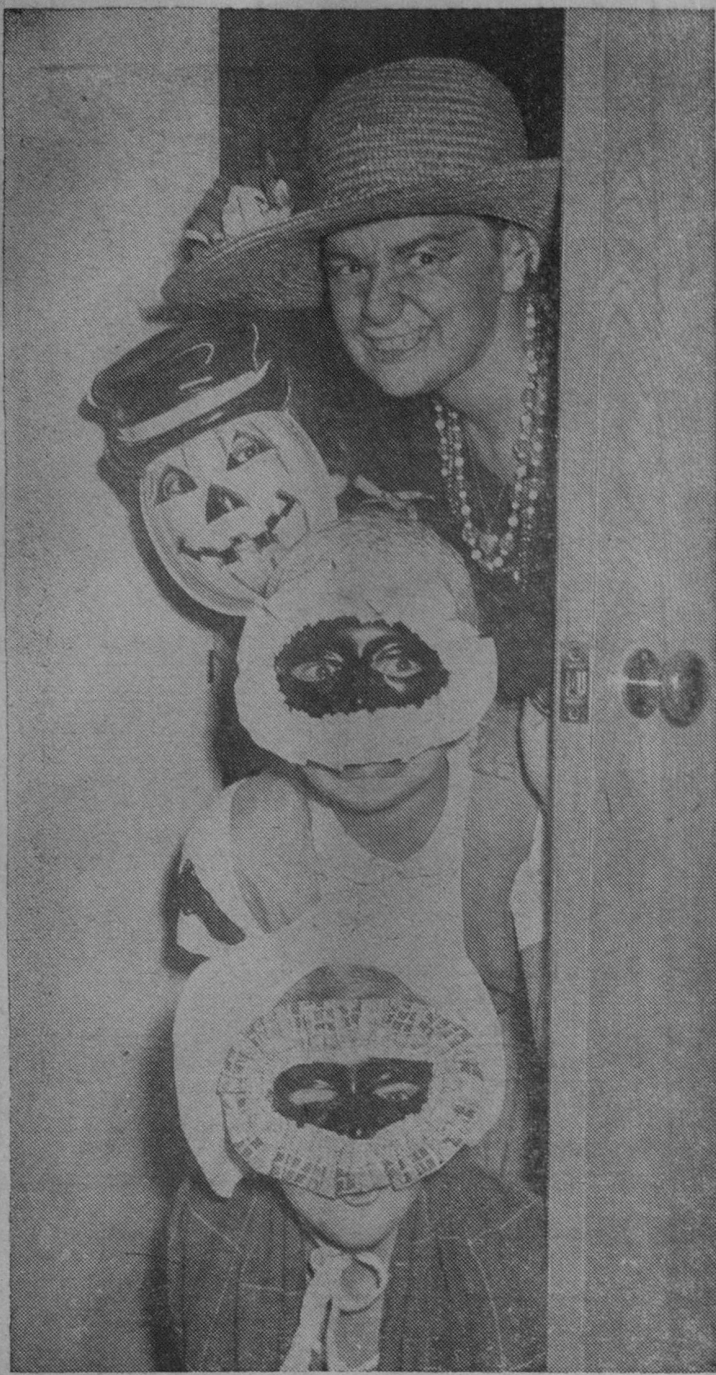

## 'Spooks' and 'Goblins' Will Roam Friday Eve

Ghosts and goblins will prowling Friday night as Halloween parties for youngsters are planned at schools throughout the county. In two Isoco County communities, children dressed in Halloween garb will be ringing door bells as ambassadors of goodwill for UNICEF, the United Nations Children's Fund.

A hoop contest for youngsters of all ages will be featured entertainment at a party to be held at the Tawas City gymnasium, sponsored by the Twentieth Century Club and Tawas City Businessmen's Association.

Doors will open at 6:30 o'clock with the four groups being entertained. Three years through kindergarten, first grade through third, fourth and fifth grades, and the sixth, seventh and eighth grades.

At Whittemore and East Tawas, ghosts and goblins will be trick or treating for pennies, nickels and dimes to help the children's fund provide medicine and food to millions of sick and hungry children all over the world.

All of the children—trick or treating for UNICEF will be wearing orange and black identification tags and carrying a UNICEF-labeled milk carton. Only one call will be made at each house.

"Your coin in a UNICEF container will be tripled—each country receiving this aid matches the contributions two to one. One dime will provide 50 large glasses of milk or enough vaccine to protect 10 children from TB or enough penicillin to cure two children of yaws, a crippling tropical disease," Mrs. Dwight A. Lawson, chairman of the Whittemore town committee, advises.

