

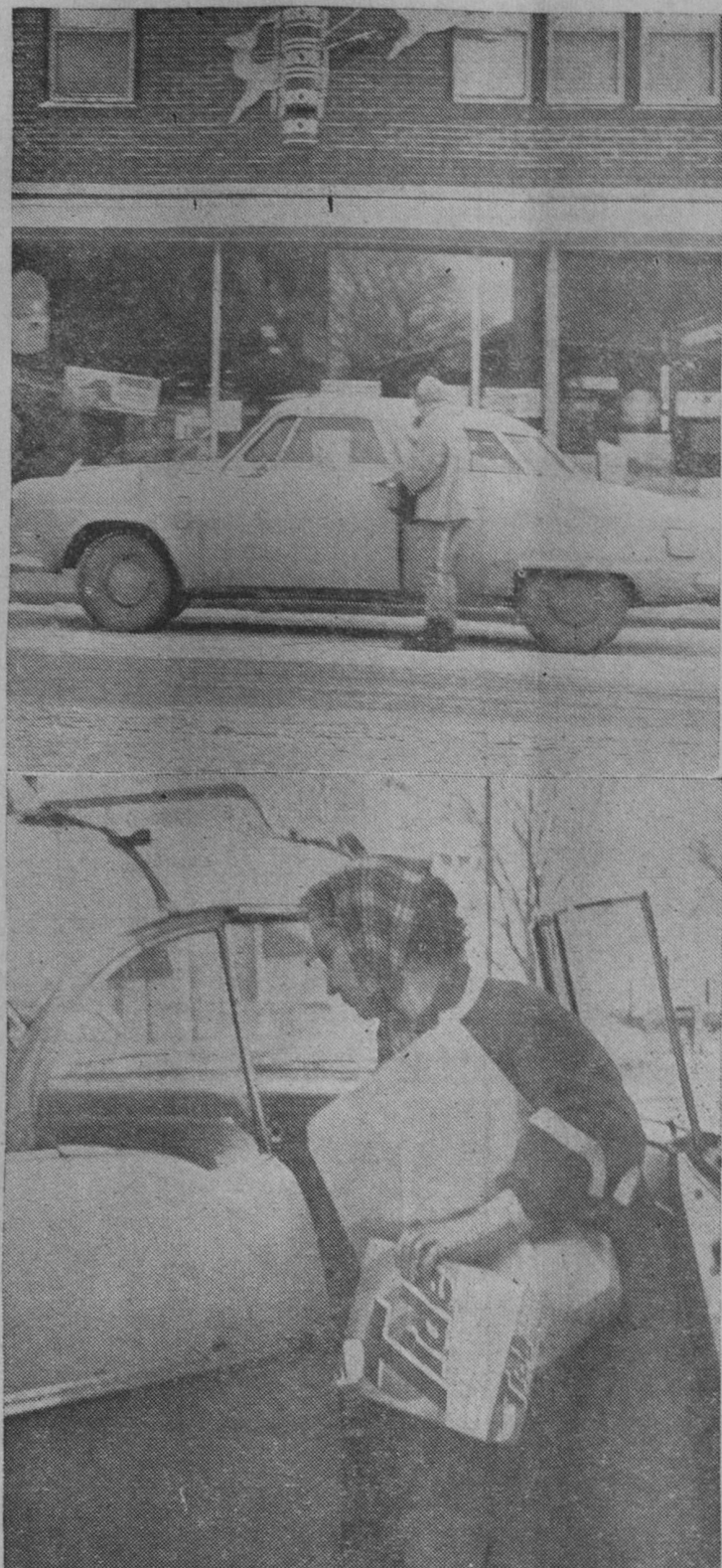

Seek Site in Tawas City for Convalescent Home

Information that Mrs. Jane Vedmore was interested in locating her proposed new convalescent home in Tawas City was disclosed at the regular meeting of the city council Monday night.

Plans for the proposed structure were presented to the council by the contracting firm of Buku and Dates of Tawas City. The prints have been approved by the state fire marshal and health department.

