinance, they shall be construed to mean the complete Water Supply System of the City of Tawas City, including, but not by way of limitation, (a) all existing water mains and all works, instrumentalities and properties used or useful in the obtaining of a water supply or the distribution of water; (b) the additions, extensions and improvements to be constructed under the provisions of this Ordinance, and (c) all additions, extensions and improvements thereto acquired or constructed in the future.

Wherever the word "project" is used in this Ordinance, it shall be understood to mean the additions, extensions and improvements to the System constructed under the provisions of this Ordinance.

Wherever the words "revenues" and "net revenues" are used in this Ordinance, they shall be understood to have the meanings as defined in Section 3, Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended.

Section 4. Said bonds shall be designated WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS, and shall be, not general obligations of the City of Tawas City, but revenue bonds, payable out of the net revenues of the System, and shall consist of

65 bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered in direct order of maturity from 1 to 65, both inclusive, dated as of February 1, 1958, and maturing serially as follows:

\$1,000.00 April 1st of each year from 1959 to 1965, both inclusive;

\$2,000.00 April 1st of each year from 1966 to 1976, both inclusive;

\$3,000.00 April 1st of each year from 1977 to 1988, both inclusive.

Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding five percent (5%) per annum, payable on October 1, 1958, and semi-annually thereafter on April 1st and October 1st of each year, both principal and interest to be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at a bank or trust company to be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds.

Bonds of this issue numbered 1 to 11, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1959 to 1967, both inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

Bonds numbered 12 to 65, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1968 to 1988, both inclusive, will be subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the City, in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date or, after April 1, 1967, at par and accrued interest, plus a premium as follows:

\$50.00 on each bond called for redemption prior to April 1, 1972;

\$40.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after April 1, 1972, but prior to April 1, 1975;

\$30.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after April 1, 1975, but prior to April 1, 1978;

\$20.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after April 1, 1978, but prior to April 1, 1981;

\$10.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after April 1, 1981, but prior to April 1, 1984;

No premium shall be paid on bonds called for redemption on or after April 1, 1984.

Thirty days' notice of the call of any bonds for redemption shall be given by publication in a paper circulated in the State of Michigan which carries, as part of its regular services, notices of sale of municipal bonds, and, in case of registered bonds, thirty days' notice shall be given by mail to the registered address. Bonds so called for redemption shall not bear interest after the date fixed for redemption provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem said bonds.

Said bonds may be registered as to principal only on the books kept by the City Treasurer in the manner and with the effect set forth on the face thereof, as hereinafter provided.

Said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the City Clerk and shall have the corporate seal of the City impressed thereon and shall have interest coupons attached hearing the facsimile signatures of said Mayor and City Clerk.

Section 5. Said bonds and attached coupons shall not be a general obligation or indebtedness of the City of Tawas City but shall be payable solely from the net revenues derived from the operation of the System and to secure such payment there is hereby created a statutory first lien upon the whole of the net revenues of said System, to continue until payment in full of the principal and interest on said bonds.

The holder or holders of said bonds or coupons representing in the aggregate not less than twenty percent (20%) of the entire issue then outstanding may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus, or other proceedings, protect and enforce the statutory first lien upon the revenues of the said System and may by suit, action, mandamus, or other proceedings, enforce and compel performance of all duties of the officers of the City of Tawas City, including the fixing of sufficient rates, the collection of revenues, the proper segregation of the revenues of the System, and the proper application thereof: Provided, However, that the statutory lien upon said revenues shall not be construed to compel the sale of the System or any part thereof.

If there be any default in the payment of the principal or interest upon any of said bonds, any court having jurisdiction in any proper action may appoint a receiver to administer and operate said System on behalf of the City, and under the direction of said court, and by and with the approval of said court to perform all of the duties of the officials of said City, more particularly set forth herein and in Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended.

The holder or holders of any such bonds or any coupons therefrom shall have all other rights and remedies given by said Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended, for the collection and enforcement of said bonds and the security thereof.

