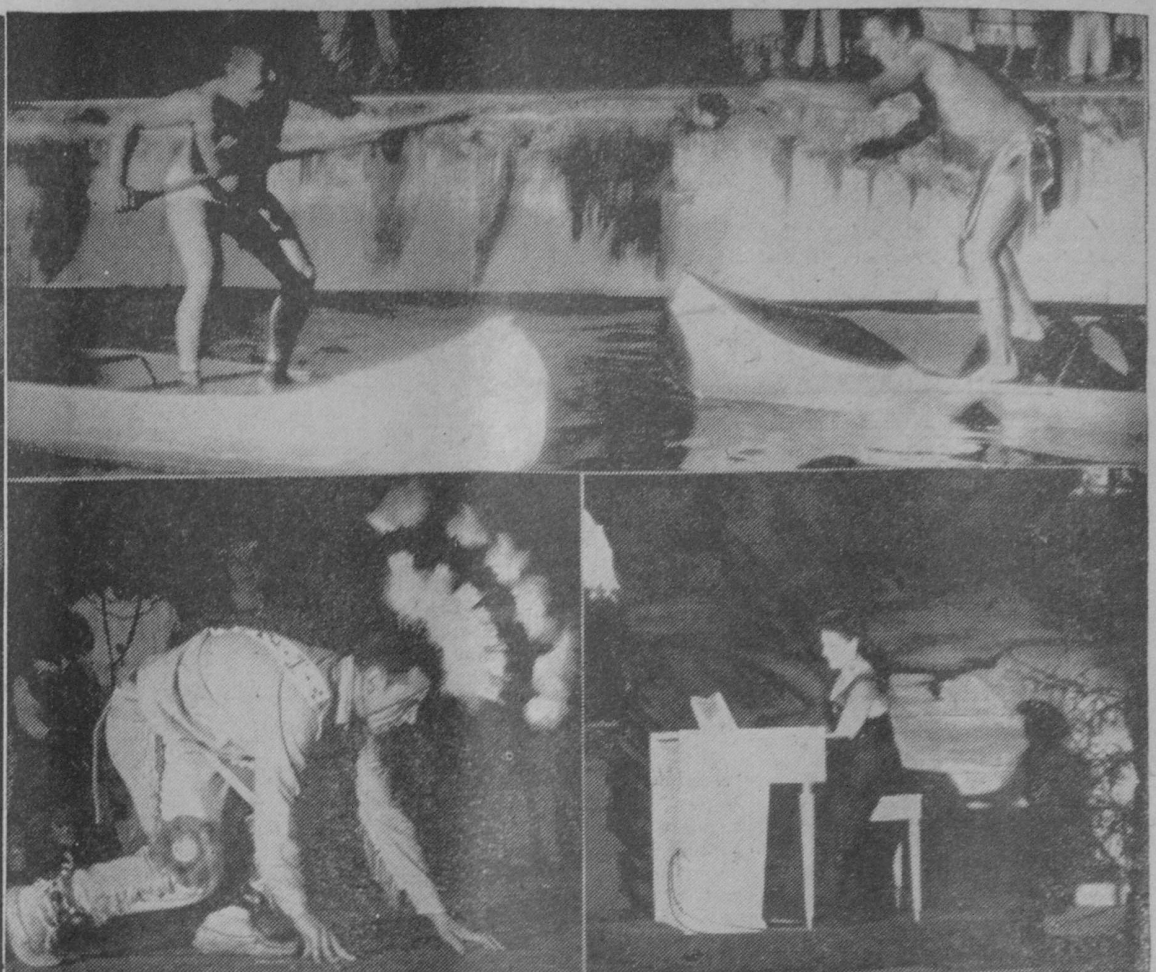




CHIEF WHITEBIRD, in full Indian regalia, is master of ceremonies for the nightly Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials Show.

## Praises Sung for New Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonial

First nighters who attended the opening program of the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials Monday were very much impressed with this newest of tourist attractions in the Tawas and Iosco County area. Programs are presented nightly at 8:30 o'clock from June 30 through September 1.

From the opening of the council fire ritual, led by two Indian warriors bearing flaming torches, to the grand finale, spectators had only high praise for this presentation's staging, casting, direction, costuming and lighting. A cast of more than 60 American Indians, including Chippewas, Ottawa, Sauk and Potawatomi from Michigan, and Pueblo's from New Mexico, comprise the cast in the hour and 45 minute program each night. Chapel Lake is located nine miles west of the Tawas on the Plank Road.

