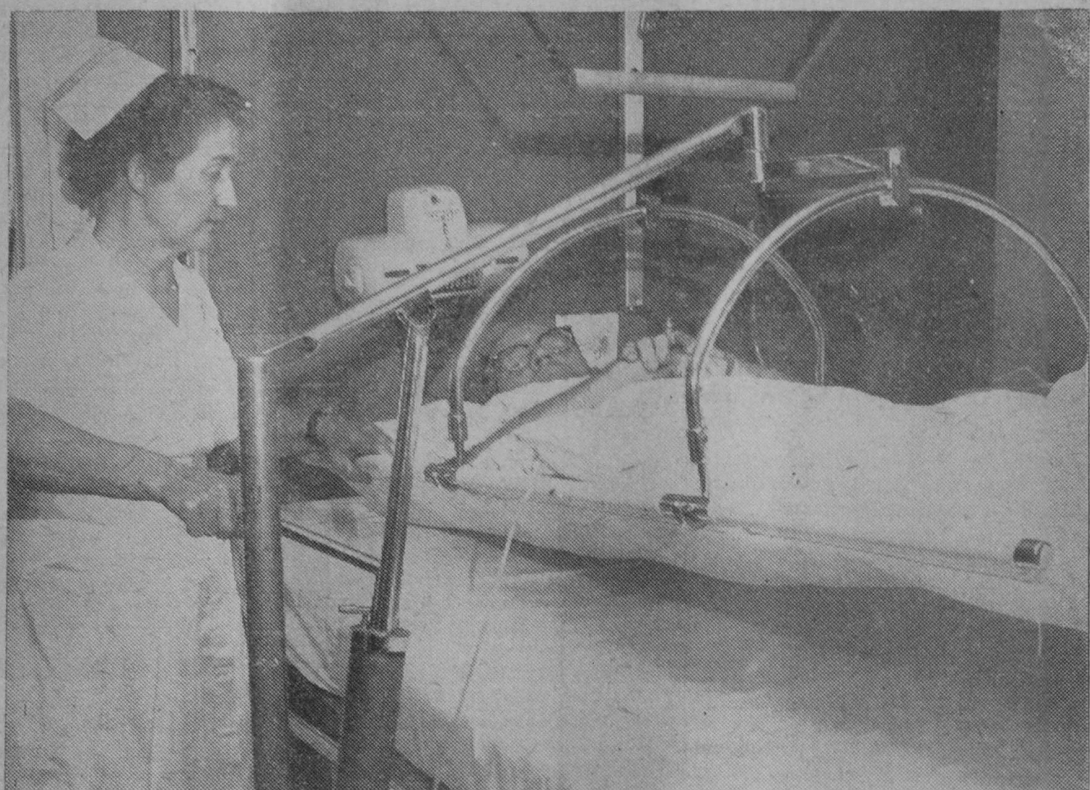

## Recommend Consolidation of Tawas Fire Departments

A special committee of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association will present six recommendations in regard to area fire protection at the next meeting of the city council.

Organized last spring, the committee is headed by Sgt. Frank Roti, commander of the Michigan State Police at East Tawas.

"Because of the growth and expansion of this area during recent years, it has become apparent that some steps must be taken to provide added fire protection," said Sergeant Roti. "We also feel that a stepped-up fire prevention program would be of great value in this area."

Serving with Roti on the committee are George Myles and Milton Barkman.

The recommendations as proposed by Roti's committee and approved by the businessmen's association at last Thursday's meeting, were as follows:

1. Consolidation of fire departments in the Tawas area, to include Tawas and Baldwin Townships, to be called the Tawas Area Fire Department.
2. Erection of a building to house fire equipment and to provide quarters for men on duty. Purchase what new equipment is needed for such a proposal.
3. Hire a full time fire chief to head this department.
4. Hire four men, along with the chief, so such station can be manned 24 hours a day.
5. Commence a fire prevention campaign.

The final recommendation of the committee was that the Tawas City Council appoint a special group to meet with a similar committee appointed by the East Tawas Council.

At present both communities have separate volunteer fire departments. Tawas City also has a contract to furnish fire protection for Tawas and Alabaster Townships. Two pieces of fire equipment are in use in Tawas City, one truck owned by the city and one owned by Tawas Township. East Tawas has one fire truck.

## MEET TONIGHT TO DISCUSS PROPOSED RADIO STATION

R. S. Underhill and William Hicks, Lansing, who hold the permit for a radio station for the Tawas area, will meet with residents interested in participating financially in the ownership of the proposed station at a meeting tonight (Thursday).

The public meeting, to be held at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office, is scheduled to start at 7:30 o'clock. Full particulars of all phases of the proposed new station will be explained.

The Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D. C., has recently approved an application for a radio station in the Tawas area.

## Thirteen Arraigned in Circuit Court This Week

Thirteen persons were arraigned before Judge Herman Dehnke in Iosco County Circuit Court on Monday and Tuesday of this week on criminal charges.

A charge of felonious assault with an auto against Richard Hinkley was nolle prossed and another warrant was issued charging him with reckless driving. He pleaded guilty to the latter charge and was fined \$75 and sentenced to 30 days in the county jail.

A plea of guilty to the former charge last week was not accepted by Judge Dehnke. Hinkley was involved in a wild chase from Alpena which ended when his car struck a state police car being used as a road block north of East Tawas.

Cases against Richard Dawe, John P. Clement and Clifford Hart

were held open; Elmer Hill and David Nielson entered a plea of guilty to larceny of a tire and wheel; Richard Hinkley pleaded guilty to the reckless use of fire arms.

A plea of guilty to a charge of breaking and entering by Charles Gollnast, which was not accepted by the court last week, was nolle prossed and he entered a plea of guilty to unlawfully driving away an auto.

Paul Coppler pleaded guilty to unlawfully driving away an auto; in the case of the people against O'Meara for failure to provide, the case has gone over the term and he is being held at the county jail; a plea of guilty was entered by Charters, Heinwald and Matterna on charges of driving away an auto.

## Former Iosco Supervisor Died at Hale

Edward O. Putnam, retired Plainfield Township farmer and a former member of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors, died Tuesday morning at his home in Hale after an illness of four years.

Born March 10, 1882, at Sunfield, Eaton County, Michigan, he came to Iosco County following his graduation from Albion High School in 1901. On November 8, 1904, he married the former Lottie Mae Webb and following their marriage they established their farm southwest of Hale.

In addition to operating his farm, Mr. Putnam always took an active interest in the civic affairs of his community. He served his township as member of the board of supervisors from 1918 until 1930 and had been a member of the board of education for 18 years. For 29 years he had been appraiser for the Federal Land Bank. He was a member of the Hale Methodist Church and had been a member of the Hale Grange for nearly 50 years.

## Check Heater Now Warns Chief Musolf

As a reminder to local residents to take precautionary measures before lighting heating equipment, Fire Chief Fred Musolf of the Tawas City Fire Department said this week that an inspection of chimneys and heating equipment now may save the home owner considerable time, energy and money later.

Musolf said that all furnaces, oil and coal heaters should be inspected before fires are lighted. Particular attention should be paid to cleaning out chimneys. Electrical wires which lead to the heating units should be checked.

He said that a rash of minor fires occur every year at this time. "These fires, which sometimes prove so costly, can be prevented if the home owner gives the proper attention to his heating equipment," stated Mr. Musolf.

"Even though the home owner may have already lighted the equipment, it is still not too late to make the check," he said.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at the Hale Methodist Church with the Rev. Dwight A. Lawson officiating. Interment will be in the Evergreen Cemetery at Hale.

## Forest Tour Successful In Spite of Wet Weather

Nearly 100 persons attended the forest and wild game management tour in Iosco County Tuesday. Sponsors of the event were the Kiwanis Clubs of Tawas and Oscoda, Michigan State University, the United States Department of Agriculture, Iosco County Board of Supervisors and the Cooperative Extension Service.

Although wet weather canceled a forest fire demonstration which was to have been held in AuSable Township, one-half mile south of AuSable bridge on US-23, fire-fighting techniques were conducted by the United States Forest Service under the supervision of Conrad Carlson, Huron National Forest ranger.

Purpose of the demonstration was to train volunteer fire fighters on how to stop a forest fire and what to do if a forest fire gets out of control. Fire-fighting equipment was on display.

Personnel of fire departments and police officials were invited to attend this particular demonstration to learn what to do in

case of an emergency.

After a noon luncheon at the Holland Hotel, the group attended a demonstration of forestry and game management on Cecil Cabbie's hunting property in Grant Township. Topics discussed during this part of the program included Norway and Scotch pine tree plantings, managing aspen to provide deer feed and the use of Balbo rye as deer pasture.

Conducting the tour during the afternoon were Lester Bell, Michigan State University extension forester, and Charles Shick, Michigan State University game management specialist.

The committee that planned this tour included Marvin Davenport, county agricultural agent; Lt. Col. Herbert Deer, Major Lyle Jewell of Wurtsmith Air Force Base; Harold Wagner, Reno Township; Richard Rose, soil conservationist; Howard Hofacer, Fran Flanders and Lester Weis, Oscoda Kiwanis Club; Cecil Cabbie and Conrad Carlson of the Tawas Club, and Thomas Craftey of Detroit.

