Ground Broken for New W-P School

Ground has been broken for the new \$469,663 Whittemore-Prescott Area School by Arthur Vollmer Construction Company, Saginaw contractor. The firm was low bidder at a special meeting of the board of education May 7.

Site for this new high school is a 40-acre tract of land at the Isoco-Ogemaw County line, on Prescott Road west of Whittemore.

Clifford Morgan, who is superintendent of construction, said Tuesday morning that the site has been brought to grade and that batterboards are presently being set for construction of foundations.

The new school will be located on high ground in a wooded section of the site. The building will face slightly to the northwest at an angle with Prescott Road.

John Halbert, superintendent of schools, said Tuesday that it is expected that construction of foundations will start after Memorial Day. "Completion date is set for July 1, 1959, but we are hoping that a classroom wing may be completed by April or early May," he said.

Mr. Halbert said that the contractor had little work in bringing the site to grade and that it was necessary to remove only a few trees. "The property will have no drainage problem on this high ground and a wooded ravine at the east end of the site will give the school a pleasant surrounding," he said.

The school will include 17 teaching stations as well as music room and auditorium, cafeteria, library, gymnasium and two shop areas. The building will contain 43,750 square feet.

Regional Library to Host District VI Annual Meeting

Mrs. Loleta Fyan, state librarian; Miss Louise Rees, Michigan State Library; Clifford L. Wightman, president of the Michigan Library Association, and 70 librarians and trustees from Northern Michigan will attend.

Miss Lenora Hass, director of the regional library and 1957-1958 chairman of District VI which is comprised of 22 counties, will preside at the meeting which will open at 9:00 a. m. with registration and coffee at Christ Episcopal Parish Hall, East Tawas. The general session with annual reports from the executive board and election of officers will feature a panel discussion on this year's theme, "Cooperation and Expansion."

Luncheon will be served at the St. Joseph Social Center followed by an address by Mrs. Alida Sims Malkus, juvenile author from New York City.

Mrs. Malkus, a widely known author, was born in New York State but later her family moved to Michigan where she grew up. Even as a child she was busy writing stories. She has always had a deep interest in science and has traveled extensively throughout the United States, Mexico and South America and her visits made so deep an impression that many of her experiences have found their way into books for boys and girls.

Anderson Officials Explain Expansion

Residents of the Tawas area were assured last week that Anderson Coach Company at East Tawas would take steps to expand its eastern trailer sales division to offset any possible drop in production here due to construction of its new trailer plant in Utah.

At a dinner honoring Anderson officials last Wednesday night, James A. Guest, company president, told some 45 business leaders and civic officials present that, although the current recession had caused a slow-down in trailer sales, the company had decided to go through with its plant expansion in Utah.

He said that about 25 percent of the company's trailer production here went to the western states, and the move was necessary to protect this market. He did not indicate when the new plant would be constructed.

Mr. Guest said that the company hopes to bring its volume of production here back to where it was prior to the current lag in trailer sales through expansion of sales representatives in its eastern and mid-western markets.

Toastmaster at the dinner was W. D. Nunn, East Tawas hardwareman. Mayors Elmer Werth of East Tawas and George Tuttle of Tawas City were in attendance. Anderson Coach Company officials attending, besides Mr. Guest, were William Johnson, Blaine Christeson, Charles McCormick, Herbert Hertzler and Orville Stiehl.

Prison Sentences Dealt to Three Men

Prison sentences were dealt to three men brought before Judge Herman Dehnke in Isoco County Circuit Court last week. Two other men were fined and placed on probation.

John Davis, who was recently convicted of forgery after being returned here from New York State, was sentenced to serve from seven to 14 years at Southern Michigan Prison, Jackson.

Donald Davis, 35, of Turner and Donald Bessey, 22, of Twinning, were both sentenced to serve two to 15 years at Southern Michigan Prison for probation violation. They had been convicted of the breaking and entering in the night-time of the Grabow warehouse at Whittemore.

