Adams Drops Out as Head Football Coach at Tawas Area High

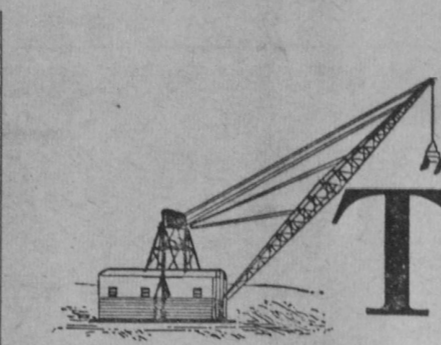
Howard Adams, faculty member of Tawas Area High School, announced Monday that he has dropped his position as head football coach at the school, effective immediately.

losco Will End 1959 in 'Black'---Treasurer

After paying all current bills and making additional appropriations to two county offices last week, County Treasurer Grace L. Miller reported Monday afternoon that it appears that losco County will finish out the year of 1959 in the "black."

Money matters were of principal concern during last Wednesday's one-day meeting of the losco County Board of Supervisors. After making additional allocations of \$1,800 and paying bills amounting to \$1,750, it was felt that the county would end the year in the "red."

However, after checking through vouchers in her office which included payment of bills and transfer of funds, Mrs. Miller said that as of Monday the county had \$285.45 in its general fund and probably would finish out the year in good order.

"The board did very well in figuring the 1959 budget so as to allow for such emergencies," said Mrs. Miller. "A special emergency appropriation fund is created each year for that purpose and even after making additional allocations last week, the county still has a balance in its general fund. I would call that good figuring on the part of the supervisors."

Much of the concern was caused over soaring welfare and direct relief costs, which called for an additional allocation of \$1,000 to the direct relief fund.

In addition to this, the board paid an advance of \$800 on next year's budget to the county superintendent's office. The superintendent of school's allocation was necessary because the state is one payment behind in its share of operation for this office. (See BUDGET, page 10.)

Daring Rescue of Tawas Man Made From Water Tank

An off-duty airman from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, and a Michigan Bell Telephone Company lineman teamed up early Saturday morning to perform one of the finest bits of rescue work ever witnessed in this area.

Credited with saving the life of Max Palace Jr., 30, Tawas City, were Herman Levi of East Tawas and A-1c Mark Blodgett of Oscoda. Palace is in Tawas Hospital receiving treatment for exposure.

Graduates from Police School at Grand Rapids

Warren M. Tanner, 21, of Tawas City was graduated Friday, December 18, after 10 weeks of police recruit training with the Grand Rapids department.

Patrolman Tanner and 16 classmates, including two new policewomen, mixed classroom sessions in investigation and police procedure with on-the-job training.

The new officers were assigned immediately to duty patrols.

Palace called to the men below to say that he was going to jump and Blodgett began the long climb up the tower. When he reached the platform around the tank he learned that Palace had climbed up another ladder and was sitting on the very peak of the water tank.

After about an hour of conversation with the despondent man, Blodgett finally coaxed Palace to go down the ladder with him.

The return trip down was much more difficult for the two men. Both Palace and Blodgett were wearing light street clothing in the near-zero weather and Palace had no gloves.

The descent to the platform proved to be the most dangerous part of the undertaking. Blodgett was forced to hold onto the belt of the other man with one hand as they inched their way over the outer edge of the bowl and down a ladder. Blodgett then returned to the ground to get assistance.

While O'Farrell and Putnam went for a 1,200-foot coil of rope, which only arrived the day before from civilian defense stock. (See RESCUE, page 10.)

losco to Honor Judge on Retirement Next Tuesday

Plans for an open house in losco County to honor Circuit Judge Herman Dehnke were finalized at a special committee meeting Monday afternoon. Judge Dehnke will retire at year's end after 32 years on the bench of the 23rd judicial circuit, which comprises losco, Alcona and Oscoda Counties.

The event will be held Tuesday, December 29, with open house in the courtroom of the county building starting at 4:00 p. m. A buffet dinner will be served at the Barnes Hotel starting at 6 o'clock.