Sponsored by the Temple of Light, Mother Church of Michigan, under the direction of the Rev. O. James Crews, the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials presents the authentic and beautiful legends and ceremonies of the North American Indian, with dramatization of his conflict and final peace with the white men. Part one of the program included the council fire ritual, the procession of the grand council and lighting of the council fires. Chief of the council was Chief Blue Cloud (Ottawa), master of ceremonies was Chief Whitebird (Chippewa), and firemaker, Chief Red Cloud (Ottawa). Part two included the dramatic portrayal, "Ceremony to a Dying Chief," which is an authentic reproduction of the ritual of the Midewinini, famed Chippewa medicine men of long ago. Chief Whitebird told the audience that this was the first such public performance of this ritual which, until this time, had been a secret ceremony of the Chippewas. Part three, consisting of the finale, "The Picture Beautiful," depicted a bit of Indian village life following long years of war with the white men. The peaceful setting of the village scene was suddenly shattered when a white intruder was discovered spying on the frolicking Indians. The

white man was rescued from a fiery death at the stake by Chief Blue Cloud, only to be submitted to the trial by the fiery gantlet. Prologue to the program was a beautiful organ music recital by Mrs. Florence Crews, playing on the "Voice of the Forest," a new Lowery Lincolnwood organ. During intermission, Frank Davis, secretary-manager of the East Michigan Tourist Association, praised Mr. Crews and his cast for what he termed giving Michigan another great tourist attraction. The honored guest of the evening, Mr. Davis dedicated the show to Michigan's first citizens—the Indians.

## Horse Show, Band Concert Feature July 4 Observance

The Tawas will observe the signing of the Declaration of Independence on July 4 with a day-long program which will feature a horse show, boxing matches, baseball, a band concert and fireworks display. Starting the morning activities will be a horse show parade at 11:30 o'clock. The parade will start on Newman Street in East Tawas and the parade route will be down US-23 through Tawas City's business district. The afternoon program will start at 1:30 o'clock with the first annual horse show, sponsored by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, at the former fair grounds property at the corner of State and Bridge Streets.

This show is being presented by the Lachine Saddle Club. Trophies, ribbons and prize money will be awarded to winning entries. Next on the program will be a baseball game at the East Tawas athletic field starting at 2:30 o'clock. East Tawas' North-eastern Michigan League entry will take on Pinconning in the make-up of a game which was rained out earlier in the season. Starting at 3 o'clock there will be six three-round amateur boxing bouts to be staged at the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials Stadium, located nine miles west of Tawas on the Plank Road. Some of the fastest young fighters in Michigan are listed on the card. Refreshments will be served and there is free parking room for 1,000 cars. The evening's program will start with a band concert by the Tawas Area High School Band at 7 o'clock in the East Tawas State Park. Director for the concert will be Aaron Manwaring, Whittemore-Preseott Area Band director and principal. He will fill in for Director Edward Rima, who is instructing at Interlochen this summer. In case of inclement weather the concert will be held at the Tawas Area School Auditorium.

The nightly showing of the Indian Ceremonials at Chapel Lake will start at 8:30 o'clock. At 9 o'clock there will be a gigantic fireworks display, sponsored by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, at the Waterways Commission Dock. Saturday's entertainment in the Tawas will include sail boat racing on Tawas Bay and a dance at the East Tawas Community Building that night.

## ARTIST OF BRIDGE STAMP HAS RELATIVES HERE

The Mackinac Bridge Stamp issue last week was of more than passing interest to many old timers in East Tawas. The artist, Arnold Copeland of Connecticut, born in Bay City, is the son of the late Arnold Copeland, a former Tawas resident.

Anyone who went to school in East Tawas 65 to 70 years ago was a school mate of the artist's father and knew the grandfather, Robert Copeland. Mr. Copeland had two sisters living here, Mrs. Mary Sims and Mrs. Cynthia Scott. There are descendants of these women living here and would therefore be second cousins of Mr. Copeland. They are Roy Sims of Wilber Township and Percy Scott of East Tawas.

## Lake Property Owners Seek Water Level Action

As the result of action taken last Wednesday night at a meeting of Tawas Lake property owners, petitions are presently being circulated among owners of lake front property to take steps toward the establishment of a permanent water level of the lake. If 51 percent of the lake front owner signatures are obtained, a special committee will take steps through legal channels to start action.

