

# Schools Prepare for New Term as Students Register

A little more than one week remains before the start of school on September 2. Building custodians are putting the final touches on cleaning school buildings and school administrators are busily preparing for the return of students.

Students who will attend Tawas Area School have been registering at the principal's office all week. First came the seniors on Monday and Tuesday; juniors on Wednesday and Thursday (today); seventh and eighth graders will register Friday; sophomores next Monday and Tuesday, and freshmen will register Wednesday and Thursday.

In announcing the bus schedule for the coming year, Superintendent Reynold Mick said that there will be a meeting of bus drivers from Iosco County, along with high school superintendents, Tuesday, August 26, 7:00 p. m. at Tawas Area School. The meeting will be held to discuss the new law pertaining to school buses.

Sgt. Frank Roti, commander of the East Tawas post, Michigan State Police, and Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell will be in attendance. The school administrators hope to set up uniform rules for application of the law at this meeting.

Superintendent Mick said that the buses will make their routes on Wednesday, September 3, and take pupils to their respective schools. There will be only minor changes over last year's run. These changes are as follows:

Bus No. 1 will pick up at Beyers' on US-23; bus No. 3 will turn south on the Wilber-Baldwin run as Biscoff's instead of bus No. 14; buses No. 5 and No. 8 will service the Baldwin point area; No. 5 will serve the point area and No. 8 will serve US-23.

and those near Butterfield's Store; bus No. 6 will haul eligible pupils going to the high school from Tawas City after it makes its regular morning run.

Bus No. 14 will continue on the Monument Road to East Tawas; buses No. 3, 4, 5, 8, and 14 will pick up students going to the high school from the East Tawas unit; buses No. 1, 5 and 15 will carry fifth and sixth graders to Alabaster; buses No. 1 and 15 will pick up at East Tawas unit and along US-23; bus No. 5 will pick up fifth and sixth graders at the high school; bus No. 2 will carry fourth graders to East Tawas. The pick up points will be at the Tawas City unit and Brugger's corner.

Further pick up stations will be arranged in the cities if several pupils can be accommodated at one stop.

There is no change in the state regulations on transportation. That is, the 1 1/2 miles radius still holds for the year.

## City May Scrap Some Antique Ordinances

The City of Tawas City may make a clean sweep of its antiquated ordinance book and replace or substitute many of the old ordinances with new and modern ones as the result of action taken at Monday night's regular council meeting.

This long-talked-of move apparently came to a head this week as the result of attempts to enforce an old hawkers' ordinance which had been in the books since 1888.

Several ordinances of this type are on record and the council decided to enforce one two weeks ago which was aimed at licensing non-residents who sell merchandise, solicit subscriptions or take orders for goods within the city limits.

Two warrants were issued for non-compliance with the ordinance. One person applied for a six-month license, but the other refused to comply and chose to contest the ordinance.

A hearing is scheduled to be held in justice court this morning (Thursday) on the latter case.

There were some doubts expressed at Monday night's meeting as to the effectiveness of this particular ordinance. City Attorney Alfred W. Mason suggested that the council make a complete check of its ordinances and repeal those which are out of date.

The council is to write to the Michigan Municipal League for "sample" ordinances pertaining to fourth class cities.

In other business Monday night, Ernest and Leonard Mueller made application to construct an addition on Mueller Concrete Products building for a gasoline station. This property was zoned as residential "A" when the zoning ordinance went into effect a number of years ago. An appeal was made under terms of the ordinance for allowance of construction. A hearing will be held at the next regular council meeting in September.

Building applications approved were: Walter Nelson, 615 Ninth Avenue, raise and level home, estimated cost \$230; William Murray, 107 Oak Street, construct 14 by 16 addition to home, estimated cost \$1,250.

The council ordered 15 rail cars of road gravel from Straits Aggregate Company for use on city streets.

## Owosso Man is Iosco's Sixth Drowning Victim

A 49-year-old Owosso barber became Iosco County's sixth drowning victim of the summer season shortly before noon Sunday when he dove off his fishing cruiser anchored off Tawas Point to retrieve an air mattress which had fallen from the boat.

