"You Auto Buy Now," a slogan which is sweeping the country as a means of stimulating business, will be the slogan for auto dealers and East Tawas merchants during a spectacular sales campaign which starts Thursday (today) and runs through Saturday.

Starting today, Newman Street in East Tawas is the site for a display of more than 80 new and used cars, representing 12 different makes of automobiles. Two used cars are to be given away free in drawings.

Displayed are Buick, Ford, Plymouth, Nash Rambler, Mercury, Lincoln, Edsel, Cadillac, Dodge, Chevrolet and Pontiac cars, all shown by local dealers.

During the three big sales days, East Tawas merchants will be open from 9:00 a. m. to 9:00 p. m. daily. Spokesmen for the campaign stated this week that interest in the "Buy Now" campaign has gathered considerable support from participating merchants and it is expected to be the largest single promotion effort in the area's history.

"Buy the things you need now—Buy days mean pay days" is the slogan for this big sales campaign.

In addition to displays of automobiles, Gingerich Feed and Implements of Tawas City will display farm equipment at the corner of Newman and Westover Streets.

Vollmer Low Bidder on New Whittemore School

At a special meeting of the Whittemore-Prescott Area Schools Board of Education held in the Whittemore Elementary School on Wednesday, May 7, bids for the construction of the new high school were opened and contracts awarded to the lowest bidder to the extent of \$469,663, thus covering the construction, heating and lighting of the proposed building.

Arthur Vollmer Construction Company of Saginaw was the successful bidder on the general contract; Branz-Diehl-Lohman, Incorporated, of Lansing for the plumbing, heating and ventilating and the Henderson Electric Company of Cheboygan was given the contract for lighting.

The new school is to be 43,750 square feet with a per foot cost of \$10.74 and will be located on a 40-acre tract at the Isco-Ogemaw County line which was purchased from Senator Charles T. Prescott.

The school will include 17 teaching stations as well as music room and auditorium, cafeteria, library, gymnasium and two shop areas.

Paul Hazelton of Traverse City is the architect. Construction will begin at once and the building will be completed by July 1, 1959.

Arrest of Suspicious Fishermen Solves 10-Month-Old Case

Investigation of a suspicious looking car in the Tawas area last Sunday morning by two troopers from the Michigan State Police post at East Tawas led to the solving of an outboard motor theft at Brighton. The theft had been on police records since July 26 of last year.

While on night patrol early Sunday morning, Troopers Walter Wiedbrauk and William Ferguson stopped a car which had a defective head light near the traffic light in East Tawas. Officers said that two of the car's occupants acted suspicious.

During a routine investigation of the car, the troopers noted a 10-horsepower outboard motor in the trunk. When two of the men gave conflicting statements as to where it had been purchased they were held for further questioning.

Eugene K. Anthony Jr. of Ecorse and Bernard H. Abbott of Trenton were questioned further at the police post and admitted that this was one of two motors which they had stolen from a boat near Brighton in July of last year.

The two men were held overnight at the Isco County Jail and were turned over to officers from the Brighton State Police post. The other two men who were with them at the time they were apprehended were not held.

The four men had spent the week-end at Hubbard Lake on a fishing trip.

Mr. Armstrong received a certificate from the MFDA honoring him for his long years of service.

Attending the convention from Isco County were Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Jacques of Tawas City.

