72 Graduate in Program Tonight at Tawas Area

Commencement exercises for the 72-member graduating class of Tawas Area High School for 1958 will be held tonight (Thursday) at the high school auditorium starting at 8 o'clock.

Tonight's program will climax the week-long graduation activities for this year's senior class. The final week's program started last Sunday night with baccalaureate service at the school auditorium. Honors award program was held last week.

School officials ended for the summer vacation Wednesday when students made one last trip to school to return books and receive report cards. Grade school pupils held annual picnics in the afternoon.

Following tonight's exercises, the seniors will be honored guests at numerous parties being planned by their parents.

Principal speaker at tonight's exercises is Dr. Lester Anderson, consultant for the University of Michigan bureau of school services.

The Rev. Charles E. Mercer, pastor of Tawas City Baptist Church, will deliver the invocation and benediction. Waldo J. Curry, treasurer of the Tawas Area Board of Education, will present diplomas. The Tawas Area Band will play "Pomp and Circumstance" for the processional and recessional.

Honor students of the graduating class of 1958 are Carol A. Westerlund and James D. Curry, co-valedictorians, and Tamara E. Bell, salutatorian.

MSU Coach Stressed Work in Classroom

"The difference between good and great often amounts to just a little extra effort," stated Burt Smith in his talk at Saturday night's banquet honoring Tawas Area School athletes.

Smith, offensive line coach at Michigan State University, stressed the necessity of "doing a fine job in the classroom."

"A fine job in the classroom would stand you in great stead athletic-wise," he commented. "If a youth is not trained to think for himself, he won't have the ability to come through in the clutch play."

Toastmaster for this annual affair was Edward Rima. It was sponsored this year by the Tawas Area Sports Booster Club under the planning of William LaCourse, president.

Ray Guyette, who graduates this week with the class of 1958, was named athlete of the year at Tawas Area School. A three-letter winner, he quarter-backed the Braves football team, played forward on the basketball team and was catcher on the baseball team. Coach Howard Adams presented him with an award and his name will be inscribed on the school's 25-year athletic plaque.

Presenting letters and awards to the high school athletes were Coach Adams, varsity football, junior varsity basketball and track; Coach William McIntosh, varsity basketball, baseball and junior varsity basketball and Donald Wallace, tennis.

Ask State's Help---

Supervisors Again Start Ball Rolling to Move Airport

Action on moving the Iosco County Airport from its present location in East Tawas was renewed again last Wednesday. The board of supervisors passed a resolution which asked the state aeronautical commission to proceed with the acquisition of land for this purpose from the United States Government.

Property now under consideration is located north of the Kunze property in Baldwin Township, near the Leslie hunting camp, on Martindale Road. The county has an option on 80 acres of private land which is located adjacent to the government property.

The board's aeronautics committee reported that the proposed new site had already met with the approval of officials at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. A site which had been selected last year, located on Monument Road, was disapproved because of being in line with Wurtsmith's flight pattern.

The aeronautics committee said that the site for the proposed new airport was flat, sandy and dry. It is located about six miles north-east of East Tawas by way of US-23.

The resolution asking the state to start action on the project was passed by a vote of 12-2 by the supervisors.

In other business taken up during this one-day session, Dr. Earl Hasty reported on House Bill 205 which requires that all occupied house trailers, located outside of a state-approved trailer park, have a permit from the local taxing unit. Trailers must also have sanitary approval under the new law, said Dr. Hasty.

The board instructed Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell to accept the low bid of McKay Sales Company of Tawas City for purchase of a new patrol car. Notice of bids for this car were advertised last month.

Tabled by the board was a request from the sheriff's department for purchase of a motor boat. The boat was for patrol work on county waters. This will be discussed at the June session. Albert Parkhurst was named manager of the Iosco County Airport. He succeeds Ralph Meyers, who resigned as manager at the April session.

The board approved the purchase of 1,000 doses of Salk polio vaccine for inoculation of youngsters in the county, up to 19 years of age. The vaccine was purchased at a cost of \$450. Cost of a three-dose inoculation under this purchase would be \$1.35, as against the normal \$9 charge.

Believe Body Found in Bay is H. E. Fernette

A body believed to be that of Harry E. Fernette of East Tawas, who disappeared from the lake-loading crib of United States Gypsum Company at Alabaster November 25, 1956, was found in Georgian Bay, Canada, Tuesday.