Whittemore's participation in the UNICEF program is being sponsored by all the civic, fraternal and religious organizations.

At East Tawas, youngsters will trick or treat for UNICEF between 6:30 and 7:30 o'clock. This

program is being sponsored by the East Tawas Methodist Church, Assembly of God Church and Grace Lutheran Church.

The Whittemore Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a Halloween party for youngsters through the eighth grade from 7 to 8 o'clock.

At Hale, youngsters will be entertained with a community parade and party at the school gymnasium. There will be prizes, games, food and fun for all. The Hale Parent-Teacher Association and Hale Chamber of Commerce invite one and all for an evening of "spooky fun."

## Spirited Campaigning Features Fall Election

Spirited campaigning by the two major political parties in Michigan is noted this week as time draws near for the November general election. Voters will go to the polls on Tuesday, November 4, to make their choice for state and county officers; decide on whether or not to call a constitutional convention, and vote on local propositions.

Campaigning by both parties at the state and local level has created an unusual interest in this second year election, or "in between presidential" vote.

Standard bearers for the two political parties in Michigan, Democratic Incumbent Governor G. Mennen Williams and Republican Paul Bagwell, have been in a knock 'em down fight for headlines for months. Both men have toured the state far and wide to further their cause and lend a hand to political running mates.

As a means of encouraging everyone to get out and vote, the Tawas Junior Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with Standard Oil Dealers, will furnish free transportation to the polls to anyone so desiring. Telephone Forest 2-3832 to make arrangements. Headquarters will be at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office. Baby-sitting service will be provided.

This campaign spirit has seemed to reach the local level in recent weeks and drew to a pre-election peak Monday when county candidates from both tickets, along with other district candidates, met at Whittemore for a joint political rally. There, the candidates had their say before a crowd of some 400 or more high school students from Whittemore-Prescott Area and Hale Area Schools.

While the politicians beamed their approval, the youngsters paraded about bearing party banners of their choice and later heard both sides of political issues from the candidates.

Taking a look at the ballot which voters will receive next Tuesday, candidates for state offices are listed on the top one-third of the sheet. Besides the aforementioned race between Williams and Bagwell, other contests are as follows: John B. Swainson, Democrat, will oppose Republican Donald A. Brown for lieutenant governor; James M. Hare, Democratic incumbent, will face Raymond A. Plank, Republican candidate for secretary of state; Paul L. Adams, Democratic incumbent attorney general, will oppose Jason L. Honigman, Republican; Sanford A. Brown, Democratic incumbent, will face Allan G. Weatherwax, Republican candidate for state treasurer, and Frank S. Szymanski, Democratic incumbent auditor general.

## Dies from Self Inflicted Wound

Earl Beaushaw, 59, of 512 West Bay Street, East Tawas, died shortly after 8:00 a. m. Wednesday of a self-inflicted gunshot wound. Investigation was conducted by Michigan State Police, Isoco Sheriff's Department and Coroner E. John Moffatt.

Police said that the victim had died instantly from a 30-30 caliber rifle slug which penetrated his chest. A suicide note was found near the body in a utility room. The victim's wife, Ida, was asleep in bed at the time.

will be pitted against John V. Clements, Republican.

Next in line will be the interesting race for United States senator. Incumbent Charles E. Potter, Republican, will face up-and-coming Philip A. Hart, present Democratic lieutenant governor.

Elford A. Coderberg, popular Republican incumbent congressman from the 10th district, will face Daniel E. Reed on the Democratic ticket.

In the state legislature, Charles T. Prescott of Prescott, incumbent Republican state senator from the 28th district, will face Lawrence J. Raymond of Standish, Democratic candidate. In the race for state representative in the Alpena District has Republican incumbent James P. Mielock of Whittemore opposing Henry Oates of Alabaster.

Republican officers who are running without opposition are: Paul Harvey, prosecuting attorney; E. John Moffatt and E. D. Jacques, coroners; Carl R. Small, county surveyor.

Besides voting on the question

of holding a constitutional convention, all county voters will receive a third ballot. This proposal asks the question: "Shall the board of supervisors return to the electorate of Isoco County the right to elect members of the County Road Commission of Isoco County?" It requires a yes or no vote.

In addition, voters in Sherman Township will receive a fourth ballot. This one will ask voters to approve 3½ mills for fire protection. The township hopes to purchase fire-fighting equipment with the additional tax money.

## Arrest of Three Youths Solves Recent B and E's

A number of cabin breaking and enterings in the Chapel Lake area were solved last week with the arrest of three youths by sheriff's department officers.