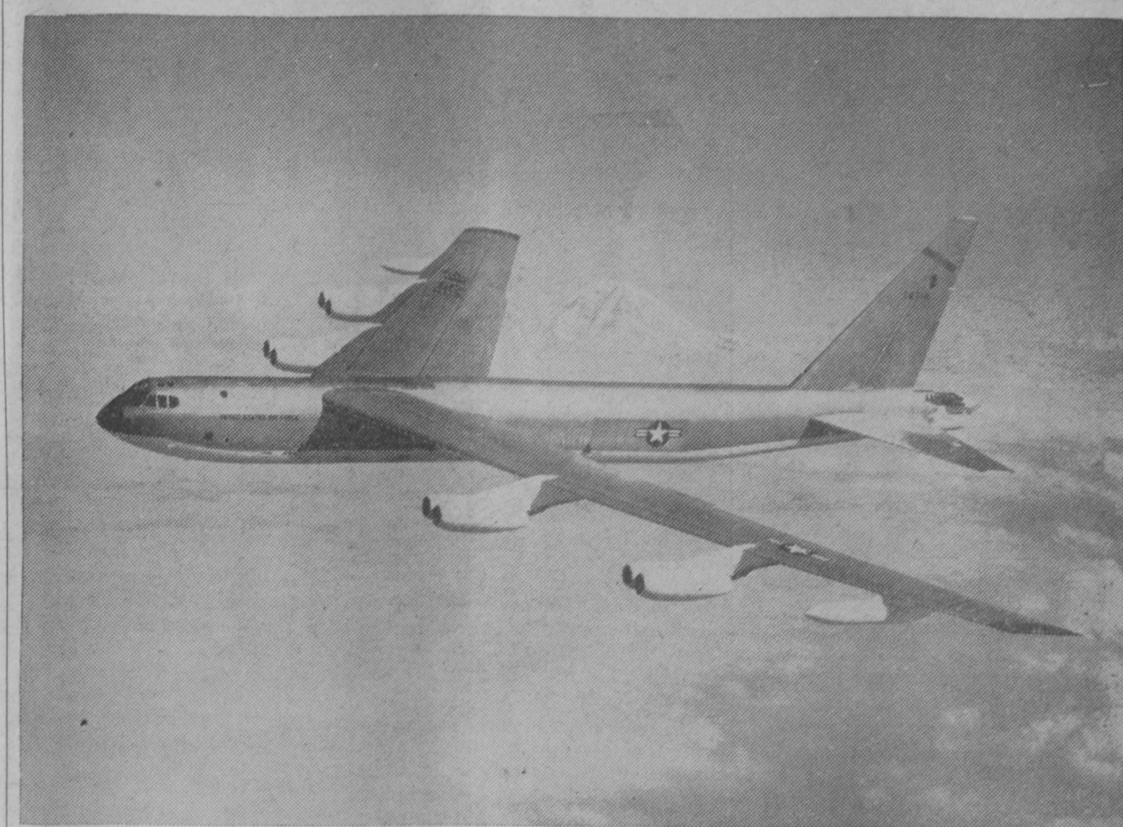
Funeral Services for Edward J. Graham Were Held Tuesday

Wurtsmith to Open Gates to Public for Armed Forces Day

AT APPROXIMATELY 2:50 O'CLOCK SATURDAY afternoon, a flight of B-52 bombers will make a special fly-by over Wurtsmith Air Force Base. The B-52 Stratofortress is the "big stick" of the Strategic Air Command, a unit of which will soon be assigned to the Isco installation. The big bomber has a top speed of more than 650 miles per hour and a normal unrefueled range of more than 6,000 miles. All models of the big bomber are equipped for aerial refueling.—Air Force Photo.

Between 9:30 and 10:45 a. m. 12 F-89s from the 445th FIS will make several formation passes over the base at low altitudes. From 11:00 to 12:00 noon 12 of the needle-nosed F-102s will thrill the visitors with their formation flyovers.

During the afternoon these same F-102s will fly over Lansing, Grand Rapids, Detroit, Selfridge AFB, Flint, Okemos, Battle Creek and Jackson.

The Strategic Air Command also will make a contribution to the Wurtsmith air program by providing a B-52 bomber buzz over the field at approximately 2:50 p. m.

The static displays, with the exception of aircraft, will be set up in one of the huge maintenance hangars. These displays will feature numerous types of equipment used by air force personnel to keep America's first line of defense on guard 24-hours-a-day.

During the day a number of planes will be on standing display. They will include a T-33 jet trainer, an F-86L jet fighter, a Sikorsky H-19 helicopter, an F-89, a C-47 and C-119 cargo planes, an RB-47

reconnaissance plane and the TF Canton, Oklahoma), of the 18th FIS.

Wurtsmith's sentry dogs will put on a short demonstration and a simulated H-19 helicopter rescue mission will be carried out.

As an added attraction the base fire department will show the Armed Forces Day visitors how injured aircrews are removed from burning aircraft.

Base Commander Col. Thomas N. Wilson extends a personal invitation to all Michigan residents to visit the base. This Armed Forces Day planning committee is making every effort to afford them with their best opportunity to learn about the air force and Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

