

# Directors Give OK; Membership Drive Started by C. of C.

A membership drive in which it is proposed to sign up 90 percent of the business places in the area as members of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce is now under way. A letter of authorization from the chamber, signed by President Cecil Cabbie, was given to the Rev. O. James Crews, William Nosworthy and John Downes designating them as collectors.

The plan, amended by the board at its regular meeting last week, calls for its scrapping should the trio fail to obtain 90 percent participation, or if a minimum of \$25,000 is not collected by June 1. If it is successful, a 20 percent commission of all moneys collected by the chamber during 1959 will be paid to the three men.

Business places are now being contacted for pledges by the trio and all money from these pledges must be in the hands of the chamber prior to September 1.

A system of payment, according to direct benefits derived from chamber activities, has been adopted. As an example, each resort housing unit would pay dues at a rate of \$5 per double or pair of twin beds; each establishment serving food or beverages would pay at a rate of \$2 for each seat; special attractions would pay according to the size of the establishment; service stations would be assessed by the number of pumps or a percentage of each gallon pumped.

All other businessmen in the area would be assessed according to the ability of each to pay and benefit derived from area promotion by the chamber.

It is proposed that the money obtained from such a drive be used for hiring a full-time staff for the chamber and for extensive area promotion on a year-around basis.

The plan, when presented by Mr. Crews to the board of directors at its January 28 meeting, met with opposition from some of the members, who disagreed with the proposed 20 percent commission being paid to the collectors. It was also felt by some that a specific amount of dues should not be set

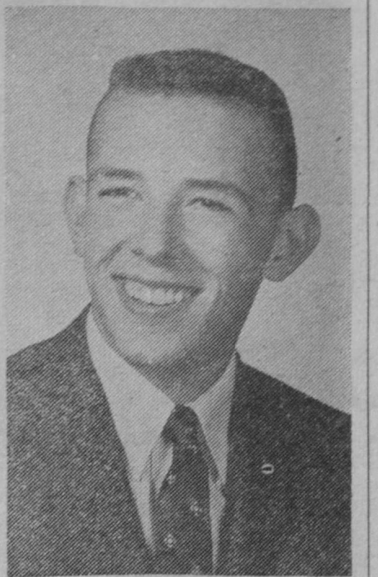
Guests at the banquet will be Sidney F. Main, district governor of Kiwanis, and Al LaPorte of Standish, district lieutenant governor.

## Tawas City Retains Unique Voting Record—

# 64 Percent of Voters Favor Sewer Bond Issue

## GO Bond Issue to be Reduced by Revenue

With 64 percent of Tawas City voters casting ballots in favor of a \$130,000 general obligation bond issue, the way was made clear at Monday's primary election to enlarge and improve this community's sewer disposal system.

Final tally of the election board Monday night saw 285 ballots cast in favor of the proposition and 158 against it. There were 17 spoiled ballots, some of which were unmarked.

Tawas City voters have the distinction of never having turned down a general obligation bond issue asked by the city council in modern history.

Proceeds from the sale of bonds will be used to enlarge the sewage treatment plant with installation of a new settling tank, additional sludge drying beds, a chlorine contact tank, new chlorinator and a building to house a laboratory and meter equipment.

It will also finance construction of a new lift station to serve the Burrell and Zaharias Subdivisions along with improvements to the lift station on Second Avenue.

Next step by the city is to confer with City Engineer Clifford Spicer so that bids may be advertised for contracts and to set up procedures for a bond issue with Detroit bonding attorneys.

Still to be determined is the method of re-payment and a breakdown of the amount to be financed by general obligation bonds and the amount to be financed by sewer revenue.

Although the city asked voters to approve issuance of \$130,000 worth of general obligation bonds, the actual figure is not expected to be that high. Reason for this is that sewer revenue will be obtained from public buildings; such as schools, county building, hospital and other non-taxed institutions.

Although turned down last fall, there is still an "outside chance" that federal aid may be received to assist with construction.

Final determination as to the amount of money necessary to be raised by general obligation bonds and the amount to be raised from sewer revenue is to be established by the council, water board and city engineer.

Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, said Tuesday that the date for start of construction would depend upon how soon bonds are sold and, after advertising, how soon contracts are let. It is hoped that work may start by the latter part of June.

Bublitz said that it would be at least one month before the method of financing would be determined. "This will entail a lot of study by the part of the city engineer, council and water board," he said.

"Both the council and the water board are very pleased with the results of the election," he said.

The need for such improvements to the sewer disposal system were emphasized after receipt of a survey made at the plant last summer by the state health department. Although a clean bill of health was received on its operation, it was pointed out that growth in the community since the sewer disposal plant was constructed in the 1930s was taxing it to the limit. Increased population and service to Tawas Hospital, Tawas Area School and other institutions have increased the sewage handled by the system.

## Miller Leader in Race to Name Spring Candidates

Allan C. Miller, Tawas City attorney, and J. Russell Hughes, Harrisville attorney, were named candidates for the position of circuit judge of the 23rd judicial circuit in next April's spring election.

The two successful candidates seeking the bench of retiring judge, Herman Dehnke, far outdistanced their opponents in a field of five. Others entered in this interesting race were J. Richard Newman of East Tawas, Norman J. Randall of Mio and F. Duane Ross of East Tawas.

Voters turned out in large numbers, despite unfavorable road conditions, to set somewhat of a record. For many voters it was their first time to cast a ballot in a February primary election and much interest was created through intensified campaigning by all five candidates.

Nearly 3,000 ballots were cast in Isosco County's 18 precincts. As a

## TC Council Adopts Sick Leave Plan for Salaried Employees

At Monday night's regular meeting of the Tawas City Council, a sick leave plan for salaried city employees was formally adopted by the council. In the past, there had been no formal policy regarding sick leave by such employees.

According to the new policy, one week of sick leave is available annually to salaried city employees with one year of service. After three years of service, an employee is eligible for two weeks sick leave.

The sick leave time is non-accumulative from one year to another.

In other business, the council appealed to residents to clean off sidewalk in front of their homes or business places immediately after snow storms. Cooperation of everyone is asked so that the city will not be compelled to enforce a city ordinance which requires that sidewalks be cleaned within 48 hours after a storm.

The council authorized erection of signs in the parking lot at the city hall designating that area for two-hour parking. The parking lot is to be reserved for use by persons who wish to pay water bills and other official use.

Supt. Reginald Bublitz was appointed as a special city police officer by the council. A part-time officer is to be hired by the city to assist Chief George Ruth.

## Braves Stand Off Bucks 'til Last Quarter; Wham!

Papenfus-Fradl and Company, better known in Northeastern Michigan Conference circles as the Roscommon Bucks, just about wrapped up undisputed possession of the 1958-59 league basketball title Tuesday night with a 53-55 chipped away at their slim lead. Outscoring the Braves, 14-11, the final whistle in the third quarter found Roscommon only two points behind, 46-44.

In the last quarter, Tawas ran out of gas right in the middle of Roscommon's "freeway," and the Bucks rolled over them with a 19-9 margin.

This was the third game in succession that Roscommon has defeated Tawas by eight points. The two teams were co-champions of the conference last year after the Bucks won in their final meeting. In the game earlier this year at Tawas, Roscommon defeated the Braves, 53-45.

High scorer of the night was Moore of Tawas, who made good on 60 percent of his shots for 27 points. Moore, closely guarded all night by Fradl, meshed 12 field goals and three foul shots.

Second in line for Tawas was Watts, who made good on 54 percent of his shots for 20 points.

Hopes of Tawas fans rose sharply in the first quarter when the Braves overcame an early 10-2 lead held by Roscommon. By the end of the quarter, led by their two offensive stalwarts, Ray Moore and Bob Watts, the Braves held a 20-18 edge. In the second quarter, the McIntoshmen added three points to their slim margin and led Roscommon, 35-30, at the half.

Tawas Area's drive began to show signs of faltering in the third stanza when the Bucks chipped away at their slim lead. Outscoring the Braves, 14-11, the final whistle in the third quarter found Roscommon only two points behind, 46-44.

