The school faculty and student body are embarrassed because of the poor sportsmanship shown on the part of adult fans from this area.

This embarrassment to school officials and youngsters was caused by actions of local ADULT fans at the recent Tawas-Standish basketball game. This newspaper does not deem it necessary to spell out just what happened at the game . . . the fans who were responsible should realize, by now, that they showed poor judgment and displayed poor

We ask this question . . . Is this the sort of an example that adults should set for school-age youngsters? We don't think it is. If adult fans would look at signs posted in the auditorium, they would note that the school asks its student body to display good sportsmanship at all times. This applies to adults, too.

No matter what local fans think about some other school's sportsmanship, or, in their opinion the lack of it, they were entirely wrong and showed poor taste in their treatment of the Standish players and school. Actions of these adult fans reflect right back on our own school system . . . two wrongs just do not make a right.

There is a vast difference between high school athletics and professional competition. Fans attending high school athletic contests should not get personal with players or coaches on the floor. This holds true for the referees or umpires, too.

Tawas Area High School needs and deserves the support of its local fans. The entire area can be proud of the sportsmanship displayed by the Braves and the school's student body. Let's return the favor, adult fans.