Tickets for the buffet dinner may be obtained from any member of the losco County Board of Supervisors or at the county clerk's office.

A program is being arranged for the event by a special committee appointed last week by the board of supervisors. Representing the board are Elmer Werth, Clarence Everett and George Blust. County officers are represented on the committee by County Clerk George Prescott and Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey.

The committee said Monday that officials from Alcona and Oscoda Counties have been invited to attend the affair.

The open house and buffet dinner will give Judge and Mrs. Dehnke the opportunity to visit their many friends in losco County. Final details have not been announced for the program, but it will probably include a speaker during one of the two events.

Council Praises Work of City Attorney Miller

Tawas City Council adopted a resolution Monday night thanking Allan C. Miller for his work as city attorney during the past year. Miller's resignation became effective this week as he takes over his new position as circuit court judge on January 1.

"I have really enjoyed working with you during the past year. It was a real break for me," Mr. Miller told the council.

During Miller's tenure, he performed much of the legal work on the largest bond issue in the city's history. This was the \$130,000 bond issue passed last February for additions to the city's municipal disposal system. No successor has been named as yet by Mayor George Tuttle.

First Shipment of Voodoos at WAFB

Eight F-101B Voodoo jet fighters landed at Wurtsmith Air Force Base Friday to add further striking power to this Air Defense Command base. The supersonic jet fighters will replace F-89s (Scorpions) now being used by the 445th Fighter Interceptor Squadron.

The first Voodoo, piloted by Lt. Col. Harold L. Hill, Kauai, Hawaii, commander of the 75th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, Dow Air Force Base, Bangor, Maine, touched down at 4:15 p. m.

The last Voodoo, piloted by 1-Lt. Jack Young, Youngstown, Ohio, landed at 4:19 p. m.

The F-101B are the first to be used by an air force base in Michigan. The planes flown in from Dow Air Force Base had been used there since last July. They will be replaced by new Voodoos just built at St. Louis, Missouri.

Two more of the sleek craft ar-

rived Saturday. Others will be added later until the 445th reaches normal squadron strength.

Lt. Col. Rollin R. Bullinger, executive officer, Wurtsmith, and Lt. Col. M. C. Morphey Jr., commander of the 445th, were on hand to greet the pilots of the landing craft.

Pilots and radarmen of the 75th FIS were whisked off to the debriefing room of the 445th, which soon will be the only FI squadron left at Wurtsmith when the Strategic Air Command takes over the base next April.

The craft is 67.4 feet long, 18 feet high and has a wing span of 39.7 feet, swept back at a 35-degree angle. Voodoos are capable of in-flight refueling, using the probe-drogue system. It has the same dimensions as its sister ship, the F-101A.

The exact speed of the craft is (See VOODOOS, page 10.)

Tawas City 'Up-Dates' its Laws With Many Revisions

In a sweeping move to bring its laws up-to-date and to enact a number of new ones, the Tawas City Council approved several ordinances Monday night. One repeals some 20 antique ordinances which are hold-overs from the days when Tawas City was an unincorporated village, plus 10 ordinances which were enacted since incorporation, amended one old ordinance and enacted five new ones.

Formal adoption of the ordinances will take place at the council's first regular session in January and will become effective 30 days from the date of passage. They will be published following the January 4 meeting.

Months ago, City Attorney Allan C. Miller started work on the project at that time and only recently met with a special council committee to make final changes.

Many of the old ordinances, antiquated by today's mode of living, concerned laws relating to regulation of drays, trade boats, duties of village marshal and one provided for the "punishment of certain crimes and offenses by hard labor."

Ordinance No. 138 regulating traffic and the operation of vehicles upon the highways of the city was amended.

New ordinances to be written into the books include: No. 146, relating to grass and noxious weeds; No. 147, littering of streets and other public places;

No. 148, juvenile delinquency and matters contributing thereto (furnishing beer or misrepresentation of age); No. 149, smoke ordinance; No. 150, which provides for the regulation and licensing of peddlers, transient merchants and solicitors.

