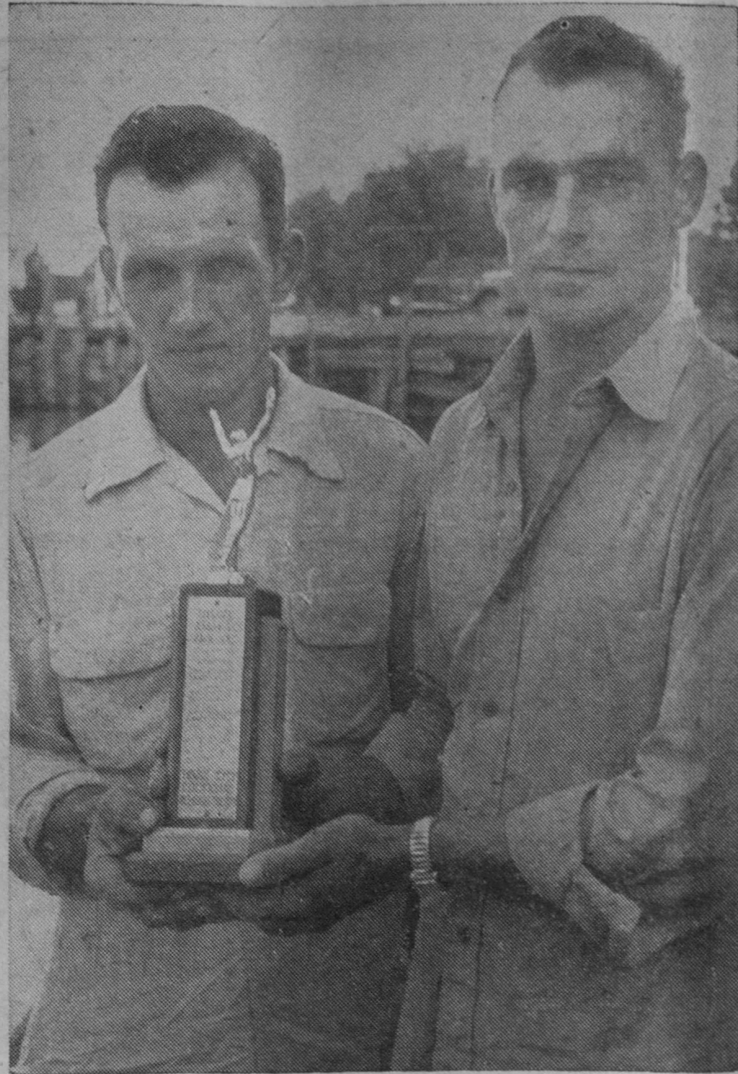

June 30 Opening Set for New Indian Ceremonials

The Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials, a stage presentation of authentic Indian dramas, music, dances and sporting events, will begin nightly performances on Monday, June 30, at Chapel Lake near the Tawas.

The setting for the colorful ceremonials is in the Huron National Forest, nine miles west of the Tawas, where a new 2,000-seat outdoor amphitheater overlooks a natural island stage in Chapel Lake. The ceremonials will start each evening just before sunset. The Rev. O. James Crews of Detroit is managing director. More than 100 North American Indians from various parts of the United States including the Michigan Ottawa and Chippewa Tribes and Pueblos from the Southwest will participate.

Among the dramatizations to be presented are the story of the Pleiades which is the Dance of the Seven Children, the Ritual of the Dying Chieftain, the Peace Pipe Dance to the four corners of the world and the running of the fiery gantlet by the Great White Scout.

Canoeing, jousting and log rolling are among the Indian sporting events to be presented.

Preceding each nightly performance will be the "Voice of

the Forest," featuring the organ music of Florence Crews of Detroit playing an overture that will include the wondrous and strange music of the Indian tribes.

A large area has been cleared to provide parking facilities at the ceremonials site. Performances will be staged every evening during the summer.