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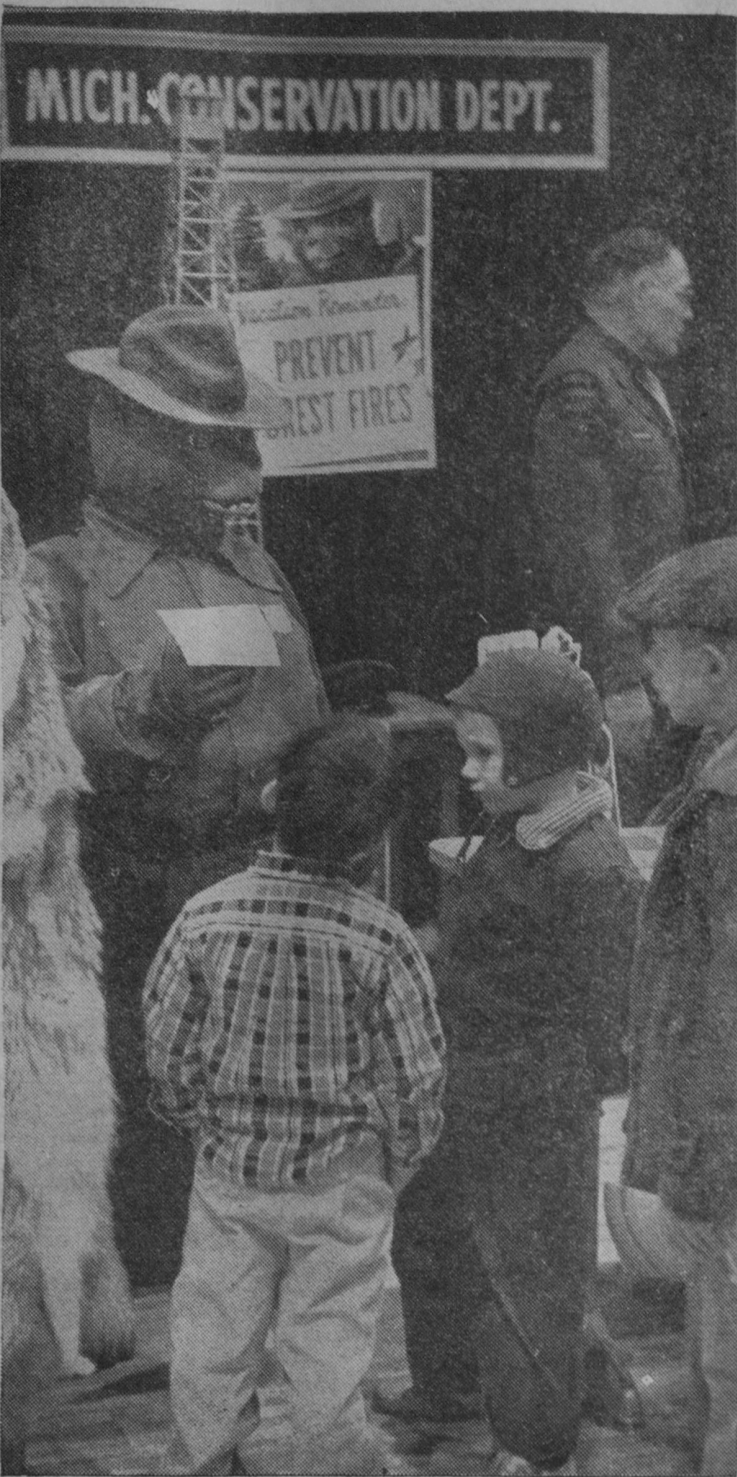

Little Steven Dennis was born about two months prematurely March 11. His weight was but two pounds, six ounces at birth and doctors said that his weight should reach five pounds before he could be taken home.

Since birth he had been in the hospital's incubator. His mother made daily visits to the hospital to be with him.

By Sunday, May 11, the little boy weighed a hefty five pounds and his parents, who have spent two anxious months waiting for him, were there to take Steven Dennis home.

"I suppose that at the least little snuffle of a cold, I'll have him down to the doctor's office," sighed Mrs. Potts, as she tenderly wrapped the little boy in his blanket preparatory to his ride home.

Sister Rita Louise, hospital administrator, said that other than being rather "fragile" when he was a few weeks younger, "his progress had moved along nicely."

At two pounds, six ounces, Steven Dennis is the smallest

baby to be born at Tawas Hospital who has had a chance of living, said Sister Rita Louise.

Nurses Aid Elaine Keeler commented, as she readjusted his yellow bonnet for the third time, "He's just like all other babies . . . they just don't like to have anything on their head at that age!"

There was much cause for rejoicing in the Potts household Sunday. There was the happy task of caring for the new baby and observances of two anniversaries . . . Mr. Potts' birthday anniversary was on Friday and Saturday was their wedding anniversary.

Contract Let for New Tawas City Kroger Store

Two Operators Now Hired for Filtration Plant

At a joint meeting of the East Tawas Council and department of public works Tuesday night, Harry Cater was hired as an additional operator at East Tawas' new water filtration plant.

