Tawas Man Tells of Adventures

A discussion about canoe racing in Michigan the other day started Joseph Pfeiffer of Tawas City reminiscing about his experiences in the Canadian far north country some 50 years ago. Pfeiffer, a retired Tawas City sawmill operator, recalled that when he and his partner prospected and trapped in the Canadian Northwest Territory he spent nearly seven years traveling by canoe. "I got enough canoeing to last me the rest of my life," he said, recounting the endless days of paddling on the Porcupine, Peel, Mackenzie and Arctic Red Rivers in an adventurous search for furs and gold. He has never been in a canoe since.

Back in 1905, "Joe" left Tawas City when only 17 years old for Northwestern Canada. There, his first job was on a Canadian Pacific Railway section crew near Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. He and a 28-year-old surveying engineer, James Gartley, who was from Edinburgh, Scotland, decided that they had had enough of railroading and left for a life of adventure in the Far North.

Moving on to Edmonton, Alberta, they outfitted for a prospecting and trapping expedition. From Athabasca Landing, northwest of Edmonton where they purchased a canoe, they made their way down the Athabasca River to Lake Athabasca, following the shore line to Fort Chipewyan. On down the Slave River and Great Slave Lake to Fort Resolution and Fort Providence, and thence into the broad Mackenzie River, traveled the two young adventurers.

The first winter that Gartley and Joe spent in the sub-Arctic was a tough one for the two young tenderfeet. Temperatures ranged down to 62 degrees below zero and, during the winter of 1907, it started to snow in November and kept it up straight through until April. "We darned near froze to death during our first winter," he said. "We were inexperienced and built a cabin which gave little protection against the intense cold. The next winter, however, we sodded the roof of the cabin and we kept warm and comfortable." The pair finally reached Fort Good Hope, near the Arctic Circle, a trip which took nearly three years of paddling and trapping after leaving Fort Providence. Pushing into the Mackenzie Mountains, the men reached the Peel River. It was while Pfeiffer and Gartley were prospecting along the Peel that they chanced across a rich gold "pocket" near a small waterfall with a seven-foot drop. "Jim and I started panning the mud and gravel at the base of the falls and we soon realized that we had struck a miniature bonanza. The first year, our take from that little pool was over \$1,700 in nuggets. We searched upstream, but we failed to locate the vein which had been the source of our placer gold. The gold had probably been washed down the stream for a thousand years. "The next summer we returned to the little falls and recovered \$1,500 worth of gold, but, after that, our yearly takes of nuggets from the pool grew less and less. "Old Crow on the Porcupine River near the Yukon-Alaska border was the farthest north-west point we reached in our roamings. We bought some supplies there, but we were rather leary about staying too long because a Northwest Mounted Police post was located in town. We didn't have a prospecting license and never registered a claim and the Canadian government took a dim view of such things. "We sold our furs—beaver, mink, martin and fox—in Hudson Bay Company's posts at Fort McPherson and Fort Good Hope and got our supplies at these trading posts. We paid our debts with the gold which we panned from the Peel." On their return up the Peel (See ADVENTURES, page 12.)

Bids Opened Monday Night at Joint Meeting—

Low Bid by B. H. Sargent Accepted

Low bid of \$111,620.15 by B. H. Sargent, Incorporated, West Branch, was accepted at a joint meeting of the Tawas City Council and water board Monday night for constructing additions to the city's sewage treatment plant and a lift station on Spring Street.

Also accepted at the joint meeting was the low bid of E. W. Haft and Sons for two pumps to be installed at the Second Avenue lift station.

Among the bidders on the first project, besides the successful bidder, were: Archie Shufelt, Incorporated, Hillsdale, with a bid of \$134,972; Gay Brothers Construction Company, Pontiac, \$133,980; Reed and Noyse Construction Company, Lansing, \$127,381.66; Wallace Construction Company, Farmington, \$117,574.

Contractors submitted two independent bids, one for the treatment plant additions and the other for the new lift station. In each case, Sargent proved to be the low bidder. Bids were to be honored for 60 days.

