A successful conclusion to the 22nd annual Silver Valley Winter Sports Carnival came Sunday afternoon with perfect weather conditions for the big, three-day weekend. Several thousand down-state visitors were attracted to the area for winter play and the program.

Reigning over the event was Miss Charlotte Bachman of East Tawas, who won the popularity-personality contest through ticket sales and earned the right to a one-week paid vacation in Florida.

Miss Bachman, now Miss Silver Valley of 1959, had as her court these other finalists: Jackie Wideman of Bay City, Judy Nord of Bay City, Julie Peltier of Oscoda, Joyce Hausbeck of Saginaw, Valerie Riftenbark of Bad Axe, Janet Nelkie of Tawas City and Mrs. Hildegard Lepard of Tawas City.

The new queen received her crown from Bob Reynolds, WJR sports director, who has been crowning queens here for the past six years.

A carnival atmosphere prevailed throughout the three days. It started with a perch fry held Friday night for some 200 visitors and men of the Silver Valley committee at the Holland Hotel and a like affair for the ladies at the Barnes Hotel.

## Tawas Man Escapes Injury in Crash

A 23-year-old Tawas City man, Harvey Westcott, escaped injury last Friday morning when a car plowed head-on into his tank truck on US-23 near Kawawlin. Instantly killed in the crash was Miss Darlene Proulx of Au Gres, a passenger in the car. Her two companions were injured and taken to Bay City General Hospital.

Westcott, driving a Bublitz Oil Company truck loaded with 5,500 gallons of fuel oil, was headed north. The south-bound car skidded across the center strip to smash head-on into the truck, which jackknifed with the impact and veered into a ditch plowing a huge furrow in the snow.

Miss Proulx, 18, was riding in the front seat beside the driver, Miss Geraldine Heinrich, 20. She was thrown from the car by the force of the impact and was apparently killed instantly. Her injuries included a neck fracture, internal injuries, right leg fracture and facial cuts. The other passenger in the car was Mrs. Dixie Conley, 22, also of Au Gres.

The three were enroute from their homes to classes at North-eastern School of Commerce, Bay City. The car apparently went out of control when it struck a snow bank heaped at the divider strip while overtaking another car.

## Winter Sports Will Continue at Valley

Winter sports activities at Silver Valley will continue during the month of February, as the schedule for daily operating hours was announced Monday night by the winter sports committee.

With perfect ski conditions at Silver Valley, the ski area, tows and chalet will open this Friday noon and will continue to operate until 10 o'clock. Flood lights will illuminate the slopes for night skiing. Friday night skiing will continue the rest of the season, as long as weather permits.

On Saturdays and Sundays throughout the remainder of the season, toboggan slides will be in operation at 11:00 a. m. On these days the ski area will continue to operate at its regular 8 o'clock opening time.

As a special offer for schools to use the ski facilities at Silver Valley on week-ends, group rates will be given. Total cost for an afternoon of skiing for one person under this school group plan will be \$4, which includes rental of skis and equipment. The regular rate for the use of tows and ski rental is \$6.25.

## Iosco Supervisors Say 'Nix' to Any More State Taxes

Iosco County Board of Supervisors went on record Wednesday as opposing any new taxes in Michigan at the present time.

In a resolution sent to the state senator and representative, the board said, "The present taxes paid by the citizens and taxpayers of Michigan are already high in comparison with the tax burden of other states, and there is no justification for imposing any additional tax burdens upon the people of the state."

The board said that it firmly believed the tax structure will produce sufficient income, if properly administered, not only to pay the necessary expenses of government but to cover the deficit heretofore created by "excessive and unnecessary expenditures."

The supervisors also called on all Iosco County schools to hold the line against spending. A resolution is to be sent to each district urging that school budgets be kept within the limits of the present tax structure, to the end that no additional taxes need be imposed.

The board went on record as supporting Isabella County which asks that Act No. 172, PA 1958, be repealed. This act provides for a \$5 health inspection fee for mobile homes.

The Iosco County Road Commission was authorized to proceed in securing the right-of-way for the road known as the Sheer Road in Wilber Township. In a letter to the board, the commission stated that investigation had revealed that the road encroaches on property owned by Clarence Krueger of East Tawas.

# PRIMARY ELECTION NEXT MONDAY

## Field Will be Narrowed in Circuit Judge Race

Next Tuesday's general primary election will see the field narrowed in the race for nomination of candidates for circuit judge in the 23rd judicial circuit, comprising the Counties of Iosco, Alcona and Oscoda. The two top-vote-getting candidates will emerge from the primary to oppose each other in the April spring election.

The race was thrown wide open this past winter with the impending retirement, at the end of 1959, of Circuit Judge Herman Dehnke. Judge Dehnke, one of the state's best known jurists, will have been on the bench of this circuit for 32 years at retirement.