Two other men, Gene Ripenbark, 19, of Twinning and James Wainwright, 28, of Essexville, were placed on three years probation, fined \$100 each and ordered to pay \$21 restitution each. They were both implicated in the Grabow warehouse burglary.

In other business, the council authorized the superintendent of public works to arrange a vacation schedule for city employees. Prior to this, city employees have never had a paid vacation.

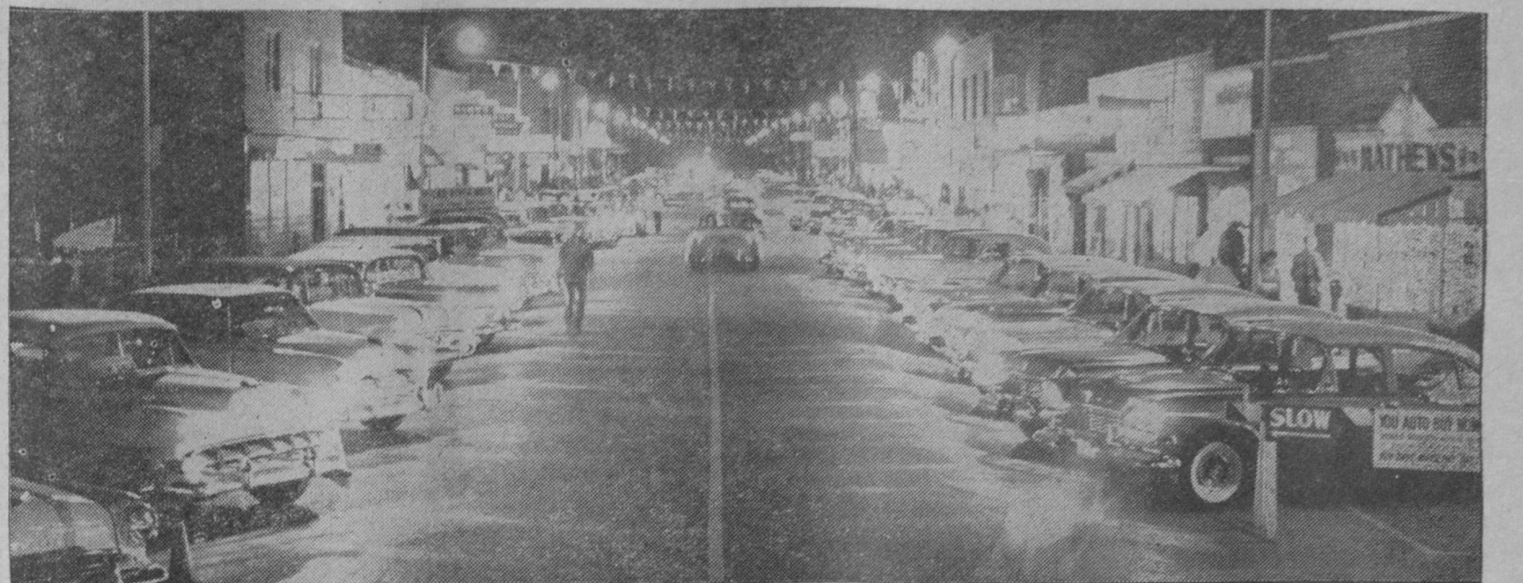
Supt. Reginald Blubitz said that most cities of this size usually give employees one week paid vacation. The schedule is to be presented to the council for approval at a later date.

Thousands See AF Jet Show

Thousands of eager sightseers swarmed over Wurtsmith Air Force Base Saturday during the annual observance of Armed Forces Day. Base officials estimated the crowd at some 10,000 persons.

Highlighting the day-long program was the low-level precision flying by jet pilots of Wurtsmith's interceptor squadrons. Close formations of F-89 Scorpions and F-102 Delta Daggers roared over the field to thrill the spectators.