Councilman Cecil Cabbie told the board that this was not an of-

ficial request for council action at this time. He said that it was an inquiry to learn if there was any property, city-owned or private, in the community available for such purposes.

Availability of city-owned property near the hospital was discussed and Mrs. Vedmore, owner of the Huron Convalescent Home, is to be invited to attend the next meeting of the council.

According to plans, the proposed structure would be 122 by 40 feet, of cement block construction.

It had been the intention of Mrs. Vedmore to construct the home on Bridge Street in East Tawas, but property owners in that vicinity objected to the plan.

In other business, the city council authorized purchase of 13 turkeys to be given to city employees at Christmas time. This custom was started by the council about six years ago.

City Attorney Allan Miller reported that at the request of Supl. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz, a letter is to be sent to the state health department to learn if the proposed plan to construct a dam on Tawas Lake would have any effect on the city's sewer disposal system.

A letter requesting that school buses refrain from stopping at intersections where they cannot be seen by approaching vehicles was sent to the Tawas Area Board of Education. The council said that a dangerous situation had arisen at the corner of Lake and First Streets when buses stopped at the intersection to load or unload passengers.

Tawas Area to Host 118 at All-Star Band Day

Band members from 14 North-eastern Michigan schools will participate in the district nine all-star band concert to be held at Tawas Area High School Auditorium Saturday, December 6. The program starts at 8:00 p. m.

Participating in the program will be top high school band students of the district schools.

Some 118 students will register at the high school starting at 9:00 a. m., with sectional rehearsals scheduled for 9:30 o'clock. A full band rehearsal will be held at 2:00 p. m. and dinner is to be served in the school cafeteria at 5:30 o'clock.

Heart Attack Fatal; 1 Hunter Wounded

One hunter was accidentally wounded and one hunter died of a heart attack in the last week of the 1958 deer season in the Iosco County area.

Victor C. Savage, 60, died of a heart attack last Thursday while hunting three miles east of Monument Road near Buck Creek. Hunting with his son, Sgt. DeLaurem C. Savage of the Saginaw City Police Department, the two men separated to go hunting about 8:45 a. m. The elder Mr. Savage was found dead at 11:20 o'clock by his son, Coroner E. John Moffatt investigated.

Claude McGuire, 50, of Caro was a victim of a shooting accident Saturday afternoon. Hunting at their cabin on the Alcona-Iosco line, McGuire had just returned from hunting and was sitting in a bunk at his cabin. He had left a 30-30 caliber rifle leaning against the outside wall of the cabin. His son, Edward, 14, started to unload the weapon and it discharged, the slug going through the walls of the porch and the cabin. The slug struck the elder McGuire in the thigh. He was treated at Tawas Hospital.

Four Persons Injured in Two-Car Crash

Four persons were injured in a two-car crash on M-55 in Burleigh Township, three miles south of Prescott Road, last Wednesday. Drivers of the cars involved were Kenneth Trudell, 39, Pinconning, and Eugene W. Mann, Omer. Injured slightly were Robert Sass, 27; Roger Trudell, 18, and the driver, all of Pinconning, and Bernard Head, 21, Standish, a passenger in the Mann car. Police said that Mann pulled out of a private drive and Trudell was unable to avoid a collision.

US-23 Re-Zoning Approved by Council

East Tawas completed the re-zoning of property along US-23 from Gifford's Grill west to the city limits from residential to commercial, as the result of action taken by the city council Monday night.

A public hearing was held by the city council and city planning commission, at which time there were no objections to such re-zoning. City Attorney Richard Newman was instructed to complete the necessary legal work.

Much of the affected area had been rezoned commercial in past years when building applications were received. Only two parcels of property remained residential, one which was located one home and one cabin.

In other business, the council approved a building application received from Mrs. Ernest Leaf. This was to move and make an addition to existing garage and construct a breezeway. Estimated cost was \$1,000. Donald Hogoabom is contractor.