Clifford Spicer of Saginaw, city engineer, told the council that he had estimated the project at \$112,000 when it was first considered last year. He said that the construction outlook for the summer looked very promising with such active bidding.

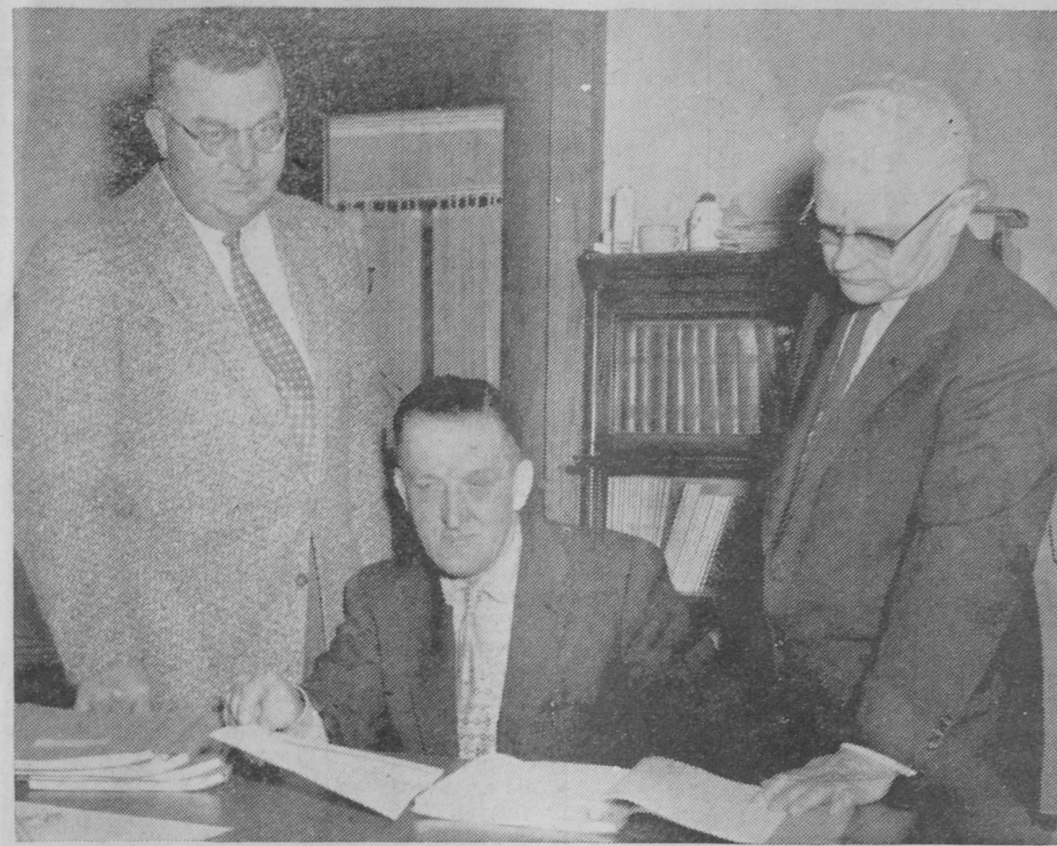
A proposal to sell \$130,000 worth of general obligation bonds for the project, which Tawas City voters approved at the February election, is now in the hands of the Municipal Finance Commission. It is expected that construction will start in June.

The amount of time which is required to clear the bond issue by this state agency and date of actual sale of bonds will determine the starting time for the project. Sargent's contract calls for a completion date within 180 days from the start of construction.

Only foreseeable delay in the clearing of the bond issue might develop in Lansing, where the state legislature and the finance commission are at odds over the commission's budget for the next fiscal year.

Tawas City, which has been urged by the state health department to make these improvements to its sewer disposal system because of its growth, took the initiative toward starting construction. It authorized Sargent Construction Company to order the new chlorinator for the disposal system and install it at the old plant before May 15. When the new addition is completed on the treatment plant, it will be transferred there.

Included in the construction will be enlarging the treatment plant, to include installation of a new settling tank, additional

sludge drying beds, a chlorine contact tank, new chlorinator and a building to house a laboratory and meter equipment.