Throughout the morning, spectators saw jet take-offs and landings, a maximum-performance takeoff, high speed passes and later in the day saw the planes in formation fly-overs.

Displays in one of the huge hangars provided visitors with a first hand view of air force equipment. Of particular interest there was a mock-up of the base as it will look in two years, compared to another mock-up which showed the base as it is today.

The mock-up showed the base's expansion program, already underway, which is designed to accommodate bombers of the Strategic Air Command.

Static displays included the T-33 jet trainer, an RB4F photo recon jet, an F86L, F-89, F-102 and the Sikorsky H-19 helicopter. A navy S2F-2 twin-engine rescue and anti-submarine plane was also on display.

Presentation of a Distinguished Flying Cross to a 30-year-old 445th FIS pilot highlighted the flight line program in the morning. Col. Thomas N. Wilson, base commander, pinned the DFC on the chest of Capt. Burford W. Culpepper for personal courage, airmanship and devotion to duty during the launching of an MB-1 missile in Nevada in July 1957.

Colonel Wilson also awarded special commendation ribbons to Maj. Clinton W. Kirkpatrick for his work in commanding aircraft control and warning squadron of the Northeast Air Command, and to First Lt. Charles F. Blaisdell for meritorious efforts with an air base group in France between the period 1955-58.

The presentations were made before massed ranks of the base squadrons' officers and airmen. Prior to the award presentation officers and men of Wurtsmith passed in review on the base's concrete apron.

Concluding the afternoon's program was the overhead flight of a giant B-52 jet bomber of the Strategic Air Command. This huge plane is one of the type which is expected to be stationed at Wurtsmith within the next two years.

Trash Fire Blamed for Destroying Garage-Barn

A trash fire, fanned by high winds Tuesday afternoon, was blamed for destroying a barn and garage on Wheeler Street and for threatening several other buildings in Tawas City's First Ward.

Tawas City volunteer firemen said that the blaze apparently started when burning embers from a trash barrel were blown up against a garage at the rear of the Richard Burch residence. The garage was completely enveloped in flames when firemen arrived and a frame barn owned by Michael Sommerfield had burst into flames. Both of these buildings were completely destroyed.

Flames from the burning garage, property formerly owned by the late James Baguley, scorched a garage on property adjoining to the north, owned by Chester Parker, and set fire to the Burch residence.

The latter fire and the adjoining garage were extinguished by firemen. Fire in the residence was in a porch subfloor.

High winds sent burning embers across the railroad tracks and set a fire in the eyes of the

Dr. John LeClair residence on Lake Street, about 150 yards away. This blaze was quickly put out with only slight damage.

The strong northwesterly wind showered sparks and embers along Lake Street from the Sanford LeClair residence east for several blocks. Had the wind shifted to the northeast the blaze may have endangered Tawas Industries at the corner of First and Court Streets and other buildings in that area.

Plantations Here Filmed by U. S. Forest Service Photog

Various timber improvement measures being carried on here in Huron National Forest will be the subject of a film now being produced by the United States Forestry Department, Department of Agriculture.

Freeman Heim, photographer-editor, and Charles Fox, technical director of the film and writer, were here three days last week shooting scenes at the Buck Creek and Kiwanis Plantations.

Both men are members of the United States Forestry Department's division of information and education at the Region Nine Headquarters, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