SIX-BOUT CARD SET FOR CHAPEL LAKE STADIUM

"Some of the fastest, toughest boys in Michigan," is the way Frank Misko, Tawas City promoter, described his card for the July 4 fights to be held at the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials Stadium.

Located nine miles west of the Tawas on Plank Road, the stadium will be the scene of six three-round amateur bouts Friday, July 4, starting at 3:00 p. m. Refreshments will be served and there is free parking room for 1,000 cars.

"Follow the Indian Ceremonials road signs," says Mr. Misko, "to see some good amateur bouts." Working with the promotional end of the fights is Edward Cowan of Tawas City.

FREE POLIO VACCINE NOW AVAILABLE FOR CHILDREN

Polio vaccine purchased by the Iosco County Board of Supervisors is now available to children between the ages of three months to 19 years. The vaccine will be administered free of charge at the county nurse's office in the Iosco County Building on Tuesday of each week from 9:00 to 12:00 a. m. and 1:00 to 5:00 p. m.

It is the hope of the health department that all children in Iosco County who have not received complete polio immunization will take advantage of this program and start their inoculation immediately.

Find Dynamite in Fire-Gutted Tool Shed

After extinguishing a fire in a tool shed at the Burrell Subdivision Sunday, Tawas City firemen found a bundle of about 10 sticks of unexploded dynamite in the ruins. Fuses were not attached to the explosives. Cause of the fire, which destroyed the building, was undetermined.

Kolonich-Kindell Take Tawas Race

The canoe team of Larry Kindell of National City and Steve Kolonich of Tawas led a field of 33 entries Sunday to win the fifth annual Tawas River Canoe Championship.

With record crowds of spectators lining the course from the starting point at Cliff's landing on Tawas Lake to the finish line at the river mouth, Kolonich and Kindell took command of the race soon after entering the river.

At that point the Tawas Chamber of Commerce sponsored team was matching stroke for stroke with Al and Leroy Widing of Holly. When Kolonich and Kindell reached the East Tawas bridge they had gained between 1½ and two minutes on the Widings.

The winners' corrected time over the course was 41 minutes and 55 seconds. Coming in second were the Widings brothers in a time of 45 minutes, 48 seconds. Taking third place were Donald Fisher and Harold Alcock of Lambertville, followed by Ralph Sawyer and Tom Gildersleeve of Osoda, Michigan Canoe racing champions, in a time of 46 minutes, 56 seconds.

Fifth team to cross the finish line was that of Robert Jones and Kenneth Wheeler of Eagle. Sixth place went to Carl Joy of Ossineke and Gary Kolonich of Tawas. Seventh place was taken by Alton Rodgers and Frank Smith of Flint; eighth to Tom Halero and Dick Crooks of Osoda; ninth place to Bert Cobb and Arthur Hatcher of Toledo; Dick Griese and John O'Brien of Detroit came in 10th.

Record time for the race, 38 minutes and 45 seconds, was set by Kolonich and Kindell in 1954. The water level in Tawas River is at its lowest point in years and this slowed the teams considerably. "About the worst point in the river was just upstream from the M-55 bridge," said Kolonich after the race. At the bend of the river the winning team powered its way over a long sand bar and found clear paddling over the remainder of the course.

For their efforts Kolonich and Kindell were awarded first place money of \$60, plus merchandise prizes. Kolonich, who won the race last year paddling with his son, Gary, won permanent possession of the trophy. Kindell had been in military service for the past two years. Second and third place teams won \$25 and \$15, respectively.

Winners of the first 17 places were awarded merchandise prizes by the race sponsors, the Tawas Chamber of Commerce and the Tawas City Businessmen's Association. Prizes also went to Gary Kolonich as the youngest participant; Bert Cobb and Arthur Hatcher of Toledo for traveling the greatest distance; John Wajohn of East Tawas and Lionel Blotchford as the oldest participants.

Several of the canoes used in the race, including that of the first place team, were manufactured by the Ausable Guide Company of Kinross. Owners of this firm are Ralph Sawyer and Tom Gildersleeve of Osoda.

