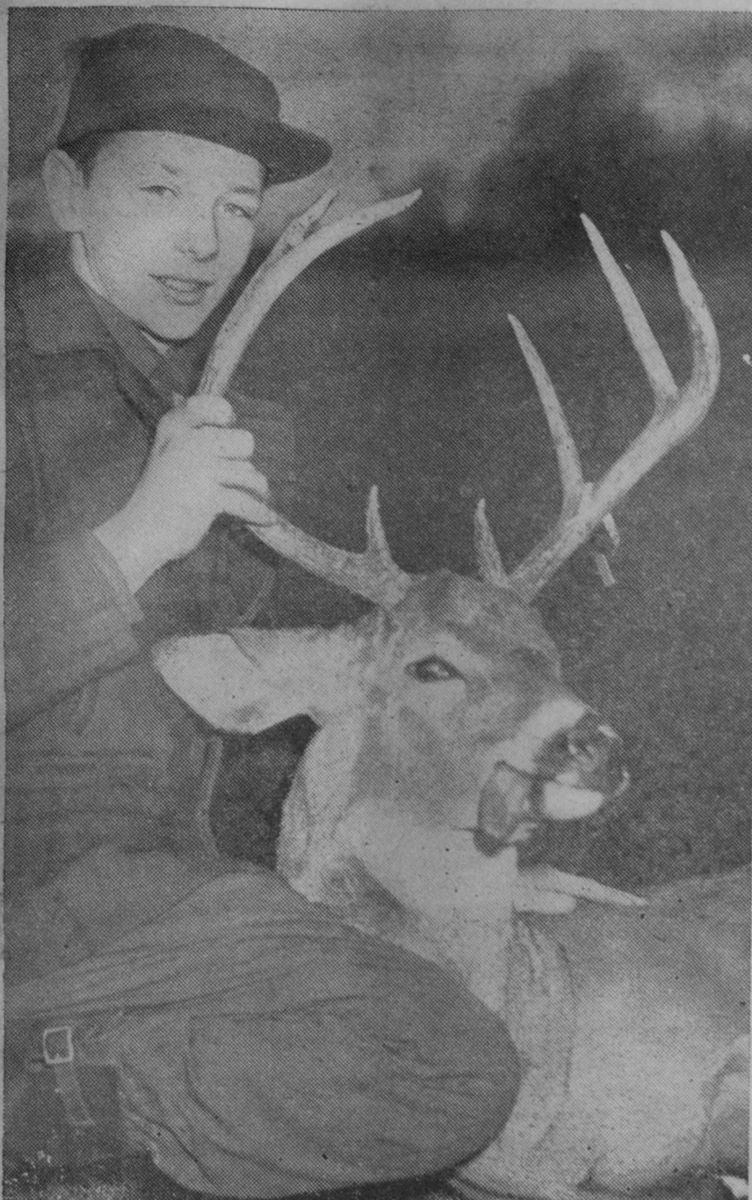

Burglars Strike Three Area Business Places

Three area breaking and enterings in which money was stolen are being investigated by Michigan State Police this week. Harten's Grocery on M-55, Singing Bridge Grocery near the Arenac-Iscosco County line and the Oasis Tavern west of Oscoda were all burglarized over the week-end.

Harten's Grocery, 12 miles west of Tawas City, was broken into sometime Saturday night or early Sunday morning. Entry was made by forcing in a screen door on the west side of the building. Stolen was an adding machine cash register containing \$86. The register was found late Monday afternoon by a party of hunters who turned it over to police.

Sold for Scrap—

Western States to Get Cutter's Torch

The last remaining ship in the fleet of pleasure cruisers once owned by the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Company, the Western States, anchored at Tawas City, was sold to the Bay City Scrap Company, salvage operators, it was announced Monday.

Paul Harvey, attorney for the Bay City firm, said that a week-long sale would be held aboard the ship starting Saturday, November 29, to sell all movable furniture and supplies.

Afterward, the salvage operators will start dismantling the boat at its present location and in the spring expect to tow the hull to its Bay City yard.

First indication that the Western States would soon be put to the cutter's torch was received here three weeks ago when the salvage company petitioned the city council for permission to perform the work of scrapping the

boat at the city park dock. Details on an agreement with the city council were worked out last week-end. The salvage operators posted a bond to insure that the dock, the lake bottom and the water front will be left free from any damage and in a clean condition free from any debris when the operations are completed.

The Western States has been anchored at the park dock since 1955, when it was towed here and converted into a flotel. It immediately ran into legal trouble with the Michigan Department of Conservation over the state's submerged land act.