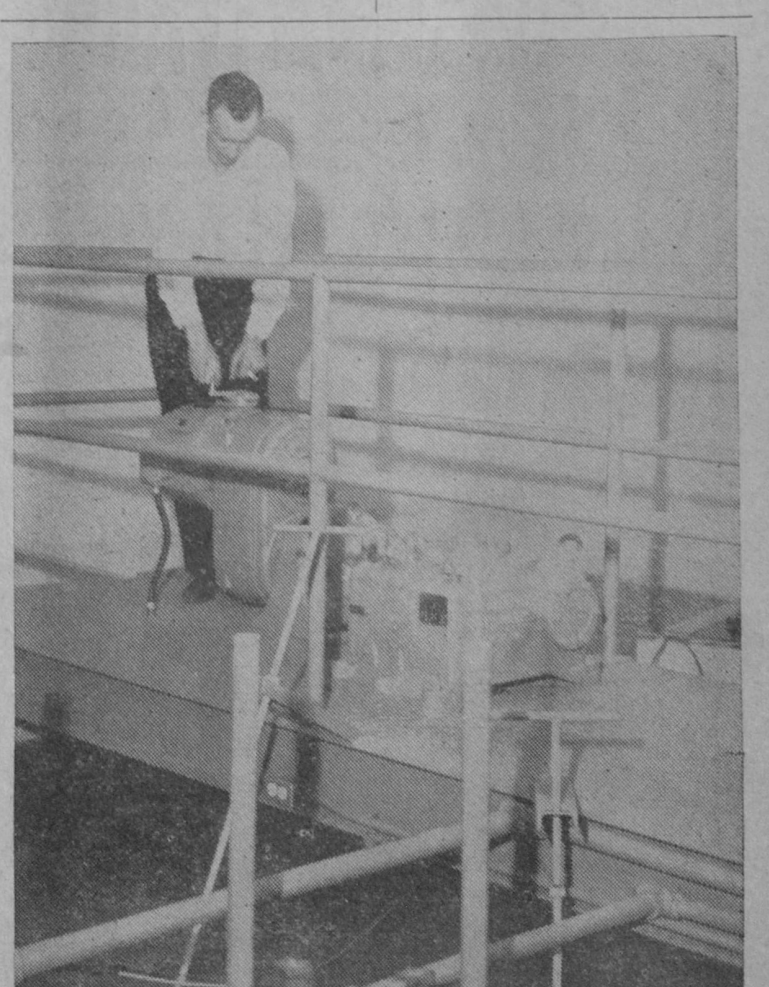
"Planting Isn't Enough," is to be the title of this 20-minute film. It will tell the story of measures being taken here, as an example of good forestry management, toward thinning out plantation timber stands, elimination of "weed species" of hardwood trees, etc.

"The principal story we are trying to tell in this film is to show the need for improving stands now so that the trees will become valuable, salable timber in the future," stated Mr. Fox.

When completed, the film will be shown to civic groups, service clubs, lumbering groups and forest products associations.

Local participants in the film shooting schedule were Cecil Cable, A. Don Anderson, W. D. Nunn, Harold Hammond and Marvin Davenport. Others pictured were members of the forest service crew and personnel from the Tawas Ranger District, loggers from the Ausable Forest Products Association.

The photographer-writer team visited sites where trees were being sawed, skidded and loaded for shipment as well as plantations under improvement. The Abitibi mill at Alpena was also visited, along with the Huron Wood Processing Company at Tawas City.

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NEWS ABOUT IOSCO SERVICEMEN

William E. Allen, aviation structural mechanic first class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Austin Allen, National City, attached to Fighter Squadron 52, took part in "Strike," a United States First Fleet striking force exercise, held off the coast of Southern California during May 5-9.

Nineteen ships, plus carrier and land-based aircraft from 15 squadrons took 12,000 personnel into the operation.

Ships and aircraft at sea formed the fast-moving "blue" attacking forces which launched raids against simulated targets on the West Coast. "Orange" defensive forces consisted of navy attack, fighter and patrol aircraft and submarines based on the West Coast.

Striking force exercises are designed to give advanced training to personnel preparing to deploy to the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

We are a nation of beef eaters, and we like pig. Lamb is a poor third in our country. Can the reason be that we do not quite understand how to buy, cook and serve it? We seldom eat lamb at its best, frequently we eat it at its worst.

The fact is that young lamb can be more tender and tasty than any other meat. Lamb is enormously popular in the Old World. It is the basic ingredient of the multitudinous shishkebabs of the Near East. And who has not heard of the wonderful British invention called the double lamb chop?

