

Baker Predicts 11 Percent Increase for N. G. in 1959

Chairman Melvin H. Baker of National Gypsum Company today predicted that his company's 1959 sales will register a 11 percent increase over this year's record sales and set a new record of about 180 million dollars.

"Because of further expansion of National Gypsum's operations and the encouraging outlook for construction next year, we expect that 1959 sales will show about a 18 million dollar increase over our expected 1958 sales," Baker said in a year-end review.

"While final figures are not yet available, we estimate 1958 sales for National Gypsum and its subsidiary, American Encaustic Tiling Company, will be close to 162 million dollars," Mr. Baker said.

Estimated 1958 earnings for the leading building materials producer were put at \$15,900,000. The firm's 1957 earnings were \$12,750,942 on net sales of \$141,472,977.

"Next year promises to be the greatest building year in history with total construction volume passing the 50-billion dollar mark for the first time," Chairman Baker said.

National's chief executive does not hold with those who expect a drop in home construction because of a mortgage fund shortage.

"There is every indication congress will pass a new housing bill to provide ample mortgage money in 1959," he said, "although it might cost more and be harder to get."

He added that "in our opinion, increased interest rates will be more than offset by the healthier buying outlook of the public and housing starts may well exceed 1,200,000 for the year."

Chairman Baker said the company had projected a record sales budget for 1959.

"Sales of National Gypsum building materials is expected to reach 165 million dollars in 1959 and sale of ceramic tile products by our subsidiary should exceed 15 million dollars."

Mr. Baker recalled that National Gypsum acquired the American Encaustic Tiling Company, incorporated, last August through an exchange of stock. National is now negotiating for the acquisition of another ceramic tile manufacturer.

FHA to Finance 420 Homes at Wurtsmith

The Federal Housing Administration announces it has committed itself to mortgage financing to construct an additional 420 residential units for air force personnel at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. Mortgage covering these units totals \$6,930,000.

"These units are in addition to the 618 previously approved by FHA for Wurtsmith," said Dwight K. Hamborsky, FHA director.

"This eligibility statement represents assurance by FHA that when construction contracts are let by the air force, mortgage financing for same will be available."

The 1,038 units will be erected upon air force-owned property adjacent to the Wurtsmith base. Dual Lake borders the property and will be eventually beautified as a recreational area. The base recently built a supermarket and commissary for personnel living in the new housing project.

"The mortgage which will finance the construction of these 1,038 units and which FHA will insure is for approximately \$16,950,000," Hamborsky concluded.

urer, The Olean Tile Company. Mr. Baker noted that when Olean Tile is acquired by National Gypsum "its sales will further add to National Gypsum's 1959 volume." He added that "we expect negotiations with Olean Tile will be completed shortly."

The board chairman said, "Important increases in production capacities and a number of attractive new products are scheduled for 1959."

"The company's new gypsum products plant at Waukegan, Illinois, will be in production in June."

"This will be our most modern plant," Mr. Baker said. "Its annual production of wallboard, lath, sheathing and plaster will take care of 50,000 homes in the great Midwestern market."

National Gypsum's massive new quarry at Tawas City, which began limited production this year, will supply ore for the Waukegan plant and a second new gypsum plant to be built in 1959 at Lorain, Ohio.

Engineering is underway at Lorain with construction to begin in the spring," Chairman Baker said. "The plant will be in production for 1960."

"We recently started a 25 percent expansion of gypsum board and plaster production at Savannah, Georgia, plant to keep pace with demand in the booming Southeastern market," Baker said. "Completion is expected in mid-1959."

Turning to research activities, Chairman Baker said the company has a number of new products ready for next year's market.

"One of the new products is a pre-decorated gypsum wallboard with a washable vinyl cover," he said. "We expect this new concept will have quick acceptance in game and family room construction."

Mr. Baker indicated that new products are expected to add three million dollars to National Gypsum sales in the first half of 1959.

JPs Ask Motorists to Drive With Care

Law enforcement agencies of the cities, townships, county and state will combine on a strong campaign to save Michigan's good traffic record for 1958, according to Justices of the Peace A. J. Goulet of East Tawas and Lester Weis of Oscoda. "A recent shock wave of multiple death and ran-off-roadway crashes have alarmed government and safety officials from the governor's office on down," both justices say.