Eugene Fernette, son of the deceased, and Vernon Hill, son-in-law, left Wednesday morning for Ontario to make identification.

Michigan State Police at East Tawas said that a constable from Warton, Ontario, had notified the St. Clair post that a body had been found there Tuesday. Strapped to the wrist was a watch with the inscription, "H. E. F., In appreciation for more than a quarter of a century of loyal service—1955, United States Gypsum Company."

A similar watch was presented to Mr. Fernette by the company's plant at Alabaster and clothing found on the body answered the description of those which he was wearing the day of his disappearance.

Mr. Fernette's body had been the subject of a long search in the winter of 1956. Divers had searched the lake bottom near the lake-loading crib but the body was never recovered.

Dr. Charles F. Klump Died Sunday, May 25

Dr. Charles F. Klump, former resident of East Tawas for more than 40 years, died suddenly Sunday, May 25, at Bothell, Washington, while attending an Odd Fellows gathering.

The body was shipped to Cincinnati, Ohio, arriving Thursday afternoon at the Stanley-High Funeral Home where services will be held Friday morning. Grave-side services will be at the Rest Haven Cemetery, Cincinnati.

Dr. Klump was born August 6, 1885, at Saginaw. His father was the late Rev. Klump, pastor of the Saginaw Evangelical Lutheran Church. On November 6, 1907, he married Miss Maud Brown of Detroit. He and Mrs. Klump came to East Tawas shortly after where Dr. Klump practiced dentistry for the next 30 years.

He was a member of Baldwin Lodge, IOOF, and Baldwin Lodge, F and AM, East Tawas. He served as grand master of Michigan Odd Fellows in 1938-1939 and was grand secretary from 1944 to 1949. The family resided in Lansing while he was grand secretary.

While in East Tawas, Dr. Klump served on the board of education, was a member of the fire department and East Tawas band, served as a member of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors and as justice of the peace.

While grand master of Michigan Odd Fellows, Dr. Klump initiated the first blood bank in America and was the first donor. Surviving are his widow; a son, Walter, at Bothell, Washington; two daughters, Mrs. Beatrice Smith and Mrs. Lucile Calvert. (See DR. KLUMP, page 8.)

Werth Explains Reasons for Delay in New Water Hook-up

An open letter to the citizens of East Tawas and Tawas City regarding a delay in furnishing water to the latter city was written this week by Mayor Elmer Werth of East Tawas.

Reasons for the delay were answered by Mr. Werth in his letter, as follows:

The City of East Tawas has contracted to sell filtered water to Tawas City. There has been a slight delay in furnishing Tawas City with water due to some engineering problems in friction losses due to loss of water pressure when water reaches the elevated water tank in Tawas City.

Regarding the filtered water capacity, the plant has a capacity of 1,500,000 gallons per day minimum. The plant is now operating on the basis of 16 hours per day, but on a 50 percent capacity. This is due to the fact that we have a

limited amount of storage facilities and must run the plant at intervals. The storage capacity at East Tawas, which includes clear well and the elevated tank, is approximately 300,000 gallons.

There has been some delay in getting water to Tawas City because of variation in sizes of water lines which built up friction as mentioned, causing very little pressure when the water reaches the elevated tank in Tawas City.

Clifford Spicer, engineer for East Tawas and Tawas City, has been asked to correct this situation so that Tawas City can have filtered water. Both water boards have been informed what must be done to correct this matter; namely, a booster pump must be installed on the water line, approximately one-half way between the water plant and the elevated tank in Tawas City, the cost being a very nominal one. This installation will also be the means of

keeping the Tawas City elevated tank filled rather than partially filled as previously indicated, and by so doing will have a more even pressure on all water lines throughout Tawas City.

We are sorry that there will be a few weeks delay in servicing Tawas City but you may rest as-

sured Mr. Spicer, the engineer, will do everything in his power to correct these minor difficulties encountered in furnishing filtered water to the citizens of Tawas City in the very near future.

Watson Finishes Work on Portraits of Judges

Portraits of nine former circuit court judges and the present judge will be unveiled at special ceremonies at the Iosco County Building June 16. Restoration of these portraits is the work of Harvey Watson, East Tawas commercial photographer.