If you are looking for menu variety, you have missed a bet if you have not tried some of the many lamb cuts at our meat counters. Breast of lamb, lamb riblets, leg-of-lamb, shoulder of lamb and lamb chops are among the cuts to be found there.

Good quality lamb is identified by its firm, pinkish to light red color; its clear white and brittle fat, forming a smooth covering, and porous red bones where surfaces are cut. Serve lamb hot or cold—never lukewarm!

Three right ways to accessorize your wardrobe for spring and summer 1958 are these—the monochromatic, the one spot of color and the "mixed-up color."

Monochromatic means one color. Accessorize with shades and tints of the color of your outfit. Examples are mauve pink with blue-red, yellow with gold. Or use the same value of the color in your outfit—a blue suit with the same blue in shoes, hat, purse and gloves.

One accessory provides the one spot of color in the second method—a beige suit, hat, shoes and gloves with a red flower is an example.

To mix up the colors you might start with a navy-blue suit trimmed in white. Wear navy shoes, purse and gloves. Choose a hat that is mostly white with some navy and a touch of light blue on it. The light blue is the accent color; picking it up in your jewelry completes the "mixed-up" color look.

Those who attended the frozen food preservation demonstration last week will want to take note of this further tip about freezer storage for bread. Frozen bread will retain its original freshness for two to three weeks. Freezing stale or partially stale bread will not restore its freshness. Be sure the bread is adequately wrapped for freezer storage.

At the first annual Homemakers College held in New Mexico, the Michigan Department of Public Health conducted a health survey of the homemakers who attended. As you might guess, the most common variation from normal was in aroidipous: 41 percent of the homemakers were overweight. Five percent were underweight. Not long ago we pointed out that being overweight is an effective way to shorten our lives—a 50-year-old man who is 25 pounds overweight may die five years sooner than he would if he were not overweight, the statis-

