District Basketball Tourney to be Held at Tawas in 1959

Tawas Area High School has been selected as the site of the 1959 district "B" and "C" basketball tournament, it was announced here today by Supt. Reynold Mick. The tournament will be held the first week in March.

A committee of the Michigan High School Athletic Association met Friday to select sites for the spring tournaments. It was the recommendation of David Arnold, assistant director of interscholastic athletics, that the tournament be held at Tawas.

Reason for the change from Pinconning to Tawas was due to the latter's central location among the participating schools, it was reported. This was the first year that Tawas had applied.

Schools participating in the tournament are as follows: Class B schools—Pinconning, West Branch, Arenac Central and Tawas Area; class C schools—Whittemore-Prescott Area, Osceola and Alcona.

Tawas Area's auditorium has a seating capacity of 1,200 persons. Tournament manager will be William Tracy, a member of the Tawas Area faculty.

Winner in class B at Tawas will go to Cadillac for regional play, while class C district champions will go to Grayling.

The selection of Tawas as the site for the tournament is the first in the history of Tawas Area School. Prior to reorganization, district tournaments had been held at the Tawas City school.

Class D district tournament play will be held at the AuGres-Sims School in AuGres. Participating

schools are Pinconning St. Michael, AuGres-Sims, Arenac Eastern, Hale Area, Rose City and West Branch St. Joseph.

Portrait of Iosco's Founder Dedicated Here Wednesday

Hanging in full view of the bay which he opened to civilization long ago is a portrait of Judge Gideon O. Whittemore, founding father of Iosco County.

Nearly 95 years after his death, a fitting memorial has finally been erected to perpetuate the memory of Judge Whittemore. In brief ceremonies Wednesday, townsfolk and some of his direct descendants gathered at the Iosco County Building to dedicate his memorial.

The memorial, a framed portrait of the judge, is a gift to Iosco County from the Barkman family of Tawas. It was contributed in memory of the late Nathan Barkman, civic leader and industrialist who passed away last spring.

Speakers during the program were Supervisor Clarence Everett of Tawas City and Harris Barkman, Mr. Everett introduced Mrs. Oliver LaVack of Osceola, a great granddaughter of Mr. Whittemore. Mr. Barkman presented the portrait to the county as a memorial to his brother.

"It is an honor, indeed," said Mr. Everett, "to be gathered here today with the descendants of Judge Whittemore and pay homage to the pioneer founder of this community."

"Though it is light manufacturing, not shingle mills; it is tree farms and recreational forests, not logging; and yachting, not log booms and lumber barges on Tawas Bay, our heritage is the product of his labor and foresight which each and every one of us can be proud to share."

This portrait is a copy of a photograph which was secured from the Michigan Historical Society several years ago for use during Tawas City's centennial celebration.

The work of Harvey Watson, East Tawas photographer, the finished portrait is a far cry from the original which had deteriorated over the years. Through skillful retouching, Watson restored the likeness of Judge Whittemore, the amount of work involved being comparable to the portraits of former circuit judges which he restored for the county earlier this year.

This portrait honors the man who established the first settlement on the shores of Tawas Bay. A former prosecuting attorney and judge in Oakland County, a co-founder of the Detroit Free Press and former secretary of state, the term of G. O. Whittemore and Company purchased the site of Tawas City and erected its saw mill on the bay in 1834. Through

the efforts of Judge Whittemore, an act was passed by the legislature in the winter of 1857 organizing the County of Iosco.

He was chosen judge of probate and prosecuting attorney when the county was organized. At the close of 10 years spent here in active business, he died suddenly of a heart attack on June 30, 1863.

Suggest Use of Farm Surplus for Relief

The Iosco County Board of Supervisors went on record as recommending that the county social welfare department investigate the possibility of using farm surplus foods for welfare relief.

This action took place Wednesday in the one-day December session.

Availability of surplus foods for this use was brought to the attention of the board by Serge Thomson of Hale. The welfare board is to report its findings during the January session.

In a report on the county-operated Old Orchard Park, Howard Becker, operator, told the board that some 3,175 cars had been registered at the park during the past year.

In other business, the county renewed its contract with the Detroit House of Correction. The board authorized purchase of a section of steel shelving for the treasurer's vault.

Flame Throwers Used in Tree Seeding Experiment

In an experimental demonstration, three United States marines from Jackson put a wartime flame thrower into peacetime use in the Huron National Forest along the lower AuSable River Saturday.

They used the flame thrower equipment to direct a blast of fire at the tops of several jack pine "seed" trees to break open the serotinous so they would drop their seeds and start new jack pine seedlings.

The three marines—Capt. J. P. Gagliardo, 1st Sgt. Stanley F. Byczek and Sgt. W. R. Calfee, all of the 84th Infantry Company, USMC Reserves, Jackson.

Sergeant Byczek commented, "This is a different use for flame throwers than the way we used them in North Korea some years ago."

William R. Beaufait, graduate researcher of the University of Michigan School of Natural Resources, directed the experimental use of the flame throwers in jack pine regeneration. He is in charge of a cooperative research project on jack pine, sponsored by the U of M and the Michigan Conservation Department.