Arrested were Harold D. Tipkey, 17, and a 16-year-old youth, both of Tawas City, and a 15-year-old Mt. Pleasant youth. Jurisdiction over the latter two boys was waived by the probate court and all three were bound over to circuit court after appearing before Justice A. J. Goulet.

Tipkey and the 16-year-old youth were arrested Wednesday after they had stolen a car Monday at Brooks Auto Parts. Upon questioning by officers, they admitted four

breaking and enterings which took place last August. Tipkey implicated the 15-year-old and a 14-year-old boy on two other cabin enterings. The latter was not held.

## TC Sewer Bond Election Planned for Early 1959

Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, law firm of Detroit, was authorized by the Tawas City Water Board and Council last week to prepare proper resolutions and other legal work so that Tawas City may hold its general obligation bond election to finance additions to the sewage treatment plant.

It is expected that a special election will be held for this purpose in January or February of 1959. The bond issue would be for \$130,000.

An election was to have been held on November 4, but because of the time necessary to prepare the legal work, it was called off. Tawas City has filed for federal

assistance in this construction, but it will not be known until Friday of this week whether or not it will qualify.

## Chamber of Commerce Needs Money--

## Make Final Appeal for Dues

At last Wednesday night's meeting of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, the board of directors announced that a letter would be sent to all unpaid members as a last appeal for dues.

It was reported that only 120 members have paid their 1958 dues, this total amounting to \$3,703.50. On hand at the present time in the treasury is \$426.01 and outstanding bills amount to \$846.

Membership in the organization has fluctuated considerably during the past seven years. The board noted that in 1952, 225 members paid dues of \$5.215. In 1953, 190 members paid \$4.857; 224 members paid

\$5.877 in 1954; in 1955, 169 members paid \$5.244; in 1956, 168 members paid \$5.201; in 1957, 188 members paid \$5.581.

The trend in membership has been on the downward during this period, in spite of the fact that in only two years have dues dropped below \$5.000.

Another problem confronting the chamber of commerce is a lack of interest shown in attending meetings of the board of directors. Since June a quorum has been present at only one meeting.

In other business, both businessmen's associations of the Tawas area will be asked to select seven candidates from each

city to make up the ballot for the November election of directors for 1959.

A report on the recent "African Adventure" movie by Ebb Warren indicated that it was not a financial success. Although those present were well pleased with the movie, gate receipts amounted to \$172 and expenditures totaled \$200.

A letter from "Official Michigan" magazine stated that this publication was preparing an article for its pages concerning Tawas' solicitation of conventions.

Milton Kotcher was named to succeed the late Alfred W. Mason as a director from Tawas City.

## U of M Official to be Kiwanis Speaker

## POINT OF NO RETURN?

Has the Tawas Chamber of Commerce reached the point of no return? This question is being asked this week by those who take an active part in the organization.

At last week's meeting of the board of directors, discussion centered around the probability of closing the chamber office because of financial problems.

In a nutshell, the main problem is this: There are only 120 members who have paid dues to date; there is a definite lack of interest shown by the membership and board of directors in maintaining an active chamber organization.

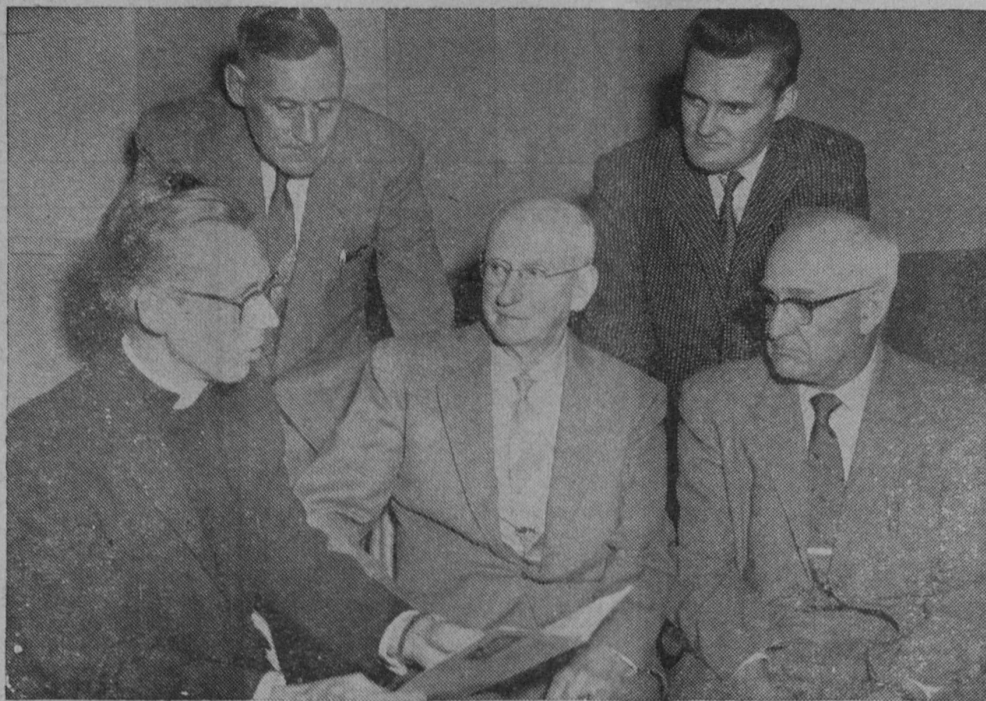
Now, this newspaper is not going to go into a tirade on why Tawas needs a chamber of commerce . . . and an active one. The membership, which consists mainly of businessmen, knows the importance of maintaining this community's public relations "arm." Activity on the part of the chamber is partly responsible for putting money in the pockets of businessmen through increased tourist trade; inactivity on the part of the organization can do just the opposite.

