One girl from this group will be chosen queen at the judging which is to take place May 3 at the East Tawas Community Building.

A. Don Anderson, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, has charge of the judging committee. Judges will be the presidents of the four chambers of commerce in Iosco County; namely, Hale, Whittemore, Oscoda and Tawas.

Anderson said that Iosco County's queen representatives will be judged on "looks and personality." All girls are 17 years old.

The queen will have a two-day expense-paid trip to the bridge dedication ceremony. She will be accompanied by a chaperon of her own choice.

# Tax Technicalities Answered on Final Day of April Session

Members of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors brought in a combined figure of \$20,774,080 as the county's assessed valuation, it was reported Wednesday by the board's footing assessment rolls committee.

This total was a \$900,000 increase over last year. The state tax commission's figure for Iosco County, which the board uses as a tax base for schools and county operation, is \$43,213,371.

The board finished out its lengthy April session Wednesday afternoon after meeting with Fred White of the Michigan State Tax Commission in the morning. Mr. White and the committee went over assessment rolls brought in by the supervisors and a few corrections were made.

White was called in by the board when a difference of opinions arose on taxation technicalities. He answered a number of questions asked by the board.

The main difference of opinion was a dispute over assessing new property and adjustment of rolls. Also, the assessing of equipment owned by outside contractors.

However, the corrected rolls amounted to a difference of less than one percent higher than the original figure of \$20,766,310 brought in last Friday.

In other business taken up since a week ago Wednesday, the board of supervisors went on record as supporting the allocation board in insisting that school tax rates be uniform among inter-county districts involving Iosco Schools. Supervisors said that in some instances where school districts jump county lines, the tax rates are not consistent.

Act 37 forest reserve funds were distributed as follows: Iosco County Road Commission, \$1,397.79; Tawas Area School, \$894.58; Hale Area School, \$1,118.55; Oscoda Area School, \$2,180.55.

The June session of the board is to open June 16. This date was selected in order that all supervisors might be present on the day of the formal dedication of the portraits.

Clarence Everett, Elmer Werth and Clement Stephan were appointed to act as a host committee for the district four meeting of the Michigan Supervisors Association to be held June 5 at Tawas.

Resignation of Ralph Meyers as manager of the Iosco County Airport at East Tawas was accepted by the board of supervisors. No successor was named.

Confirmation was received by the board from the state aeronautics committee stating that the application by the county to the CAA for construction of a proposed new airport on Monument Road had been refused because of its close proximity to Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

The resignation of Ralph Meyers as manager of the Iosco County Airport at East Tawas was accepted by the board of supervisors. No successor was named.

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# Iosco Doesn't Want M-171, if Not Repaired

A proposed move by the Michigan State Highway Commission which would give M-171 to Iosco County, or abandonment of M-171 by the state, came under fire from the board of supervisors on Monday of this week.

Members of the board expressed the opinion that this highway is an important "feeder" to US-23 and to areas inland. The board stated that the county is not financially able to reconstruct or maintain the road.

It was stated at the meeting that this was the same position held by the Iosco County Road Commission and the board of supervisors concurred with the commissioner's thinking.

The county road commission contends, so it was stated, that the state should repair the road before turning it over to the county.

Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda Township told the board that M-171, from the US-23 intersection to the main gate at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, has many dangerous curves; that the bridge over the AuSable River is too narrow and that the road bed should be widened. This stretch of concrete is one of the oldest in this part of the state.

According to a letter from the Alcona Board of Supervisors, that group has gone on record as opposing any move closing traffic on M-171 to the general public. In the past few years the federal government has talked of closing the road because of the enlarging facilities at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

It was pointed out by the Alcona County board that M-171 is important to that county's road network, inasmuch as residents in the VanEtan Lake Area would have to travel an additional 13 miles to reach US-23 over any alternate route.

## THIRD ANNUAL HOME-SPORT SHOW IN MAY

Third annual Iosco County Home and Sports Show will be held at Tawas Area High School Auditorium on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, May 9, 10 and 11.

William Roberts, who is chairman of the Tawas Jaycees committee sponsoring the show, said Tuesday that space is still available for displays at the show.

Featured at the show will be furniture, appliances, home modernization methods, heating, electrical appliances, camera equipment, pre-cut homes and roofing.

Hours the building will be open are set at 6:00 to 10:00 p. m., Friday; 1:00 to 10:00 p. m., Saturday and Sunday.