The new plant, which has furnished that city with water for the past two weeks, has been operating at intervals during the day. There is not enough storage facilities, however, to fill the demand throughout the entire 24-hour period without going into production at night-time intervals.

East Tawas has been consuming about 300,000 gallons of water daily and the plant operating schedule is to be set up on a longer daily schedule, the reason it was announced Tuesday night by the East Tawas Council and department of public works that open house would be held Saturday, May 17, at the new water filtration plant at the foot of Newman Street near the Waterways Commission Dock. Hours for the open house will be from 10:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m.

Mayor Elmer Werth said Tuesday that many favorable comments have been received from East Tawas residents about the new water supply. "Many people have told me that the new filtered water is even softer than before," said Werth. "Everyone is pleased with the clearness of the new water."

There has been no specific date set as yet when Tawas City will enter into its water purchase agreement with East Tawas. It will take effect as soon as valves are opened at the city limits.

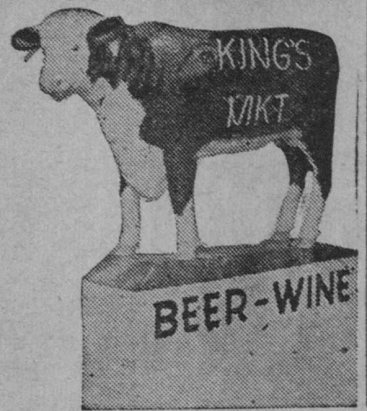
Mrs. Emma Sloan gave the invocation. Program chairman was Miss Helen Applin, who acted as

Mrs. Avis Black Mother-Daughter Banquet Speaker

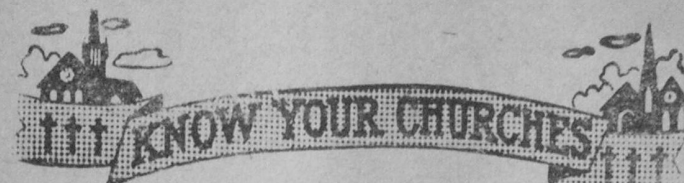

The state conservation camp experience is one never-to-be-forgotten. That is what we always learn from the boys and girls who achieve the real privilege to attend. They will have been busy, tired and happy all at the same time.

Who will be the fortunate boy and girl from Iosco County this year? To be eligible they must be enrolled and doing a fine piece of work in one of the conservation projects.

Recent visits with 4-H Club leaders reveal that most girls are nearing the completion of clothing projects. While I was visiting with Mrs. Howard Mott the girls arrived after school for fittings, and help with finishing work like zippers and hems. Such attractive garments they are making, and with capabilities matching those of most of us grown-ups, too.

Mrs. Ethel Spafford showed me dresses being made by girls in the

Peaceful Valley 4-H Club project. She says one more meeting should be enough for most of the girls and then they will begin real practicing of their modeling tips in preparation for the dress review event.

When you drive north on M-65 this summer, keep watch for the garden experiment project at the Jacobs home. Quack grass has plagued Mrs. Jacobs and the boys for several years; this year they are trying a spray program to control the quackgrass with a chemical known as Dalapon. Mr. Davenport has been helping them prepare the new garden spot for planting. Mrs. Jacobs also has a spot where she plans to try a mulch control for comparison.

Mrs. Ernest Herzog told me about the child care project being completed by three 4-H Club members who wanted training to prepare them for baby sitting work. Among the special things she has planned for the girls was how to bathe a baby. This subject the girls presented as a demonstration at their community 4-H Club meeting. A field trip to the fire station gave the girls a chance to learn about handling home fire situations.

The girls have nearly completed the first of three child care study projects. We hope they will want to go ahead with another of these projects, perhaps complete the entire series. By then they should be exceptionally well prepared to offer their services as trained baby sitters.

Mrs. Orville Lyke showed me the seedbed being readied for growing seedlings by the young people in her conservation project. The sand has been screened. This is a long-time project for seedlings grow very slowly.

In the meantime, several of the young people are getting started with planting seedlings at home. Around 300 young trees were left by Mr. Davenport with Mrs. Lyke and Mrs. Jacobs to be distributed among the club members for planting.

In a matter of six or eight years these trees, if properly cared for during that period, can provide funds for college or other special education. Thus this kind of 4-H project becomes a worthwhile, long-time investment.