Mrs. Mary M. Byrd, county office manager of the Iosco County ASC, attended a tri-district ASC meeting at St. Ignace on June 18-19. All counties in the Upper Peninsula and those north of the Bay-Oceana County line in the Lower Peninsula were represented.

New Tawas City Water Rates Take Effect July 1

Starting July 1, the water rates as established in the Tawas City Bond Ordinance No. 142 will be in effect. These rates are as follows:

(a) Readiness to serve charge based on meter size: Five-eighths or three-quarter-inch meter, \$4.00 per quarter; one inch meter, \$10 per quarter; 1½ inch meter, \$24 per quarter; two inch meter, \$48 per quarter; three inch meter, \$100 per quarter; four inch meter, \$250 per quarter; six inch meter, \$625 per quarter.

(b) Consumption rates (based on water used): First 10,000 gallons per quarter at 40 cents per 1,000 gallons; next 10,000 gallons per quarter at 35 cents per 1,000 gallons; next 80,000 gallons per quarter at 30 cents per 1,000 gallons; all over 100,000 gallons per quarter at 25 cents per 1,000 gallons.

The minimum quarterly rate shall be \$8 per quarter.

The Tawas City Water Board again wishes to remind water users that whenever the fire siren blows, all sprinkling must cease immediately, even though water restrictions have not been put into effect this year, as yet.

REORGANIZE OFFICERS AT TAWAS INDUSTRIES, INC.

Reorganization of officers of Tawas Industries, Incorporated, was announced last week.

Joseph Warren of Flint continues as president; Elmer R. Werth of East Tawas, who has been vice president and general manager, continues in that capacity and takes on the added duties of treasurer.

Paul Harvey of Bay City and East Tawas has been named secretary. He replaces the late Nathan Barkman, one of the founders of the firm, who had served as secretary-treasurer.

Two Iosco Banks Will be Closed July 4-5

The Peoples State Bank and the Osoda State Savings Bank will be closed Friday, July 4, and Saturday, July 5, for the holidays, according to an announcement made this week. The two banks will be open from 7 until 9 o'clock Thursday evening, July 3, for the convenience of customers. Night depositary service is available.

Stolls Head for Canadian Northwest News-Photo Trip

The Stolls will head for Alberta and British Columbia to gather outdoor features and shoot color movies for Northern Trails Features service, operated by Bert Stoll at East Tawas. Bert writes for the Detroit Free Press and Midland Daily News. Peter is physical education instructor at Barnum Junior High School in Birmingham.

They leave Detroit Saturday, June 28, for Toronto. From there, they will travel across Canada on the Canadian Pacific's "Canadian" scenic dome train through the Canadian Rockies to Vancouver, British Columbia.

After covering some of British Columbia's centennial events in the Vancouver area, they will head for northern British Columbia to the Pacific Great Eastern Railway to Prince George. Prince George and Smithers will be bases for side trips into northern wilderness areas. They will return home early in August.

Auxiliary Flotillas Held Rendezvous at Port Austin

Flotillas from Algonac, Port Huron, Alpena and Tawas, which comprise the 14th division of the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary, held a rendezvous at Port Austin June 21-22. Three boats from Alpena and five from Tawas crossed Saginaw Bay in a group Saturday morning. Convention headquarters was at the Edgewater Hotel in Port Austin. A banquet attended by 60 persons was held Saturday night.

A memorial tribute to the late Captain Wayne F. Harden was conducted by Acting Captain Richards of Alpena. After the banquet, a social evening was held at the hotel.

Sunday morning a business session was held at which various items were discussed. The main topic was safety on the water. Points stressed were: Do not overload your boat; put on life jackets, especially in a small boat; it may save your life; do not use an outboard motor which is too large for your boat.

David Barkman's Essay Wins IOOF UN Pilgrimage Trip

"The United Nations is the greatest effort toward peace that the world has ever known. It is our hope for the future, a step towards the Utopia that men have always dreamed about, but it is more than just a shrine dedicated to the high aspirations of mankind, it is a practical piece of machinery working to make those operations a reality."