Wednesday's session was called as a follow-up on a meeting held earlier this month at which it was recommended that a dam be constructed at the mouth of Tawas River in order to maintain the lake level. Tawas Lake presently is at its lowest level in many years. Named to the Tawas Lake Permanent Water Level Committee recently by the Iosco Sportsmen's Club were Edward F. Martin, Carl B. Babcock, Stan Rogers, William VanNorman, Elmer Vipond and Floyd A. Upton. Mr. Martin is chairman.

## New Physicians Open Offices in Keiser Building

Two young physicians, who recently completed their internship at St. Luke's Hospital in Saginaw, opened their new general practitioner offices in the Keiser Building, Tawas City, on Tuesday of this week.

They are Dr. James E. Jacques, 26, of Saginaw and Dr. Larry S. Kelly, 26, of Coopersville. Both are June 1957 graduates of the University of Michigan School of Medicine.

Both of the young physicians brought their families to Tawas to make their home here. Dr. Jacques is a nephew of E. D. Jacques of Tawas City.

Dr. Kelly said this week that their offices would be open daily except Saturday afternoon and Sunday. Their offices will be open two nights a week, Tuesday and Thursday.

"We anticipate a much greater cooperation than the 51 percent of property owner signatures which is required for this project," stated Mr. Babcock Monday. "We hope to see some results on the project by the spring of 1959."

More than 100 persons attended last week's meeting, held at the American Legion Hall in East Tawas, and no objections were heard to the committee's report. It is anticipated that cost of such a water level control dam would be \$15,000. Cost to each owner would be an approximate total of \$30 spread over a five-year period. The committee said that proper adjustments were being contemplated in regard to undeveloped land on the west side of the lake to encourage the participation of those property owners.

## Did A Lot of Thinking in Dark---

### Chimney Traps Burglar

A 21-year-old would be burglar, who was rescued late Monday evening after being trapped for nearly six hours about three-quarters of the way down a 15-foot chimney, told police Tuesday morning, "I did a lot of thinking in there. I might better have 20 years in jail than die in that place."

Herbert Thayer of Long Lake told Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers that about 3:00 Monday afternoon he lowered himself down the fireplace chimney of the Fred Glass cabin on River Lake near Hale.

When he got down as far as the damper he could go no further. Attempting to pull himself out, the clothesline broke. Thayer found himself stuck in a squatting position on top of the chimney damper with his arms helplessly extended over his head. His muffled cries for help were heard by two Battle Creek men, Lyle C. Wilbur and Frank Paul, who were fishing on nearby River Lake. The two men ran to the cabin but could not find the trapped man until he yelled, "I am inside the chimney." The surprised men asked what he was doing in there and Thayer answered, "I am just a darn thief! Run over and get Butch!" "Butch" is Deputy Sheriff

Clare Pierce, who owns a gun repair shop about two miles distant. "I thought those two fellows were pulling my leg," said Pierce at the county jail Tuesday morning, "when they told me they had caught a thief in a chimney. But I went along, anyway. Pierce took a coil of nylon rope along with him and after climb-



ing on top of the cabin lowered one end down the chimney. "He clambered up that chimney like a squirrel," said Pierce, describing how Thayer made his exit. Deputy Pierce said that he had known young Thayer "since he was that high," motioning with his hand above his knees. "He is a pulp wood cutter and has been out of work lately."

## Burglar Leaves Big Electric Bill After Living in Cabin

A summer resident of this area reported to the Iosco Sheriff's Department this week that his cabin at Jose Lake had been burglarized sometime during the past few months. Missing was a blanket and fishing equipment.

A. J. Dork of Saginaw told officers that something seemed to be out of order when he came up to his cabin on Memorial Day, but he did not think any more about it. He decided to call police after he received a bill from the electric company recently for \$32. Normally the electric bill for the cabin is \$12 a year.

Investigating officers said that apparently the burglar had lived in the cabin for quite some time. Beds, clothing, an electric stove and heater had been used recently. A rear window in the building was found to have been forced open.

## Suffered Heart Attack at Waterways Dock Monday

Deven Middleton, 63, of Summerville, Massachusetts, suffered a heart attack at the Waterways Commission Dock in East Tawas Monday and was rushed by ambulance to Tawas Hospital. He died shortly afterward.

State police said that Middleton, who had been fishing, was found face down on the dock. Relatives of the victim were aboard one of the fishing party boats when the heart attack occurred.

## Found Dead in Auto

Herbert C. Arps of Greenbush was found dead in his smashed car about one mile south of his home at 3:30 o'clock Wednesday morning. Robert Foster, Oscoda Township officer, said the car ran off US-23. A post mortem was performed on the body yesterday afternoon.