The new lift station on Spring Street will serve the Burrell and Zaharias subdivisions.

Bids on construction of 4,587 feet of sewer mains to serve the two subdivisions and the Herman Fahsel property are to be advertised this week, with opening of bids set for June 1.

B. H. Sargent, who attended the meeting, said his firm had done some construction in this area, which included installation of

several pumps in Tawas City lift stations and constructed a sewer line in East Tawas. The firm has built treatment plants at Pinconning, Standish, St. Louis, Boyne City and Big Rapids.

During the meeting of the water board, Frank Ahonen submitted plans for sewer and water construction for the new Emanuel Lutheran School. These were approved and are to be submitted to the state health department for approval.

'Harbingers of Spring'—Garden Club Plans Flower Show

"Harbingers of Spring" is the title of the spring flower show being planned by Tawas City Garden Club. The show will be held Saturday, May 23, at Tawas Area School. Doors will be open from 2:00 to 9:00 p. m. and the public is cordially invited.

The show has been divided in four parts: Section A, arrangements; section B, horticultural; section C, potted plants, and section D, junior division.

Under arrangements are 14 different classes:

1. Arrangement of daffodils.
2. Composition using birds.
3. Arrangement of tulips.
4. Arrangement by a man.
5. A miniature arrangement not to exceed four inches.
6. Mixed bouquet.
7. Arrangement using driftwood, foliage, flowers; dried material permitted.
8. Arrangement of lilacs.

9. An all green arrangement.
10. Wild flowers in basket.
11. An all white arrangement.
12. Arrangement of pansies.
13. Arrangement of geraniums.
14. Unclassified.

Flowers used in arrangement classes need not be grown by the exhibitor.

The horticultural division will include the following flowers:

- Tulips, Leucorum, (snowflakes), daffodils, narcissus, hyacinths, lilies of the valley, Muscari, scilla or squill, any unscheduled bulb, iris, pansies, violas, violets, alyssum, dianthus, primula, myosotis, Arabis, peonies, any unscheduled bloom, flowering shrubs, flowering trees, display of forced branches.

All horticultural specimens must be grown by exhibitor. All classes are open to the public and all entries are free.

First Freighter Delayed at Port Gypsum

National Gypsum Company announced early this week that the first Great Lakes freighter which was scheduled to dock Wednesday morning at its new Port Gypsum installation has been delayed. A company spokesman said that the exact date of arrival was not known, but that it would be here shortly.

When the ship does dock, it will be the first lake freighter to load gypsum ore from National's recently-opened quarry in Grant Township.

It was not reported whether the 525-foot self-unloading carrier, Fred A. Manske of the Boland and Cornelius Line, would be the first ship to dock at the installation. According to last week's announcement, this ship was to have docked here Wednesday.

New Generation's First Building Project—

Break Ground for New School

With the first spadeful of sod being turned by the Rev. Leonard Newman, another step was taken toward fulfillment of a dream by Emanuel Lutheran Church for a new Christian day school in Tawas City.

"For other foundations can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ"—with these words read from First Corinthians, Pastor Newman conducted ground breaking ceremonies Sunday morning for the new school.

Members of the building committee who took part in the program were William Look Sr., chairman; Joseph Fox, John St. James, Frank Ahonen and Arnold Hosbach. Each took his turn at breaking the ground.

The impressive ceremony was attended by about 150 members of the congregation and other Tawas City residents, following the regular Sunday morning worship service.

Actual ground-breaking started Monday when Eckstein Construction Company, general contractor, started work of bringing the site to grade with bulldozers.

It is expected that the \$59,000 one-story concrete block structure will be completed in time for the start of the fall term in September.

Located west of Tawas City baseball field near the Second Avenue-North Street intersection, the new school will contain two classrooms, an office, kitchen and large multi-purpose room, the latter measuring some 66 feet long and 33 feet wide. Its ceiling will measure slightly higher than

the rest of the building, which will be 70 by 66 feet.

This new building will replace the present school building located at the corner of Second

Street and Fifth Avenue, constructed about 65 years ago. This new building project is the first undertaken by congregation members of this generation. The last

came some 57 years ago when the church parsonage was constructed. The old school building is expected to be retained for possible future use.