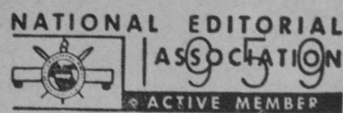
The last named ordinance is the one which started the council on its move to bring the city's ordinances up-to-date. The city had a peddler's and hawkers ordinance at the time but it had been passed in the 1890s and was couched in words and terms of that period. The city attempted to enforce the ordinance on one occasion about two years ago and a change was deemed necessary.



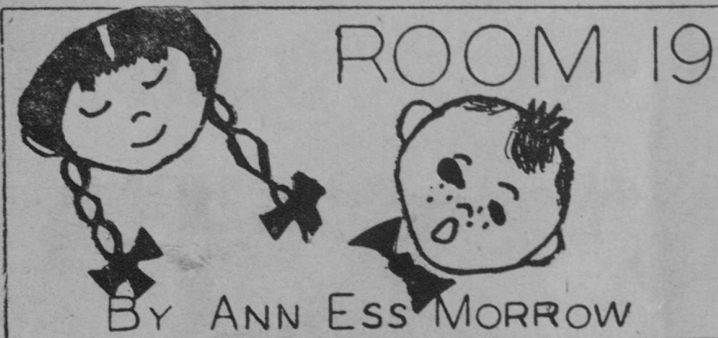

Suspense I often see at school. There is breathlessness when classes meet for the first time, when graded papers are being returned, there is gasping when new plans are told and when vacations start.

I saw it yesterday. Boys and girls with tinsel in their eyes and thoughts and unwrapped gifts in hand, turned happily toward home, in joyous waiting for Christmas Day.

As they scampered out of Room 19 with Santa Claus on its boards and holly wreaths in windows, they chirped their holiday greetings then flew along the snowy way.

I watched them leave with wistfulness, seeing them as potential openers of 100 gifts or so, all trimmed with ribbons of far more color and yardage than any football field could boast.

I know, too, as they leave, that many will be playing outside the next few days, building bodies in the fresh, clean air, even as they build experiences to be later shared in school. I know that healthy appetites will grow and munching in between meals; that those so often naughty will now be candy kids for sure.

I see them dressing up and going to their different churches, observing Christmas in their family's way. And always, in the giving of gifts, especially little ones that they have made at school, I see them better boys and girls, instead of merely good ones.

I see them creep from rooms at early hour and dash for bulging stockings.

I view them tossing schedules over, with homework chores dispelled.

They had really worked on final projects, the way our own lad did. The children in his fifth grade room had each been given an imaginary \$20 to spend on Christmas gifts.

This two-week project, like other carefree little boys, he had left to tuck into the darker hours of the final night—after cub scout meeting, much to mom's dismay and dad's exasperation.

The project called for listing gifts and names of folks to whom they might be given. But the advertisement for each gift chosen must be cut out from the paper and mounted in neat fashion with price including calculated sales tax, too—and all of it, no matter what he bought, must come to \$20—nothing more and nothing less.

The early purchases went well. Dad was doomed to boots and mom destined for a nice portfolio. A pound of steak was even to be tucked into a Christmas basket.

Then the adding process started, done with wavering figures in a notebook small and black. And here he found that he had been over generous. So out he tossed the steak that needy folks were all but munching and did away with basket dead.

Finally, with writing cramped and spirit, too, and just two hours removed from Cinderella time, it added up exactly and glee was uppermost.

Then mother checked. And in the item second to the last, he had given the 59-cent purchase a sales tax of three cents instead of two, thus leaving him a total of one cent under what it should have been.

Feverishly he reached again for newspaper. Frustration grew and spread to waiting members of the anxious family, who turned to papers, too, to aid the lad on sleepy quest. A penny's good for bubble gum, but where was an ad that said so?

Finally the idea came, hinging on a tiny notice proclaiming that amazingly, bananas were 10 cents a pound.

With hand unsteady from the lateness of the hour and from excitement at a quest that now was all but done, he acted—this we fear—on mom's suggestion:

"A Christmas gift for Finn," he wrote—Finn is our funny monkey. "One small banana . . . bruised . . . one cent."