This was the lead paragraph in the winning essay by David Barkman, 17, of East Tawas, who was chosen as this area's delegate to the annual United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth sponsored by the Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

David's essay was adjudged best among the 24 entries submitted by students of Tawas Area High School. Subject of the

essays was "What the United Nations Means to Me and My Community."

David joined other Michigan delegates at Detroit Monday. They will join delegates from other sections of the nation for a 10-day visit at the United Nations headquarters and points of interest in New York City. After his return to Tawas, he will report his experiences in New York to various local organizations.

Sponsored here by Baldwin Lodge, IOOF, both a boy and a girl had been sent in previous years. Due to the lack of contributions, only enough funds were available to send one representative this year. Vernon Hughes was committee chairman. Eligible in the competition

were boys and girls 16 or 17 years of age and sophomores or juniors at Tawas Area High School.

In fairness to all entrants, each essay was assigned a number without any means of identifying the writer. Essays were judged using a point system last Saturday and the number of points received by each was totaled to determine the winner.

After making final tabulations, it was found by the judges, working independently of each other, that David's essay had been selected as the first place winner.

David is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Barkman of East Tawas. He will be a senior this fall at Tawas Area. His sister, Judith, now attending the University of Michigan, was a delegate to the pilgrimage in 1955.

Shears Sheep in Spare Time

Jet Pilot is Farm Boy at Heart

"Oh, this is just something for me to do in my spare time. I thought I'd like to get out and become acquainted with some of the people in Iosco County, and this is my way of doing it."

Speaking was 1st Lt. William

Ramsey, 27, a F-102 jet fighter pilot assigned to the 18th FIS at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

Now, if the reader can find anything in flying a supersonic jet plane akin to shearing sheep, a nearly forgotten "art" in Iosco

County, he is a step ahead of this reporter. But, that was just what Ramsey was doing Sunday at the Harry Krueger farm in Wilber Township.

Wilber Township residents and Mr. Krueger will tell you that the young man knows his way around a pair of clippers. The fact is, a national record established by him seven years ago for shearing sheep still holds true.

In 1951, Ramsey won the national sheep shearing contest at the International Livestock Show in Chicago. It was at this show that Ramsey established a record for shearing a sheep—one minute, 28 seconds—which has never been broken.

A native of Charlottesville, Virginia, the lanky airman said he was a "little rusty with the clippers" after spending four years in the air force. It would be hard to convince Mr. Krueger of that fact, however. Ramsey sheared 38 sheep before dinner Sunday and demonstrated much knowledge in the handling of the animals.

The Virginian, whose father is a beef cattle raiser in what is perhaps the nation's best farming country, said that he was interested in studying all phases of agriculture in Iosco County during his spare time. He is a former 4-H Club member.

He has met with County Agent Marvin Davenport on numerous occasions to talk about sheep raising and with farmers who have visited the cooperative extension office.

After meeting with Davenport recently, the county agent lined up several other flocks of sheep for Ramsey to shear in Iosco County. Farms which he has already visited include those of Orville Strauter in Sherman Township and Lester Robinson in Reno Township.

"When Ramsey called and said he was interested in shearing a few sheep it was just like a bolt out of the blue," said Davenport. "Numerous farmers have been calling the office of late to try and find someone to shear their sheep. We didn't have any answer until he showed up."

Airmen at Wurtsmith will be treated with a novel program this Saturday night at the officers' club. Lieutenant Ramsey plans to stage a sheep shearing demonstration there. He might even turn up a few more sheep-shearers.

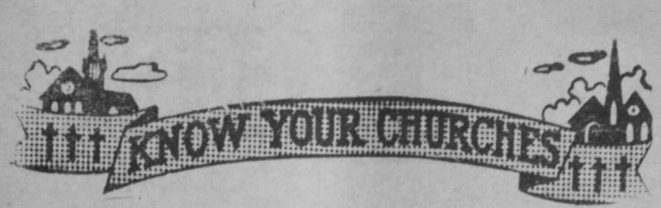
The church is finishing its final week of Vacation Bible School and there has been an excellent attendance. The children will be presenting their program Sunday evening at 8 o'clock.