Five candidates have filed for the non-partisan primary election, including three attorneys from Iosco County, one each from Alcona and Oscoda Counties.

Those candidates from Iosco County include Allan C. Miller, J. Richard Newman and F. Duane Ross. On the ballot from Oscoda County is Norman J. Randall, while J. Russell Hughes is the candidate from Alcona County.

The race has resulted in intensive campaigning by all candidates. Judge Dehnke, well-liked and highly respected in the circuit as well as the state, had never been opposed in an election.

For many voters, it will be their first time to cast a ballot in a February primary election. Only East Tawas and Oscoda Township hold yearly primaries to select city

## Tawas City GOP to Select Candidates for Spring Election

Tawas City Republicans will select party candidates to appear on the spring election ballot at a caucus and city convention to be held Saturday night, February 14, at the city hall. The caucus is scheduled to start at 8 o'clock.

City offices at stake include those of Mayor George Tuttle, Clerk Walter Nelson and Treasurer Ruth Albertson. The Republican caucus will also nominate candidates for supervisors of the three wards, presently held by Clement Stephan, First Ward; Fred Brabant, Second Ward; and Clarence Everett, Third Ward.

Aldermen posts up for nomination are those presently held by John N. Brugger, First Ward; Earl B. Davis, Second Ward; and Cecil Cabbie, Third Ward.

Aldermen Arthur Wegner, Clyde Eyril and Howard Hatton have one more year to serve on two-year terms.

There has been no notice received of a Democratic caucus to be held this year. During the past several years, the Democrats have entered nearly an entire slate during spring city elections.

## City Faces Serious Threat from Frost

Tawas City, like many other Northern Michigan communities, is facing the serious threat of re-occurring water disruptions due to the intense cold weather this winter. In all probability, the water disruptions which have taken place will not be fully corrected until warmer weather.

First problem faced by the department of public works this winter was when frost penetrated the ground to a depth of between 2 1/2 and four feet. The frost heaved the clay at this level and snapped off water mains at their joints.

Lately, there have been a few cases of freeze-ups of water lines between the mains and the homes of consumers. This has resulted in disrupted water service for some residents from three to four days.

In order to combat this latest condition, the department of public works urges those consumers who suspect that their water lines are less than 4 1/2 to five feet deep to leave a water tap running—very slowly—all night. Freeze-ups may become even more severe in the near future and an open water tap may save home owners from costly maintenance bills.

## Boy Shot Accidentally While Target Practicing

A 15-year-old AuSable Township youth, who was shot accidentally in the stomach while target practicing Saturday afternoon, is reported in fair condition at Tawas Hospital.

Treated for a gunshot wound in the stomach was Henry K. Mioduch, whose father operates a tavern on US-23 between Oscoda and East Tawas. Mr. Mioduch told investigating state police officers that he and the boy were target practicing behind their home.

Mioduch said he asked his son for the rifle, a .22 caliber, and he handed it to him, stock first. When he reached for the rifle it went off, hitting young Mioduch in the stomach.

## Favorable Vote Would Authorize City to Make Additions to Sewer Disposal Plant

One special proposal ballot will greet Tawas City voters at next Monday's general primary election. Voters are asked to approve a \$130,000 general obligation bond issue for construction improvements to the municipal disposal system.

A successful vote would authorize enlarging the sewage treatment plant by installing a new Imhoff or settling tank, additional sludge drying beds, a chlorine contact tank, a new chlorinator, a building for a laboratory and meter equipment.

It would also authorize construction of a new pumping station and installation of necessary equipment for servicing the Burrell and Zaharias Subdivisions and a new, high-capacity pump for the Second Avenue lift station.

A spokesman for the city said this week that such improvements and enlargements to the sewer disposal system have been under consideration for the past five years. Plans have been prepared by Spicer Engineering Company and approved by the state health department.

"It is something that everyone knows we need. The longer we wait, the more it will cost to construct because of the material increases each year," states Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works.

The sewer disposal plant was designed for a 1,200 population in the 1930s and during peak loads at present it handles approximately

## Winter Pounds Michigan With Worst Storm

Iosco County dug out from its worst snow storm of the winter Wednesday morning. City and county snow plows worked all night Tuesday to remove the snow and ice which blocked streets, highways and rural roads.

Schools of the county were closed Tuesday and Wednesday, as buses were unable to break their way through the snow packed roads.

During the peak of the storm Tuesday morning, sections of US-23 were completely blocked to traffic between Au Gres and the Singing Bridge, traffic came to a standstill and county road commission plows rushed to the area to unblock the traffic. This was the same condition south of Oscoda.

Wrecker service tow trucks and service stations had a field day pulling automobiles out of snow banks, as did the plow operators, who were cleaning out private driveways as late as Wednesday afternoon.

At one time during the storm, a county road commission spokesman said that plows were pulled off the highways because of poor visibility. There were no serious accidents reported in this area, however.