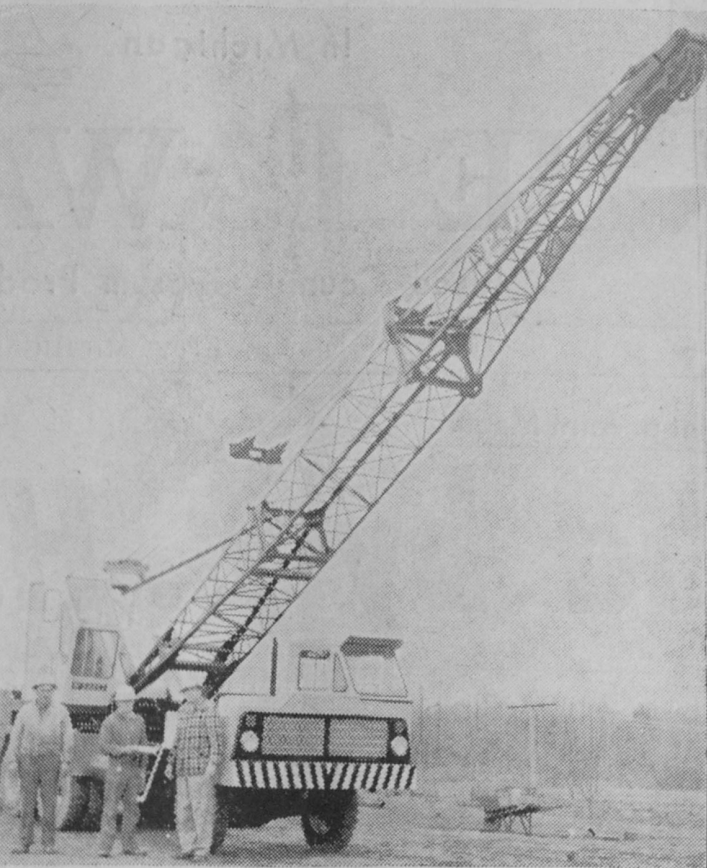

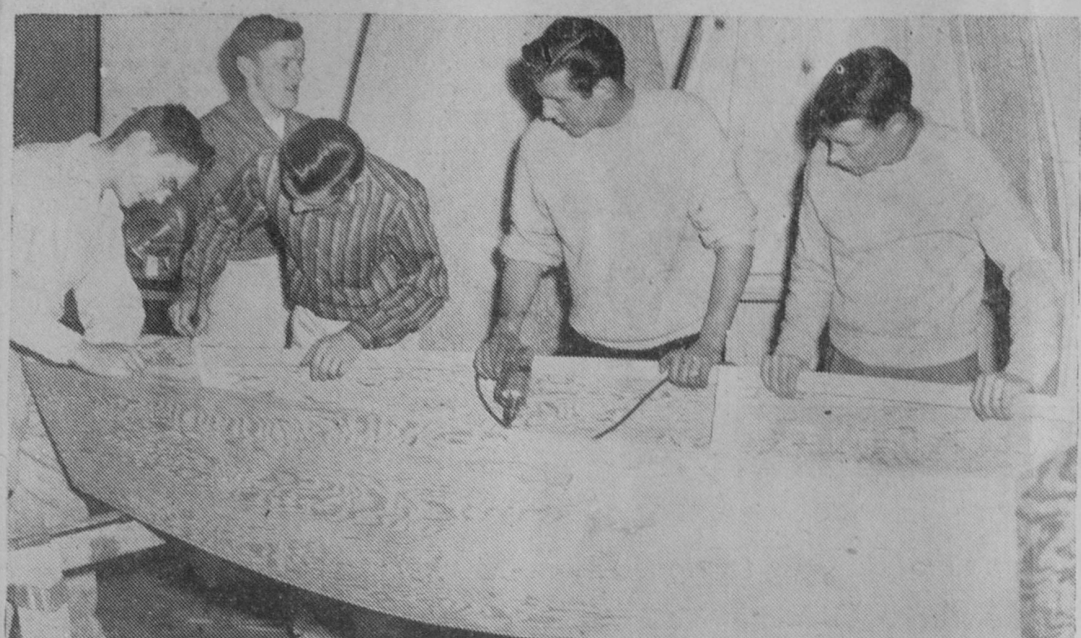

down. Hot weather and flies may also contribute to the decline.