Dead is Clare Pate, who had been staying with his family aboard the family's 23-foot Chris Craft at the Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas.

Pate, his wife, Betty, and two daughters, Pamela, 14, and Nancy, 15, and Steve Bumhardt, age 10, were fishing off the Tawas Point fog signal when the accident occurred.

Pate dove off the boat into about 30 feet of open water to retrieve the air mattress about the time larger party fishing boats headed back to shore for lunch. A strong off-shore wind caught the air mattress and kept it out of the Owosso man's reach. When he saw that he could not reach it he turned around and headed back to the boat.

When his family noted that Pate was becoming exhausted in his swim back to the boat, his daughter, Pamela, dove into the water and went to his rescue with a "Mae West" air force-type life jacket. The girl helped her father on with the jacket and then assisted him back to the boat.

The girl then climbed aboard and untied a small anchor line and dove back into the water with one end. She gave the loose end to her father and climbed back in the boat. Mrs. Pate and the three youngsters attempted to pull him aboard. Seeing that he could not be pulled in, Pate told Pamela to start the engine and head for shore. He then fell unconscious. Pamela dove back into the water and put the rope under his arms and Mrs. Pate and Nancy held on to him with the rope.

Pamela beached the craft on a sand bar off the fog signal. The United States Coast Guard rescue crew from Tawas Point was notified and the amphibious duck was dispatched to the scene. State police were notified by radio and the resuscitator from Tawas Hospital was taken to the scene by a patrol car.

All attempts by the coast guard rescue crew failed to revive Pate. They said that the water was choppy and he could have swallowed much on the way to shore, although he never went under at any time other than when he first dove in.

Coroner E. John Moffatt ruled that Pate died from accidental drowning, although he may have had a heart attack or stroke after he became exhausted.

Pate was Tawas Bay's third drowning victim of the summer season and the sixth person to drown in Iosco County waters this year.

## 'Davy Crockett' at Indian Ceremonials This Week-end

In recognition of "World travels entertaining children - America's Davy Crockett," Leslie E. Arndt, editorial staffer for the Bay City Times newspaper, will receive the honorary title of "Scout Strongheart" August 27 during the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials.

The setting for the colorful ceremonies, which have run nightly throughout the summer, is in the Huron National Forest, nine miles west of the Tawas in Northeastern Michigan where a 2,000-seat amphitheater overlooks an island stage in Chapel Lake. Indians from 11 tribes stage authentic dramas, music, dances and sporting events in the pageant.