Congressman Elford A. Cederberg has advised The Tawas Herald that he will be in the courthouse in Tawas City from 10:00 a. m. to noon, Wednesday morning, October 2, to discuss any federal matters the residents of Iosco County wish to talk over with him.

The 10th District representative began this practice of making visits to all counties in the district following the adjournment of each session of congress when he first began serving the 10th District and has continued it each year since.

"I will be glad to discuss with Iosco County residents any problems they may have which involve the federal government or discuss legislation that we have had under consideration during this session of congress," Congressman Cederberg said.

## Joseph Danin Successful on Post Office Bid

Joseph Danin of Saginaw has been notified by the post office department that he was the successful bidder in the proposal to rent post office quarters for Whittemore.

The new building, to be erected by Mr. Danin, will be ready for occupancy not later than March 1, 1958.

It will be of cinder block construction with a brick veneer front having 1,040 square feet of usable floor space and will be located approximately 100 feet north of the present quarters.

The present quarters, owned by Archie Graham, have been in use as the post office in Whittemore since 1938. Since that time the rural route from that office has increased from 60 miles to 68 miles, with the rural population increasing from about 630 to over 1,000 persons. The population of the City of Whittemore has increased from about 400 to nearly 500 persons.

The volume of mail handled through the Whittemore post office has increased to such an extent that the present quarters have been outgrown, stated Postmaster John A. Dickey.

## Belgian Youth is Visitor in County

A 22-year-old Belgian youth, Henry Braeken, is currently observing dairy farm practices in Iosco County. He has been the guest of the Waldo J. Curry family at their dairy farm on M-55 during the past three weeks. He will leave for the Bay City area Saturday.

Henry represents his native Belgium in the International Farm Youth Exchange, a program whereby the various participating nations exchange youthful delegates during a six-month period. He is the first foreign exchange delegate ever to come to this county.

Purpose of the IFYE program is to facilitate exchange of farm management practices and encourage exchange of new ideas between nations as might be applied to farming, as well as to further cultural and good international relationships.

During the delegate's six-month visit in this country he lives in the homes of the participating farm families, allowing him to study farm practices first hand and to become better acquainted with the American farmers. The American counterparts of Braeken are following the same program in the countries in which they visit.

Since coming to the United States, Braeken has lived with farm families in Nebraska, Wisconsin and Michigan. His principal interest is in dairy farming, although he observed general farm practices and beef cattle raising in other areas.

Braeken's home is located in a village in Northeastern Belgium. As is the case of most European farmers, he "commutes" from his home in the village to the outlying farmland.

His father's farm consists of 50 acres of land in small parcels of about four or five acres

each. Rye, oats and fodder beets (similar to sugar beets) are the principal crops, all used for cattle feed. The Braeken's have a herd of 28 meat-milk type cattle.

The likeable Belgian youth has three years of agricultural education beyond his secondary schooling. This is nearly the equivalent of a college education and is very advantageous for him. The usual farm youth of Europe does not receive this opportunity.

When he returns to his native land he will be in line for a position as an assistant agricultural extension agent, a job similar to that of the cooperative extension agent in this country.

During a break in work Monday (Braeken was helping the Curry's fill silos with chopped green corn silage), he said he was very much impressed with the progress of farm mechanization in the United States.

Pointing to the tractors and other modern equipment used on the Curry farm, Braeken said, however, that such machinery probably would be of little value on farms of Europe. Besides their impracticability on a small farm, the initial cost would be prohibitive as would be the cost of operation and maintenance. Heavy work horses remain as the principal prime mover on Belgian farms.

During his stay in Iosco County, he has attended various meetings of farm organizations, including the Farm Bureau. He is very much interested in the 4-H Club program.

As a side light of his visit here, Henry attended the Tawas Area-Gladwin football game Friday night. This was the first football game he had ever seen and he described it as "very exciting." He said he had always pictured American foot-

We have discussion sessions with program committees of Burleigh Gadabouts and Reno home demonstration groups this week.