The net result, Johnson says, is a reduced supply of feed nutrients and there must be a good supply of nutrients to maintain production.

Decide on how much supplemental feed to have available. Some years will require more than others. In general, to replace one ton of pasture grass it takes one ton of silage, 700 pounds of dry hay or 475 pounds of grain.

Nation-wide census of agriculture starts in late October and in early November of this year, according to the United States Bureau of Census. This is the 17th such census.

Thirty thousand census takers are scheduled to visit each of the nation's 4,600,000 farms, ranches and other places where livestock and poultry are kept or crops produced.

Census questions will call for three kinds of information. First, a count of farm resources such as total farms, area of farms, acres of cropland, acres for pasture, etc.; second, farm products produced and sold in 1959; and third, how many days the farmer worked off the farm, how much fertilizer and lime was used this year, how much was spent for farm labor, etc.

Bureau of census officials are suggesting that farmers keep a few simple records to assist the census takers. Records of harvest, products sold and major expenses would be valuable to both the farmer and the census taker.

Information gathered by the agricultural census is used by agricultural researchers, agricultural industries, farm organizations and by farmers, themselves, in making operating decisions.

This time of the year with graduation drawing near many young people are asking this question: "Is there a place for me in agriculture?"

Theo Coleman of the Michigan State poultry science department gives this answer. Poultry is now a four billion dollar industry. That means it must be constantly manned by able and educated personnel.

Coleman says there is a great demand for personnel to care for the industry who have some education and preferably some experience in it. Men with college training in poultry husbandry are now serving the industry in colleges and universities as teachers, research investigators, extension specialists, directors of extension and directors of experiment stations.

Here are some of the areas open to a young person. They might manage poultry farms if they do not own their own. They may serve the industry as service men engaged by feed companies, processing plants and hatcheries. They can also sell feed, equipment and other products needed by poultry raisers. Some may be engaged in research by feed manufacturers.

These are only a few of the openings for young and ambitious persons. For more information, write or visit the department of poultry science, Michigan State University, located on the South Campus in Anthony Hall, East Lansing. Opportunities in other fields of agriculture are similarly looking for qualified young men and women. I will be only too glad to discuss these possibilities with anyone interested.

Sheep raisers should be alert for signs of stiffness and weakness in ewes from now until lambing time.

That is the advice from Ralph Barner of the Michigan State University veterinary pathology department. Barner says this condition which results when the nutritional requirements of the ewe and her rapidly developing lamb exceed the nutritional intake. Prompt action by a veterinarian can often save many lambs and ewes. In the later stages of pregnancy disease, affected ewes lie with their head turned to one side, breathe rapidly, grind their teeth and may become comatose.

You may have noticed that milk production always goes up in May and June and then declines sharply in late summer. Larry Johnson of the Michigan State dairy department gives a few hints on feeding the dairy cow this summer.

In May and June the lush pasture tends to stimulate the cow to produce at her maximum. Then by July and August legumes and grasses are more mature, dry weather shortens up new pasture growth and milk production goes