The flame thrower demonstration was staged on a field trip in the Huron National Forest, conducted by Tawas District Forest Ranger Joseph Blake, for between 70 and 80 members of Lower Michigan Chapter of American Society of Foresters. It concluded their two-day biennial meeting.

Is State Facing a Forest Problem?

Is Michigan again faced with the spectre of abandoned lands and economic decay in northern communities dependent upon forests for industries and recreation? This possibility was suggested last Friday night at the East Tawas meeting of the Lower Michigan Chapter of the Society of American Foresters in a report of the forest protection committee headed by Dr. Samuel A. Graham of the University of Michigan.

"In numerous localities a permanent forest industry is being exchanged for an excessively large and temporary deer herd," Dr. Graham's report stated. "Overbrowsing of forest reproduction by deer is preventing establishment of a new crop of timber following logging in many localities."

"This situation is far more serious than is generally recognized. As long as timber is being cut, and hunting is good, all seems well. People fail to appreciate that without forest reproduction the forest industry will go, and the deer environment will deteriorate with the ultimate destruction of forest, wildlife and recreational resources upon which thousands of people depend for their living."

Although much progress has been made by the Michigan Conservation Department in harvesting of excess deer through special "any deer" seasons, a much greater harvest is needed to prevent the ultimate economic decline of counties in North-Central and Northeastern Michigan, it was reported.

"Foresters should take the leadership in educating people to the situation before it is too late," the 75 foresters representing state and federal agencies and forest industries were told.

Sets Tawas Lake Level Hearing Next Month

A hearing to give reasons why the level of Tawas Lake should be established is to be held in Iosco County Circuit Court on January 7.

At last week's initial hearing, objectors to the proposed level, Burgess, Timreck and Sims families, represented by Allan C. Miller, asked for specific reasons why the level should be established.

Judge Dehnke asked that the reasons be contained in a supplemental bill of particulars to be presented at the January 7 hearing.

Petition asking the court to establish the level was presented by Paul Harvey, assistant prosecuting attorney, representing the board of supervisors. Tawas Lake property owners had requested the action.

Mio Attorney Files as Candidate for Circuit Judge

Norman J. Randall of Mio, Osceola County, has announced that he will be a candidate in the February non-partisan primary for the office of circuit judge of the 23rd judicial circuit. This position is now held by Judge Herman Dehnke, who will retire at the end of next year.

Mr. Randall has been engaged in the practice of law in the circuit for some 25 years. He practiced law in the City of Detroit, following his admission to the bar in 1928.

Mr. Randall is a member of the local and state bar associations, the American Bar Association and the American Judicature Society. He is a veteran of World War I and has been active in veteran's affairs and problems.

Third Tawas Attorney to File

Ross Files for Circuit Judge

F. Duane Ross, attorney and counselor at law of East Tawas and Osceola, announced this week that he will seek nomination to the office of circuit judge for the 23rd judicial district. Candidates for the post, which includes the geographical areas of Iosco, Alcona and Osceola Counties, will be chosen at a non-partisan election to be held on February 19, 1959. The two candidates who receive the most votes will seek election to the post in April of 1959 for a six-year term to commence on January 1, 1960.

While attending to his offices in East Tawas and Osceola, the counselor also continues his duties as associate trial counsel for the firm of Ross and Ross of Belleville and Detroit. He is a partner in the latter firm.

A trial attorney of extensive experience in the circuit courts of Michigan, Mr. Ross has also appeared and practiced before the United States District Courts and the courts of the States of New York, Indiana, Ohio, Illinois and Kentucky. During the past 16 years, he has appeared as either prosecution or defense counsel in numerous trials involving Federal Military Courts Martial. He is presently one of the Detroit Bar Association attorneys chosen to serve on the circuit court committee for Wayne County, a post which he has held for the past four years. This committee studies circuit court procedures and makes recommendations to the court on all phases of circuit court activity.

In making his announcement for the candidacy to the judicial

post, Mr. Ross pointed out that he would run on a planned platform of fairness to all, coupled with unassailed personal integrity and a capacity for mercy toward the unfortunate. With a chuckle he pointed out that as proof of non-partisanship, he has acted as chief trial counsel for both local democratic groups and local republican groups in Wayne and

officer. He presently holds the rank of lieutenant commander in the Organized Naval Air Reserve and is attached to Transport Squadron VR 732 based at the Grosse Ile Naval Air Station at Grosse Ile. It was while serving with a board of officers chosen to review courts martial cases following the Japanese surrender that Mr. Ross was ordered to the newly opened Naval School of Justice to instruct naval officers in procedural and substantive law. Prior to his discharge from active duty in 1947, Ross was serving on temporary duty with the office of the judge advocate general of the navy engaged in compiling recommendations for the United States Code of Military Justice. This code is presently the standard code of justice for all the armed services.