Authorization was given to Deloise Durant to attend a three-day conference of assessors at Ann Arbor in December.

The city attorney was instructed to advertise for bids on three city-owned lots on River Street and a parcel of land near the cemetery.

Breaking and entering of the Merschel Cleaners in East Tawas last Thursday night was solved over the week-end with the arrest of an 18-year-old Tawas City boy. About \$2 in cash was stolen from the cash register. Bound over to circuit court and held under \$300 bond is Terry James Tanner.

Five Receive Citizenship in Iosco Circuit Court Tuesday

"I hereby declare, on oath, that I absolutely and entirely renounce and abjure all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state or sovereignty, of whom or which I have heretofore been

a subject or citizen; . . ." these were the opening words of the oath of allegiance as read by Judge Herman Dehnke to five persons in Iosco County Circuit Court Tuesday.

Always a dramatic and inspiring part of circuit court proceedings, five new citizens swore their allegiance to the United States at a naturalization hearing to start the December term of court.

The new citizens are Mrs. Henry Smith of Tawas City; Mrs. Francis Tucci and Mrs. Jack Kitchen, wives of servicemen stationed at Wurtsmith Air Force Base; A-lc Hector Chavez Rojo of Wurtsmith, and Fred Craigie of Alcona County.

During the routine questioning of petitioners prior to administering the oath, Judge Dehnke stressed the importance of becoming an informed citizen. For the naturalized as well as the native-born, in order to properly exercise their right to vote.

"Just being admitted to citizenship is not the end of it . . . it means a continual process of keeping informed," the judge declared.

Following the ceremony, a special program for the new citizens was presented by members of the Iosco Quota Club and Glenn Staley Post, American Legion Auxiliary, Hale.

Russell H. McKenzie to be Ordained Into Holy Order

The Rt. Rev. Archie H. Crowley, suffragan bishop of Michigan, Protestant Episcopal Church, will ordain to the Sacred Order of Deacons, Russell Harwood McKenzie in Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, on Saturday, December 6, at 6 o'clock in the evening.

Mr. McKenzie was born in Port Huron June 28, 1904, the son of Charles and Emma E. McKenzie. He received his education in the schools of Detroit, Whittemore and Carsonville, graduating from high school at Carsonville. He furthered his education at Albion College from 1922-1924. After a period spent teaching in the public schools in Iosco and Monroe Counties, he was elected county clerk of Iosco County, holding that office from 1935 to the early part of 1951. In 1951, he resigned as county clerk to enter the employment of the Peoples State Bank at East Tawas, where he is employed at the present time. Since September 11, 1950, Mr.

McKenzie has been a lay reader in Christ Episcopal Church. His

interest in the church led him to be admitted as a postulant for holy orders at that time as well. Pursuing the studies requisite for the same, he was admitted as a candidate for holy orders on September 25, 1957.

After ordination Mr. McKenzie will serve as assistant minister of Christ Church in East Tawas and of St. Mark's Parochial Mission in Hale, until such time as he is assigned elsewhere.