The monumental task of copying these pictures was started earlier this year under the sponsorship of the Iosco County Centennial Committee. The success of this undertaking will be readily seen by those who attend the unveiling next month.

All of the portraits have identical natural wood frames with an engraved plate attached, giving the name of the judge and the years which he served on the bench.

Many of the portraits had hung in the courtroom of the old county building for years. Some had been damaged by water marks; others showed a deterioration of chemicals in the paper and all had a layer of dust and grime accumulated through the years.

After removing the pictures from their gilt frames and giving them a careful cleaning, Mr. Watson copied and re-copied each picture several times. Between each step he painstakingly retouched the negative and prints.

The centennial committee searched the county for a usable picture of one judge, but none could be found. As a last resort, an engraving of the "lost" jurist printed in an old newspaper was located and added to the collection.

After considerable work by Mr. Watson, the likeness taken from this old photo engraving can not be distinguished from the other pictures. The end result of these pictures is a testimony to Mr. Watson's skill.

Residents of the county are urged by the centennial committee and Iosco County Bar Association to attend this special ceremony in June. The project is being finished through funds which remained after last year's Iosco centennial celebration.

Six Persons Injured in Car-Truck Collision in Tawas City

Six persons were injured in a truck-car head-on collision near King's Market on US-23 in Tawas City last Saturday afternoon. All of the injured were taken to Tawas Hospital by ambulance.

Injured in the truck was John Burdzinski, 67, driver, of Route 1, Tawas City. He received chest, head and internal injuries. He was driving alone.

Occupants of the car injured were: Maurice E. Stocks, 75, driver, Detroit, chest, head and in-

ternal injuries and fractured right hand; Anna Jenkinson, 39, Royal Oak, multiple contusions and abrasions to legs and arms; Jerry Jenkinson, 10, leg injury; Ethel Stocks, 68, fractured left ankle and right wrist and lacerated forehead; James Jenkinson, 39, Royal Oak, fractured right wrist and ankle and internal injuries.

Police said that Burdzinski, who was traveling south, had pulled off on the right shoulder of the

road. He then pulled back on the pavement and went over the center line. Stock, who was headed north, veered to the left to avoid a collision but the truck turned back into the right lane and the two vehicles met head-on.

The Stocks vehicle was a total loss. Two airmen from Wurtsmith Air Force Base were injured in an accident Friday on River Road. Donald A. Koontz and Thomas L. Pollard were both treated at the base hospital for injuries.

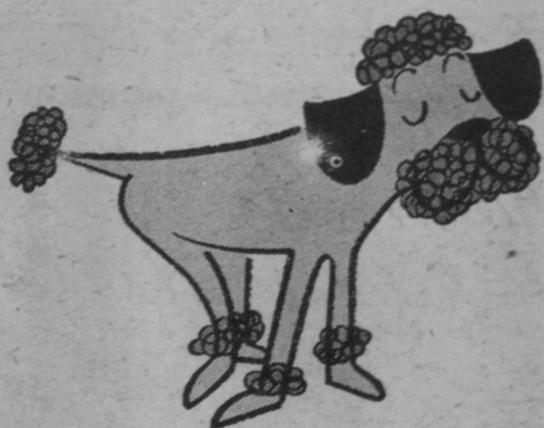

Michigan Libraries to Furnish Service to Vacationers

A major program to provide book service to vacationers at Michigan state parks during the summer months is once again underway by the Michigan State Library, Mrs. Loleta D. Fyan, state librarian, said today.

The program, which has been in operation over 10 years, is part of Michigan's plan to provide the best library service to every person in Michigan, whether at home or on vacation. Through its public library development section, headed by Miss Helen Kremer, the Michigan State Library will distribute over 6,000 books this year to 27 state parks. The books represent a variety of reader interests, ranging from fiction to Michigan history and biographies, natural science, nature hobbies and children's storybooks.

The first 1,200 books are now being prepared for state parks in Caseville, Ocqueoc Lake, Higgins Lake, Chelsea, East Tawas and Grand Haven. The entire shipment of 6,000 books is expected to be completed by early June. The books are returned to the state library by the park managers in November. Reader interest is high among the campers and requests vary according to geographical locations of the parks. Brimley State Park, located in Chippewa County in the Upper Peninsula, requested illustrated children's books and adult material.