Sing: "Joy to the World" by Handel.

Jesus also said, "I am the door; by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved." Another time He said, "I am the good shepherd and know my sheep." Still another time He called Himself "the way, the truth, and the life."

Light candle five and read:

The babe at Bethlehem received His name when He was born into the world. He gives us His name when we are born into His Church. This name, "Christian," is far better than any gift of riches or fame. We want to be worthy of it—willing to dedicate ourselves to the task of taking the gift of Christ's love and name to others, so that to them also He will be "Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace."

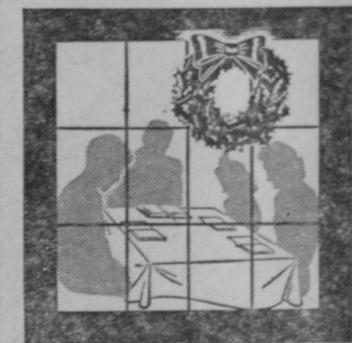

Having turkey or other stuffed poultry for your Christmas dinner? Be sure to remove the stuffing from what is left. Refrigerate it, the turkey and gravy.

We have been examining a variety of casserole recipes this as a part of our extension lesson on the subject. In the recipe folder is a very good recipe called turkey bechamel, providing your family likes mushrooms. It is rich and filling.

For those who prefer a recipe without mushrooms, here is another casserole version for turkey that is very good. Peas can be substituted for the broccoli, if you prefer.

BIT-OF-TURKEY CASSEROLE

- 1 Cup dairy sour cream
- 1 Cup milk
- 2 Eggs, slightly beaten
- 2 Teaspoon salt
- 1/2 Cup enriched flour
- 2 Tablespoons lemon juice
- 8 Ounces elbow macaroni
- 1 1/2 Cups cooked broccoli pieces (or peas)
- 2 Cups cooked diced turkey (or chicken)

In top of double boiler combine sour cream, milk, eggs, salt and flour. Cook over boiling water, stirring occasionally, until mixture begins to thicken. Stir in lemon juice. Meanwhile, cook macaroni. Add four teaspoons salt and macaroni to 1 1/2 quarts boiling water. Boil rapidly, stirring constantly for two minutes. Cover, remove from heat and let stand five minutes. Rinse with warm water and drain well. Combine sauce, macaroni, broccoli and turkey. Turn into greased two-quart casserole. Cover and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees Fahrenheit) about 15 minutes. Makes six servings.