# Federal Govt. Seeks Land Exchange for WAFB Housing

The United States Army Corps of Engineers, at its Detroit office, has made formal request to the Iosco County Board of Supervisors to make available tracts of land, presently owned by the State of Michigan under the jurisdiction of the department of conservation, for "Capehart Housing" at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

The engineers propose an arrangement to acquire lands by which certain county-owned land of equal value would be traded to the state, the former to be selected by the conservation department. The federal government would then purchase the lands from the county.

Land in question is about 70 acres located west of M-171 at the south boundary line of Wurtsmith Air Force Base. The additional land would be used for family housing units at the base.

Monday the Iosco County Board of Supervisors went on record as supporting this proposal of the federal government and named A. Don Anderson, East Tawas real-

estate broker, as the county's agent in the transaction.

Irving Walker, attorney of the corps of engineers real estate division, said in a letter to the board that the trade is necessary because the department of conservation cannot sell and convey lands outright to the federal government without reservations.

Under federal law, the proposed housing must have a clear title, as it will be mortgaged for construction.

## Judges' Portraits to be Dedicated

Restoration of portraits of the 10 circuit court judges who have served Iosco County will soon be completed by the H. L. Watson Studio, East Tawas.

These portraits, complete with new framing techniques, will be unveiled in the circuit court room of the Iosco County Building, Tawas City, on Monday, June 16.

Presentation ceremonies are being arranged by a special committee of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors and the Iosco County Bar Association.

# Prescott Tells of License Plate Law

George A. Prescott, department of state branch manager, announced today two important changes in the new license plate laws that are effective immediately.

The first change provides that upon transfer or assignment of interest in a motor vehicle, the owner shall remove the plates and may retain and preserve them. This eliminates the requirement before that the plates shall be transferred immediately to another vehicle or turned in for cancellation with no refund.

The second change provides that the owner of a currently registered vehicle may remove the plates and transfer them to another vehicle he later acquires without transferring or assigning his interest in the vehicle from which he removed the plates. This

permits a person not electing to trade or sell, to hold a vehicle from which he removed plates for a later sale. He must, however, go to a branch office and transfer the plates he removed from one of his cars to the one he may later acquire.

Both amendments removed obviously unfair restrictions. Many persons like to shop around before purchasing another car and under the old ruling they had to put plates they removed from a vehicle they sold immediately on another car, or lose the money they had paid for the plates.

Then, too, under the old rule, you had to sell a car you might want to keep around as a second car, before you could remove the plates and transfer them to another car you might subsequently purchase.

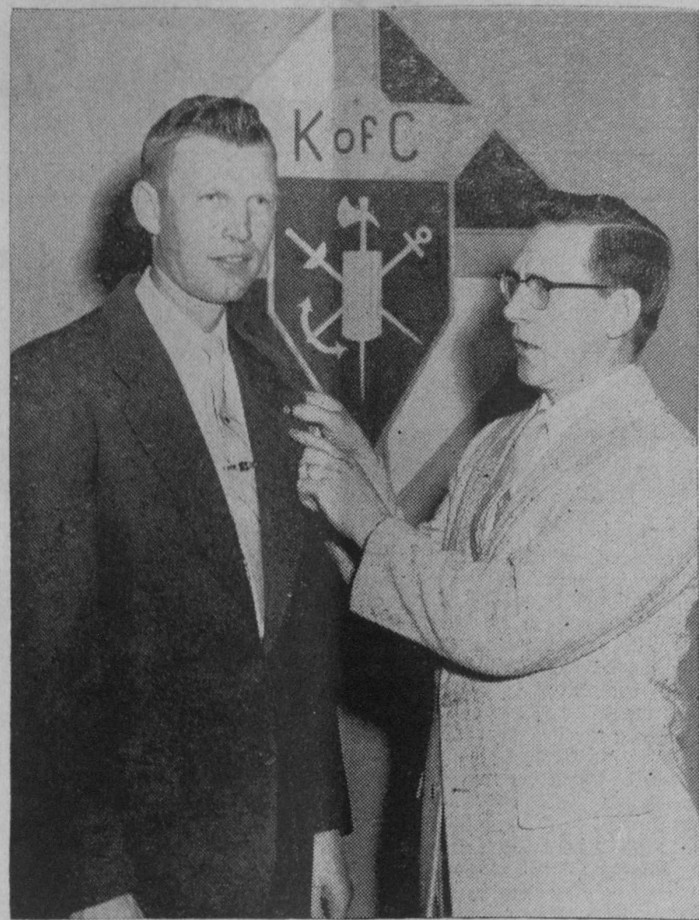

This film was produced by Gospel Films, Incorporated, the same firm which produced the film, "Seventeen," which was enjoyed by everyone.