Increased celebrating and social drinking prevalent at this time of year may be the root of the recent alarming trend, according to national and state safety experts. The state liquor control commission reports that only 25 percent of the liquor is sold in licensed taverns and resorts. The balance is consumed in homes or at private parties.

"We usually enjoy good cooperation from the licensed dealers," stated the justices, "but we urgently beg the cooperation of our businessmen and industries and the large numbers of private people who entertain at this time of the year. We are especially concerned for the people who rarely drink at other seasons, the family breadwinners and the young people."

"It is not necessary to be drunk in order for either driver or a pedestrian's traffic judgment to be fatally effected. The person who has had only two or three and is feeling great can be a serious danger to himself and others."

Enforcement agencies of the city, township, county and state will be on extended duty as the holidays arrive. Every effort will be made to cope promptly with traffic offenders. Drivers in rural areas are especially admonished to reduce speed and control their cars better. "Drunk drivers go to jail."

Christmas Checks Go to Kroger Employees

Christmas gift checks totaling approximately \$74,295 will go to employees of the Kroger Company in this area, it was announced today by C. Olaf Talla, vice president of the Detroit division which operates local stores.

Christmas checks go to all full-time employees with six months or more service, with the exception of those who participate in a company incentive plan, Mr. Talla said. Incentive plan checks will be distributed early in 1959.

Detroit division personnel are among more than 30,000 Kroger employees in stores, warehouses, offices and manufacturing plants in 20 Middle Western and Southern States who will receive Christmas checks totaling approximately \$875,000. Kroger employees have received Christmas gifts of this type for the past 21 consecutive years.

U. S. Forest Service Provides Good Habitat for Wildlife

An estimated 50,000 sportsmen hunted an average five days on areas of the Lower Michigan National Forest during the 1958 deer season, Louis A. Pommerening, forest supervisor, reported today. He also estimated there was a harvest of 11,000 deer.

The Lower Michigan National Forest contains more than 860,000 acres of public forest land, according to Supervisor Pommerening, and is made up of Manistee and Huron Forests. These two forests were consolidated into one management unit in 1945. The Huron Forest is one of the oldest in the United States and will be 50 years old in 1959. The Manistee Forest celebrated its silver anniversary this year.

To sportsmen, these areas offer public access and provide excellent hunting and fishing. They also provide areas of high scenic and general recreational value.

While the taking of game and fish on the forest is controlled by the Michigan Department of Conservation, it is the responsibility of the forest to provide good habitat for wildlife. This is done through good land management practices. "The relatively new field of wildlife management offers new problems and approaches to integrated land management," states Robert E. Radtke, forest biologist and staff officer, assigned to the Lower Michigan National Forest. Cooperation is also given the department of conservation in its deer herd management program, because only through good herd management can the numbers of deer be maintained in balance with the available food supply, and yet maintain a maximum herd year after year. The successful deer harvest this year is the result of this type of productive management.

Just how does the forest service manage its land so that wildlife populations will be maintained at a level consistent with all other services of the land?

1. Coordinating wildlife with all other forest uses, especially timber management. It is the policy, for example, on timber sales to cut near deer yards during the winter months, thus supplying considerable deer browse. A well planned system of timber harvest will have much to do with the success of the future deer herd.
2. Timber stand improvement measures are conducted in aspen stands in order to produce young aspen sprouts, which are high quality deer food. Up to a ton and a half of browse food on every acre is produced in this way. Acorn producing oaks are also left where they will benefit the deer.
3. Cooperating with all agencies involved in wildlife management and encouraging proper utilization of the wildlife resource on a sustained yield basis through hunting under state laws and regulations.

Recently the health unit became a chapter of the Michigan Health Council, which in turn is a member of the National Health Council.