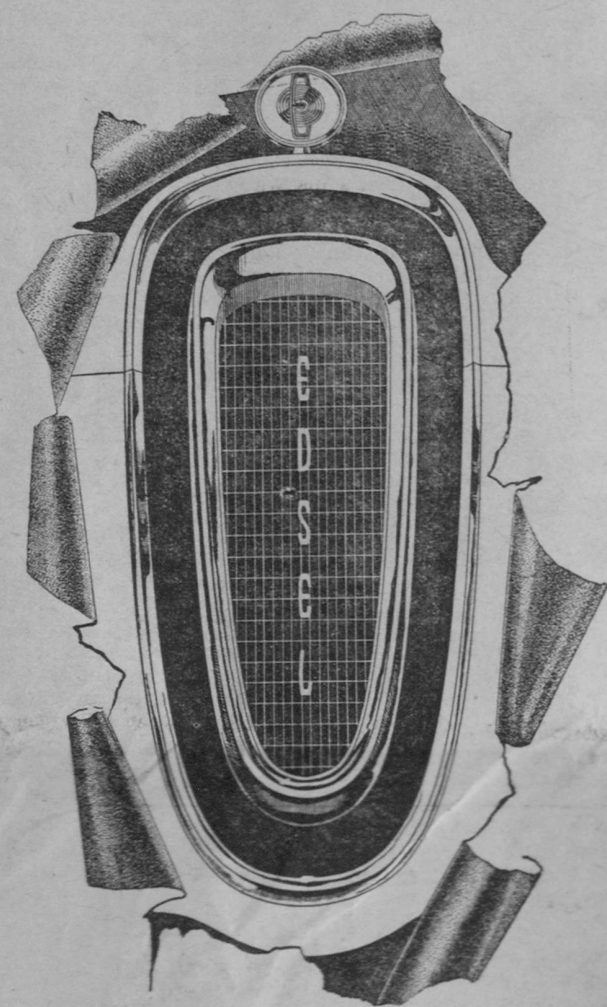

The kitchen planning clinics conducted in the special laboratory at Michigan State University once each month have proved to be wanted and used assistance for homemakers throughout the state.

Started last fall, these clinics were something of an experiment to see whether or not families planning to remodel or build kitchens, utility rooms or laundry rooms would attend a clinic to learn as much as possible about how to get the best result in their own home.

This service is conducted by specialists in the area of home planning at the university. You are most welcome to register to attend in the month of your convenience. There is no cost except your transportation to and from East Lansing.

Dates for the next two clinics are these: Tuesday, May 13, and Wednesday, June 11. For more information, please get in touch with me at the Federal Building, East Tawas.

Have you been feeling some "back talk?" Cheer up—you are but one out of every three Americans who will suffer from back ache sometime during your life.

According to the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons, 39 percent of our present under 45 population have back trouble. Fatigue and strain, often the result of improper lifting, account for almost 90 percent of back ache. Over-exertion, prolonged bad posture and excess weight—all these can lead to back trouble. Do not shock your spine by crashing when you sit. When you lift anything, bend your knees and let the arms, legs and hips do their part.

Additional tips may be helpful during the house cleaning season when homemakers are apt to become overtired from more than usual amounts of reaching, bending and lifting.

To save bending, use a long handled dust pan, and a long

applicator for waxing floors. Get a safe step-stool to eliminate long reaching and make safer lifting objects to and from shelves. Above all, wear comfortable shoes when working at jobs requiring long periods of being on your feet. This is not the time to "finish-off" the shoes no longer in condition for best wear.

Wear comfortable clothing that fits close enough to avoid catching on objects as you work, or even worse, being stepped on and tripping you.

Apply these tips for happier, easier house cleaning and surprise the family when evening comes by being in good humor after a hard day's work.

We are experimenting with a new idea in service to Iosco County families. Easy to read and understand are her discussions of various "problems" parents have as their small children grow and develop. Mrs. Backus is herself a mother and a grandmother as well as having made the field of family life study a career.

She is trying this news letter approach as a way to meet and help parents of young children who very often find it difficult to attend meetings because they cannot leave their youngsters.

Would you like to read the current issue of her news letter, "Dear Parents of Young Children"? All you have to do is let me know you want one mailed to you. The only requirement for your request is that you are parents of one or more children now under age five.

The discussion topic this time is "naughtiness."