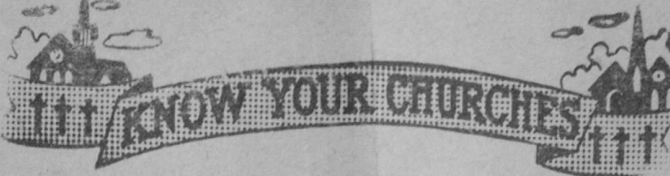

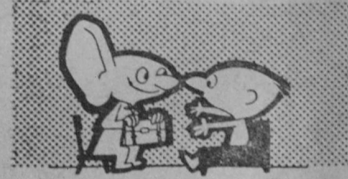

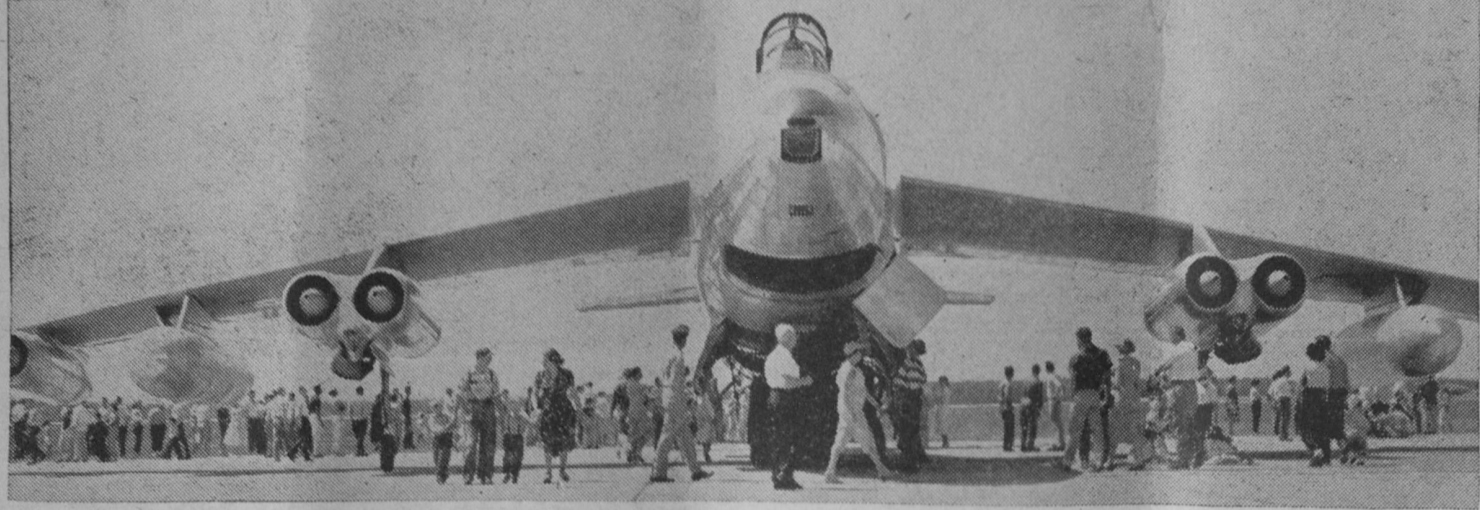

Ard Richardson Has Outstanding Cattle Herd

(The following is an article which appeared in the May 11 issue of The San Antonio (Texas) Light, telling about the outstanding cattle herd of Ard Richardson. The Texas cattleman is co-owner of the Holland Hotel at East Tawas. His wife is the former Mildred Quick of Tawas City.)

Although an outstanding herd of registered Herefords has star billing on the Ard E. Richardson ranch, Richardson also is greatly interested in his smaller herd of

Brown Swiss cattle, primarily a dairy breed. On his ranch on the Masterson Road, south of Highway 90 west, Richardson gradually has been increasing his herd. He also is carrying on a breeding improvement program.

The breeding program has the objective of increasing the milk production of the individual cow and at the same time maintaining or increasing body size.

The herd now numbers 67 head, including bulls, calves and 36 cows. There was a good demand, he said, for both heifer and bull calves, particularly the former. But, because he is building up his herd he has had but few heifers to offer.

This past week, however, he was preparing to ship five heifers to a breeder at Valles, near Tampico, Mexico. The Brown Swiss is popular south of the border, Richardson said, not only for dairying but also for crossbreeding with beef breeds, particularly Brahmans.

Richardson and his ranch manager, Milton Willman, listed several reasons why they liked Brown Swiss cattle. Richardson said:

"The Brown Swiss is a hardy, healthy, long-lived animal, which maintains high production over an unusually long span of time. Highest lifetime production of butterfat for all breeds was set by a Brown Swiss owned by an Indiana breeder. Another cow, at 10 years of age, produced 1,544-75 pounds of butterfat during a 365-day production test period."

"We have found that Brown Swiss make excellent nurse cows and are particularly valuable on the road. They do not seem to be affected by the traveling, handling and ever-changing environment which tend to upset nurse cows on the show circuit."

"Another reason why we like the Brown Swiss is because it is of considerable dual purpose value."

Richardson's experience with Brown Swiss dates back to 1950 when he bought the ranch from the late George Lyles, who was interested in the breed.

At that time, Richardson acquired from Lyles three cows and two bred heifers. He did some crossbreeding with Herefords. It was not until 1954 that he acquired a Brown Swiss bull. Incidentally, after eight years, all five of the first acquired females are in the present herd.

Richardson added a few animals, purchased locally to his herd from time to time.

At the first sale of the Texas Brown Swiss Association, held at Stephenville the past January, he bought three bulls, two heifers and one cow. Included in the lot were the top-selling heifer and top-selling bull.

Thus far, the Brown Swiss herd on the Richardson ranch has been used only to provide nurse cows and to supply milk to the farm families.

