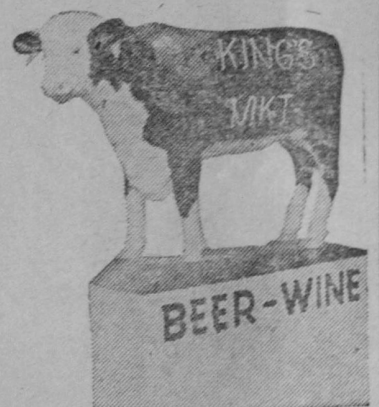

Betty Kubiak will present her pupils Friday, June 6, at 8 o'clock at the Tawas Area High School in a dance revue called "Dancing Around." It deals with the four directions, north, south, east and west, with subtitles, "Santa's Doll Shop," "Under Northern Skys," "The Southern Plantation," "Bar T Ranch" and "Broadway."

The curtain opens on the doll shop number, a group of 40 "dolls," from little four-year-old hulas (10 of them) to Dutch, Spanish, French, military dolls, etc. They all join in with "Oh, You Beautiful Doll" for a colorful beginning, and then go into their various dance routines.

"Under Northern Skys" offers the "Northern Lights Ballet," "Jack Frost," "The Skater's Waltz" and other northern numbers. "The Southern Plantation" has the southern belles singing "Sleepy Time Down South" and doing a novelty parasol ballet, the little four-year-olds doing

a balloon ballet to "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles" and even "Topsy," also other tap and ballet dances ending with "It's An Old Southern Custom" by the soft shoe chorus. "Broadway" opens with the chorus girls singing "There's No Business Like Show Business" and doing a chorus girl tap. The theme carries down through a Broadway strut, a cane tap, "Lolly Pop," "Dearie," ending with the Broadway toe to "Dark Town Strutters Ball" by nine ballerinas. The entire cast of 75 dancers, which range in age from 2 1/2 to 16 years of age get together for the colorful grand finale, "Good Night Neighbors."
