



City Policeman Richard Bertsch, although not seriously injured, had to have eight stiches in his leg to close a cut and had to take a week off from his regular work to recuperate from his injuries.

While checking doors in the downtown area about 2:00 o'clock Sunday morning, Bertsch heard an engine "winding up" as it headed north on US-23. He got in the city patrol car and gave chase to a speeding foreign-made sports car as it went through Tawas City's business district at more than 80 miles an hour.

The speedy sports car and its driver whipped around the First Street corner at Brugger's Market to slip away from Bertsch. The patrol car piled into a utility pole on the corner when it went into a skid and "fish-tailed." The pole was shattered and it was miraculous that two heavy transformers affixed to the top did not come crashing down on top of the car.

As we said, "Dick" fortunately escaped with only minor injuries. The young fellow who was driving the sports car is probably laughing up his sleeve right now ... at that speed it was impossible to get a license number and with quite a few foreign cars of this type in the area, descrip-

tions of the car by "eye-witnesses" vary. Police are still investigating, however.

The speeder in the case Sunday morning, according to witnesses, went around the block and then roared up US-23 going at an even higher rate of speed . . . right past the police car, where Bertsch was lying injured. He cared only for his own neck. We predict that the driver of this car will get his sooner or later, one way or another.







Motorists to Face Real Challenge **Over Labor-Day**

Motorists will face a real challenge on Michigan highways over the Labor Day holiday to reduce the death toll under the record low of 13 fatalities last year. The death tolls are computed

from 6:00 p.m. Friday to mid-night Monday, a period of 78 hours. Last year the average was one death every six hours. During the five years previous to then, a death average was one every three hours, the lowest being 14 in 1951 and the highest in 1952 and 1953 with 32 each year. The goal of the Michigan State Police is to have the lowest toll

Again an intensified patrol will be in effect from noon Friday, August 29, to midnight Monday, September 1. All pass days will be canceled and more than a thousand state police on duty Traffic patrols will work 10 hour shifts, assisted by 129 National Guardsmen. Sheriffs will have 96 guardsmen.

"We will do everything we can to cut the toll," said Commissioner Joseph Childs, "but there will also be a test to just how great the improvement in driving has been.