Section 7. The construction, alteration, repair and management of the System shall be under the supervision and control of the City Council of the City of Tawas City. The City Council may appoint and designate a board, commission, or officer to operate and manage the System, and may employ such person or persons in such capacity or capacities as it deems advisable to carry on the efficient management and operation of the System. The City Council may make such rules, orders and regulations as it deems advisable and necessary to assure the efficient management and operation of the System.

Section 8. The rates to be charged for wa-

ter service furnished by the System shall be as follows, said rates to become effective on April 1, 1958:

The minimum quarterly rate shall be \$8.00 per charge.

Fire Hydrant Charge

For water used through fire hydrants, the City shall pay the sum of \$40.00 per year for each such fire hydrant, payable in equal quarterly installments.

The City Council shall establish special rates covering the use of water not measured by a meter, or for any other special use where a special rate is deemed advisable and reasonable.

Deposit

A cash deposit of \$200.00 as security for payment of water rates shall be required of each user in such cases as the City Council shall deem such security to be advisable, or in such cases where a deposit is required by the provisions of Section 21, of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended.

Billing

All bills shall be rendered to users on a quarterly basis, and if not paid on or before the due date specified thereon, a penalty of ten percent (10%) of the amount of the bill shall be added thereto.

Enforcement

Charges for water services shall constitute a lien on the property served. On or before October 1st of each year, the officer in charge of collection of such charges shall deliver to the tax assessing officer a certified statement of all water charges then due and unpaid. The tax assessing officer shall then place such charges on the next general tax roll and the same shall be collected as part of the general City taxes.

The City shall have the right to shut off and discontinue the supply of water to any premises for the non-payment thereof when due of water rates and charges and said water shall not be turned on until all sums then due and owing shall be paid in full and a turn-charge of \$2.00 is paid.

The rates for water service presently in effect in said City shall remain in effect until April 1, 1958, at which time the rates above specified shall become effective.

Section 9. No free service shall be furnished by said System to any person, firm or corporation, public or private, or to any public agency or instrumentality.

Section 10. The initial rates hereby fixed are estimated to be sufficient to provide for the payment of the expenses of administration and operation and such expenses for maintenance of the said System as are necessary to preserve the same in good repair and working order, to provide for the payment of the interest upon the principal of all the bonds as and when the same become due and payable, and the creation of the reserve therefor, as required by this Ordinance, and to provide for such other expenditures and funds for said System as this Ordinance may require. Such rates shall be fixed and revised from time to time as may be necessary to produce these amounts, and it is hereby covenanted and agreed at all times to fix and maintain such rates for services furnished by the System as shall be sufficient to provide for the foregoing.

Section 11. The System shall be operated on the basis of an operating year beginning April 1st and ending on the last day of the following March.

From and after the date of adoption of this Ordinance, the revenues of the System shall be set aside, as collected, and deposited in a separate depository account in the Peoples State Bank, a bank duly qualified to do business in Michigan, in an account to be designated WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM RECEIVING FUND (hereinafter, for brevity, referred to as the "Receiving Fund"), and said revenues so deposited are pledged for the purpose of the following funds and shall be transferred from the Receiving Fund periodically in the manner and at the times hereinafter specified.

(A) OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE FUND

Out of the revenues in the Receiving Fund there shall be first set aside, quarterly, into a separate depository account designated OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE FUND, a sum sufficient to provide for the payment of the next quarterly current expenses of the System and such current expenses for maintenance thereof as may be necessary to preserve the same in good repair and working order.

The City Council, prior to the commencement of each operating year, shall adopt a budget covering the foregoing expenses for

each year, and such total expenses shall not exceed the total amount specified in said budget, except by a vote of two-thirds (2-3) of the members of the City Council. There shall also be included in said budget all expenditures to be made from the Replacement Fund and the Improvement Fund.

(B) BOND AND INTEREST REDEMPTION FUND

There shall next be established and maintained a separate depository account designated BOND AND INTEREST REDEMPTION FUND, the moneys on deposit therein from time to time to be used solely for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest upon the bonds hereby authorized. The moneys in the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (including the Bond Reserve Account hereinafter established) shall be kept on deposit with the bank or trust company where the principal and interest on the bonds herein authorized are currently payable.