## Death of Indian Woman Investigated by Sheriff

Investigation was continued this week after an autopsy was performed on the body of a 29-year-old Indian woman whose body was reported to have been crushed by a driverless car late Sunday night at her home near Oscoda.

The victim was Rosa Nahgahwon of the Oscoda Indian Reservation, near the Iosco-Alcona County line. Monday's autopsy revealed that the woman had died of internal injuries which may have been caused by the car rolling over her body. She was reported by her husband, Lawrence Nahgahwon Jr., to have been run over by the family car shortly after 10 o'clock Sunday night. It was said that the car had rolled down a hill from where it was parked near the house.

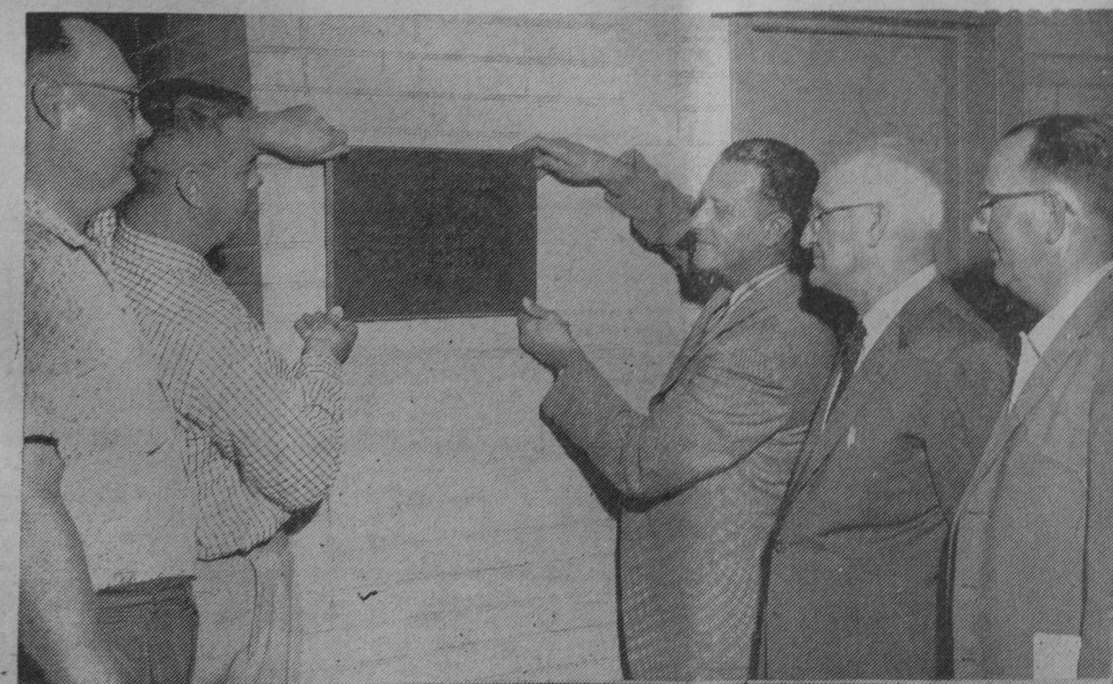
Nahgahwon told sheriff's officers that he had been sleeping in the front yard of his home when his wife came up to him and attempted to arouse him for supper. He said he heard her scream and looked up to see the car roll past. He ran down the hill and stopped the car and then returned to find his wife lying on the ground.

John Nahgahwon, an uncle of Lawrence, was next door and heard her scream. He aroused Lawrence Nahgahwon Sr. and both ran to the scene.

When the two men arrived the woman was still conscious. She was carried into the house. About 20 minutes passed and it was noticed that the victim's breath was getting shorter and she complained of being chilled. Lawrence Sr. went to a house on M-171 to call a doctor. Failing to get one in Oscoda he called the Gilbert Ambulance Service.

Oscoda Township Deputy Horace Dillon, Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and Undersheriff Leon Putnam, accompanied by Coroner E. D. Jacques of Tawas City, rushed to the scene and found that the victim had died.

The younger Nahgahwon told officers that he and his wife had been drinking earlier in the evening at Mikado. Upon returning home, his wife had parked the car on a hill above the residence without putting it in gear or setting the brakes. He said the car was parked about an hour before the accident. The victim is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Whitney Alberts (Chief Blue Cloud) of Oscoda.