Campers are grateful for the service, too. Burt Lake park, located near Indian River in Cheboygan County, returned 19 additional books last year which were donated by a camper who appreciated use of the park library. There is also the case of the manager of Fort Wilkins State Park, located at the tip of the Keweenaw Peninsula in the Upper Peninsula, who writes: "Actually when fog and cold creeps in from Superior, any literature which gives the camper the right to hold down a corner in our library is satisfactory. On particularly nasty days, I've seen campers huddled by the water heater for 15 minutes reading the recipe on the back of a can of VanCamp's . . ."

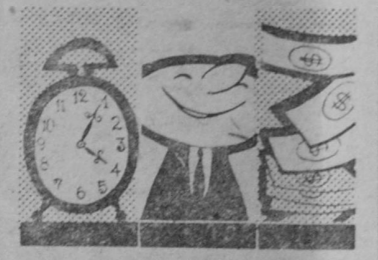

Chairman of Isoco County Board of Supervisors, Glenn Long, appointed Lloyd Little, Grant Township supervisor, to serve on the Isoco County Tree Growers Association board of directors. Mr. Little's appointment completes the tree growers board of directors for 1958-59.

Our recently organized owner-sampler DHIA association has a new service to its members come July 1. This new service will be the listing of surplus dairy cattle owned by our owner-sampler and DHIA members. Don Murray, extension dairy specialist at Michigan State University, says the first listing will be released early in July. Ross Williams, owner-sampler tester, and I will have listings to help Isoco County farmers find surplus cattle. Mr. Murray's office at Michigan State University in East Lansing will keep a list for answering inquiries from out-of-state buyers.

Machine tabulating of herd records has made this surplus dairy cattle listing service possible. All necessary information on the stock can be indicated by appropriate marks on a card for each animal. By running cards through a sorting machine, all cattle which fit a desired classification can be spotted.

Listings will be limited to those dairymen on the Dairy Herd Improvement Association and owner-sampler testing programs where records are machine tabulated. Tabulating fees paid by these dairymen will finance the cost of preparing the list. Also, these dairymen have herd control or identification numbers which are needed in making up the list.

In recent years many inquiries on available cattle from out-of-state buyers have been received. Since the state had no central listing of available dairy stock, buyers have not been encouraged to come into the state.

Sales of surplus cattle in Michigan have generally been good. Local demand has snapped up most of the available stock.

Dairymen need to do a better job of marketing their surplus cattle, according to Clint Meadows, dairy cattle breeding specialist at Michigan State University. "Michigan has had the dubious reputation of being the place to get a bargain in dairy cattle," Meadows says. "This listing service should help dairymen market their cattle and at the same time help to develop a strong out-of-state market for Michigan dairy stock."

Conditioning hay—churning or crimping recently mowed hay—can help cut field drying time 40 percent for hay that is to be baled.

Where conditioning is coupled with hay that is to be chopped and baled, about 60 percent can be cut off the field curing time, according to Robert White, agricultural engineer at Michigan State University.

White says that hay conditioning involves a machine which takes hay and passes it through a pair of rollers to either crush or crimp stems so moisture can get out faster. These flattened stems will dry at more nearly the same rate as the leaves.

Under normal weather conditions, a farmer using a hay conditioner could mow hay one day and expect to bale it the following day.

Some hay conditioners may be used in conjunction with mowers in which they condition hay one round after it is mowed. Others will be used as a separate unit requiring another trip over the field.

Whichever type of equipment is used, the important thing is to condition the hay soon after it is mowed. Any time hay is left in the swath long enough to take an initial wilt and become raggy, stems lose crispness and the effectiveness of conditioning is greatly reduced. Once stems get soft, they will not crack and snap as they go through the rollers.

With a chopping program, White thinks a barn drier is a must. Hay can be taken out of the field at a relatively high moisture content and blown into the barn. The mechanical handling of hay can be done while leaves are still tough and resist shattering.

Barn drying under normal conditions will cut about 40 percent off the field curing time. Chopping and barn drying need about the same curing time as hay conditioning and baling.