Out of the revenues remaining in the Receiving Fund after provision has been made for expenses for operation and maintenance of the System there shall be next set aside, quarterly, in the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund, a sum proportionately sufficient to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest upon all outstanding bonds payable from the revenues of the System, as and when the same become due and payable. Commencing April 1, 1958, the amount so set aside for interest each quarter during the first six (6) months of each operating year shall be not less than one-half (½) of the total amount of interest maturing on the following October 1st, and each quarter during the last six (6) months of each operating year shall be not less than one-half (½) of the total amount of interest maturing on the following April 1st. Commencing April 1, 1958, the amount so set aside for principal each quarter during each operating year shall be not less than one-fourth (¼) of the principal maturing on the following April 1st. If there shall be any deficiency in the amount previously required to be set aside, then the amount of such deficiency shall be added to the current requirements.

There is hereby established in the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund a separate account to be known as the Bond Reserve Account, into which account there shall be deposited, after providing for all requirements of the Operation and Maintenance Fund and current requirements of the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund, in equal quarterly installments, commencing April 1, 1959, the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars during each of the operating years commencing April 1, 1959, to April 1, 1962, both inclusive, and Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars during the operating year commencing April 1, 1963, so that by the close of said operating year beginning April 1, 1963, said Bond Reserve Account will total the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars. Moneys in said Bond Reserve Account shall be used solely for the payment of principal and interest on said bonds, if necessary. If, at any time, it shall be necessary to use moneys in the Bond Reserve Account for such payment, then the moneys so used shall be replaced from the net revenues first received thereafter which are not required by this Ordinance to be used for operation and maintenance or for current principal and interest requirements: Provided, However, that such Bond Reserve Account shall not be regarded as moneys otherwise appropriated, or pledged for the purpose of determining the sufficiency of funds available for redemption of callable bonds.

No further payments need be made into the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund after enough of the bonds have been retired so that the amount then held in said Fund (including the Bond Reserve Account) is equal to the entire amount of principal and interest which will be payable at the time of maturity of all the bonds then remaining outstanding.

(C) REPLACEMENT FUND

There shall next be established and maintained a separate depository account designated REPLACEMENT FUND, which shall be used solely for the purpose of making major repairs and replacements to the System, if needed. There shall be deposited into said fund, after providing for all requirements of the Operation and Maintenance Fund and the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (including the Bond Reserve Account), the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars during each of the operating years commencing April 1, 1960, to April 1, 1965, both inclusive, so that the sum in said Replacement Fund shall total Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars by the close of the operating year beginning April 1, 1965. Deposits into said fund as above required shall be in equal quarterly installments during each operating year. If, at any time, it shall be necessary to use moneys in said fund for the purpose for which it was established, the moneys so used shall be replaced from the net revenues in the Receiving Fund which are not required by this Ordinance to be used for the Operation and Maintenance Fund or the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (including the Bond Reserve Account).

(D) IMPROVEMENT FUND

There shall next be established and maintained a separate depository account designated IMPROVEMENT FUND, the moneys on hand therein from time to time to be used for the purpose of acquiring additions, extensions and improvements to the System.

There shall be deposited in said Fund each quarter after providing for all requirements of the Operation and Maintenance Fund, the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (including the Bond Reserve Account), and the Replacement Fund, such moneys as the City Council shall deem to be necessary for making additions, extensions and improvements to the System.

(E) SURPLUS MONEYS

Any revenues remaining in the Receiving Fund in any operating year after meeting all requirements of the Operation and Maintenance Fund, the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (including the Bond Reserve Account), the Replacement Fund, and the Improvement Fund, shall be deemed to be surplus and may, at the discretion of the City Council, be transferred to the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund for the purpose of calling bonds herein authorized, or transferred into the Improvement Fund: Provided, However, if the City shall be in default of setting aside moneys in the Operation and Maintenance Fund, the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (including the Bond Reserve Account), or the Replacement Fund, such default shall be cured prior to use of such surplus for any other purpose.

