

> Some research which was done in Pennsylvania shows that children themselves have solutions for their breakfast problems when they suggest they ought to get up earlier, go to bed earlier, have the kind of food they enjoy, have someone with whom to share the breakfast meal.

More than one-fourth of the children in the survey got their own breakfasts, and their breakfast record was poor. When adults supervised or ate breakfast with the children the eating was better than if they breakfasted alone, Children ate better breakfasts if the meal was prepared for them especially if they had helped an adult prepare it.

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