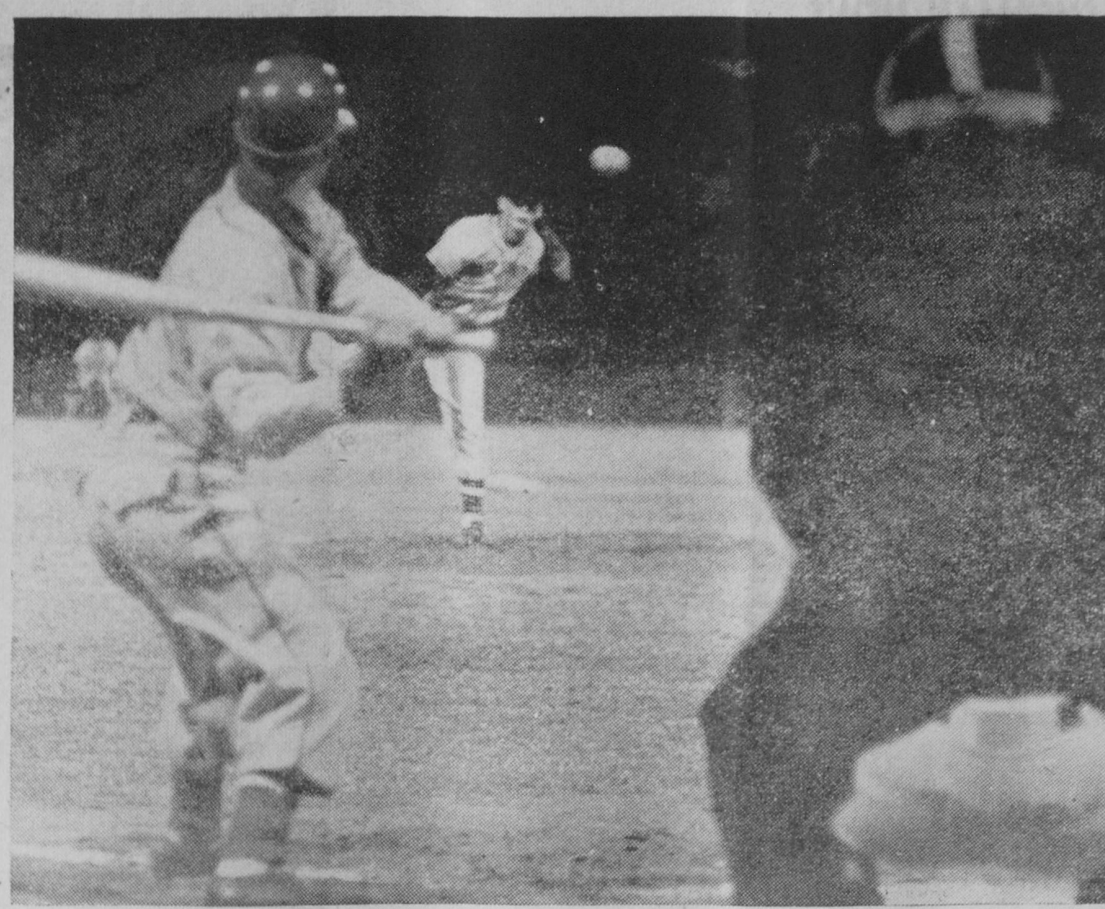

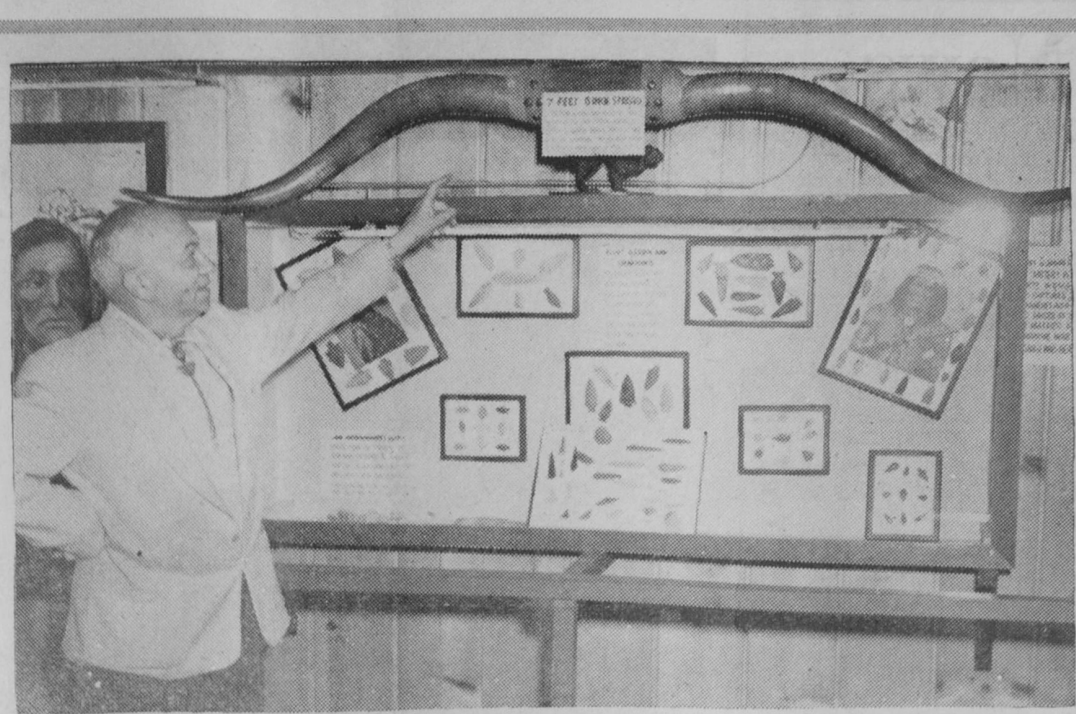

The oxen was killed in a battle when Cynthia Parker, mother of Chief Quannah Parker, was rescued from the Comanche Indians. 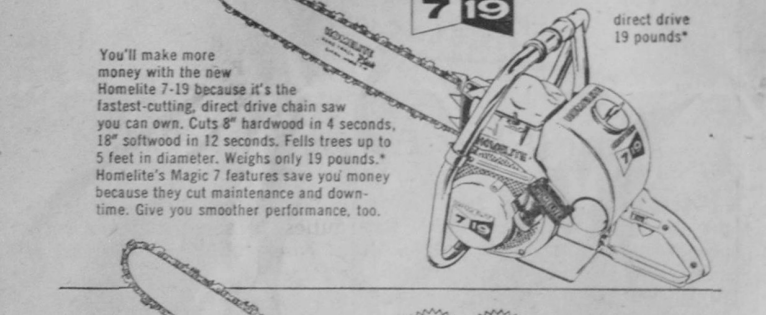

APRIL SESSION

April 14, 1959

River, their canoe hit a partially submerged rock and the two men along with all of their supplies. "We had an awful time salvaging our equipment, but, after two days of hard work, we recovered everything but an axe, a rifle and a camera.

Of the latter, Pfeiffer said that after several years of lugging all of the equipment necessary to take pictures in those days, all of their exposed glass photographic plates sank to the bottom and were never recovered.

"It was pretty lonesome up there for a boy still in his teens," said Joe. "Jim would cheer me up, but we would go for days without seeing anyone—once in a while we would see a few Indians paddling on the rivers, but there were very few other white trappers."

Some of the Indian tribes had very interesting names. "For instance, there were the Yellow Knives, Dog Tooth, Dog Rib and Katchim tribes," said Pfeiffer. "When we left to paddle back on the Mackenzie River, we turned our stone and sod hut over to the chief of the Dog Ribs."

One of the most interesting things which he recalls is the still little understood phenomenon of "Northern Lights." "At times, these beautiful sheets, spirals and shafts of light which coursed the sky were very frightening—they seemed to 'crackle' and bothered our dogs a great deal. To see such a thing is awe-inspiring."

Pfeiffer and Gartley came back to civilization in 1912. "We parted ways in Moose Jaw and I came home to Tawas City, where I found that no one recognized me after my long absence."

"I left home as a scrawny kid of 17 and returned when I was 25 years old." During those endless months and years of paddling and the hard life of a trapper, he had developed a powerful set of well-muscled shoulders and it was only natural no one would recog-

nize him after his long absence.

Joe recalled this week that he had thought of returning to the far north country on a couple of occasions many years ago. "I was all set to go one time about 1917, but, at the last minute, my partner here in Tawas City backed out. I guess that it was just as well, because it would have been pretty rough going after being away from a canoe for so long."

Now 71 years old and retired for four years, he has long since lost the powerful shoulder and arm muscles which helped to propel him and his partner on the rivers of the Canadian Northwest. Gartley died many years ago and Joe never saw him after they parted ways, "but with all the talk about the Yukon in recent years, it is nice to recall our experiences of so long ago," he said in concluding this interview.