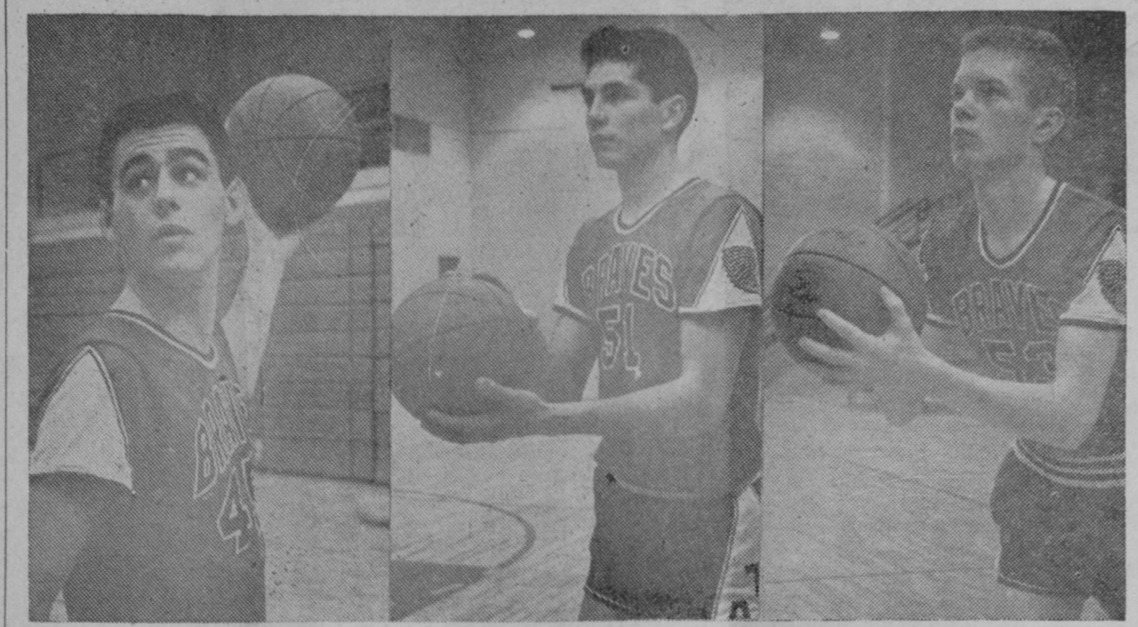
Deer hunters, phooey!... conservation department, phooey!

Braves Open Season Friday Against Orioles

When Tawas Area High School opens its 1958-59 basketball season Friday night at West Branch, the Braves should be as strong as the Tawas team which was conference co-champion last year.
Without treading on "thin ice" with a pre-season prediction at this early date, as far as this year's conference title is concerned, the Tawas team has three seasoned veterans and a good "crop" of ex-JV'ers who should make the NEM race interesting for local fans this year.
Coach Bill McIntosh has lost all-conference and second team all-star, Ray Guyette, along with Dick Lanski and Ken Bublitz, who were the bulwark of last year's five, plus four other lettermen.
But, returning for the nucleus of this year's squad, is the front line of Bill Mick, Ray Moore and Bob Watts. Moving up from the JV squad are Dwayne Ulman, Bob Foco, Pete Bolen, Chuck Fairfield, Al Moore, Arnie Stump and Larry "Doc" Anschuetz.
There are a few "ifs" to be considered before Tawas Area's squad can be compared with co-champion, Roscommon, which seems to have the inside track to the league championship, according to pre-season "dope."
Naturally, the biggest concern of McIntosh is how well the newcomers to the varsity will fill the gaps left by graduation. Another concern, at present, is the re-injured leg of Bill Mick.
Otherwise, the team has shaped up rapidly and will be put to its first test "under fire" this Friday night.
Taking a look at other NEM Conference teams, Roscommon lost but three from its co-championship squad of last year and has nine monogram winners returning. Houghton Lake has three outstanding lettermen coming back from its 12-win and four-loss squad of a year ago. Arenac Central has seven returning lettermen, West Branch has six, Pinconning three, Beaverton seven and Arenac Eastern two.

Postmaster Martin Kasischke Says 'Mail Early for Christmas'

Now that we are heading into the Christmas mail rush, Postmaster Martin Kasischke put his "Mail Early For Christmas" campaign into high gear today.

Mr. Kasischke said, "We are ready for an all time record Christmas mail this year. Every facility of the post office is being expanded to render maximum service. Extra trucks and personnel have been added, and special mailing schedules will be set up to insure prompt handling of the tremendous flood of both incoming and outgoing mail."

"However," he continued, "the vast volume of Christmas mail is only part of our problem. Names and addresses are often carelessly written, many packages are poorly wrapped or have insufficient postage on them. These oversights result in delays and disappointments, most of which can be avoided if everyone will follow these simple requirements listed below."

Be sure Christmas card and gift mailing lists are up-to-date.

Wrap Christmas gifts securely.

Address cards and gifts correctly.