To date, there are 120 members who have paid dues totaling \$3,703. This is about \$1,000 short of the funds necessary to operate through next March. If the money is not forthcoming, the chamber office will be closed.

Although it is often said that there are just too many organizations and activities in which to participate in the Tawas area, this fact (or fallacy) should not apply to the chamber. It is just too important to let it die out for want of active interest and financial help.

This newspaper recommends that unpaid members dig down in their jeans and remit dues to the chamber of commerce at once. It may be too late if they wait any longer.

It is also recommended that as many businessmen as possible attend the next meeting of the board of directors to add their ideas on how to assist the organization.

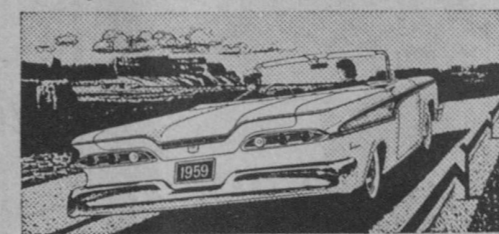

On Thursday, November 6, at Logan Township Hall (five miles west of M-55—M-65 junction on M-55) Dr. Arthur Mauch of Michigan State University will tell us about "Your Products and Dollars Abroad." If you or your neighbors are interested in attending, let me hear from you so we can let the luncheon committee know how many are coming.

Social security tax rates will go up on January 1, 1959, but so will benefits, according to Everett M. Elwood, extension farm manager specialist at Michigan State University.

Employer and employee rates will be 2½ percent each. Rates for self-employed persons will be 3½ percent. Also beginning with the first of the coming year, earnings up to \$4,800 will count toward social security benefits.

Other changes have been made that you farm people will want to check. Among these is an amendment that will allow certain dependents of disabled workers to become eligible for benefits.

Work requirements for disabled people over 50 have been liberalized. Previously, these persons needed to meet two requirements: Must have worked under social security for at least five out of the last 10 years before becoming disabled and at least 1½ years of their work under social security must have been during the three years just before they became disabled. This second requirement has now been removed.

Disabled workers whose social security disability benefits were reduced or were not payable because they received workmen's compensation or other federal disability payments are now eligible for a full payment.

More complete details about the changes in the social security program may be obtained from the social security representatives that are in the Federal Building

the second and fourth Thursday of each month.

Although many changes were made in the federal income tax law this year, only a few of these changes affect farmers.

Two changes that Mr. Elwood labels "of particular interest" to farmers are increased first year depreciation and an increase in loss carry-over period.

A farm business can now elect to write off 20 percent of the cost of tangible personal property in the year it was purchased. This 20 percent is in addition to the regular depreciation on the balance. It also applies to used as well as new property acquired after December 31, 1957, for use in the business.

This 20 percent depreciation is limited to tangible personal property subject to depreciation and costing not more than \$10,000 (or \$20,000 on a joint return), with a remaining useful life of at least six years. Property obtained from relatives does not qualify. The extra 20 percent depreciation is computed without taking in account the salvage value.

The second change permits a net operating loss to be carried back three years and forward five years. This change begins with 1959. Before, net operating losses could only be carried back two years and forward five years.

More details on these and other changes will be available in a farmers' tax guide that should be on hand in our office by November 15.