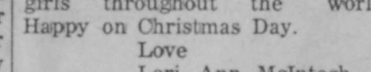

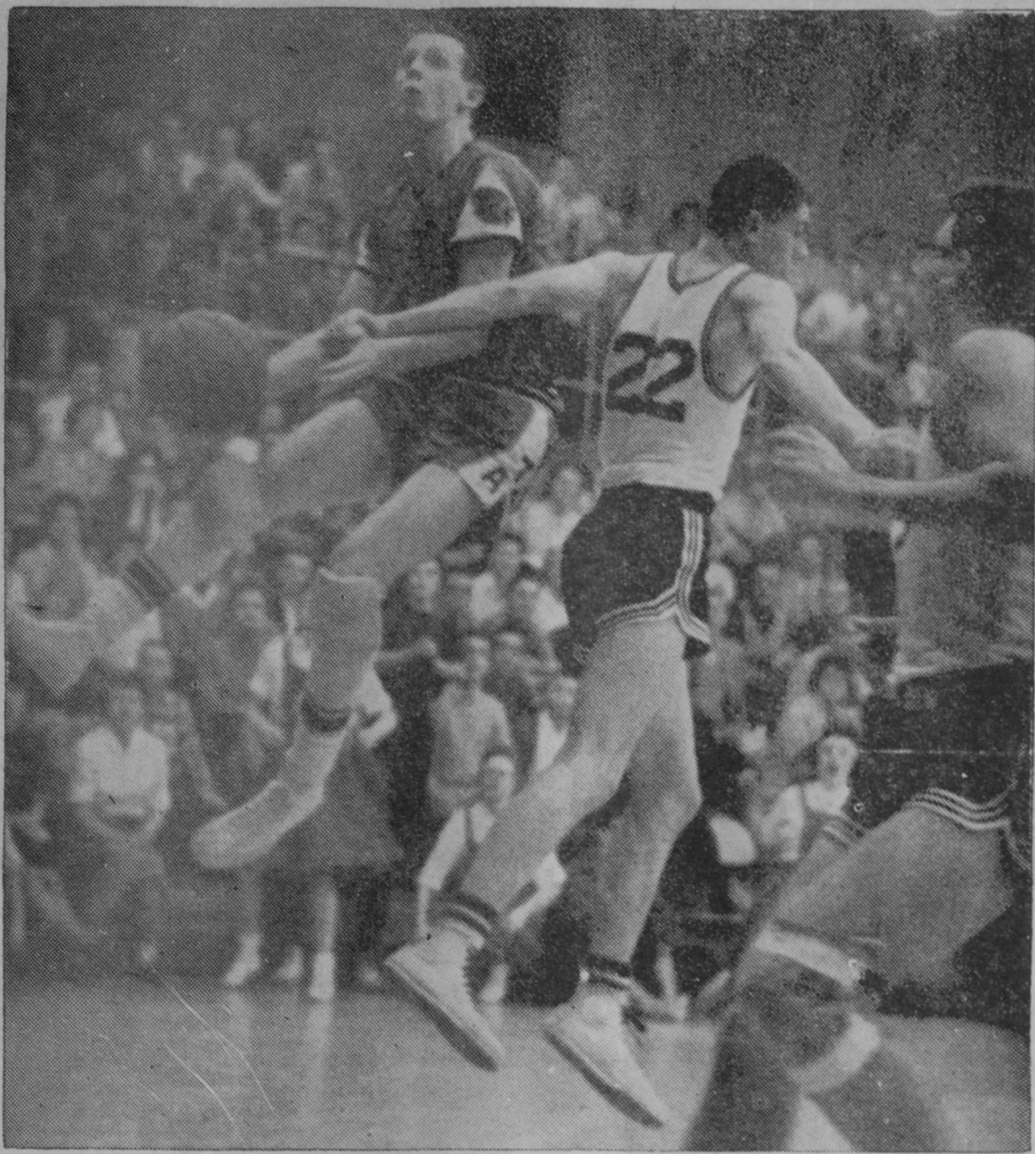

Pinconning Cagers Defeat Tawas Area Braves, 44 to 43

Pinconning High School cagers took up where they left off last spring in tournament play when they defeated the Tawas Area Braves, 44-43, on the winners' home floor Friday night. The loss dropped Tawas from the unbeaten ranks of the Northeastern Michigan Conference and also out of a tie for first place.

Coming up with great defensive play which stopped two of Tawas Area's top scorers cold, the Spartans came from behind in the third quarter to take the lead and then fought off a determined effort by Tawas Area in the last minutes of the game.

The McIntoshmen held a rather commanding 20-12 lead at the end of the initial quarter, mainly on the sharpshooting of Larry "Doc" Anschuetz, who made good on four buckets. Two of his teammates, Arnie Stump and Pete Bolen, contributed five and four points, respectively, in the quarter.

At this stage of the game, the handwriting was on the wall for Tawas Area, but the score did not indicate it. Guard Dwayne Ulman, who has been one of the scoring leaders in the three previous games, was held to two points and Guard Herman Rollin

was able to score but one charity toss.

This constituted the entire scoring effort of these two players for the night as Pinny, with its pressing man-for-man defense, held them in check. Both Ulman and Rollin missed a great part of the game due to "foultitis," the latter leaving the game in the last minutes of play via the five-foul limit.

The second quarter was a big one for Pinconning when the Spartans outscored Tawas Area, 13-7, taking advantage of every mistake committed by the Braves. The Tawas team saw its lead diminish rapidly when Pinny players stole the ball on several occasions and whipped in quick buckets. This cut the Braves' lead to 27-25 at intermission.

