Lately, there have been a few cases of freeze-ups of water lines between the mains and the homes of consumers. This has resulted in disrupted water service for some

residents from three to four days. In order to combat this latest condition, the department of pub-

lic works urges those consumers who suspect that their water lines are less than 4½ to five feet deep to leave a water tap running-very slowly-all night. Freeze-ups may become even more severe in the near future and an open water tap may save home owners from costly maintenance bills.