Tentative plans for the future, however, call for establishment of a dairy of a size which, with modern equipment, could be operated by one man.

Should Not Rely on Misinformation Says Paul Ellifritz

Residents of Isoco and Arenac Counties were urged by Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager, to get in touch with the Bay City office of the Social Security Administration for information regarding payments under the old-age and survivors insurance program.

Mr. Ellifritz stated that his office encounters numerous instances of applicants for benefits who have relied on erroneous or misleading advice received from friends or relatives. As a result they have mistaken ideas about requirements for social security payments and the amount of the payments which they will receive. In several recent cases, failure to obtain correct information before reaching retirement age has had serious effects on the applicant's plans for retirement, he added.

The Bay City office of the Social Security Administration receives all applications for retirement and survivors payments from residents of 11 counties in the northeastern part of the Lower Peninsula. In addition the office receives applications for disability payments from qualified workers 50 years of age or more and applications to "freeze" the wage records of disabled workers under age 50. Since January 1, 1958, the Bay City office has forwarded 967 applications for retirement or survivors payments.

Mr. Thomas was born August 31, 1896, at Tawas City. He served in World War I. For a number of years he had resided at Flint and Holly.

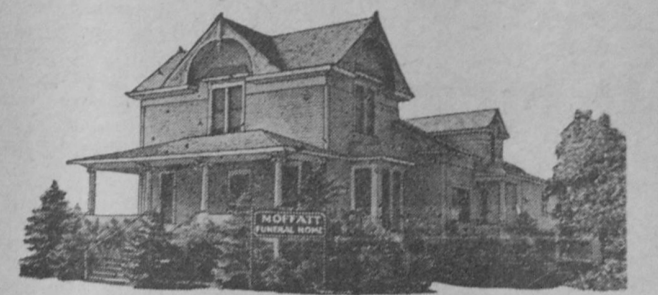

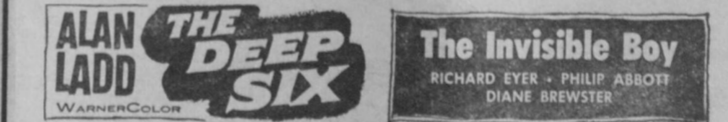

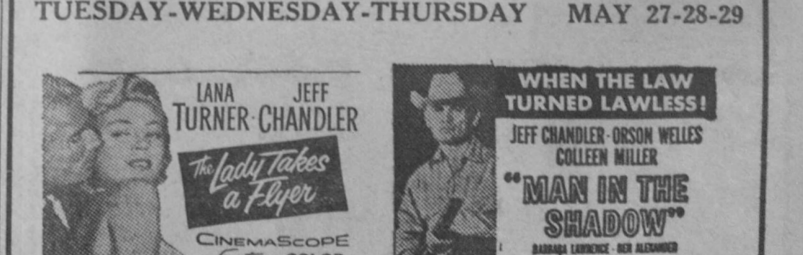

Chemical weed control is not a gamble—it is a sound, economical practice. But to get good control of weeds, you should follow these basic principles.

Weeds are killed most easily when the weather favors weed seed germination and rapid plant growth.

Chemicals recommended for selective weed control kill best when weed seeds are germinating or when plants are young.

Use the recommended rate of application.

Do not disturb the soil in the crop row after applying chemicals. If you disturb the area near the plants, you destroy the chemical layer.

Rates differ with soil type. In general, use the lower recommended rates on light or sandy soils. Rates recommended for mineral soils may not be effective on muck soils.

Know your weed species. This is important because several chemicals are effective on certain species only.

Know the chemical's limitation. Beware of the wind drift and volatility of the chemical. Use only low volatile forms of 2-4-D on vegetable and fruit farms. Be careful not to spray herbicides near sensitive crops such as grapes and tomatoes.

Full details on chemical weed control for vegetable and small fruits are available in the new Michigan State University Extension folder just received in my office in the Federal Building. Copies are free.