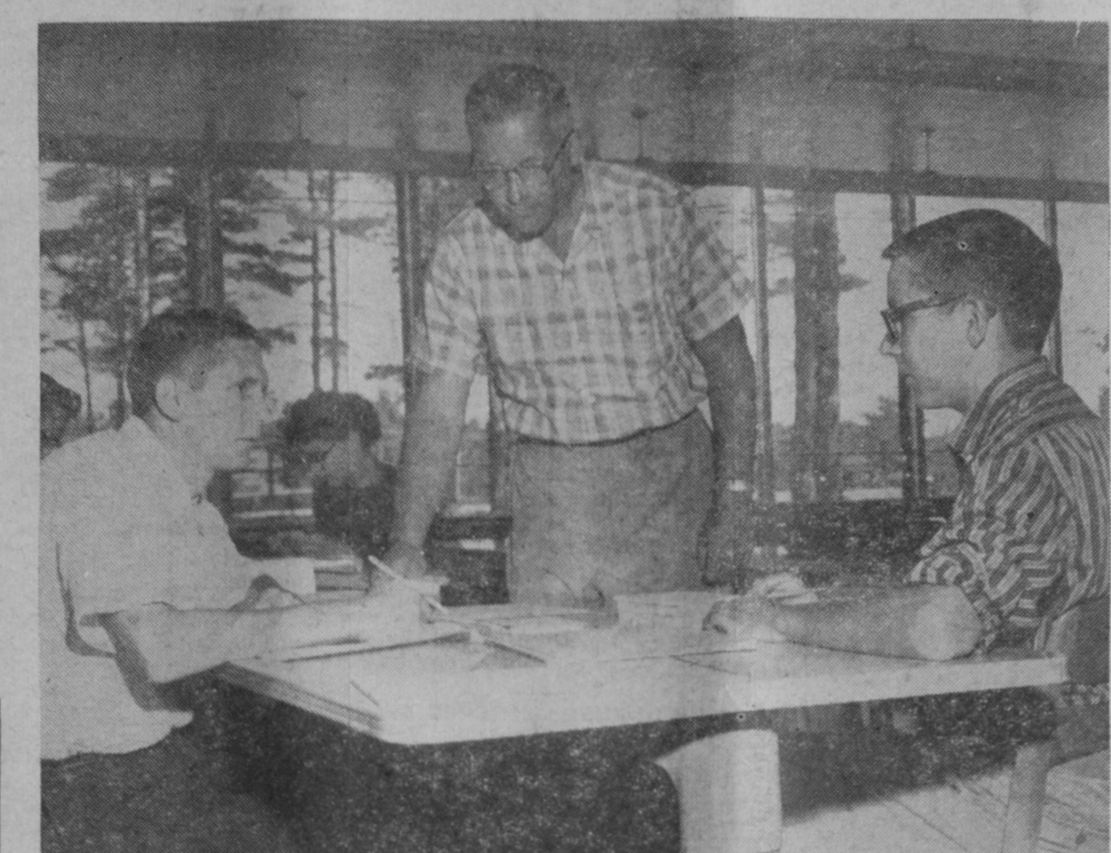

## Sheriff Says Dog Law Will be Enforced

According to reports from the Iosco Sheriff's Department, there has been a sudden outburst of dogs running at large in the county during the past several weeks.

There have been 15 reported dog bite cases in the county this year. Some 300 dogs have been disposed of by the sheriff's department. Four dogs which were running deer were shot by deputies.

"The tourist season is at its height and the danger of rabies is great at this time of year," said Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell. "One year ago this month a case of rabies was discovered in Sherman Township."

The sheriff said that three persons were summoned into the justice court of Arthur Goulet this week for absolutely refusing to comply with the Michigan dog law. Two were from Whittemore and one owner was from East Tawas.

Says Sheriff O'Farrell: "Europeans visiting in this country are surprised at the laxness of people in not attempting to control their dogs. We have fairly good dog laws in our state and they must be enforced."

## Joseph Klish Home Damaged by Fire

Fire and smoke damaged the home of Joseph Klish in Tawas City Tuesday noon. The blaze started in the second story of the residence and was brought under control by the Tawas City Fire Department in approximately one-half hour.

Considerable damage was done by water and smoke to the furniture and furnishings on the ground floor. No one was home at the time of the blaze.

## City Police Car Crashes While Chasing Sports Car

Richard Bertsch, part-time Tawas City policeman, was injured in a crash involving the city police department's patrol car early Sunday morning.

Bertsch was treated at Tawas Hospital for a cut leg and bruises which he received when the patrol car crashed into a utility pole at the corner of First Street and US-23.

While checking doors about 2 o'clock near the Borosch Real Estate office, Bertsch heard the engine of a car "winding-up" as it headed north on US-23 and he gave chase as it sped by. His partner, Ivan Baker, was checking doors in the business district.

The speeder turned out to be driving a foreign-made sports car and, although the patrol car did not lose ground on the straight

away, the low-slung sports car whipped around the First Street corner and made its get-away.

Bertsch attempted to turn the corner and the car went into a skid and rammed into a utility pole on the corner. The pole shattered and knocked out electric power in the area. Service was resumed several hours later through the work of Consumers Power Company line crews.

Bertsch was removed to Tawas Hospital for treatment of his injuries by the Iosco County Sheriff's Department. Damage to the patrol car is estimated at more than \$1,000.

