mean about a \$1,200 to \$1,300 decrease from that which was requested. Last year the district received 7.5 mills.

Whittemore-Prescott Area Schools, which had asked for and received eight mills from the losco County allocation board, was cut back to 7.5. This district overlaps county lines in Iosco, Arenac and Ogemaw. This will mean a reduction of approximately \$2,200 to \$2,300 in school operating funds for the district from that which was requested.

Russell Rollin, Iosco County school superintendent, said Wednesday afternoon that one farm in the Whittemore-Prescott district overlapped about 35 acres into Turner Township, Arenac County. The township was granted one mill for its operation and the township reached the maximum amount of taxes which could be spread because of the 15-mill limitation.

Oscoda Area Schools received the full eight mills, Reno No. 1 received nine mills and Hale Area received 7.6 mills.