If your garden area is limited, plant a balanced garden of those vegetables that will produce the greatest returns.

You will want to measure these returns by nutrients per pound, production per square foot and number of hours of labor needed to produce the crop.

Here is a list of vegetables suggested for small gardens: Beans, beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, chard, lettuce, onions, spinach, peppers, radishes, tomatoes (staked) and turnips.

Sweet corn is one of the borderline crops, say the specialists in the horticulture department at Michigan State University.

Owing to the high quality of freshly harvested corn, nearly every home gardener wants to include it in his garden. But the amount of food value produced per square foot is small compared with some other crops. There is hardly room for it in a garden smaller than 25 feet by 50 feet.

Although potatoes, lima beans, cucumbers and squash are highly desirable, they require a considerable amount of space and should therefore be limited to larger gardens.

Newly seeded lawns need lots of water. In fact, the most important step in caring for a newly seeded lawn is to make certain that the surface of soil always contains enough moisture to keep little seedlings alive after the seeds germinate.

Water the lawn as often as is necessary to keep the surface moist. Use a fine spray to avoid washing the soil. You may need to sprinkle the new seeding two or three times daily.

After the grass is one inch tall, you can water the lawn by soaking the soil to a depth of four or five inches. Then allow it to dry until the grass shows signs of wilting.

Begin mowing the lawn as soon as the grass is three inches tall. A sharp mower is essential for cutting new seedlings. Set the cutter bar to a height of two inches and maintain the grass at this height.

The county dress revue will take place at the Isoco County Fair this year. An honor group and a county dress revue winner will be chosen at that time.

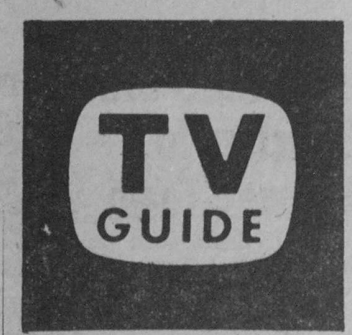
Tours were planned for Sherman Sharpies on June 4 to visit livestock projects, and an all-club tour for Reno Topnotchers on July 14.

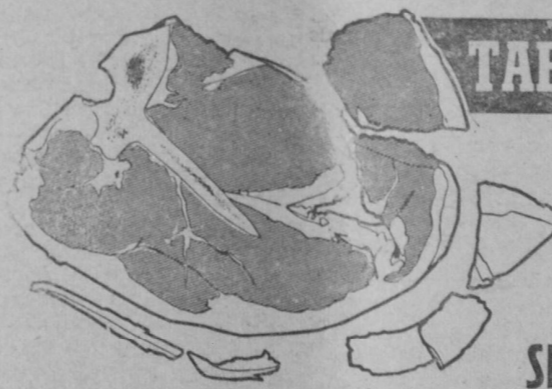

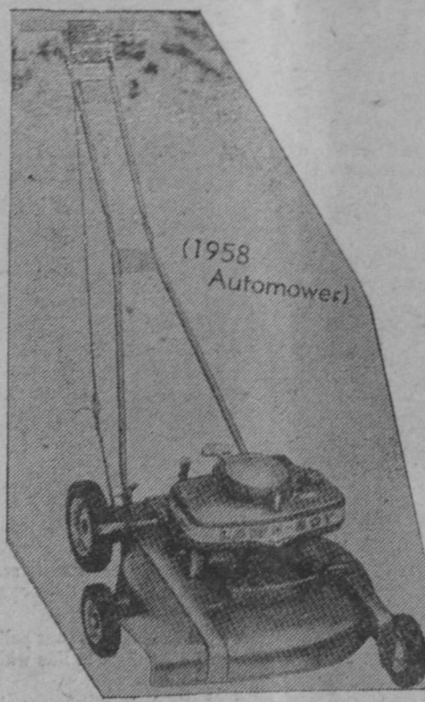