During the ensuing years, ownership of the Western States changed hands. It was fitted out and operated for a short time as a floating resort. The hotel corporation was declared bankrupt and the ship was finally sold for scrap.

Gift Bonanza Starts in Tawas City on Friday

Second Tawas Attorney to File—

Miller Candidate for Judge

Allan C. Miller, a native of Isosco County, has announced his candidacy for circuit judge for the 23rd judicial circuit in the 1959 spring elections.

Miller will be seeking election to the vacancy to be created by retirement of Judge Herman Dehnke, who has held the office since 1928 and has achieved statewide recognition as a judge.

Miller, who was born in Tawas City and later lived in East Tawas, has left his partnership in the well-known Detroit law firm, Lucking, VanAuken and Miller, and moved his residence back to East Tawas.

Recently appointed to act as city attorney for Tawas City, the candidate for circuit judge is the eldest son of the late Sheriff Charles Miller. His mother, Mrs. Grace L. Miller, has been treasurer of Isosco County for more than 20 years.

Miller spent his childhood in Tawas City, East Tawas and Tawas Township. He was graduated from East Tawas High School, where he was captain of the basketball team and earned letters in baseball and tennis. He was a member of the high school debating team and was graduated with honors in the class of 1940.

He worked his way through the University of Michigan, financing his education by work in the registrar's office, washing dishes and driving a taxi. He was awarded the Noyes Scholarship for sons of veterans of World War I. He was graduated with a bachelor of arts degree "with distinction" and was a member of the Phi Kappa Phi honor society.

Married to the former Betty

Gill while still attending college, Miller worked in Detroit factories during the summer and drove a taxi during off-class hours in three years of studying law at the University of Michigan. He also received the Harry Helfman Scholarship while in law school and earned the degree of juris doctor, awarded to graduates with a better than "B" average.

For the past 12 years, he has been in law practice with the Detroit firm which was originally founded by John D. Connelly and Alfred Lucking in 1880. Miller became a partner in the firm in 1953. In addition to extensive trial work in the circuit, probate, recorder's, traffic and common pleas courts in Detroit and Wayne County, Miller has handled legal mat-

ters for his clients before the Board of Immigration Appeals, Board of Army Contract Appeals, bankruptcy referees, Securities and Exchange Commission, tax court, Interstate Commerce Commission and appellate courts. He has handled civil and criminal matters in the federal courts of Michigan, Illinois and New York.

Despite the demanding hours of his law practice, Miller has also been active in community affairs in Detroit. He served as president of the parent and teachers organization of Edison Grammar School and was twice elected as a trustee of his church, Northwest Presbyterian Church. In the latter capacity, he handled such church affairs as financing the purchase of a new home for the pastor and issuance of bonds for financing a church addition.

He also is a member of the State Bar of Michigan, Detroit Bar Association and American Bar Association, and he was co-editor of the "Michigan Practices and Procedure Handbook." In the legal profession, he has served on the federal court committee, public relations committee, bar poll committee and special activities committee of the Detroit Bar Association.

Mr. Miller is the father of four sons, ages two, seven, eight and 14. His eldest son is now a high school student at Tawas Area School. He has two younger brothers who also are natives of the Tawas area. They are Charles and Kenneth Miller, both of whom now reside in Detroit.

In announcing his candidacy for circuit judge, Miller pointed out

Circuit Court Hearing in December—

Discussion Held on Tawas Lake Level

Some 44 persons attended a public discussion on the establishment of the legal level of Tawas Lake last Thursday night at the East Tawas Community Building. The meeting was conducted by Hathaway J. Hanes, in charge of engineering and architecture for the Michigan Department of Conservation.

The Tawas Lake Property Owners Association recently petitioned the Isosco County Circuit Court to establish a legal level of the lake and a hearing is to be held Tuesday, December 2, before Judge Herman Dehnke.

The property owners association proposes to construct a dam near the headwaters of Tawas River in order to maintain a normal level of the lake. At present, Tawas Lake is at its lowest recorded level.

First to speak during the meeting was Paul Harvey, who acted as the association's attorney until his appointment as assistant Isosco County prosecutor. He said that there had been a good deal of confusion among some persons as to what would take place at the circuit court hearing.

Said Mr. Harvey, "From a legal standpoint, the hearing is being held only to establish a normal level to be determined by Judge Dehnke. The petition from the property owners asked for a dam, engineering and establishment of an assessment district, but these problems are not related to the court at this time. It will be concerned only with what is, and what should be, the normal level of Tawas Lake."

Mr. Hanes told the group that the conservation department had conducted a survey at Tawas Lake in 1944, dealing with the problem of floods, and obtained beach profiles to show, elevation-wise, what raising the lake level would do to the surrounding property.