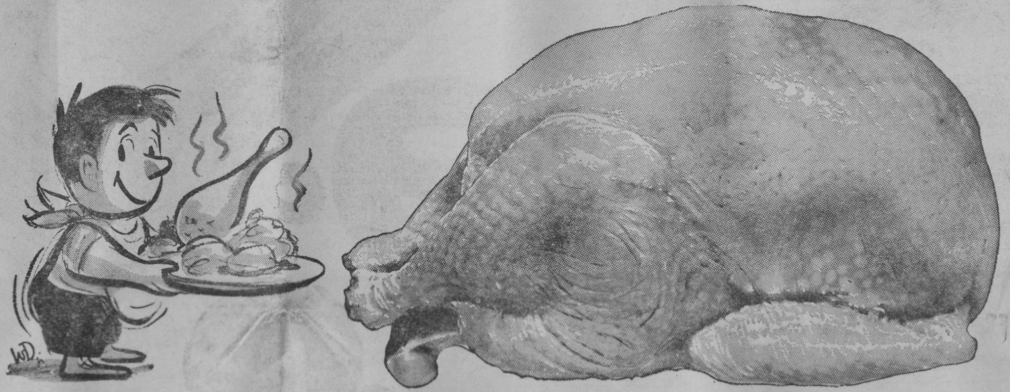

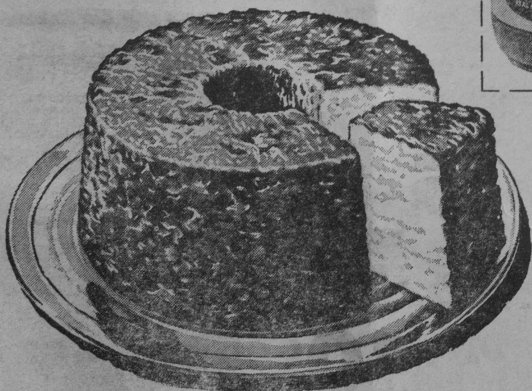

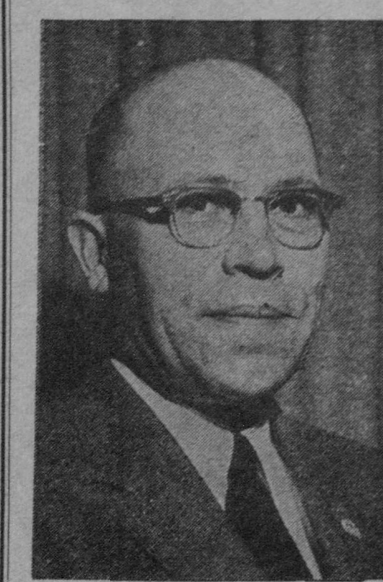

It is our recommendation that this board urgently petition the conservation commission to establish a headquarters in this county, on land which they now own on M-55 or elsewhere as they desire, have a telephone there to give 24-hour service to complaints and to substantially increase the enforcement work in this county. Such a headquarters could also centralize the other conservation department activities, particularly housing the fire fighting equipment, incidentally making this more effective also by having satisfactory telephone service.

Mailing Period for Overseas Packages Set by Post Office

The period November 1 to November 20 has been designated by the post office department for the mailing of Christmas parcels to members of armed forces overseas. The term includes personnel of the armed forces, members of their families and authorized United States civilians employed overseas, who receive their mail through an APO.

Time of mailing for parcels is as follows: Surface mails, November 1 to November 20; airmail, December 1 to December 10. Maximum weight for parcels is 70 pounds, except that a limit not to exceed 50 pounds applies to certain overseas destinations addressed through New York.

Domestic rates of postage are applicable and postage must be fully prepaid. When fourth-class parcel post rates are applicable, the zone rates from post office where mailed to the post office through which the parcel is addressed will be charged. Air mail weighing not to exceed eight ounces is chargeable at the rate of seven cents per ounce and those articles weighing over eight ounces are chargeable at the rate of 80 cents a pound.

Complete instructions for preparation of parcels and addressing may be obtained at the Tawas City post office.

Blue Cross Completes Record Ad Campaign

Using state-wide advertising media, Michigan Blue Cross-Blue Shield has completed a record two-week campaign for non-group hospital and medical subscribers. State law limits enrollment in non-group health plans to two weeks, but the advertising drew a record 33,067 inquiries.

Announcing the results, Louis Graff, director of public relations and advertising for Michigan Blue Cross-Blue Shield, said: "This is the first time in the history of our state-wide non-group campaign that both total inquiries and also newspaper-radio returns have increased substantially."

Advertising expenditures this year were approximately the same as for 1957, but the results were nearly doubled. Newspaper-radio returns alone accounted for 12,078 inquiries this year, compared with 6,471 last year. Total inquiries from all advertising in 1958 amounted to 33,067, compared with 18,249 last year. Mr. Graff attributed the results, in part, to over-all Axiological or "human value," advertising which began last February.