Before the end of the third stanza, Pinconning had taken over the lead and held a 34-33 edge at the quarter whistle. The Spartan defense proved to be the big obstacle in Tawas Area's path, with only six points scored by the Braves, four by Stump and two by Anschuetz. On the other hand, Cluff came to life for Pinny and scored seven points and Milwaukee, Wisconsin; Oak Park goal.

This set the stage for a dramatic, last ditch stand by Pinny in the fourth quarter. Marter, high point man for both clubs during the night, hit four buckets and Cluff added another. Stump and Sanders came up with two points apiece for Tawas, the latter's on two tosses from the foul line, while Bolen tipped in one rebound and added four foul shots.

All efforts of the Braves went for naught in the last seconds of play, however, as Pinny grabbed the last rebound off the Tawas backboard and Flynn of the Spartans had possession of the ball as the final whistle sounded.

Tawas Area had three men in double figures, Bolen leading the scoring with 15 points, followed by Stump with 13 and Anschuetz with 10. Marter's individual scoring effort of 18 points was high for the winners, followed by Cluff with nine.

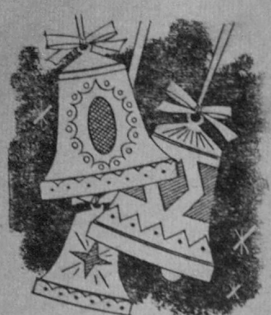

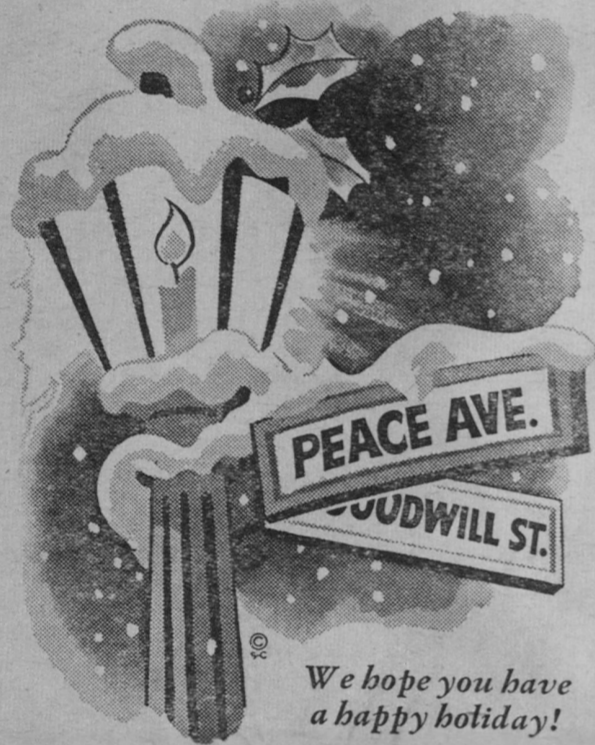

hind the wheel of an automobile. But no one believes that he or she, as a "drinking" driver is dangerous. Result: Traffic accidents and fatalities caused by drivers "who had been drinking" but are not necessarily intoxicated, in as many as half of the total accidents.
The public thinks that the alcohol problem lies with the falling-down drunk driver.
The police and traffic safety authorities point out that when drivers reach this state of intoxication, they are often incapable of driving at all. They also point out that driving deterioration occurs long before the falling-down stage is reached and that the real safety problem occurs with the "drinking" driver—the driver who has had only a few drinks and still considers himself capable behind the wheel.

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Wrong Thinking by Auto Drivers May Cause Disaster
One of the toughest problems in traffic safety education is to convince people of the distinction between what they think and what they know about driving. In many ways drivers confuse what they think with knowledge. When what they think is wrong and is applied to their driving, it eventually can lead to disaster.
For example, a recent public opinion survey to determine what motorists think about traffic safety disclosed that the average driver thinks that a major share of accidents are caused by drunken drivers.
Michigan's accident statistics, compiled by the state police, show that fatalities involving a drunken driver, that is a driver proven to be "under the influence of alcohol," was listed in only six percent of the fatal accidents for last year.
This does not mean that alcohol is of little significance to traffic safety. Actually, the opposite is true; alcohol is one of the major problems in traffic safety.
But the distinction between what people think about drinking and driving and what is really true about drinking and driving is where the problem lies. Essentially it boils down to this: Everyone agrees that the drunken driver is a menace be-