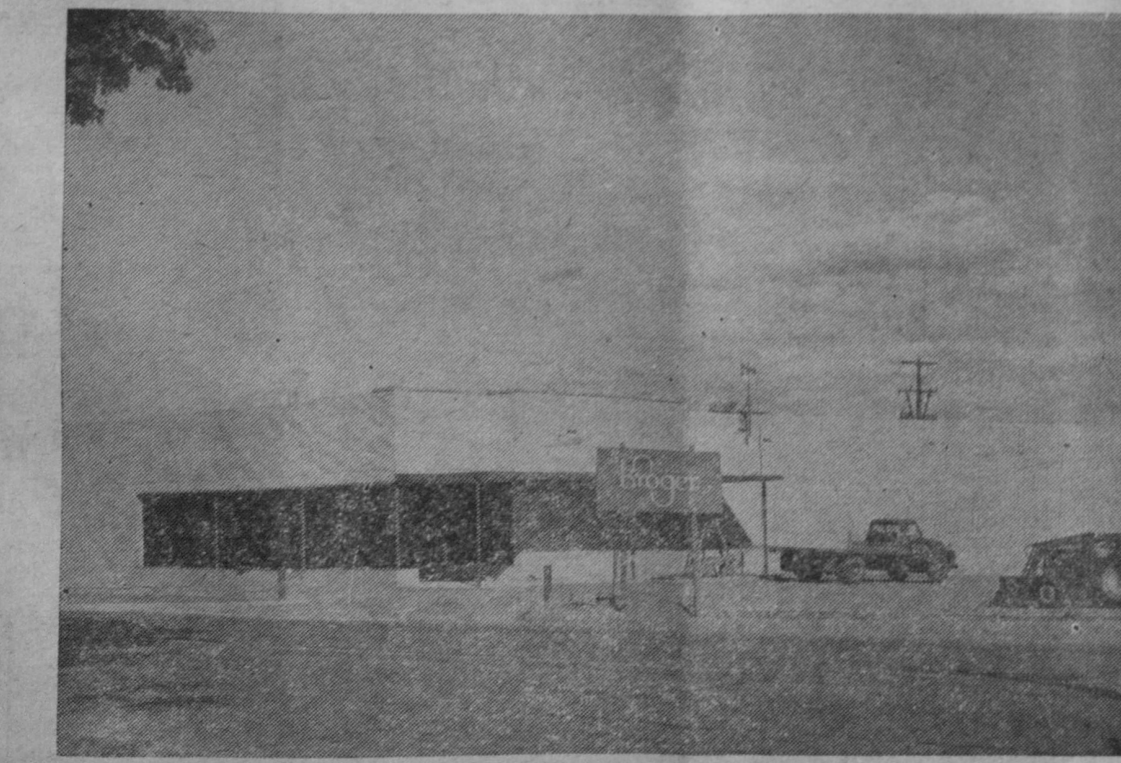
Chief of Police George Ruth said Monday that police are positive that the sports car was from this locality and are quite sure of the identity of the driver. Several eye witnesses, however, have given conflicting statements as to the color of the car and its make. He said that investigation would continue this week with the assistance of Michigan State Police and the sheriff's department.

Chief Ruth said that one witness told him that the sports car circled the block and then came back up US-23 at an even higher rate of speed, passing the crashed police car at the corner. State police said that a car which passed the post in East Tawas traveling at a high rate of speed shortly after the crash is believed to be the one involved.