Section 13. From funds of the System on hand as of the date of the adoption of this Ordinance, there shall first be transferred to the Operation and Maintenance Fund established by this Ordinance a sum sufficient to meet operation and maintenance expenses to April 1, 1958. The balance of such funds on hand, and not appropriated for other purposes, shall be transferred to the Receiving Fund established by this Ordinance and shall be subject to the provisions of this Ordinance relative to the use thereof.

Section 14. In the event the moneys in the Receiving Fund are insufficient to provide for the current requirements of the Operation and Maintenance Fund or the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund, any moneys and-or securities in other funds of the System shall be transferred, first, to the Operation and Maintenance Fund, and second, to the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund to the extent of any deficit therein.

Section 15. Moneys in the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund over and above those being accumulated for the payment of principal and interest next maturing, moneys derived from the proceeds of sale of the bonds, and moneys in any other fund except the Receiving Fund and the Operation and Maintenance Fund, may be invested in obligations of the United States of America. In the event such investments are made, the securities representing the same shall be kept on deposit with the bank or trust company having on deposit the fund or funds from which such purchase was made. Income received from such investments shall be credited to the fund from which said investments were made.

Section 16. Said bonds shall be sold and the proceeds applied in accordance with the provisions of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended.

Section 17. The proceeds of sale of the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall be deposited in the Peoples State Bank, East Tawas, Michigan, a bank insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, in a separate depository account, and there shall first be transferred therefrom to the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund the amount of premium and accrued interest paid, if any, and the balance of such proceeds shall be applied solely in payment of the cost of the project hereinafter described and any engineering, legal and other expenses incident thereto and to the financing thereof. Payments for construction, either on account or otherwise, shall not be made unless the registered engineer in charge of such work shall file with the City Council a signed statement to the effect that the work has been completed in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor, that it was done pursuant to and in accordance with the contract therefor, and that such work is entirely satisfactory.

Section 18. Any unexpended balance of the proceeds of sale remaining after completion of the project herein authorized may, in the discretion of the City Council, and to the extent of Fifteen percent (15%) of the amount of bonds herein authorized, be used for further improvements, enlargements and extensions to the System, provided that at the time of such expenditure such use be approved by the Municipal Finance Commission. Any remaining balance after such expenditure shall be paid into the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund and shall be used for the redemption of callable bonds, or prior to the first call date only, purchasing bonds on the open market at not more than the fair market value thereof, and at a price in any event not exceeding the first call price.

Section 18. The City of Tawas City covenants and agrees with the successive holders of the bonds and coupons that so long as any of the bonds remain outstanding and unpaid as to either principal or interest—

(a) The City of Tawas City will maintain the System in good repair and working order and will operate the same efficiently and will faithfully and punctually perform all duties with reference to the System required by the Con-

stitution and laws of the State of Michigan, including the making for water services rendered by the System, and the segregation and application of the revenues of the System in the manner provided in this Ordinance.

(b) The City will maintain and keep proper books of record and account, separate from all other records and accounts, in which shall be made full and correct entries of all transactions relating to the System. No later than three (3) months after the close of each operating year, the City Council will cause to be prepared, on forms furnished by the Municipal Finance Commission, if such forms be available, a statement in reasonable detail, sworn to by its chief accounting officer, showing the cash income and disbursements of the System during such operating year and such other information as may be necessary to enable any taxpayer of the City, user of the service furnished, or any holder or owner of the bonds, or anyone acting in their behalf, to be fully informed as to all matters pertaining to the financial operation of the System during such year. A certified copy of such statement shall be filed with the Municipal Finance Commission and such statement and books of record and account shall, at all reasonable times, be open to inspection by any taxpayer of the City, user of the service, or holder or holders of any bonds, or anyone acting in their behalf. The City Council will also cause an annual audit of such books of record and account for the preceding operating year to be made by a recognized independent certified public accountant within ninety (90) days from the close of such operating year. Said annual audit shall be in such reasonable detail as will present the full financial condition of the System to the holders of the bonds and shall include the auditor's comments on the manner in which the management of the System has complied with the provisions of this Ordinance relating to the setting aside of moneys in the several funds established by Section 12 of this Ordinance, the acquisition of insurance, and such other matters as an auditor might normally audit. A certified copy of such audit shall be sent each year to the manager of the syndicate or account purchasing the bonds herein authorized.