Use complete addresses—including street number, rural route or post office box number. Be sure

that the name of the street is complete with avenue, parkway or drive. Avoid abbreviation of street and state names. Use zone numbers wherever possible, and be sure to include your own zone number in your return address.

And most important of all—mail cards and gifts within the next few days.

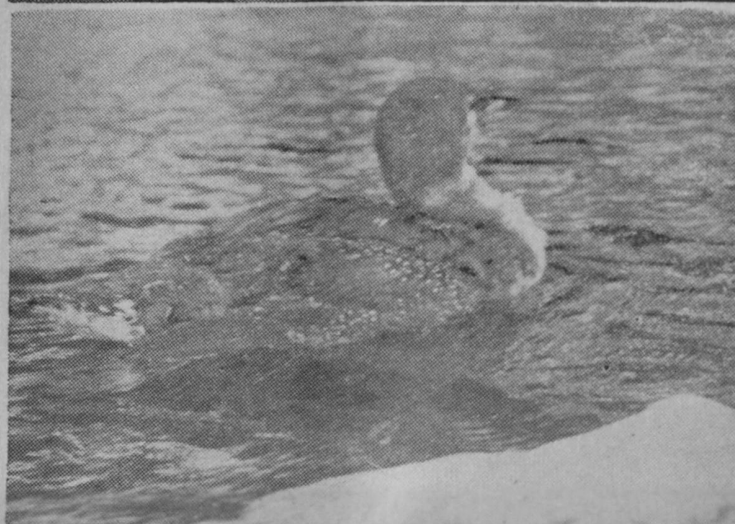
Delivery of Christmas cards will be greatly expedited if everyone will bundle them with "local" or "out of town" bands which are available at the post office.

Try to bring your parcels to the postal window before 10:00 a. m. or between 1:30 and 3:30 p. m. to avoid the noon hour rush.

The postmaster also suggests that everyone send all Christmas cards by first class mail, thus insuring forwarding service if the addressee has moved, or the card will be returned to you if the recipient cannot be located. Then, too, Christmas cards sent by first class mail can include handwritten messages to make your greetings more personal.

Christmas mail for local addresses should be started on its way at least a week before Christmas.

No Laughing Loon!

"Laughed like a loon," is a time-worn expression, but a loon found on Tawas Bay last Saturday had no reason for mirth—it came near to death in an odd situation.

Dwight "Lucky" Gadd of Tawas City spotted a movement on the ice lakeward from the US-23-M-55 intersection and, on investigation, found that a loon was frozen in the ice.

Gadd freed the loon, its head being frozen solid to shelf ice. A fish hook was imbedded in its beak and a long leader tightly wrapped around it.

Conservation officers told Gadd that the bird should be released on water because of its being practically helpless on dry land.

Gadd knocked the ice off the bird's head and then removed the hook and leader with a pair of pliers. The loon was in a very weak condition, having been without food for days. It gave a little "croak" as it swam off in search of food.

Trouble with sticky drawers these days? Dampness is a primary cause of this sticking, although it is well to check a couple of other possibilities. One is a heavy amount of weight in the drawer. Another is that the drawer or drawer frame may be pulled out of line. Locate the real cause and the correction is not difficult.

If considerable weight must be stored in a drawer, metal tracks will help. Use a level to check the drawer framework, or maybe find one leg that is too short or too long. Then, take the necessary steps to make the drawer level.

If drawers swell from dampness, sand or plane the binding edges. After it has been made to fit, use paraffin, paste wax or soap on the runners.

Should you find loose joints are the cause of the drawer sticking, reinforce by regluing, or use small metal corner plates to add strength.

None of these remedies are very difficult and everyone's disposition will improve when the cause is eliminated.

Sewing shortcuts make the job more enjoyable, save time, save energy. When you arrange your equipment for a sewing "spreed," consider the U-shaped arrangement. This means placing the surface for cutting on one side, the sewing machine at the bottom of the U and the pressing surface on the other side.

Whether you cut, pin, baste, stitch or press, do as much of each as you can at one time.

