Hook-Up Made With East Tawas---

Tawas Now Using One Water Supply

By now, residents of Tawas City have noticed the "big change" in the taste of the municipal water supply. Last Thursday the final switch-over was made at the new booster pump station near the Schreck Lumber Company on US-23, thereby connecting Tawas City with East Tawas' water system.

A test of the new pumping station was made a week ago Tuesday, but it did not go into operation until Thursday noon. This event went by unannounced by the city council, but did not go by unnoticed by Tawas City residents, who have been drinking "hard" well water since the late 1930s.

This new water is produced at East Tawas' filtration plant, which went into production earlier in the summer. The water is pumped from Tawas Bay to the new plant where it goes through a filtering process, chlorination

and then pumped into the mains. Tawas City purchases the water on a contract basis, the amount being used measured at a meter pit near Feather-Lite Manufacturing Company.

City Superintendent Reginald Bublitz said this week that he was very satisfied with the operation of the new booster pump station. "Pressure at the Tawas City standpipe has not dropped below 50 pounds since the switch-over was made, even during the period prior to the rain of last week-end."

Between 75 and 80 pounds of pressure on the mains is maintained at the booster pump station. Original plans did not call for the booster pumps, but it was found that friction loss between the meter pit and the Tawas City standpipe was too high.

"People will become accustomed to the new taste of the water in a short while," said Bublitz. "With the continued use of the new water, the mains will be cleaned of the iron deposits which remain from the old well water."

Bublitz said that there may be some "red water" during the next six or eight months. "If there is, it will be due to the chlorine breaking down the iron deposits which remain in the pipes. This will eventually be eliminated, however," he stated.

The East Tawas Water Board announced last week that it was considering the installation of water meters in that city, because of the widespread abuse of water for sprinkling lawns. Sprinkling hours for all non-metered water users are 6:00 to 9:00 a. m. and 5:00 to 8:00 p. m. There are no restrictions on the use of water by 60 residences that have meters installed.

A check at the filtration plant revealed that more than 900,000 gallons of water were being processed and used daily. Production of water is not the problem (the plant is capable of producing 1,500,000 gallons a day) but that operation costs have risen because of the increase.

Students Go Wednesday---

School Opens Next Tuesday

School will officially open Tuesday, September 2, when all teachers will meet at 9:00 a. m. with a general session at Tawas Area High School.

At the conclusion of the general session teachers will meet with their respective principals for specific instructions.

Pupils will go to their respective schools at 9:00 a. m. Wednesday, September 3. Elementary pupils will be assigned to their rooms and the high school pupils will have a short class session. School will be dismissed at noon Wednesday, so that teachers and the administration will be able to adjust the class load to the best advantage of pupils.

On Thursday, the high school will be in session all day until 3:30; Alabaster will dismiss at 3:00; the East Tawas and Tawas City units will dismiss at 3:20. Buses will leave the high school for home runs at 3:30 p. m.

Pupils have been assigned to classes in a manner that will promote the best educational program for all of the pupils. Changes in these assignments will only be made in cases of extreme circumstances. Class sizes are now in good amounts and if changes come, some classes will be overloaded and others will be too small.

Crews to be Adopted by Chippewa Tribe

The Rev. O. James Crews, producer of the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials, and his wife, Florence Crews, featured on the program as the "Voice of the Forest," will be adopted by the Black River, Swan Creek, Saginaw Chippewa Indians at the final performance on Labor Day at Chapel Lake, according to Chief Whitebird, chief of the tribe and master of ceremonies at Chapel Lake.

Chief Pete-a-watem of Mt. Pleasant, who is treasurer of the reservation, will be the acting chief in the ceremony. Chief Blue Cloud and Chief Red Cloud will collaborate, as will Netmup, the medicine man at Chapel Lake. Three princesses—Little Fawn, Evergreen and Nondah, will participate, with the entire Chapel Lake cast.

Seek Establishment of Legal Tawas Lake Level

A petition signed by more than 50 percent of the freeholders at Tawas Lake was presented to the Iosco County Board of Supervisors at its session last week requesting the establishment of a legal level for that body of water. Paul Harvey, attorney of Tawas City, represented the property owners.

After discussion in committee, William White of the conservation committee moved that the petition be tabled until the September 17 session. This was carried unanimously.

The Iosco County Road Commission reported to the board that it would be extremely difficult to adjust its personnel to a 40-hour week, as was recommended by the supervisors last month.

The board explained that many of the employees were specially trained to operate large road construction equipment. It was also noted that highway personnel are subject to call on nights, holidays, Saturdays and Sundays and that no time and a half or double time was paid.

Commission members felt that re-adapting to a 40-hour week would have a disrupting effect on their long-time building program and the present harmony that exists within the commission.

The county will again advertise for sealed bids on 10 acres of land purchased by the county adjacent to the present county airport.

A resolution, presented by County Agent Marvin Davenport, was approved which urged that Iosco County be declared an emergency area because of the summer drought. It recommended that funds be made available for the purchase of hay which would enable Iosco farmers to winter their livestock.

Two Administrative Changes at Tawas Hospital Are Announced; Sister Rita Louise is Transferred

Two new administrators took over their duties at Tawas Hospital this week. They are Sister M. Oliva, administrator, and Sister Barbara Marie, director of nurses.

Sister M. Oliva replaces Sister Rita Louise, who had been hospital administrator since June of 1953 when the hospital first opened. Sister Barbara Marie replaced Sister Rose Anthony, who had been here since August 1953.

