"Laughed like a loon," is a timeworn expression, but a loon found on Tawas Bay last Saturday had no reason for mirth-it came near to death in an odd situation.



Gadd freed the loon, its head being frozen solid to shelf ice. A fish hook was imbedded in its beak and a long leader tightly wrapped around it.

Conservation officers told Gadd that the bird should be released on water because of its being practically helpless on dry land.

Gadd knocked the ice off the bird's head and then removed the hook and leader with a pair of pliers. The loon was in a very weak condition, having been without food for days. It gave a little "croak" as it swam off in search of food.