A larger operator may find it desirable to incorporate both methods and use a hay conditioner and then chop the hay at a high moisture level and barn dry. This operation is more expensive and can probably be justified only

on large farms where a lot of hay is put up. But in so doing, a farmer can expect to cut about 60 percent off the field drying time. Under favorable haying conditions this would let a farmer mow and condition one morning and chop and blow hay into the barn that afternoon.

Home fruit gardeners now have a simple, easy-to-use tool for waging their annual tussle with insects and diseases.

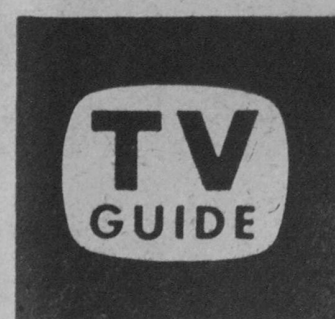
The tool is an "all purpose" spray tested and recommended by entomology, horticulture and plant pathology workers at Michigan State University. Application needs only to be done once a week, making the job a week-end project, according to Alfred C. Dowdy, extension entomologist at Michigan State University.

The spray, which contains captan, malathion and methoxychlor, gives the home gardener a control measure that is not as complicated and extensive as that used by commercial growers, yet gives good control of the major insects and diseases.

When only a few trees are involved, growers will probably find it more economical to purchase one of the commercial mixtures that are available.

Here is Dowdy's recommendation for preparing the mixture: To each gallon of water add two tablespoons of 25 percent wettable malathion powder, three tablespoons of 50 percent wettable methoxychlor powder and two tablespoons of 50 percent wettable captan powder.

Applications should begin soon after the emergence of the first foliage but can be started anytime after and still help control insects and diseases. Dowdy warns that application should be stopped during bloom and again seven days before the fruit is picked.

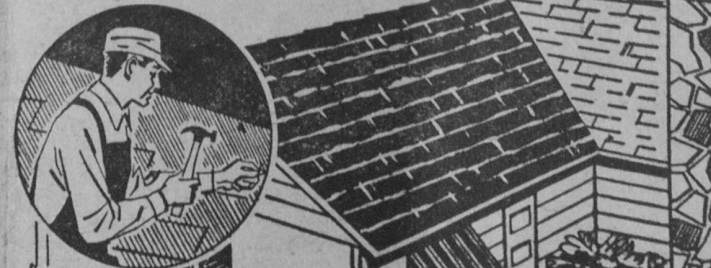

Best insurance for moth protection is good housekeeping. That means taking care of the garments and the place where they will be stored. Most wooleens will be dry cleaned for protection. Some wooleens and blends of wool may be washed before storage.

Vacuuming is probably the best way to thoroughly clean closets, boxes, chests, etc., where storage takes place.

Removing lint, dirt and other matter deprives the moth larvae of a source of food supply. Be extra wise—burn the contents of the vacuum bag immediately after cleaning a storage area.

Spraying with three to five percent DDT solutions, being careful to cover all cracks in walls or baseboards, is a good precaution for the storage spot.

Is your garden dry? Most everyone's is. This means you will be tempted to water it. Remember, it is best to do a good watering job or not do it at all. Shallow watering causes roots of plants to grow near the surface and be subject to drought damage. Roots that grow deep are more resistant to drought.

Let the sprinkler or hose operate in one place until the soil is soaked to a depth of at least six inches. Apply the water only as fast as it is absorbed by the soil.

Fabric and straw combinations are new in the hat picture this season.

Canned tomatoes are the all-time specialty. They go into casseroles and meat sauces. They can be stewed with seasonings, or mixed with corn, beans or bean sprouts. Chill them and serve with chopped onions, chives or celery.

SOCIAL SECURITY AGENT HERE THURSDAY, JUNE 12

Some aged wives and widows who are separated but not divorced from their husbands could be receiving monthly social security benefits on the basis of their husbands' work, if they would come in and file applications, Paul M. Ellifritz, district social security manager, said today.

A 1957 change in the law did away with the requirement that a wife must be living with or supported by her husband when she files an application, and that a widow must have been living with or supported by her husband at the time of his death. Now, a 62-year-old wife or widow may be eligible for a monthly benefit merely on the basis of a legal marriage that is still in existence, even though they may have been separated for many years and are at opposite ends of the country. There has been no change in the law with respect to the provision that a wife can receive monthly benefits only if her husband is also receiving his benefit.