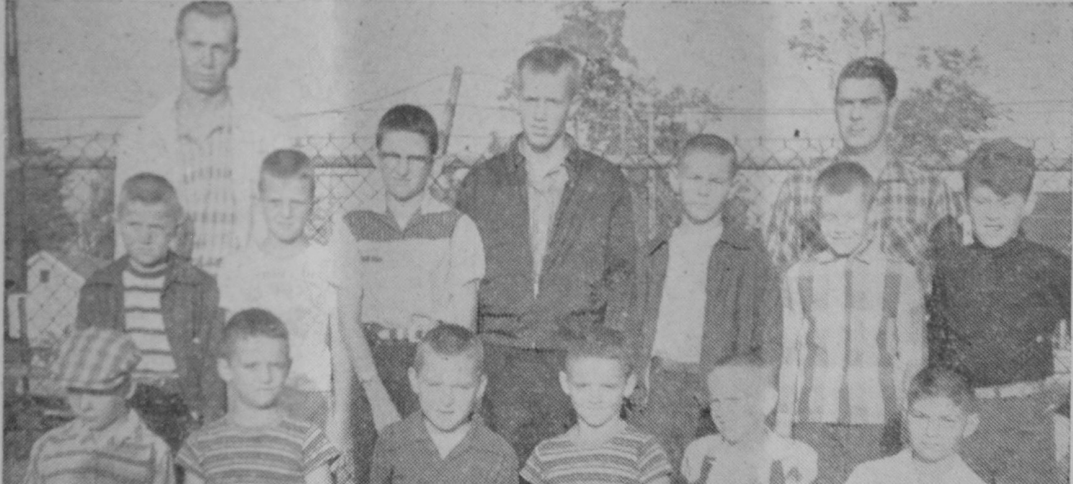

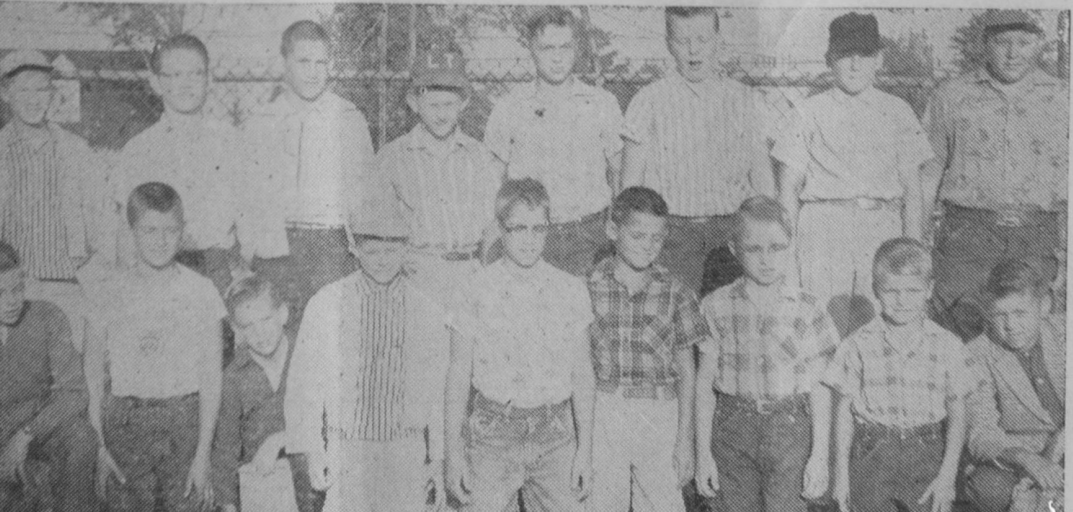

**Motorists to Face Real Challenge Over Labor-Day**

Motorists will face a real challenge on Michigan highways over the Labor Day holiday to reduce the death toll under the record low of 13 fatalities last year.

The death tolls are computed from 6:00 p.m. Friday to midnight Monday, a period of 78 hours. Last year the average was one death every six hours. During the five years previous to then, a death average was one every three hours, the lowest being 14 in 1951 and the highest in 1952 and 1953 with 32 each year.

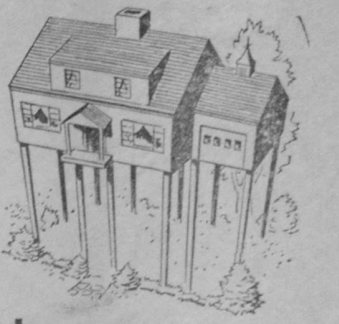
The goal of the Michigan State Police is to have the lowest toll ever occurred.

Again an intensified patrol will be in effect from noon Friday, August 29, to midnight Monday, September 1. All pass days will be canceled and more than a thousand state police on duty. Traffic patrols will work 10 hour shifts, assisted by 129 National Guardsmen. Sheriffs will have 96 guardsmen.