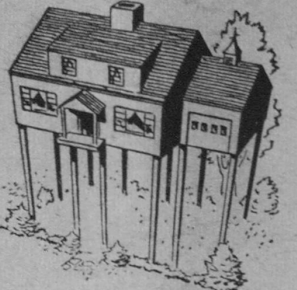

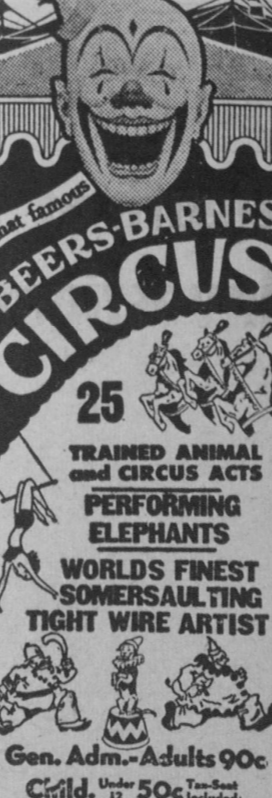

Applications for district 4-H Club camp reservations are coming in each day. Remember first come first served, so do not delay the mailing of your application if you wish to attend camp this summer.

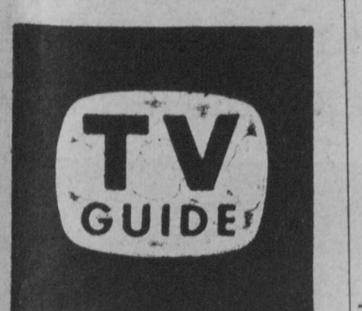
Remember, too, you must have completed one project (including report) and have a second project well underway to be eligible for camping.

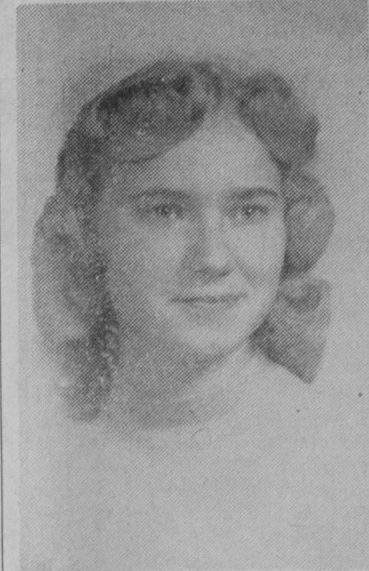

## SPECIAL TRAINING FOR WAR ORPHANS PROVIDED

An educational assistance program for children of servicemen who died as a result of injury or disease incurred during World War II or the Korean conflict was brought to the attention of local residents this week by Russell A. Rollin, county school superintendent.

## Supervisors' Proceedings

### JUNE SESSION

June 16, 1958

Pursuant to previous adjournment, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order in statutory June session at 10:00 a. m. by the chairman who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Belleville, Burgess, Everett, McKenzie, Little, Long, Monroe, Oates, Rodman, Smith, Stephan, Webb, Werth, White, O'Farrell. Absent: Brabant, Pollard, Jordan, Kochenderfer.

Chairman Long then turned the meeting over to Mr. E. H. Stickney, who briefly explained to the gathering the purpose of the coming dedication program. Mr. Stickney commended Mr. Harris Barkman for his efforts in reproducing the pictures of the circuit judges of Iosco County representing nearly 100 years of the judiciary here. Mr. Stickney explained that the funds used in this work and for the beautiful table placed in the foyer were moneys left over from the centennial program. Mr. Herbert Hertzler was then introduced and gave an interesting talk on the judicial system with numerous local sidelights.

Chairman Long accepted the excellent pictures and table on behalf of the county. The board then recessed to respective duties.

Upon call to order at 11:00 a. m., communications were read by the clerk and referred to the proper committees.

Mr. Werth moved that Mr. Little be commended for his efforts on the allocation board in seeing that millages were kept uniform in school districts involving this county which are across county lines. The motion was supported by Stephan and carried unanimously.

After some discussion about securing a glass top and ash trays for the foyer table, the board recessed upon motion supported and prevailing until 1:30 p. m.

**AFTERNOON SESSION**

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session.

Mr. Harris Barkman addressed the board stating that the centennial fund had been used up in reproducing the circuit judges pictures and the purchase of the table. He stated that the Iosco County flag had been reproduced and paid for in the amount of \$185.00. He asked that the board be the committee out in the reproduction costs of the American flag and standards which were also destroyed by fire.