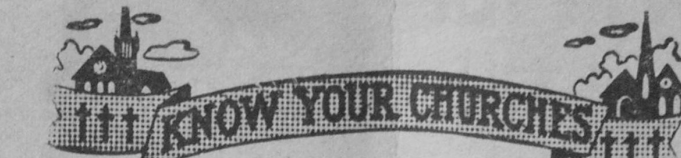

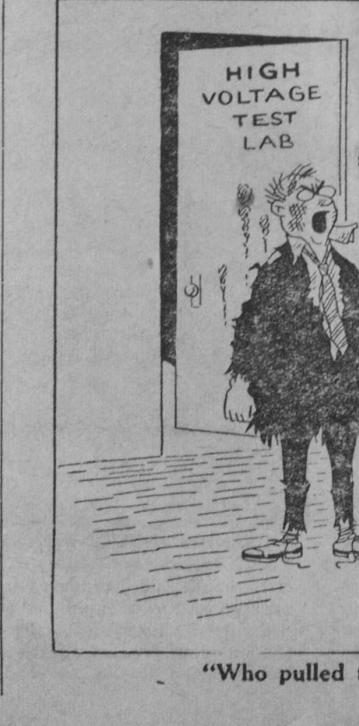

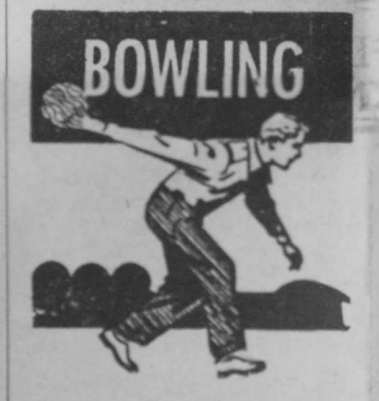
## Visit Tawas Gallery of Historic Indians

Remember, "Freeze Yourself Some Spare Time" is to be featured at the home demonstration county-wide get-together event on April 28. You are invited to come, whether or not you happen to belong to a group.

Fruits and vegetables will be ready for freezing almost before we know it, that is how fast the time flies! Use this opportunity to review how to do it yourself. Ruth Crasner, home service advisor for Consumers Power Company, is arranging an interesting presentation. The place of meeting is Consumers Power Company office in Tawas City. The time is 8:00 p. m.

Women in Reno-Burleigh communities are finishing up lamp shades this week. They will be displayed at the achievement event on April 28. A workshop held at the Daugherty home on Tuesday, April 15 helped the women prepare lamp shade patterns, cut and punch the material for lacing to the frames, and most everyone made a start at lacing them together.

Have you heard about a new kind of pole? They are made of lightweight metal with a plastic cap on the bottom. This cap fits against the floor. On the other end is a rubber suction cap containing a spring. The top cap is pushed up against the ceiling to permit the bottom cap to rest on the floor, thus the pole comes to rest in a true vertical position, making a firm upright support.

What is it used for? A pair of poles makes possible hanging many kinds of shelves, chests or cases. The case pieces would rest on angle irons hooked into slits in the pole. This arrangement leaves free areas over and under the cases, resulting in a feeling of spaciousness.

Other uses for the poles include lamp lighting, magazine and book racks. Since they are not nailed fast, these poles are especially useful in rented apartments or houses. You can take them with you when you move.

Houseplants do need air, not just any air, either! It must have enough moisture and be of the right temperature, says Dr. Fred Widmoyer, extension specialist in horticulture at Michigan State University.

Humidity is often a house plants problem because heating systems dry out the air. Here are ways to add moisture for the plants. Put the potted plant in a saucer or metal tray filled with coarse sand or gravel. Fill with water to the top of this material. Moisture will then evaporate into the air surrounding the plant.

A bath for your plant does two things—provides moisture and opens the plant pores. Do it in the morning on a sunny day so the plants will be dry by afternoon.

# Points Way to Speedier Social Security Payments

Businessmen, including self-employed farmers, who are retiring soon can speed up social security payments by having the necessary documents at hand.

When filing a claim for social security, certain proofs are required. A self-employed individual should have an extra copy of Income Tax Form 1040, and Schedule C, or F, depending upon his business activity. Where partnership Form 1065 was filed, a copy of that form also will be required. These forms will be kept with his file in the Social Security Administration. Usually forms for only two years are needed—the last two before the year you file a claim for old age benefits. Also be prepared to show your canceled check, money order receipt or other evidence showing payment of social security taxes for those years.

A representative of the Bay City District Office of the Social Security Administration will be in the Federal Building, East Tawas, Thursday, May 8, at 10:30 a. m. He will take claims for benefits and answer any questions you may wish to ask relative to social security.