Mr. Ross was admitted to practice before the State Bar of Michigan in 1951 after completing the prescribed courses at the Detroit College of Law and gaining his law degree from that college. He had, prior to the war, attended Eastern College for his pre-law work following his graduation from Belleville High School. He recalls that he tried his first circuit court case in Wayne County, three days after he was admitted to practice in Michigan. He has also received certificates of completion of numerous industrial courses gained at the time he was working his way through college by working nights at the Central Specialty Foundry and the Ford Motor Company.

Let's not harm amicable relationships among conference schools in a word battle among newspaper editors... there will be plenty of opportunity to express opinions when and if such a reorganization is considered.







SOCIAL SECURITY AGENT AT FEDERAL BUILDING TODAY

According to Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of social security district office in Bay City, people making application for their retirement benefits can speed up handling of their applications if they bring along the papers necessary to establish their right to benefits. These papers should include their social security card, proof of their age and proof of recent earnings. Mr. Ellifritz explained that the applicant's most recent W-2 form furnished by his employer, or his last income tax return along with Schedule C or Schedule F and the

anceled check showing payment of the self-employment social security tax, if self-employed, will suffice for proof of recent earnings. Mr. Ellifritz added that a birth certificate is not necessary for proof of age but that any old document giving date of birth, an old family Bible or an old insurance policy might possibly be all that is needed for proof of age.



apples, have on hand a supply of good baking apples, a jar of shelled, mixed nuts and boxed dates. Just mix chopped nuts and dates with brown sugar. Wash and core the apples, and plug the bottom of the core opening with half a date. Fill the rest of the core hole with the brown sugar-date-and-nut mixture. Top this with a small piece of butter. Bake the apples in individual casseroles with just a small amount of water.

While they are hot, serve them with cream. You can bake apples this way while the rest of the meal is being eaten and bring them to the table bubbling hot. This is a delicious treat and easy to make in the rush of activity during holiday-time.

There are many wonderful varieties of squash on the market for your Christmas dinner. Hubbard is the old standby—good steamed or baked. Look for a real rough outside skin that is dark green in color.

The butternut is dark green. A "top knot" is a distinguishing feature. This squash is quite dry, but has a nutty flavor . . . so you may prefer to steam it. The butternut is yellow-beige and has a long neck. Unlike other varieties, it is easy to peel before cooking. It will take about the same length of time to cook as boiling potatoes. If the turkey fills your oven, maybe this would be easier for you to use.

The snacks you eat between meals can be good and good for you.

What you eat has a great effect on how you look and feel; so think of your weight and complexion before reaching for soda pop and candy. These foods contain empty calories.

Many other treats you also like contain a food always necessary for an adequate diet—milk. Ice cream and milk shakes make healthy and satisfying snacks.

Attention 4-H Club foods project members: How about trying a new drink made of milk, ice cream and crushed graham crackers.

Blend these ingredients together with a rotary beater or blender and serve. If you like it, your friends will, too—and it will be good for all of you. It is an idea for refreshments at your community club meeting.

Fruits, too, are both tasty and nutritious. Try serving an attractively arranged fruit platter, along with popcorn.

Hot dogs and hamburgers have long been favorites of boys and girls. It is a good thing, since meat is an important food in a well rounded diet. Dips and spreads made from meat or cheese are nutritious and add zest to any party.

Have you heard there will soon be a guide bulletin for a new foods project featuring snacks? Will you want to enroll?







All these recent snow squalls remind us how lucky our friend the bear is—he can "sleep off" the whole winter! Worst of all, most of us wait until the last minute for storm windows, storm doors and general "get ready for winter" chores.

Ernest Kedder, an agricultural engineer at Michigan State University, reminds us of another winter chore, preparing farm engines for winter. The life of an engine left idle during the winter is shortened if it is not prepared properly for inactive duty and if it is not currently placed back in service after storage.

Manufacturers give complete information on storing engines and starting engines that have been in storage, it takes only a few minutes to take care of an engine properly. Too often the switch is turned off at the end of the season and the engine left idle until next season. Once in awhile batteries are removed.

Kedder suggests that the engine and accessories be cleaned; this includes the radiator and air



Improved Traffic Record Has November Set-Back

November suffered a serious setback in Michigan's improved traffic record, with the highest monthly toll so far this year with 151 persons killed in 127 accidents, according to provisional figures released by the Michigan State Police.

The toll was 17 more, or an increase of 13 percent, over November 1957, when 134 persons were killed in 116 accidents.

August, with 144 deaths, is second high for the year.

The November performance is the worst since 1955, when there were 208 fatalities for that month. But it is still better than the 10-year average of 160 deaths in November from 1948 through 1957.

November is the second month this year to show an increase in fatalities over the same month of the previous year. The September toll of 130 deaths was eight more than were recorded in September a year ago.

The record for the first 11 months now stands at 1,218 deaths, which is 162 fewer than last year at this time, or a reduction of 11.7 percent. The goal for the year is a 10 percent reduction.

Final figures for October showed 111 deaths and 4,612 injured in 14,109 accidents. This was a reduction of 31 deaths or 22 percent under the same month of last year, an exceptionally good record. Injuries, however, increased 132, or three percent, from 4,480 to 4,612, but the number of accidents decreased by 309, or two percent, from 14,418 to 14,109.