Prevent the stretching of bias edges by stay-stitching them. Do it with a stitch of average length

and matching thread, placed just off the seamline toward the raw edge of the material. Always stitch with the grain; in other words, from the wide to the narrow end.

More sewing shortcuts are to be found in an extension folder prepared by Michigan State University clothing specialist Bernetta Kahabka. Stop in at the office or write us for a copy.

Most plentiful in supply, thus most economical to buy this year, are English walnuts, pecans and filberts. Almonds are a short crop and it follows that they are higher priced.

Use nuts in the nut bowl, add them to salads, breads, rolls, sandwich fillings, poultry stuffing, puddings, ice cream.

Shelled nuts keep best in airtight containers in a cool, dark place. They keep best in the shell and unsalted ones keep better than salted ones. Have you thought of freezing nuts? Shelled ones keep well if put in tight containers, just like other foods. Frozen Brazil nuts will shell more easily than those not frozen. The nutmeats are more easily removed whole when this is done.

Here is one way to make your soft candlelight this year. Line each ring of a muffin pan or dessert mold with a thoroughly chilled paper cup. Before placing the cups, pull a string with a short knot on the bottom through the cup. Wind the other end of the string around a short stick and lay it across the top of the cup. This will keep the wick in an upright position. Now, melt your partially burned candles over hot water (a double boiler is fine) and pour the melted mixture into the molds.

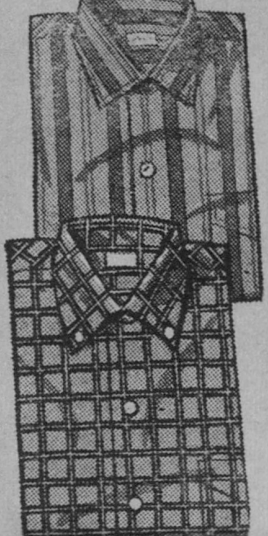
Melt the old candles over hot water to avoid a possible accident—just melt it, do not let it get too hot.

Coloring may be added to the wax before pouring. An old lipstick makes a beautiful shade for the traditional Christmas candles. Crayons provide other color sources.

Other size candles can be made using the same procedure—just find a mold of the size and shape you want finished candles to be.