Dear Editor:

This is in reply to letters which appeared in The Tawas Herald and Iosco County News during the week of June 12, 1958, which was

signed by certain residents of Wilber Township. The Wilber Township Board would like to explain to all residents of the township and other interested persons, the reasoning used and the facts concerning the refusal of the board to allow the closing of a certain township road.

First, we have been accused of showing partiality in the closing of one road and leaving another open. We wish it to be known

that these are definitely two entirely different situations and have no bearings on one another. The reason for closing the one road was because it was of no value to any individuals or residents of the township. The other road, which is to be left open, is a road of necessity for the activities of many other parties.

The closing of the road, which is described as: Running from the Northwest corner of the Northwest quarter of the Section 19, Township 23 North, Range 8 East, in said Wilber Township, Iosco County, Michigan, Southerly, would be detrimental and provide a hardship to certain individuals as well as the Consumers Power Company and the forestry service.

We maintain, also, that the expense incurred in the building of a road and the construction of a bridge across Silver Creek would cost at least \$6,250 (a minimum figure derived by the road commission engineer). Added to this figure would be the high maintenance cost for a road which would be of no value to the taxpayers of the township. The taxpayers should be aware of the dollars saved to them by closing the stretch which crossed Silver Creek at the afore-mentioned point.

It seems ridiculous in our eyes that selfish interests of one party should be allowed to curtail activities of so many others. If one person can so obstruct a highway, there would be no end to the number of persons who would likewise wish to close any other road that interferes with their property and have a perfect right in doing so.

The road under discussion has been called a "trail through the woods." This "trail" has been an established township road since June of 1888, according to records which are now on file and has been financed and maintained as such since that time.

We contend that there is no justification for closing this road and as was resolved at our recent meeting, we expect that this road will be left accessible to the public in the future as it has been in the many years past.

In addition, we wish it to be known that the township board represents the accusations as to the postponement of the road commission hearing of May 28, 1958, to give the township board time to act on the closing of the township road.

The board feels that it was in no way responsible for the hospitalization of one of the road commissioners, which was the reason for the postponement of the meeting until June 9, 1958.

We do not feel that the election or appointment of road commission officials has any connection to this matter. We are proud of the relationship which we have maintained with the road commission and feel that only in this cooperative manner can we maintain roads to the best interest of all residents of the township.