State police will use marked, semi-marked and unmarked cars. Detectives will be on desk duty to relieve uniform men for patrols.

"We will do everything we can to cut the toll," said Commissioner Joseph Childs, "but there will also be a test to just how great the improvement in driving has been. We can continue to show improvement if drivers remember to drive safely and courteously. Let's do just as good as we can."

Governor Williams gave a brief non-political talk on Michigan industries.

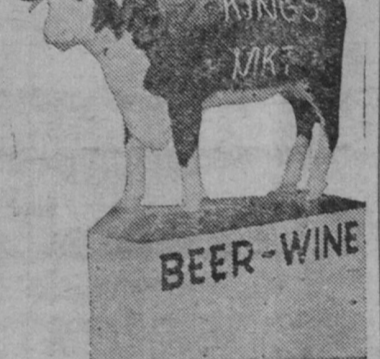

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Mary Flynn, and brother, Joseph Ruel, both of Rose City; three nieces, and a nephew.

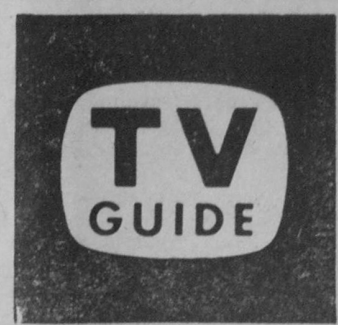

Let us hear about more projects of 4-H Club members and the experiences of the girls who write about them.

"I like flowers and my folks let me have a part of the vegetable garden for my own use. I did not have to buy many seeds or plants because my neighbor, Charlotte Webb, who has completed four projects in flower gardening, supplied me with many varieties. My mother has helped me, too. I have hoed in her garden and helped take care of the younger children to show my appreciation.

"Our whole family takes a great interest in 4-H Club work and can hardly wait until the fair, when our various projects will be on exhibit. 4-H Club work makes life on a farm more interesting and it certainly keeps us kids from becoming juvenile delinquents." Marlene Wilson, Hale Happy Hustlers.

One 4-H'er helps another and "whole families" interested in the community and county 4-H Club program—that is what makes the clubs really good.

"I have always been interested in gardening and the 4-H Club, with its fair exhibit, has given me an incentive to have an earlier garden and a better one. "Early this spring my neighbor, Mrs. Wilson, and I sent for some unusual climbing varieties of vegetables—tomatoes, beans and cucumbers. I planted them indoors and later transplanted them in individual containers, such as, cottage cheese boxes and dog food cans. These were later hardened on our front porch and when danger of frost was past, transferred to the garden. They have been staked and will soon need to be tied up. We are anxious to see the results.

"My own private garden is located where my dad formerly kept pigs. It is very rich and is better for some vegetables than others. I have found from experience that tomatoes mature earlier in less rich soil, so I planted them in the family garden. "My seeds were planted early but due to dry weather did not germinate quickly. After they did come up I soaked my garden, using the hose, several different times. To make certain I would have peas for the fair, I planted them at two different times. "Rotenone has been applied at short intervals to control the Mexican bean beetle, cabbage and broccoli worms, potato and cucumber beetles." Charlotte Webb, Hale Happy Hustlers.

Charlotte has become quite expert with handling and identifying insects as a result of her entomology project. She will be giving an entomology demonstration at the State 4-H Show, and will also compete in the garden judging contest.

**Farm Events**

Since the State of Michigan has attained the status of a modified certified brucellosis free area, and since another goal is to maintain complete eradication of brucellosis, it is most important that all avenues of re-infection be eliminated.

Our state law now requires that vehicles used for transporting livestock be "properly cleaned and disinfected." At a recent meeting of the Michigan Department of Agriculture officials, instructions were given to their inspectors to check trucks for cleanliness so that this method of possible spread of infection be brought under control.

How about your truck or trailer? Is it clean? Are you doing your part?

Are your cows losing their calves prematurely? Maybe it is leptospirosis. Despite demonstrations of the effectiveness of vaccination in preventing leptospirosis in both cattle and hogs, the disease is continuing to appear in many herds.