Drivers are warned by state police that driving conditions are still extremely hazardous throughout the Lower Peninsula because of icy highways.

## Escapes in Night Clothing—

# Tawas Man Lost All in Fire

A 59-year-old Tawas Township man, clad only in night clothing, escaped from his burning home last Saturday morning. George Martin, who lives alone, told Tawas City firemen that he awoke to find his bedroom filled with smoke and made his escape from the burning building through a window.

After nearly becoming overcome by smoke and fumes, Martin re-entered the building through the same window and gathered up a few articles of clothing and again made his escape.

Martin ran to a nearby farm home and turned in the alarm. The Tawas City-Tawas Township Fire Department quickly arrived on the scene but the interior of the main portion of the building was in flames.

Using high-pressure fog the firemen finally confined the blaze to the west corner of the building, although much damage had been done to the interior because of its early start. Efforts to save the building were lost when the truck ran out of water. By the time the truck was filled from Cold Creek, several miles distant, the building was again in flames and ragged out of control.

The only part of the structure left standing was a garage attached to the west end of the main building, which was also damaged by the flames, smoke and water. Martin, who lost all possessions except those which he wore on his back, said that during the past

year he had spent nearly \$4,000 on remodeling his home. Included was a new basement and garage, new asbestos siding and roof, complete replastering and remodeling of the interior.

The asbestos siding and roofing helped to contain the flames to the interior of the building. At the time of the fire, Martin was unsure of his insurance coverage on the building and contents.

When flames were confined to the west portion of the building, re-entry was made and a strong box containing valuable papers was recovered.

Cause of the blaze was undetermined. The property was once known as the Sam Bradford farm.

Eleven Tawas Area churches will participate in a World Day of Prayer program to be held at the Assembly of God Church, East Tawas, Friday, February 13, at 2:00 p. m. The public is invited.

Theme of this year's program is "Lord, I Believe." Each church will have charge of a separate topic.

The Rev. George Krish, Assembly of God Church, will give a short devotional talk. His talk will be centered on the theme and the projects to which the offering is dedicated.

Each year the service is prepared in a different country. This is the basic purpose of World Day of Prayer, when offerings for missions at home and abroad will also be made.

The World Day of Prayer chain begins on the Tonga Islands, with Queen Salote leading her subjects as dawn breaks over these tropic isles. When it sinks behind the Arctic horizon the ice-jockeyed St. Lawrence Island in the Aleutians, the last supplication of the 24-hour unbroken cycle is murmured.

One hundred forty-four countries on six continents will have been spanned by these prayers.

## NEWS ABOUT IOSCO SERVICEMEN



February preinduction physical examination call for Iosco County includes the following six men: Robert F. Nickell; Marvin E. Thompson; Robert W. Hester; Ralph W. Sawyer; Robert A. Lincoln, transferred to Lansing board; Charles F. Sobolesky Jr., transferred to Arenac County board.

The Iosco County local board is located in the Federal Building, East Tawas, and the office hours are from 12:30 to 4:30 p. m. Monday through Friday.

Chairman Edward I. Dickey of Whittemore is also authorized to register young men when it is impossible for them to go to the local board office or when it is not open.

Army Pvt. Keith R. Gordon, 18, of East Tawas marched January 19 with other members of the 101st Airborne Division's 327th Infantry in Nashville, Tennessee, during the inaugural parade honoring the newly-elected governor of Tennessee, Buford Ellington.

The 101st Airborne Division, a major Strategic Army Corps (STRAC) unit, constantly maintains an immediate readiness force for airborne deployment to any area in the world. Within six hours, a reinforced battle group of 1,700 men can be airborne.

Gordon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Waldo W. Gordon, is a rifleman in the 327th's Company E at Fort Campbell, Kentucky.

He entered the army in June 1957 upon graduation from Tawas Area High School.

Selective Service registration is a continuing requirement for all young men when they reach 18 years of age. It has been announced by Edward I. Dickey, chairman of Local Board No. 36 for Iosco County.

Young men are required to register for the draft within five days after reaching their 18th birthday. Registration may be accomplished at any local board office. Men who are away from their homes on their 18th birthday may go to any local board in the area where they are located and register for Selective Service.

The draft board chairman emphasized that all registrants give their proper residence address at the time of registration. This residence address determines the local board that will always have jurisdiction over the registrant's draft classification.

Members of reserve components of the armed forces, including the national guard, are required to register. Only persons on active duty in the armed forces are not required to register. They must register within 30 days following separation from service, however if born after August 30, 1922, and not previously registered.


At the time of registration, each youth will receive a registration certificate which he is required to have in his personal possession at all times. If the certificate is lost or destroyed, a duplicate may be applied for at the local board office. Failure to comply with the Selective Service registration requirement may result in prosecutive action by the United States Department of Justice.