"We are almost at a stage now where the work we did some years ago will do some good for you," he said. "The position of the department is entirely unbiased, we operate according to the law and are responsible for obtaining engineering on such a project for the court."

"If the dam is constructed correctly, it should be built correctly, it should take care of any flood problem on Tawas Lake and the Tawas River," said Hanes.

"We know that this would be a problem one of these days, and in past years we sat down and compiled data on several lakes in Michigan," he said.

In answer to a question raised as to whether the dam would lower the level of Tawas River, Hanes said that the construction of a dam is comparable to pouring two gallons of water into a one-half gallon sauce pan. The pan still holds only one-half gallon after the water goes through.

"If any problem exists with the river or drainage, or if such a structure will affect people some distance away, it will have to be determined by the court," said Hanes.

It is proposed that the legal level of the 1,600 acre lake be set at 533.33 feet above the mean sea level at New York. This would

indicate that if such a figure was adopted by the court, the proposed dam would raise the water about 20 inches above the present lake level.

Hanes said that the highest recorded level of Tawas Lake came in April 1952 when it reached a point of 586 feet above mean tide. Lowest level was recorded September 4, 1951, when it dropped to 581.77 feet. However, the gauge set in the lake by the conservation department is now on dry land, as the water receded from its banks during the past few years.

Carl B. Babcock, who has been active in the dam project, said

Screaming fire sirens last Saturday night announced that "Old Man Gloom" had finally been captured in the Tawas. He met his doom at the hands of deputized members of the Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee, who were charged with the responsibility of tracking him down.

All a publicity stunt of the winter sports committee, the capture of "Old Man Gloom" created quite a bit of excitement in the Tawas. He "escaped" capture in Tawas City and was finally cornered in East Tawas.

Shot down by Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell, using a blank cartridge pistol, the Tawas "most wanted enemy" was carted off to a funeral pyre aboard an old time hearse. Not having any horses at their disposal, members of the committee furnished their own horse power.

A spokesman for the committee said that it is hoped that the gloomy attitude of some businessmen will leave them, now that "Old Man Gloom" has been eliminated.

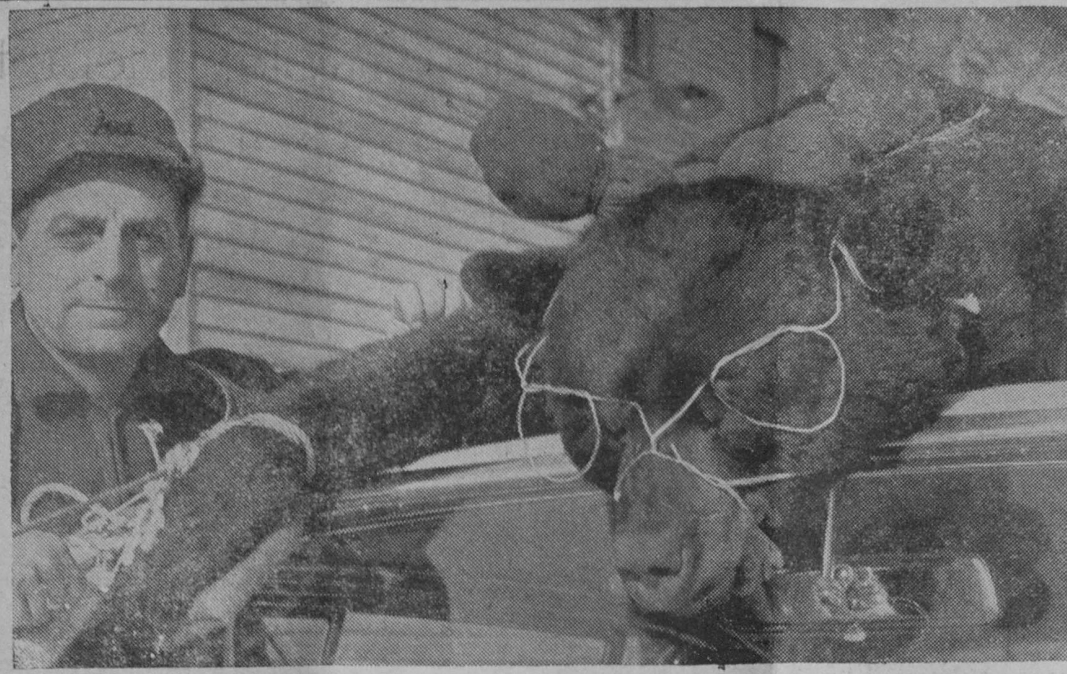

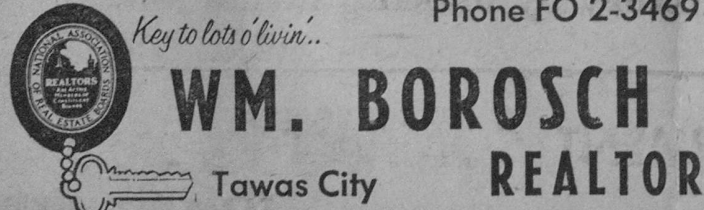

First Tuesdays is the time selected by women in our new extension group located along North US-23. We are pleased to have them in our extension family, too. Possibly you read in last week's paper about one of their meetings. They are planning for about 15 members.