(c) The City will maintain and carry, for the benefit of holders of the bonds, insurance on all physical properties of the System, of the kinds and in the amounts normally carried by public utility companies and municipalities engaged in the operation of water supply systems. All moneys received for losses under any such insurance policies shall be applied solely to the replacement and restoration of the property damaged or destroyed, and to the extent not so used, shall be used for the purpose of calling bonds.

(d) The City will not sell, lease or dispose of the System, or any substantial part thereof, until all of the bonds have been paid in full, both as to principal and interest. The City further will cause the operation of the System to be carried on as economically as possible, will cause to be made to the System all repairs and replacements necessary to keep the same in good repair and working order and will not do or suffer to be done any act which would affect the System in such a way as to impair or affect unfavorably the security of the bonds. The City covenants and agrees that it will not grant any franchise or other rights to any person, association or corporation to establish and operate a competing water facility within its corporate limits.

Section 19. The right is reserved, in accordance with the provision of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended, to issue additional bonds payable from the revenues of the System, which shall be of equal standing with the bonds herein authorized, but only for the following purposes and on the following conditions:

(a) To complete the project herein described in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor. Bonds shall not be authorized unless the engineer in charge of construction shall execute a certificate to the effect that additional funds are needed to complete the project in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor. If such certificate shall be so executed and filed, it shall be the duty of the City Council to provide for and issue additional revenue bonds in the amount stated in said certificate to be necessary to complete the project in accordance with the plans and specifications.

(b) For extensions and improvements to the System: Provided, that no such additional bonds shall be issued unless the average annual net revenues for the two complete operating years next preceding the issuance of the additional bonds, or the net revenues for the immediately preceding operating year, whichever is lower, when supplemented by the net revenues estimated to accrue from the making of the extensions and improvements proposed and-or from an increase in the water rates provided for in the Ordinance authorizing such additional bonds, are equal to not less than one hundred fifty percent (150%) of the largest amount of combined principal and interest to fall due in any future operating year on any bonds then outstanding, payable from the revenues of the System and on the additional bonds so to be issued.

As a condition precedent to the issuance of said bonds, a written estimate of the net revenues estimated to accrue from the proposed extensions and improvements and from the rate increases, concurred in and executed by such engineer as shall be designated by the City Council, and by the engineer of the Municipal Finance Commission (or in the event no such State officer or agent exists, an engineer selected by the Municipal Finance Commission, or successor State agency having jurisdiction over the issuance of municipal bonds), shall be filed with the City Clerk and the Municipal Finance Commission. Permission of the Municipal Finance Commission (or such other Commission as shall have jurisdiction over the issuance of municipal bonds) shall constitute a conclusive presumption of the existence of conditions permitting the issuance thereof.

No additional bonds of equal standing shall be issued pursuant to the authorization contained in this Section if the City shall then be in default in making payments to the Operation and Maintenance Fund, the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (including the Bond Reserve Account), and the Replacement Fund.

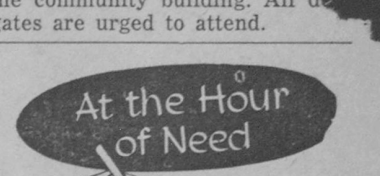

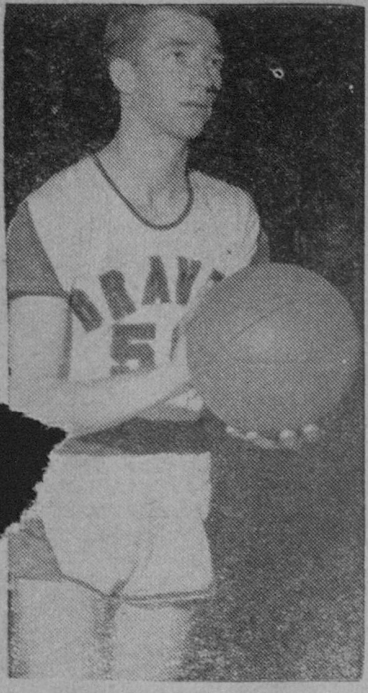