FARM EVENTS

By MARVIN DAVENPORT Iosco Agricultural Agent

Iosco County Hereford raisers brought home the "beef" from the Gladwin Bull Sale last week. The Grand Champion Hereford bull, Zato Heir C-3, was purchased by James Mielock of Reno Township, with Al Donovan, Cedar Lake Ranch manager, getting the Reserve Grand Champion Zato Larry Seven Tony. Larry Domino, the fourth, was purchased by Timreck Brothers of Tawas Township. This excellent inheritance that can be transmitted from such good sires is the secret to the fancy, choice and good calves for which feeder buyers are looking. Might I suggest our Hereford men take a look at the three new additions in Iosco County.

Our corn researcher, E. C. Rossman of Michigan State University, says that some extravagant claims are being made for sweet-dent hybrid corn for silage. These hybrids are crosses of a single cross sweet corn and a single cross dent hybrid. These corn plants bear ears having about one-third sweet corn kernels and the rest the regular dent corn.

The false claims made are greater yield of silage of better quality than dent hybrids of some maturity and higher sugar content that cows prefer.

Five years of research at Michigan State University indicates the following: These hybrids are lower in grain yield than the best dent hybrids, the best sweet-dent corns were about equal to dent hybrids in fodder weight which is less important than grain content.

Sweet corn contains more sugar at roasting ear stage. By silage time most of the sugar has already been converted to starch, the same as dent corn. The sweet-dent silage may be a bit higher in sugar but the small difference would be more than offset by the lower grain content.

COMPLETES OFFICIAL PRODUCTION TEST

A registered Guernsey cow, Thum Gold Cassie, owned by Henry and Karl Luitje, Hale, has completed an official production record, according to the American Guernsey Cattle Club at Peterborough, New Hampshire.

This record was for 10,460 pounds of milk and 519 pounds of fat. "Cassie" was an eight-year-old, and was milked two times daily for 305 days while on test.



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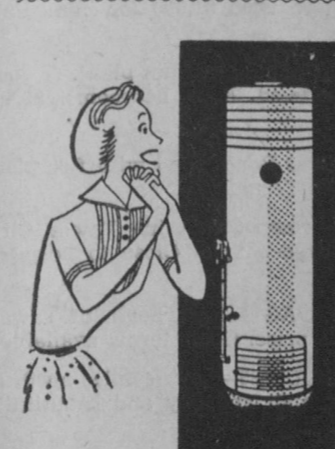

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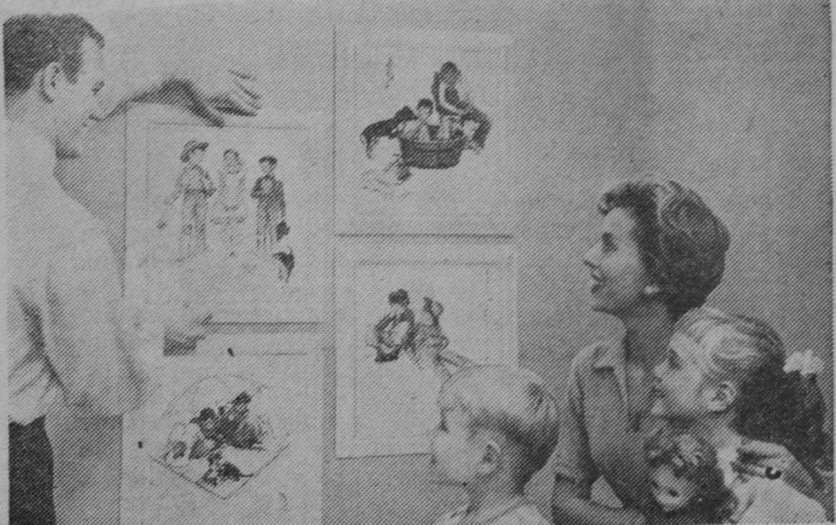

APRIL HAS REDUCTION IN TRAFFIC DEATHS

April became the fourth consecutive month this year in which there was a reduction of traffic deaths in Michigan and fewer than 100 deaths a month. Provisional figures reported by the state police show 80 deaths last month as compared with 118 in April a year ago, a reduction of 38, or 32 percent.

The war year of 1945, in which there was gasoline rationing and a speed limit of 35 miles an hour, was the last previous year in which the first four months had less than 100 deaths each. The last pre-war year was 1933 in which there was a like report.

April also was the 23rd of the last 25 months in which deaths have gone down.

