



### Two Iosco Students Earn Degrees at MSU During Month

Included in the largest fall graduating class at Michigan State University during December were two Iosco County residents. They are Herbert F. Wendt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert E. Wendt, 206 Eighth Avenue, Tawas City, who received a bachelor of arts degree in psychology, and George H. Hohman, son of George Hohman, Oscoda, who received a bachelor of arts degree in social science.

The class numbered 654 graduates, which included 464 with bachelors and 190 with advanced degrees.

Commencement speaker was Irwin J. Lubbers, president of Hope College, Holland. The degrees were conferred by Michigan State University President John A. Hannah.

## Miller to be Sworn In as New Circuit Judge Friday

On January 1, a young attorney will realize his life-long ambition—he will be sworn in as a circuit court judge, and in his own home district.

Allan C. Miller, a native of Iosco County, was the successful candidate in last spring's non-partisan election to name a successor to Judge Herman Dehnke, who retires December 31 after more than 32 years on the bench of the 23rd judicial circuit.

Participating in Friday's ceremony will be Circuit Judge Richard D. Smith, who is serving his second term in Bay County. The Rev. Charles Mercer will give the in-

vacation for the ceremony.

"I think it is a challenge and it is something that I have always wanted to do," said Mr. Miller this week as he made preparations for the swearing-in ceremony to be held in the courtroom of the Iosco County Building.

"It will be extremely difficult to follow in the steps of someone who is known throughout the state as a renowned jurist," said Mr. Miller. "In some ways, it will be much easier for me because a splendid pattern has been set by Judge Dehnke.

"The judge has done an excellent job in cleaning up the dockets in all three counties and I will have a good opportunity to get the house in order and will be able to move slowly on matters that are on hand," said Mr. Miller.

Miller, who was born in Tawas City and later lived in East Tawas, left his partnership last year in the well-known Detroit law firm, Lucking, VanAuken and Miller, and moved his residence back to East Tawas to become a candidate for circuit judge.

He was graduated from East Tawas High School, where he was active in sports and was graduated with honors in the class of 1940.

He worked his way through the University of Michigan, financing his education by work in the registrar's office, washing dishes and driving a taxi. He was graduated with a bachelor of arts degree "with distinction" and was a member of the Phi Kappa Phi honor society.

Married to the former Betty Gill while still attending college, Miller earned his law degree after three years of study at the University of Michigan.

The Millers have four sons and a daughter, ages nine months, three, eight, nine and 15. Their eldest son is a sophomore at Tawas Area High School.

Judge-elect Miller extends a special invitation to his many friends to attend the swearing-in ceremony which will start at 11:00 a. m. New Year's Day.

## No Progress Made in Coach Company Strike

Representatives of union and management in the nearly five-month-old Anderson Coach Company strike met for a little more than an hour Monday, but no progress was made on settlement of a new contract.

Two minor points in the contract were agreed upon. These included grievance procedures and waiver of seniority rights in shut-downs and start-ups.

The union, represented by William Scott, president of local 2539, and his committee proposed a 15-cent-an-hour increase in the base rate and a guaranteed bonus plan.

The workers had originally asked for a 30-cent-an-hour increase in base rate and elimination of the incentive bonus system. When the men walked out August 4, base rates were \$1.95 for production workers, \$2.20 for painters and some other jobs and \$1.50 for watchmen.

James Guest, president of the coach company, said following the meeting that the company's position was the same as during the November 24 bargaining session—"We can't afford to pay any more money. The union's last proposal actually amounts to more than its original 30-cent-an-hour demand."

Guest said that the company could not continue to make its offer of crediting each worker through November 29 with 20 weeks toward vacation pay. He pointed out that the company now has been shut down for nearly one-half year.

### National Farm Loan Assn. Changes Name

Effective December 31, the Northeastern National Farm Loan Association will become the Federal Land Bank Association of Standish.

This name change, officially approved by the association's board of directors December 16, was made possible by legislation requested by the land banks and passed by the last congress, according to the announcement by Fred C. Latter, National City, president of the association.

Mr. Latter said the new name better identifies the association with the purpose for which it was chartered and for which it has operated through the years; namely, the making and servicing of federal land bank loans.

"The legislation providing for the association name change also changes the title of the position held by Henry W. Beecher, from secretary-treasurer to manager," said Mr. Latter.

The Standish association makes and services loans for the Federal Land Bank of St. Paul in Iosco, Ogemaw, Gladwin and Arenac Counties. During the past year, loans totaling approximately \$233,100 were obtained by farmers in these counties. Funds from these loans were used for such purposes

### 10 PERSONS MET VIOLENT DEATH DURING 1959

Area law enforcement agencies reported this week that 10 persons met violent death in Iosco County during the past 12 months. This included five persons who were killed in highway traffic accidents and five persons who met death by drowning.

Water accidents showed an increase over the preceding year, but there was one less drowning. Those persons who drowned were as follows: William White of Pontiac drowned May 3 in Londo Lake, George Metcalf of Flint drowned May 29 in the AuSable River, Norman W. Travis of Hale drowned July 1 in an abandoned gypsum quarry in Sherman Township, Marshall D. Lee of Chio drowned July 19 in Indian Lake and James Fenzau in Cedar Lake.

Traffic deaths included A-3e James O. Jones, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, who was killed in a one-car accident at the east city limits of East Tawas; Debbie Johnson, two months old, Flint, was killed in a two-car accident on US-23 at Tawas Point Road; Jacquelyn Riley, 15, Tawas City, killed in a two-car crash on US-23 at Johnson Road south of Oscoda; Lyle W. Crouterfield, 13, Standish, died in a one-car crash on US-23 south of Tawas City.

The other traffic death was Dennis A. Ott, seven years old, Saginaw, who was struck down and killed by an automobile while walking along M-65 south of Whittemore.

## Airman Killed Christmas Eve on Slippery US-23

A 21-year-old airman from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, married and the father of two children, was killed Christmas Eve when his small foreign car skidded off US-23 north of Oscoda and crashed into a tree.

Dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital was Wayne G. Wymer of 6075 Loud Drive, Oscoda. Coroner E. D. Jacques pronounced death due to a skull fracture.

Investigating Michigan State Police and sheriff's officers said that Wymer was traveling north on US-23 when his car skidded to the west side of the road about 1.3 miles north of the Iosco-Alcona County line. The car was a total wreck after it struck a tree some 28 feet from the pavement.

Other accidents reported in this area over the holiday included three minor property damage accidents which took place in foggy weather Friday.