Mr. Barkman informed the board that he had come across a picture of the founder of Iosco County. He asked permission to have the picture reproduced and hung in the courthouse as a memorial to his brother, Nathan. There would be no expense to the county. It was moved by Werth supported by Stephan that Mr. Barkman be given permission to proceed.

Major Buko of Wurtsmith Air Force Base addressed the board stating that he needed a letter from this board stating that the county was in favor of the new housing project adjacent to the air base on land that Mr. Anderson, under commission by the board, is seeking to acquire for that purpose. Mr. Frank Szymanski Auditor General Department of Auditor General Lansing 2, Michigan Dear Mr. Szymanski:

Per your letter of May 22, 1958, regarding your department's examination of records and audit of Iosco County for the year January 1, 1956, to December 31, 1956, our finance committee has examined this audit and has asked the various departments to make corrections immediately as suggested by your department. To our knowledge this has been complied with and others have been corrected by new legislation.

We wish to make note of your comments in the general comment section, page 10, of your report referring to financial condition. The statement made that the financial condition would not reflect the overdrafts of the liabilities of the county due to outstanding bills. We feel that the cash shown on this date of \$4,649.29 is correct. That we had taken 30 days dating for some bills is not the concern of your auditors in auditing our county and actually this would not exist to this point and it is our feeling that this is loose comment made by your auditors and is not justified.

We know no reason for carrying a slush fund over from year to year but are collecting the amount of tax required to operate our county and we are com-

plying with all comments and have asked various departments to correct these errors.

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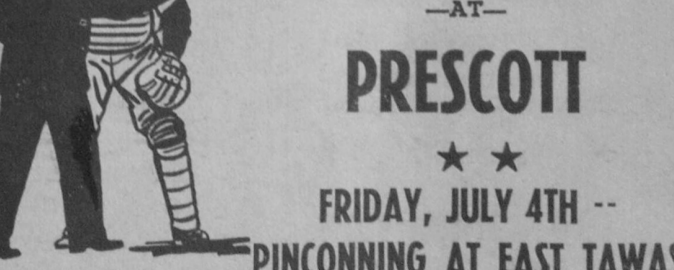

## LETTERS to the EDITOR

In reply to the letter to the editor dated June 20, 1958. Pertaining to letters of June 18 and petition of June 9 was endorsed by a total of 22 residents of Wilber Township or the immediate vicinity. Where the chairman of the township board, Lewis Rodman, contends that there would be a hardship created on certain individuals. I fail to understand how the closing of this trail can work a hardship when they endorsed the petition to close the trail.

The situations are identical except Supervisor Rodman lives on part of the road recently closed and I, C. Krueger, live on the trail which petition was denied. I am the only resident living on this trail. In regard to the value of the road that was re-

cently closed, looking at it from a selfish standpoint, so to speak, it is the contention of many residents and especially sportsmen that said above road was one of the most picturesque pieces of terrain in Iosco County.

During the hearing on petition June 9 at Iosco County Road Commission special meeting, hearing the quoted objections of Consumers Power Company and United States Forestry Department having a detrimental effect, it was proved not true. Because at no time during the hearing would the closing of this trail effect either of the above departmental operations.

Checking the records in the Iosco County Abstract Office June 12, 1958, it was disclosed that this property within this area was chartered under United States patent rights dated April 7, 1896. Showing no trails or roads of any kind. Therefore this trail being an established township road since 1888 according to records which are now on file according to Sup. Lewis Rodman's statement, must be ignored because it is not on record in the abstract office as of the above date. Because this road is not a recorded township road, therefore this trail does not come under commission maintenance program and the above reasons support the fact that the road always remained a one-way trail to my home having to maintain this road with my own funds.

The direct impact opposing the closing of this trail did not develop until after postponement of special meeting May 28 and again we state that it was a very unfortunate situation that Mr. Rodman, supervisor and chairman of the Wilber Township Board, and a member of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors who appoints road commission members and original owner of property involved in said petition, where Mr. Rodman presented Wilber Township Board resolution, it was a nucleus for the road commission's decision.

When only two (2) individuals, namely Mr. Jameson and Mr. Rodman, appeared to object to petition at hearing. When seven (7) original signers plus an additional five (5) signing letter to editor in June 19 issue. I am wondering if township board represents the majority or minority? I feel justified in saying that if this petition had been presented before Road Commission members elected, instead of appointed by the supervisors when a supervisor was involved as an objector, its disposition would have been unbiased and favorable to the petitioners residing in the area.