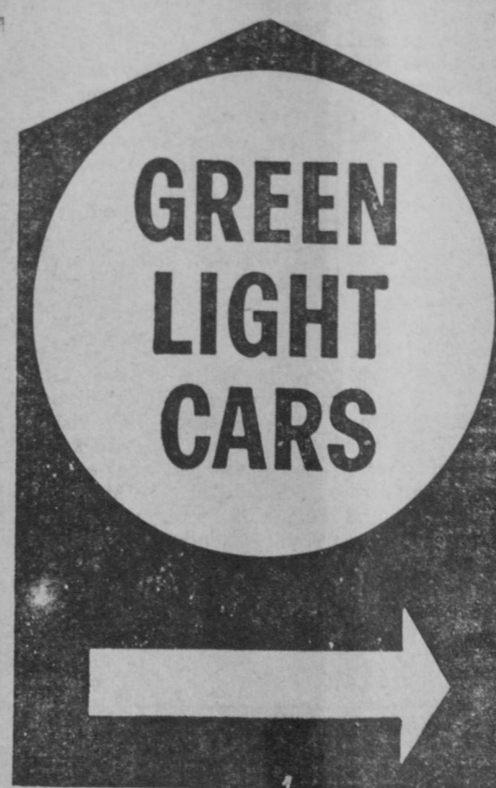

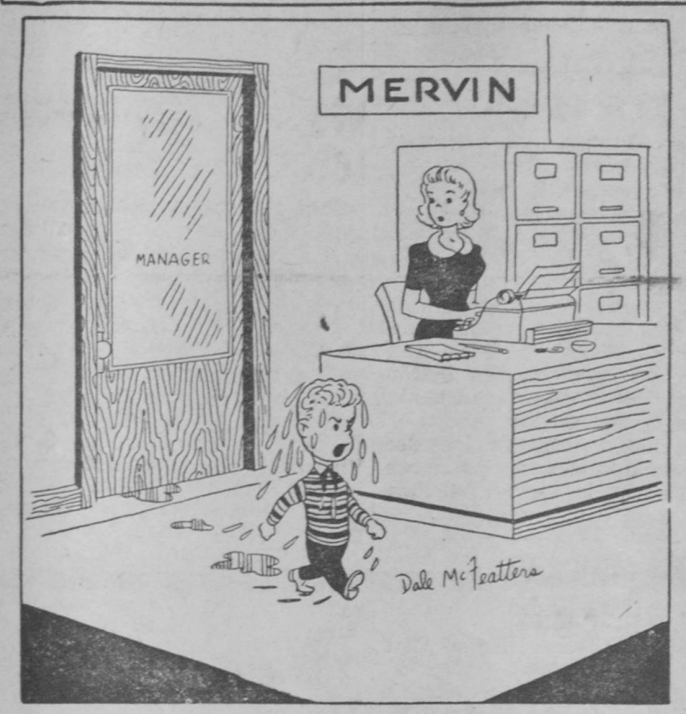

Golf Association Elects Officers

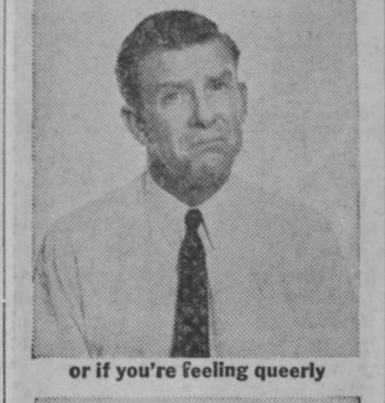

Howard Dietzel, new manager of the Tawas Golf Course, was presented to the group. Mr. Dietzel outlined new improvements made in the course and those planned.