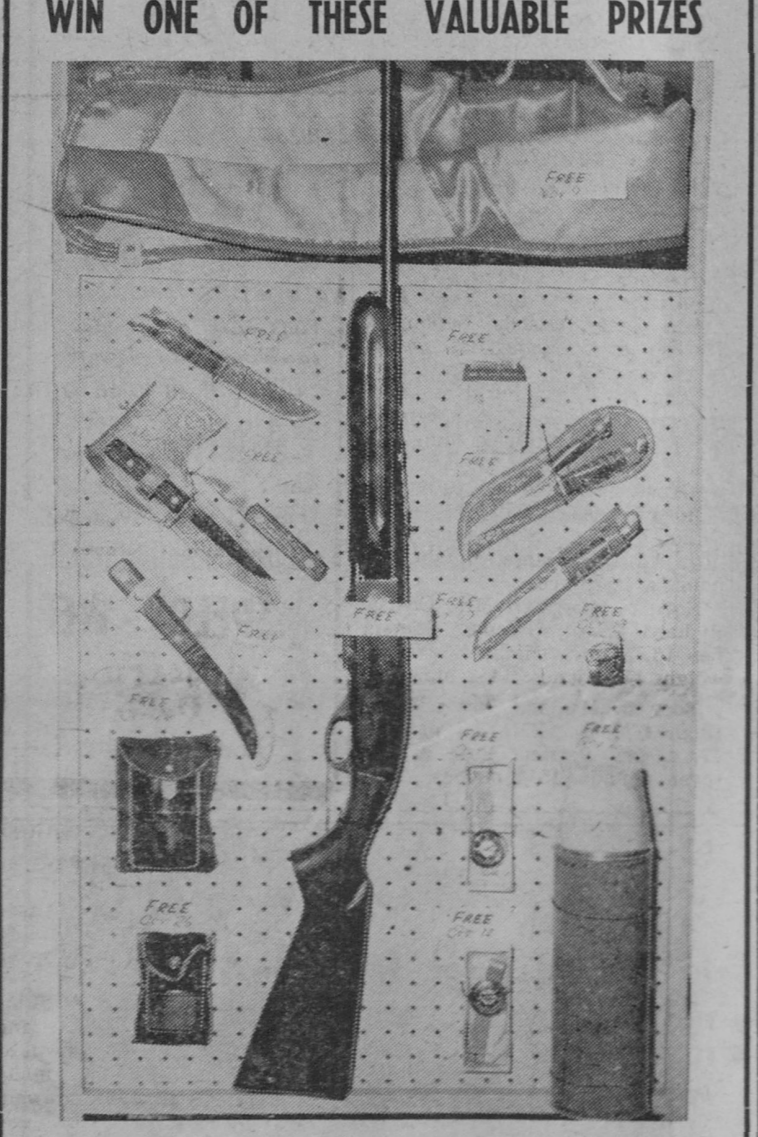

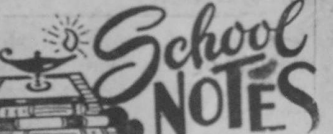

Mr. Little read the following resolution.

WHEREAS, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors is greatly interested in the welfare of Iosco County and

WHEREAS, the industrial growth of the county is equally as important as the tourist growth and facilities provided for such.

Therefore be it resolved that this board would like to go on record as favoring the installation of the National Gypsum dock as recently revised by said company and submitted for approval to the United States Corps of Engineers, C. C. to Colonel Hyzer.

Upon motion by Little supported by Jordan the resolution was unanimously adopted and the clerk

instructed to send a copy of the resolution to Colonel Hyzer.

Mr. Christeson because of business commitments asked to be relieved of his duties as chairman of the building and grounds committee. The chair appointed Fred Brabant as chairman of the committee and Mr. Stephan was named to the committee to fill the vacancy.

Mr. Oates read the following report of the aeronautics committee.

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Gentlemen:

Your aeronautics committee having had under study the county airport problem, report the following:

After due consideration, we have found that the present airport cannot be enlarged because of the lack of available land. We have, therefore, studied three other possible sites; one in Tawas Township and two in Wilber Township.

The site in Section 33, Range 7 East, in Wilber Township, has many advantages. It is high and dry and level. A blacktop road borders the property, which consists of approximately 540 acres. It has the approval of our airport engineer, Robert Peckham.

Engineers from the State Department of Aeronautics and the Civil Aeronautics Administration have visited the site and indicated they like it. It is centrally located to serve all of Iosco County. A study of the mileage and driving time from the intersection of US-23 and M-55, resulted in the following facts.

To section 33 site—6.1 miles, nine minutes.

To present airport—2.8 miles, seven minutes.

There are no easements for telephone or electric lines across the property. Forest growth is mostly jack pine and scrub oak, indicating that the cost of clearing would not be excessive.

The site is located near the AuSable River, Silver Valley, and several inland lakes, which offer resort and tourist attractions.

The site in Section 28, Range 8 East, Wilber Township has not been seriously considered on account of the fact that it is farther from the center of population, is not adjacent to a paved road, and does not seem to offer good conditions for an east-west runway.

The site in Tawas Township has not been seriously considered because there would be four or five owners involved, it is a little too close to Tawas City, and it would require drainage.