The new hospital administrator comes to Tawas from Borgess Hospital, Kalamazoo, where she had spent one year in charge of the nursery. The new director of nurses had spent five years at Borgess Hospital and had been head nurse of the orthopedic unit.

Sister Rita Louise was transferred to Nazareth College near Kalamazoo where she will assume teaching duties. Sister Rose Anthony will remain at Tawas Hospital.

Another Submerged Land Hearing Set

A public hearing is scheduled September 9 in Lansing to provide interested persons an opportunity to express views on proposed revisions in rules and regulations for administration of Great Lakes submerged lands.

The hearing will begin at 1:30 p. m. in the house chamber of the state capitol, according to the Michigan Conservation Department.

Revision of the rules and regulations is necessary because the original Submerged Lands Act (Act 247) was amended by passage of Act 94 earlier this year.

The rodeo will be held at the old fairgrounds, East Tawas. Three performances are scheduled for August 30, 8:00 p. m.; August 31, 8:00 p. m., both under lights, and September 1 at 2:00 p. m.

On Saturday, August 30, the rodeo will be preceded by a horse show.

Cowboys and cowgirls from all over the United States will perform in saddle bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, wild cow milking, Brahma bull riding, beautiful trick riders, trained animal acts, the world famous Scotty McKenzie performing his trick roping act and rodeo clowns performing and fighting deadly Brahma bulls.

This is the show which has played to capacity crowds throughout the season in the State of Michigan and is produced by Midwest Rodeo Producers. A. Don Anderson, president of Tawas Chamber of Commerce, states that this show is packed with chills, spills and thrills and is a real fitting send-off to the end of the Tawas tourist season.

C of C Makes Plans for Well Drillers Convention in 1959

Plans for the well drillers convention, to be held in Tawas May 19-20, 1959, were discussed at a meeting of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce last Wednesday night.

More than 1,000 persons are expected to attend the convention, including association members and their families. Eighty equipment dealers will have display booths here.

The chamber of commerce plans to make six mailings telling of attractions of this area and special events to the more than 500 members. A special effort will be made to get one mailing out before the start of deer hunting season.

Resort and restaurant facilities to handle a group of this size were discussed and plans were made on how to handle reservations.

The time set for showing the African travel movie by Ebb Warren was changed to a later date in October. This program will be held at the Tawas Area High School Auditorium and will include a special showing in the afternoon for students.

Paddlers Set for Annual AuSable Race

Twelfth annual Michigan International Canoe Marathon will be held on the AuSable River from Grayling to Oscoda Saturday and Sunday.

More than \$3,000 in cash prizes will be awarded to the first 10 two-man canoe teams which cross the finish line at Oscoda. The winners will be awarded the world championship of long-distance canoe racing.

The race is scheduled to start from Grayling at 8:30 o'clock Saturday night. An expected field of 35 canoes will head downstream on the 240-mile test of endurance and racing skill. About 15 canoes are expected to finish the long grind.

Some of the top-ranking teams which will participate are Ralph Sawyer and Tom Gildersleeve, both of Oscoda, who hold the record time for the classic, 16 hours and 53 minutes, set in 1956; Tom Estes and Buzz Peterson, both of Minneapolis, who won second last year; Steve Kolonich of Tawas and Larry Kindell of National City, who have won seven out of nine major races in Michigan this year and have defeated Gildersleeve and Sawyer in three of them; Al and LeRoy Widing of Holly, who defeated Kolonich and Kindell in the 85-mile Rifle River race on July 4.

Last year an estimated 50,000 persons watched the race at the starting and finishing points and at the bridges and dams along the river.

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A NEW LAW enacted by the state legislature requires that drivers of vehicles stop before overtaking or meeting any school bus which is stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers. Ask for Observance of Bus Law Now

School representatives from Alcona, AuGres, Hale, Oscoda, Whittemore and Tawas met Tuesday night to discuss the two-way school bus stop law and other matters pertinent to school bus transportation.

Sgt. Frank Roti of the Michigan State Police, Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and Deputy Sheriff Leon Putnam were in attendance to advise on the best methods to carry the

new law into effect. It was the feeling of this group of law enforcing officers and the others present that all people should voluntarily conform to the new ruling from the time school starts this year until the law becomes effective September 13.

This new bus law states that no vehicle shall meet and pass any school bus which is stopped for the purpose of receiving or dis-

charging passengers. A vehicle are warned not to pass while the lights are flashing. As soon as the lights stop flashing one can proceed.

All parents should caution their children, too, that while this law is in effect September 13, they should still use caution when crossing the highway. This is a new law and it will be sometime before all motorists comply automatically.

SUBMERGED LAND HEARING

Interested persons will again have an opportunity to express their views on proposed revisions in rules and regulations for administration of Great Lakes submerged lands. A public hearing will be held September 9 beginning at 1:30 p. m. in the house chamber of the state capitol at Lansing.

This will be a golden opportunity for anyone to have his say on this controversial subject. Publishers of this newspaper hope that interested persons from this area and the entire State of Michigan are represented at the meeting.

Little has been said in the past two weeks about National Gypsum's Port Gypsum development south of Tawas City. The conservation commission recently approved a permit which allowed the continuance of its construction.

The State of Michigan has filed with the supreme court an appeal of Circuit Judge Herman Dehnke's decision which ruled that a riparian owner has the right to wharf or dredge out to navigable waters. Because of the research which will necessarily go into this case, it is not expected that the supreme court will hand down its final opinion in the very near future.