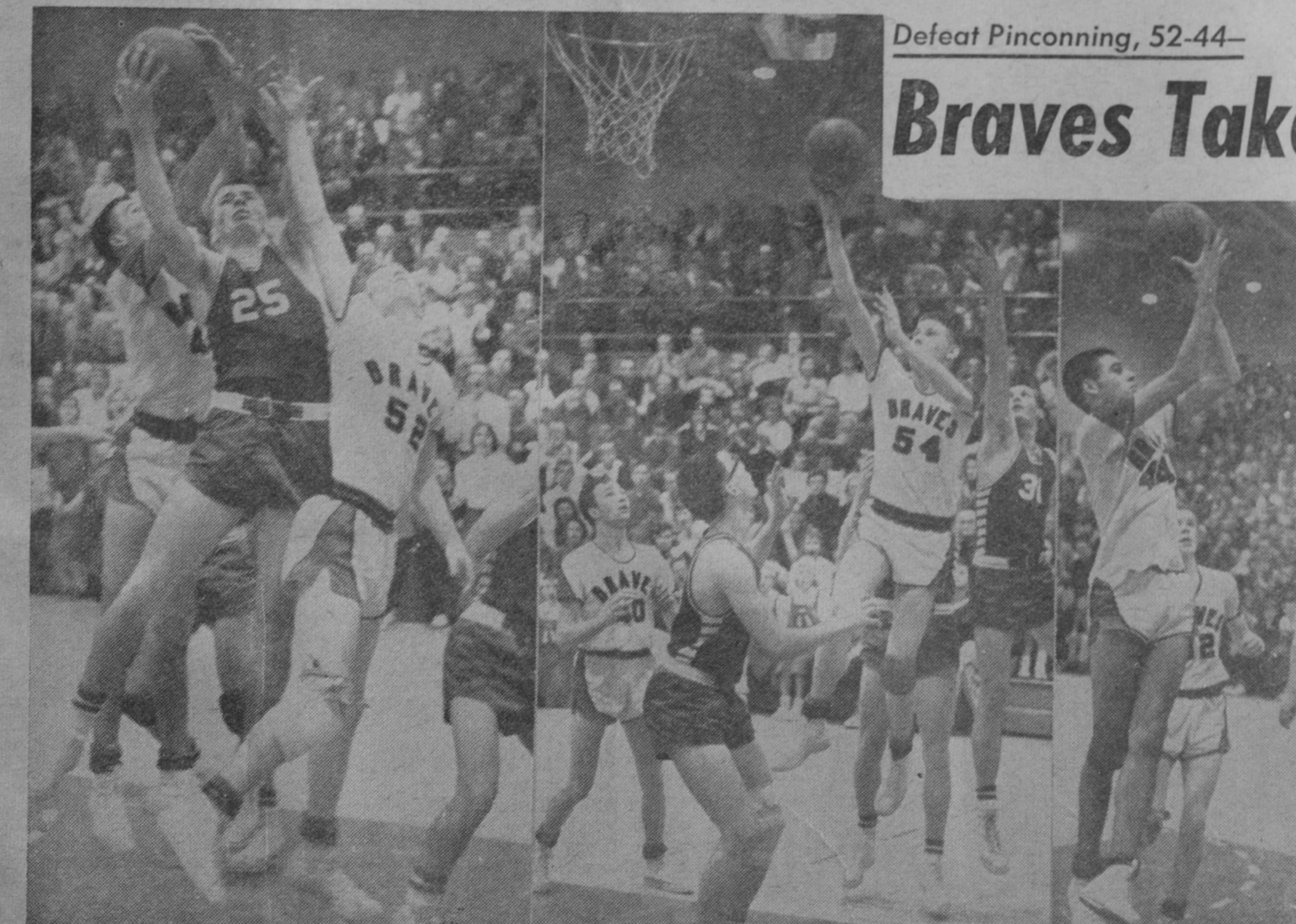

Through efforts of the council, a board of directors, made up of prominent men of Hale, was formed to secure the services of another doctor for the community. As the community enlarges the need for another doctor is becoming a necessity.

The council also has a blood donor list which is being brought up to date and to be kept intact, and copies sent to doctors, law enforcement agencies and fire departments in the area.

Other work done by this group is the mailing of Easter Seals, collection of moneys from sale of these seals and the care of crippled children and adults.

