

Tawas Area Takes Over NEM League Lead

Win 48 to 46 Thriller from Houghton Lake

By virtue of its 48-46 win over Houghton Lake Friday night, the Tawas Area Braves took sole pos session of first place in the NEM Conference and found themselves listed among the top 10 teams in Michigan class "B" schools, ac-cording to a Detroit newspaper's selections Monday.

the final score. Dick Lanski, second place in scoring for Tawas with 15 points, played an outstanding game and Rock seven of his 15-point total came


via the free throw lane.



or polished look. Fabrics are often blends of wool with cashmere, precious fur or nylon. These are lovely but may not stand hard wear like all purpose wools, such as, the tweeds. Tweeds are cur-rently in good fashion and good buys for general purpose wear.

Soft fabrics tend to pick up lint, and you see that happen on coats as they hang in racks. If a coat is wrinkled from hanging in the store, it will probably need frequent pressing as you wear it. Check outside stitching, button oles cut with fabric grain and lining.



TREASURE MAP?—The United States District Engineer at Detroit announced last week that another apparent attempt is about to get underway at East Tawas to salvage the copper cargo of the sunken vessel, Kitty Reeves. Roy D. Carlson of St. Clair Shores made application for permission to conduct salvage operations some 2,000 feet in a southerly direction off Tawas Point. It is believed that this is the location of the ill-fated schooner which sunk in a severe storm in December 1870 with its cargo of more than a quarter million dollars in copper. During the past 11 years numerous attempts have been made to locate the cargo, mostly through the efforts of Julius Roth, 87, of Tawas. It is reported that the current attempt is being made with the benefit of the aging Tawas man's knowledge of the site and other information gained over his years of effort.