On Tuesday, December 2, this group will meet again and we plan to teach them how to make a Christmas greens wreath. The meeting will be at the home of Mrs. Henry Slykhouse and they will welcome anyone from other new groups who wants to learn about wreaths.

It would be a good idea, though, for those planning to make wreaths to let it be known (call me or Mrs. Slykhouse). That is so we will be sure to have enough wreath rings and wire.

You will want to bring your own greens, cones and a pair of old shears for cutting wire and greens.

Our new extension women's group in the Tawas Trailer Park has been having weekly morning get-togethers for several weeks. They have also added some members who do not live right in the park and have 12 members altogether.

Two weeks ago I met with them and we started the discussion on property rights. We plan to finish it this week.

In Tawas City a new group is also being formed. There are about 12 members now and they are working on Swedish embroidery for Christmas gifts.

We hope to have names for these groups before long, as soon as someone makes a suggestion that meets with everyone's approval. They will be naming officers and leaders, too.

Left-over Thanksgiving turkey is fine for salad. Simply dice the meat and add it to a tossed vegetable salad.

I have visited with several women who are already using the holiday foods recipes Mrs. Ruth Hunsberger offered at our November 7 meeting. The recipe exchange among the women who attended the meeting is being compiled and mimeographed. Everyone who was at the meeting will receive a copy.

It is time to start our holiday baking, beginning with those foods which need to "age" or "ripen" before they are ready to eat.

Now we can offer you a copy of the bulletin, "Arranging Flowers." You will remember we did not have enough for everyone at the time Dr. Fred Widmoyer taught the lesson in September because it was out of stock.

A new printing has just been made. We will be happy to supply bulletins to all who ask for them.

Glazed cranberry garnish is attractive and tasty when used with a variety of familiar dishes. Maybe you have not thought about using cranberries in this way. Here is one example. Prepare squash for serving. Heap it onto a hot serving plate. Now, garnish this with whole, glazed cranberries. Bright yellow and red, a small amount of one with larger amount of the other, makes a most attractive dish for your special dinner. You will think of other combinations.

To keep the berries whole, cook two cups of them in one cup of water and one cup of sugar until tender, about 10 minutes.

In plentiful supply, and most economical, are English walnuts, pecans and filberts. These will be your best buys for holiday cooking and eating.

Some 'Tips' for Better Baked Cookies

Here are a few hints that will make Christmas cookie baking a lot easier.

First of all, prepared mixes are only slightly more expensive than "starting from scratch" but are great time-savers!

Fancy, thin cookies tend to lose their shapes in transferring them from cutting board to baking sheet. So, roll the dough directly on a greased and lightly floured cookie sheet, cut desired shapes and remove surplus.

If you wish to hang decorative cookies on the tree, press a small navy bean into the top of the cookie for a loop hole. . . remove after baking.

Colored bead candies will adhere perfectly to cookie surfaces if rolled-out cookies are brushed with a pastry brush dipped sparingly in cold water.

To flatten drop cookies, cover bottom of glass with damp white cloth and use to press down cookies.

Here's to good eating and easy bakin'!

that stakes showing the proposed 583.33 lake level have been set at Cliff's Landing, Grove's Landing, Dimmick Subdivision and at Schill Road.

"It is proposed that the dam be paid for by the people who will benefit from it," said Babcock.

Babcock said that the cost of the proposed dam, based on conserva-tion department finds, would be between \$14,000 and \$18,000. "The taxpayers would have the last say on whether the dam would be con-structed, should the court estab-lish a legal lake level," he said.

"If the court holds that the cost of maintaining the lake level is prohibitive, there will be no dam," said Babcock.

Mr. Hanes said that a conserva-tion department engineer would be at the hearing to answer ques-tions which might be raised by the court December 2.

An informal discussion on tech-nical points which might arise through construction of a dam was held following the general meeting. It was learned that west and north-side property owners seek a lower level than the 583.33 level, maintaining that the some-what level would flood some of their property.