## Jap Machine Gun Found in Dump; Now Property of County

A dangerous and illegal-to-possess World War II souvenir, which was found in the Tawas City dump last December, is now the property of the Isosco County Sheriff's Department.

The souvenir, a .31 caliber Japanese Nambu light machine gun, was found by C. Oliver Champine of Tawas City and turned over immediately to sheriff's department officers.

Rusted and corroded from the weather, the weapon was cleaned, repaired and is now registered with the Federal Alcoholic Tax Unit, Bay City, as the property of the county.

Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell said that the weapon probably had been carried home from some Pacific island by a World War II veteran. Possession of such an automatic firing weapon, unless it is rendered permanently inoperative, is contrary to federal law.

## FIRE CAUSED \$5,000 DAMAGE TO SCHOOL BUILDING

Fire of undetermined origin caused approximately \$5,000 damage to a garage building, which was being used for a classroom, at the Sherman Township School last Saturday morning. Whittemore firemen battled the blaze for about one hour before bringing it under control.

The brick and steel building, which was originally constructed for use as a bus garage, had been rebuilt since the re-organization of the Whittemore-Prescott Area School District and was being used as a farm and wood-working shop.

The blaze was discovered by George Kohn of National City, rural mail carrier, about 10:45 o'clock while he was making mail deliveries.

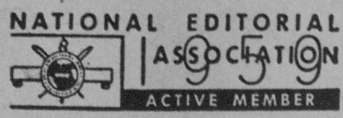
Edward Gerard, school custodian, told investigating state police officers that he had entered the building about 10 o'clock and noticed no fire at that time.