Defeat Pinconning, 52-44— Braves Take Over Conference's Top Rung

Tawas Area High picked up a nice Christmas present last Friday night in the form of undisputed possession of first place in North-eastern Michigan Conference basketball standings.

But, the game was no gift from Santa Claus. The Braves had to hustle to sidetrack the Pinconning Spartans, 52-44, in four action-packed quarters at the Tawas Area Auditorium.

Both teams went into the contest with undefeated records, the Spartans having the most impressive with four wins, including victories against Roscommon and Houghton Lake. Tawas Area went in with three games to its credit.

The Braves lost little time in taking the lead, holding a 16-2 edge midway in the first quarter. Pinconning did not score until 2 1/2 minutes were gone in the quarter. Just when it looked as though everything was going in Tawas' favor, a sudden flurry by Pinny put the score at 18-11 in favor of the Braves at the quarter whistle.

The second quarter found the Spartans hotter than dime store cap pistols while the Braves were as cold as ice. Pinny, with a brilliant passing attack, tied the score midway in the quarter and then went on to a 27-24 lead at the half, having meshed 16 points to the Braves eight.

The hectic third quarter saw the teams burning up the court, but not the baskets. Both teams rattled the backboards, Tawas hitting for 12 points while the Spartans mustered but six. With three minutes to go, Tawas finally pulled ahead only to have Pinny snatch a momentary lead. With a minute and 40 seconds to go, Tawas pulled into a 36-33 lead which it did not lose the rest of the way.

The fourth quarter found Tawas in the drivers' seat as it clicked off 16 points to the Spartans' 11.

Pinny, using a half court press, had two men guarding Ray Moore, high-scoring Tawas guard, throughout the game. Although this move prevented Moore from shooting, it allowed the McIntoshmen to work three players on two Pinny defenders under the baskets. This sprung both Bob Watts and Bob Foco into the open and allowed Guard Dwayne Ulman to pop through for jump shots on occasion.

While Tawas was way off on its shooting, Watts clicked off 25 points being set up many times by nice passes from Bill Mick and Moore. Foco played his best game of the year with 10 points and excellent rebounding. Ulman, showing a steady improvement in each game, meshed nine.

High scorer for the Spartans was Lee King, forward, with 12 points. Key players in the Pinny offensive attack were the Cluff brothers, center and guard, who collected 17 points between them.

Pinconning had a bad break in the game when Gary Kinsey, guard, was forced out of action with a sprained ankle.

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\$624.50 Contributed to TB Campaign in First Three Weeks

A long and costly campaign against tuberculosis still lies ahead of Michigan and the nation.

This prediction was made in a statement released today by J. Irwin Nichols, executive secretary of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association. He foresees the need for stepping up programs in TB research and prevention if progress against the disease is to be continued.

"Half a century ago when the Christmas Seal agency first spurred tuberculosis control, hardly a family escaped the suffering and

tragedy of the white plague," Nichols said. "Since then the TB death rate has been cut by more than 90 percent. The case rate has declined, but at a slower pace."

Contributions of Iosco County residents during the Christmas Seal sale now in progress will help continue the fight against tuberculosis. During the first three weeks the county has given \$624.50, Nichols reported. Last year residents contributed \$1,579.43.

He warned about underestimating the threat of tuberculosis. The disease cost state and local taxpayers in Michigan \$17,000,000 last year.

Christmas Seal donations finance a state-wide health education program. They support research projects and aid case-finding programs.

Equipment owned by the health council includes: Three hospital beds with mattresses and covers, two bedside tables, three bed pans, four urinals, two rubber rings, one pair adjustable crutches, two pair adult crutches, one pair youth crutches, one folding wheel chair, one folding fracture type wheel chair, one fracture bed pan.

Approximately 200 bed pads have been stored at the home of Mrs. Guet in Hale. However, the council is searching for a small building which can be either purchased, donated or material supplied to house this equipment with more to be added as time goes on. This building to be located in Hale and all equipment is available on loan to anyone in the area. This means Iosco County, Oscoda, Ogemaw and surrounding counties. Any assistance by representation from groups of outlying areas, contributions, either materials or time, will make the work more satisfying and of more assistance to the health problems of all the area.