HERMAN A. BISCHOFF

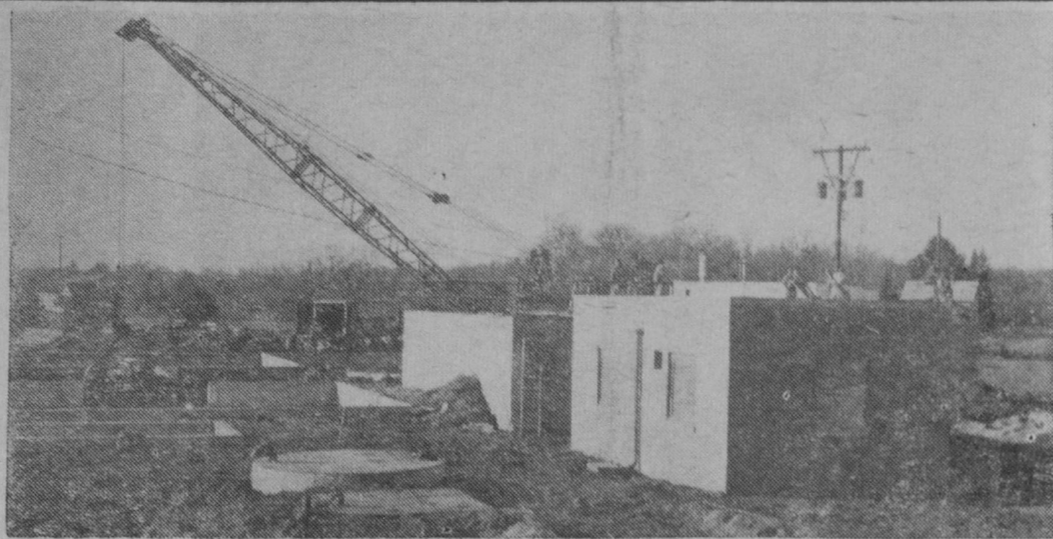
Herman A. Bischoff, Baldwin Township farmer, died Wednesday evening, December 16, at his home.

Since a plan went into effect whereby a man is on night duty at the city hall in Tawas City to receive fire calls, a considerable amount of time has been saved by the volunteer fire department in answering fire calls and property damage caused by two fires was reduced.

Edward Libka, one-time member of the fire department, was hired by the city three weeks ago to act as night duty man. A room in the basement was furnished for his living quarters.

If the fire truck had arrived a few seconds later, the fire could have been serious.

A car fire last week was also extinguished in short order when the city hall doors were opened by Libka and the fire truck warmed up when volunteers arrived.

Shortly afterward, Levi came to the scene with Michigan Bell Telephone Company climbing equipment. Despite the fact that Levi had only recently undergone a surgical operation, the two men climbed back up the tower with one end of the long rope, two safety belts and a pulley.

A safety belt was fastened around Palace's waist and one end of the rope secured tightly. Levi made the descent a few rungs at a time with Palace resting on his neck and shoulder. State Troopers Paul Uerling and William Ferguson and a number of men on the ground held the other end of the rope to support the weight of Palace as Levi inched his way down the ladder.

A suicide note written on a bar napkin was found later. O'Farrell said that he will be questioned as soon as his condition improves before any action is taken.

The board paid bills of \$750 as the county's share of marine enforcement participation with the state and \$1,000 to the Northeastern Children's Guidance Clinic at Alpena. The clinic is now serving a number of Iosco children.

Of principal concern to supervisors was the increase in the direct relief and welfare load in the county. The budget this year called for \$18,000 for relief and \$15,000 for welfare. Relief funds ran out prior to the October session and additional money was transferred from welfare. Later, both funds received transfers of money from the emergency appropriation fund.

Not figured in Monday's analysis of the budget was the authorization given the sheriff's department to exceed its budget by \$1,500.