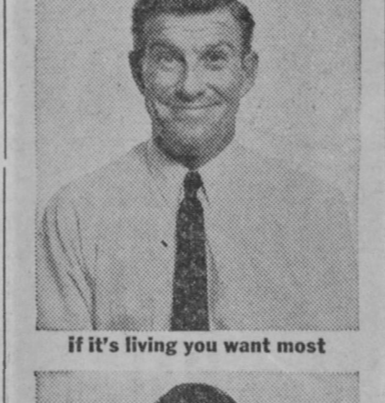

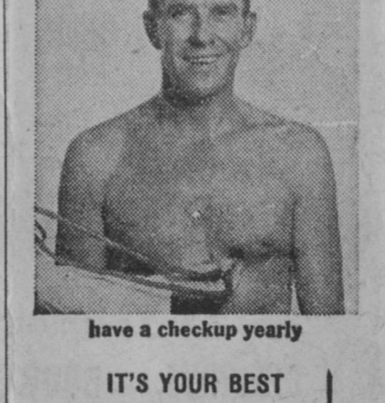

C. L. (CASH) BRANDALL

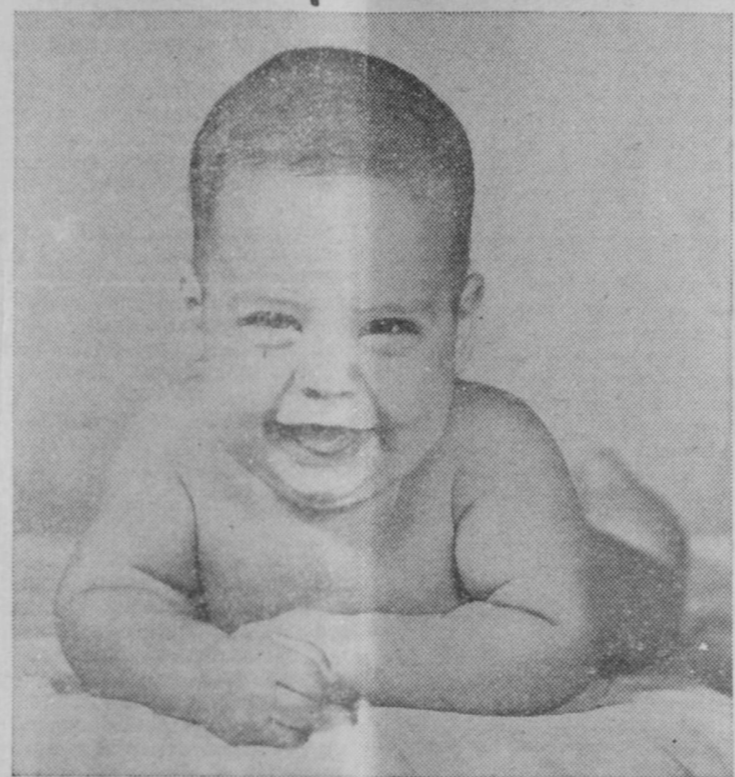

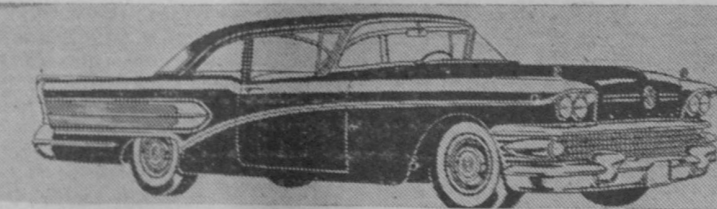

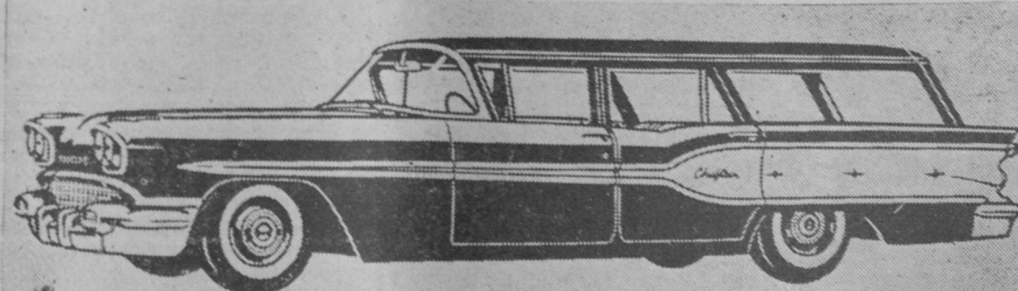

The documentation submitted with Mr. Andrews' letter of October 9, 1957 requested transfer of U. S. Forest Service lands for development as a new airport. A vigorous objection to the site was raised by the air force on the basis of conflict with Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

A thorough study has been made of the possibility of proceeding with the transfer and development of a civil airport under some arrangement whereby the factors of conflict could be avoided. It now appears conclusively that the conflict is not susceptible to satisfactory reconciliation and that in this case the military considerations carry the preponderant public interest of the United States and must be acceded to.

If the county should have any alternative proposals regarding suitable government owned land for airport development at another location under any other arrangement, we will be happy to discuss and consider such a proposal. We regret that the decision has been so long delayed and ask that some of the delay has been caused by our efforts to work out a solution with the air force.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS: The matter of your proposal to abandon State Trunkline Highway Number M-171 and place the cost of maintaining same on the Iosco County Road Commission has been brought to the attention of the Board of Supervisors of Iosco County, Michigan, at their meeting of April 15, 1958.