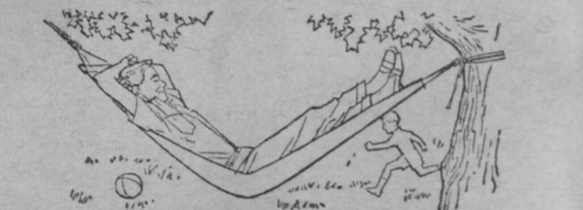

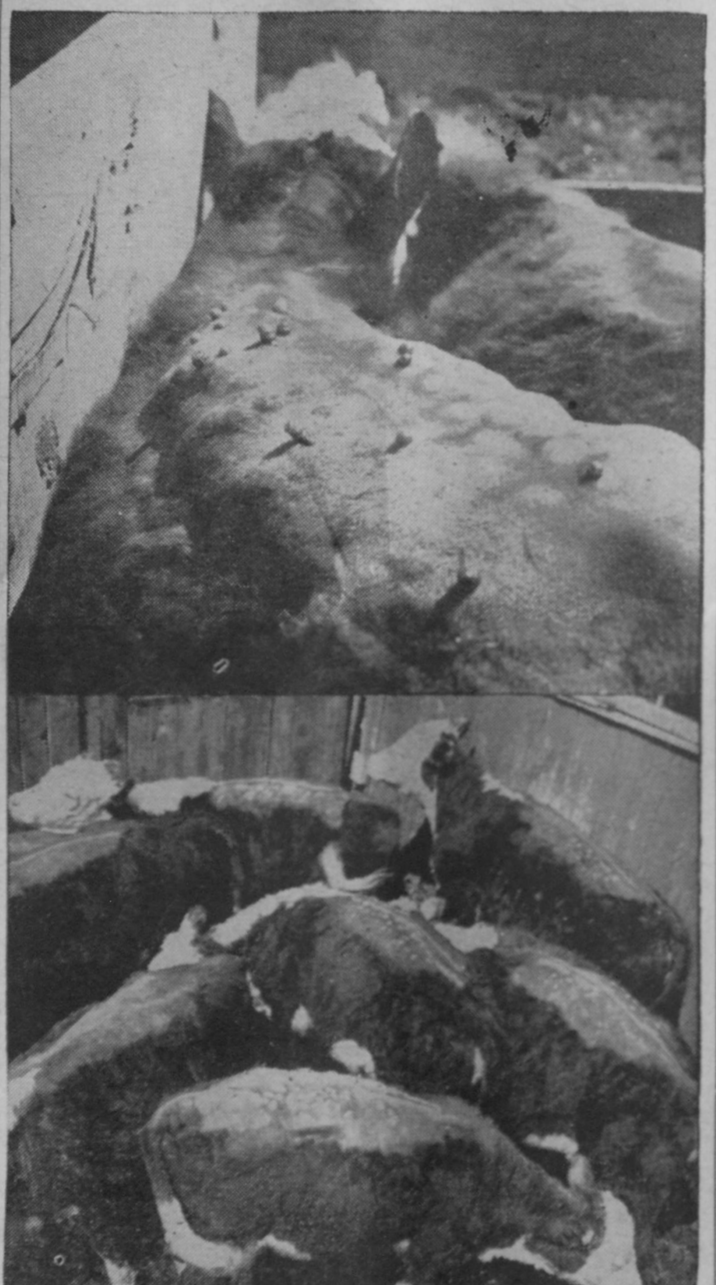

Iosco Farmers Cooperate in Grub Control Project

Iosco Cooperative Extension Service and Dow Chemical Company cooperated recently in a demonstration in grub control in cattle. Millions of dollars are lost to cattle farmers and meat processors every year because of the cattle grub.

The eggs laid by the adult heel fly on cattle hair hatch into tiny worms that burrow through the skin into the living tissue, follow through the digestive tract and thus into the back of the animal, cutting a hole through the hide by which to breathe. It matures into the grubs pictured here, drops to the ground and another heel fly is ready to lay eggs again.

The chemical named "Trolene" is given preferably in the fall. This chemical kills the worm in the blood system.

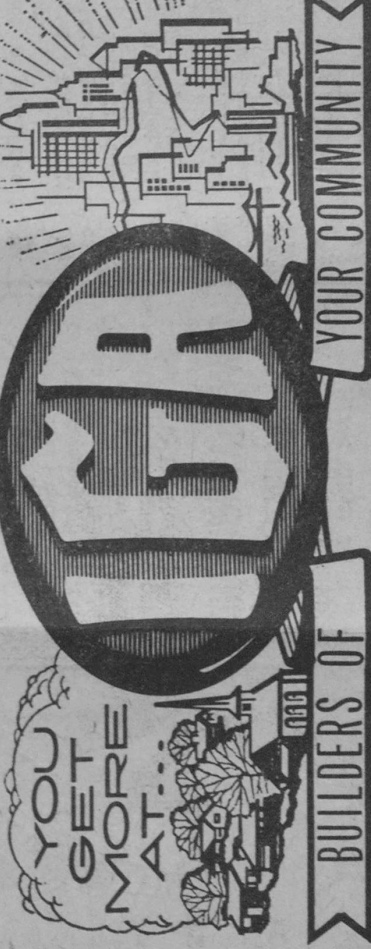