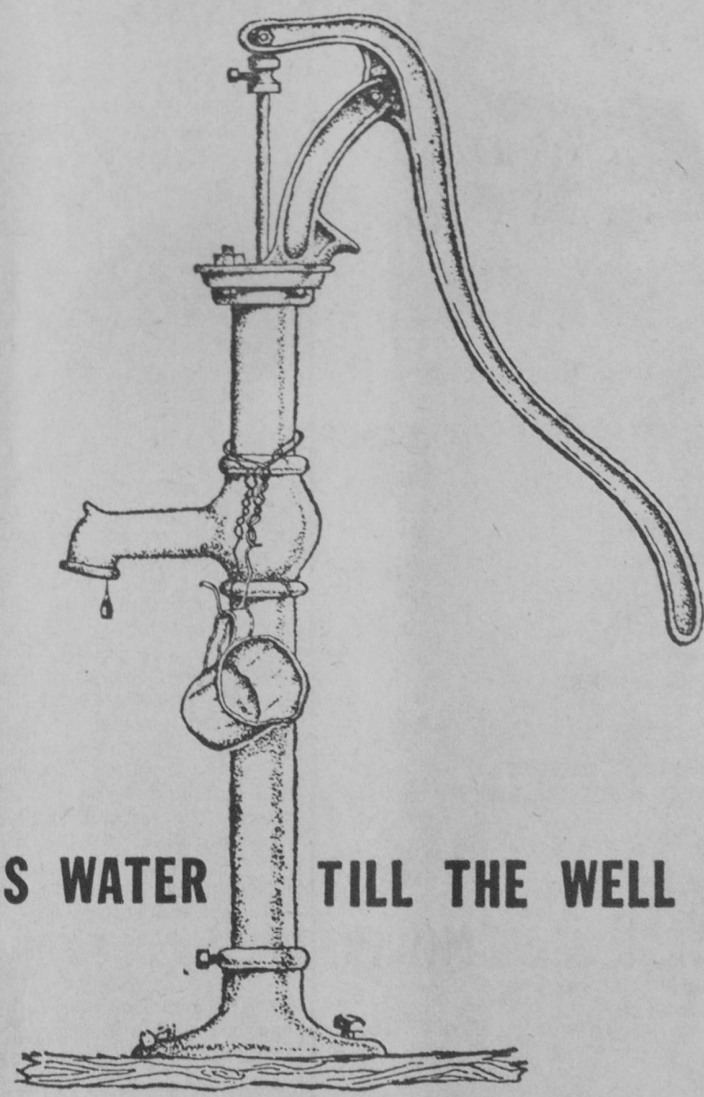

Provide for Christmas Tree Safety

Look out! That Christmas tree can be dangerous! Little precautions can save a lot of damage if these rules of safety are followed: First, mount the tree in a stand that holds water. This will keep the tree fresh and green. Remember, a dry tree is a fire hazard. Keep the tree away from open fireplaces, radiators, television sets and powerful electric lights. Do not overload the circuit by putting too many lights on one outlet. Turn off the lights before bedtime or leaving the house. Trimmings should be fireproof. The base of the tree should be kept clear of combustibles; such as, loose papers and ribbons.

Lighted candles are a menace as well as outmoded. Do not use them.

Last—be sure to dispose of the tree in a fire-safe area. If it is to be burned in the fireplace, do not leave it unattended, as more than the tree may go up in smoke.

Complete Last Portion of M-55 New Construction

Work on the 7½ miles of new construction to replace the last remaining graveled portion of M-55 in Isoco County was completed recently by C. E. Utterback, Mt. Pleasant contractor.

Consisting of building a new 25-foot-wide aggregate base with sealcoat in preparation for future bituminous surfacing, the contract was for \$594,011.

Work started on this project in April of this year and barricades were removed before deer season. During construction, traffic was routed down Chambers Road to the Meadow Road, then to the National City Road to Whittemore. From there the route went along M-65 to the M-55 junction.

This project has long been sought after by Isoco County residents and M-55 is now completely hard-surfaced from Lake Huron into the heart of Michigan.

Much work remains to be done in transplanting sod along the shoulders of the road. In the picture at top right, a sodding crew is shown at work last week. Because of the freezing weather, this work has been discontinued until spring.

Similar construction was completed recently on nine miles of M-65 westerly from the M-55 junction.

Taxes on Michigan Real Estate Climb to All-Time High

Taxes on farm real estate in Michigan climbed to an all-time high last year. The average tax was \$1.54 per acre.

According to William Heneberry, agricultural economist at Michigan State University, farm property taxes have been going up steadily since World War II. But he says that the big increase has come since 1950.

In 1950, the average real estate tax on Michigan farms was 77 cents per acre. This is exactly half the 1957 average tax.

One of the biggest causes of higher taxes is the rising value of farm property, Heneberry believes. Farm land was worth more than half again as much in 1957 as it was in 1950.

Another force helping to push taxes up has been school financing. Growing population has made it necessary to expand school facilities, hire larger teaching staffs and improve equipment.

Farmers, however, are not the only Michigan residents who are troubled with higher taxes. Tax bills on non-farm property have been going up, too.

But Heneberry believes that farmers may, in some cases, have paid more than their share of taxes to finance schools and other improvements. Delay in getting new property on tax rolls and farm property being over-valued in comparison with non-farm property have contributed to this.

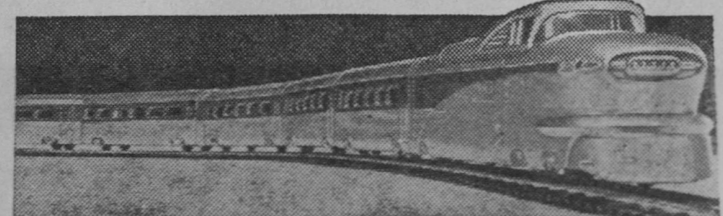
The economist predicts that taxes will continue upward. "The climb this year, however, will probably be less than it was a year ago. The cause of high taxes are still with us. We still need better roads, schools, police and fire protection and other services of local government," he said.