Ralph Barner, veterinary pathologist at Michigan State University, hopes Isosco County farmers are taking advantage of the protection vaccination gives animals against this disease. Leptospirosis may appear in different ways in individual herds. The outstanding symptom of the disease is the premature birth of dead calves or pigs. However, the disease may exist where that sign is not observed.

Barner suggests a method to try and prevent this disease before it starts. Farmers can isolate all newly-purchased cattle or hogs and have a veterinarian test them for leptospirosis before they are introduced into the home herd.

Genesee wheat, a soft white winter variety, is climbing in popularity among Michigan growers. In 1955, only about 16 percent of the wheat acreage was planted to Genesee. Today, probably more than half of the total wheat acreage is in Genesee, according to Milton Erdmann, farm crops specialist at Michigan State University.

Only three years ago, another variety called Yorkwin, held the spotlight as the most planted wheat. Genesee and Yorkwin have about changed places in the percentage of wheat land planted to each variety.

Genesee is gaining favor primarily because it consistently yields better and has a stiffer

straw. Over several years, Genesee will average about two or three bushels more per acre than Yorkwin. Growers like to give their wheat extra nitrogen to boost yields. With Yorkwin, the increased growth usually means losses from lodging because of the weaker straw.

This has been an excellent year for wheat growers. All varieties have yielded well, but the top yields of around 80 bushels have in most cases been of Genesee variety.

This year's Hessian fly free date for planting wheat is after September 7.

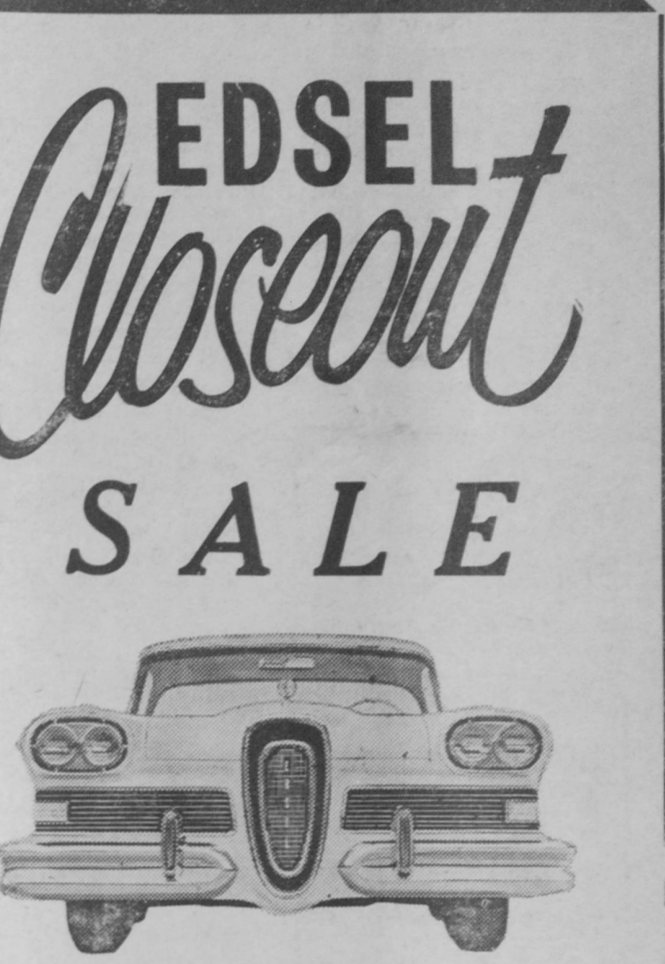

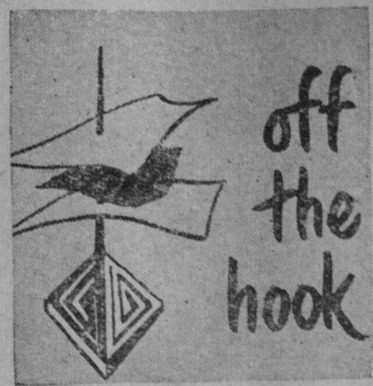