## NIGHT CLASSES IN ALGEBRA II BEING HELD

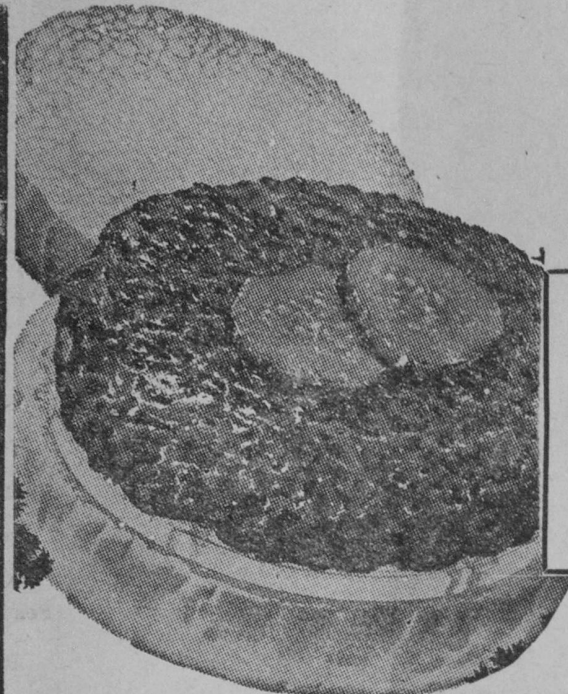

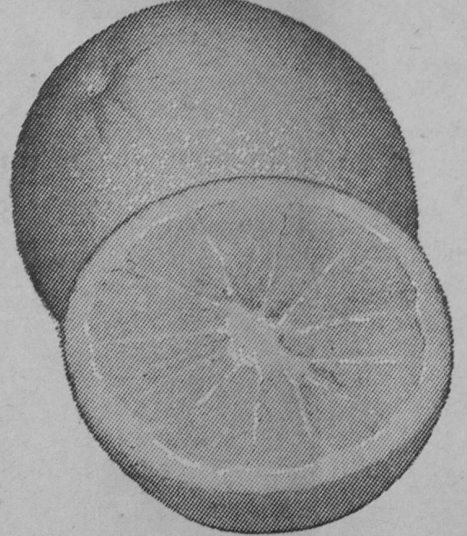

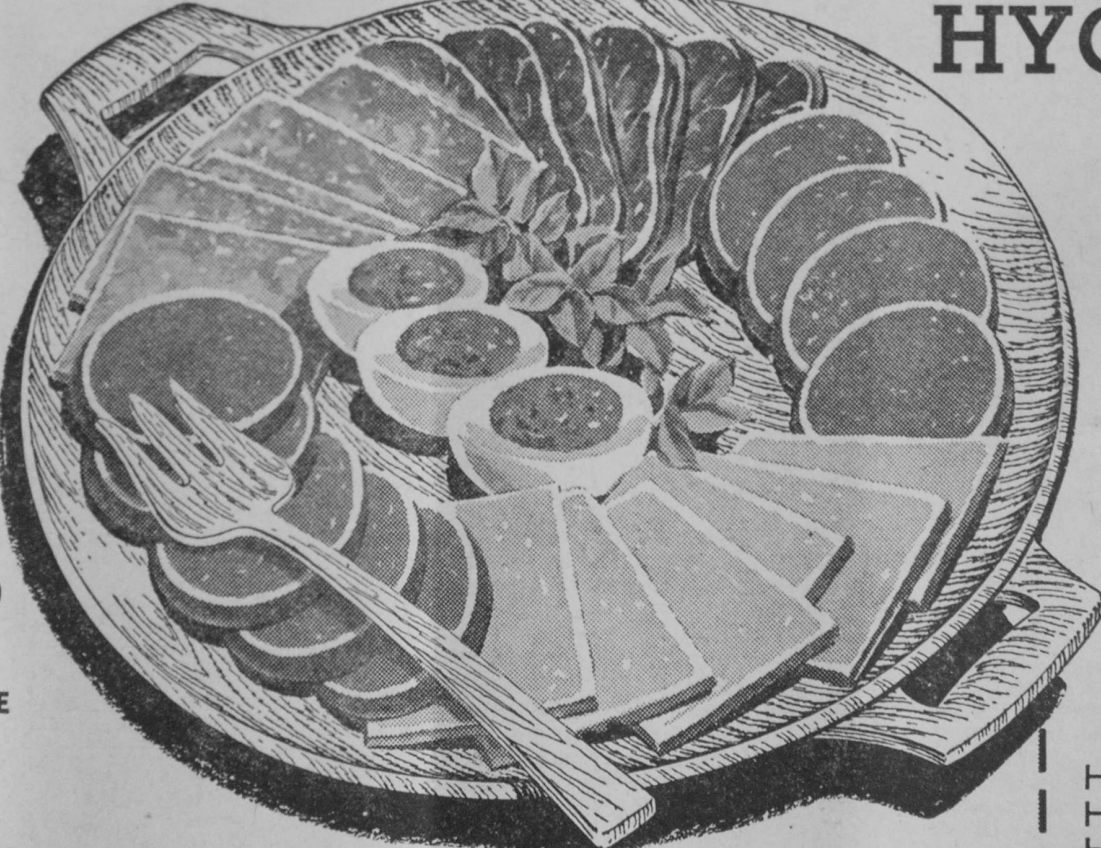

### Sgt. Konetshny Retires from State Police

Detective Sgt. Conrad C. Konetshny, 56, who was stationed at the Michigan State Police in East Tawas during the 1930s, retired last week after one of the most colorful careers in state police annals. He has no retirement plans except for spending more time at his cottage near East Tawas.

The exploits of "Konnie," as he was known by his fellow officers and nearly all who knew him, made him a living legend before many present young troopers had turned from shooting marbles to pistols.

Receiving eight citations for meritorious work, "Konnie's" legendary career ran the gamut from his assignment here as a motorcycle patrolman to being a Nazi "spy" for the state police.

Born on an Illinois farm near the Mississippi River, Konetshny became trooper 96 in the state police force of 1930. His career ended three years later in the depression-era cuts and was not rehired until 1935 when he was recalled to duty at East Tawas, then a new post.

As World War II neared, his ability to read and write German led to detached duty with army intelligence at Fort Wayne in Detroit, to infiltrate the German-American Bund.

After the war, Konetshny worked on the still-unsolved Lydia Thompson murder case; the Macomb and Wayne County grand juries; became a specialist on safe crackings and helped send several racketeers to prison for cigarette smuggling, which was costing Michigan nearly \$3,000,000 in unpaid taxes.

During his retirement, Konetshny plans to visit some of the 54 state police posts to see "if some of the old breed of trooper is still around."