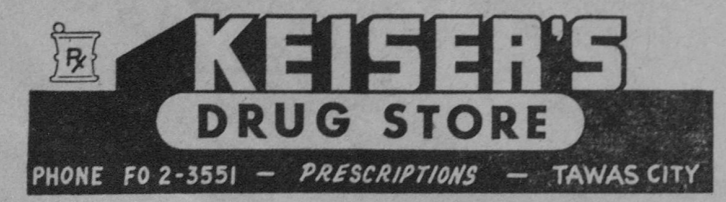

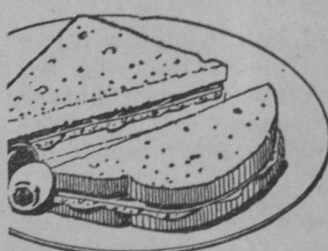

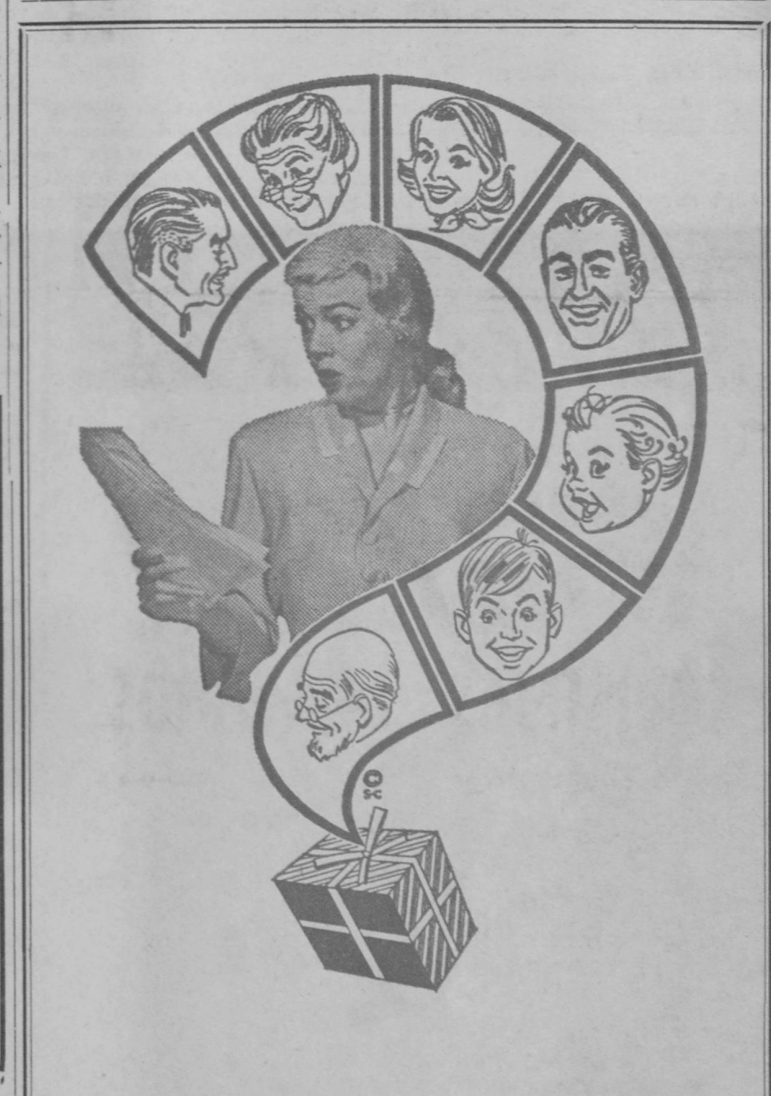
