Chamber Board Approves Membership Plan

Directors Vote 8 to 4 in Favor; Opposition Seen

Approval of an intensified area promotion and launching of a membership campaign for the Tawas Chamber of Commerce was given by its 14-man board of directors at a special meeting last Friday. Final action is to be taken next week.

Hired to conduct a membership campaign for the chamber was the Rev. O. James Crews, John Downes and William Nosworthy. Crews is well known here as the director of the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials.

The proposal was presented to the board at its regular meeting Wednesday night. At that meeting, Mr. Crews proposed to go out personally and contact, as nearly as possible, 100 percent of the business people of every bracket, of every field in the Tawas and its surrounding area. "To the purpose," he said, "to bring in 90 percent membership to the chamber on an equal, on an equitable pay basis. That five-eighths of the money go to advertising, publicity and promotion of the Tawas area and three eighths be devoted to salary and operation of the chamber."

The proposal passed by an eight to four majority vote of the board of directors Friday. One member was not present and one abstained from voting. Voting yes on the proposition were Dr. E. B. Cavell, Emory Sylvester, Lyle Mooney, A. Don Anderson, J. Berkeley Smith, Elwood Bronson, Milton Kotcher and Harold Gould. Voting no were President Cecil Cable, Walter Champion, Bruce Myles and Steven Ezo.

At Friday's meeting, President Cable stated, "Promotion is a very important thing for the benefit of our area. I believe it is something which should have considerable thought and study and I do not think that we can take any direct action by not giving something as large as this some thorough study."

During his remarks, he cited past accomplishments of the chamber of commerce, noting that it had operated on a budget of approximately \$4,000 to \$7,000 during past years. He said that money received had been by strictly voluntary contributions from individuals "who feel they are a part of the community and feel that their share of the investment has been the amount they have felt they could give."

Mr. Cable said that during the past 12 years the area had received national publicity on radio and television networks, notably over NBC's Wide-Wide World program, and in newspapers and magazines. "I'll guarantee you cannot get the publicity that we have had in the past for \$100,000," he asserted.

In presenting his plan to the directors, Mr. Crews said that it was taken directly from a successful promotion used at Wisconsin Dells, a pageant in Wisconsin along the lines of the Indian ceremonials which was started here last summer.

"That plan was simply this," he said. "Not to club anybody into something they did not want to do or that their business would not stand, but to gain a united effort on the part of the vast majority—as nearly as possible 100 percent—of all people who would benefit from increased tourism."

"I think we have in the Tawas area as much to offer as any area in the United States, from the standpoint of recreation, luxuries and entertainment."

"Briefly, then, the idea is to go out, at no cost to the people of the Tawas, and at no cost to the chamber, until results have been produced, to produce 90 percent of the business people of the Tawas as paying members of the chamber. All equally paying in accordance to their ability to pay, an agreed sum that is mutually satisfactory to all people involved. To the end that we have a body so highly organized that each year the dues collection becomes a matter of automation."

Mr. Crews said that it was thought that for an average of \$123 per business, that this year \$40,000 could be raised on the budget. A straight commission of 20 percent would be paid to Crews, Downes and Nosworthy for making the collections under the plan.

He suggested that the chamber employ a full-time executive manager experienced in the promotional field and said that possibly the services of an advertising agency should be obtained to produce the greatest amount of results.

"We will show that it is absolutely practicable and possible to route into the Tawas an additional million people a year, to begin with," said Mr. Crews.

President Cable said that he would not take it on himself to take direct action on the proposal and would not take it on himself to assume the responsibility of a minority group of even the directors on any answer. "I still feel that there are people in this area who should be able to voice their opinion, because they are vitally interested in the welfare and outcome of the area," he said.

The plan for obtaining memberships as presented by Mr. Crews was to separate into units the different types of businesses here, each paying according to value received from promotion. The first would include motels, hotels, cabins, restaurants and bars; the second...

With near perfect weather conditions in the offing and a program packed with new features, the 1959 winter sports carnival should go down as one of the best ever. The big week-end will start Friday night with Reynolds making his annual 6 o'clock sports broadcast from the Holland Hotel. Coming from WJR-Detroit will be the station's mobile studio.

Following the broadcast will be the traditional men's fish fry at the Holland. Veeck, who is currently attempting to acquire an interest in the Chicago White Sox, will be the principal speaker.

Also on Friday night the ladies will stage their annual fish fry and get-together at the Barnes Hotel. Guests to be entertained at this function will be Miss Michigan of 1958 and the candidates competing for the title of Miss Silver Valley-1959.

Following the fish fry and get-together, a spectacular aerial and ground display of fireworks will be staged on the ice of Tawas Bay. This unusual and different winter sports entertainment is scheduled to start at 9:30 o'clock.

Following the basketball game between Tawas Area Braves and Arenac Central, a teenage "rock and roll" dance will be staged at the Tawas Area Auditorium. Featured will be Pete Bentz and his "Blue Notes" dance band.

Saturday festivities will start at 11:00 a. m. with brunch at the Holland Hotel for queen contestants and guests.

Tawas Woman Learns Braille in Home Course

"When those first workbooks came I was so nervous that I could hardly touch them for several days—with a few encouraging words from my neighbors I took an interest in them and they opened up a whole new life for me."

These were the words of Mrs. Amanda Farley, 218 Beech Street, Tawas City, who has been awarded a completion certificate for the home course in Braille from the Hadley School for the Blind in Illinois.

An all A student, Mrs. Farley said that her neighbors had been very helpful with her lessons. For instance, when she was learning the Braille alphabet, she progressed as far as the "m" but could not tell if the character had three dots or four. The workbook had been used many times during instruction of other blind persons and one of the dots in the "n" was worn off the page.

"A neighbor stopped in to visit one day and I lost no time in bringing out the book so she could tell me whether that particular character had three or four dots," she said.

Mrs. Farley will continue her study of Braille through books from Michigan State Library for the Blind in Saginaw and periodicals in Braille, which include Reader's Digest.

"Mrs. Farley is probably better versed on current events than most people with eyesight," said Mrs. Nita Grear, a neighbor.

Mrs. Farley has been blind 18 years. She has a daughter, Mrs. James Carpenter of Xenia, Ohio,

and three granddaughters.

She crochets rugs, knits, raises a garden and cans the vegetables, is a splendid cook and maintains her own home. She is an active member of Tawas City Baptist Church.

Mrs. Farley, who has a double handicap in that she is almost totally deaf, plans to enter the School of the Blind in Saginaw in the near future. "In this way, perhaps I can become a teacher of the blind and help other persons overcome their handicap," she said.

To Limit Parking Lot To Official Use Only

Albert Renwick, city health inspector, gave his report on milk being produced in this area.

Mother's March Set for February 12

By proclamation of the mayors of both East Tawas and Tawas City, the evening of Thursday, February 12, has been designated as "March of Dimes Night."

Starting at 7 o'clock, there will be a "Mother's March on Polio," a house-to-house canvass, in which it is hoped that everyone will cooperate in an effort to make the county campaign a success.

Sgt. Frank Roti of the Michigan State Police, who has overall charge of the program for the Tawas Kiwanis Club, urges all residents to turn on their porch lights and give as generously as they can so that Iosco County will fully meet its quota.

This fifth annual mother's march will be one hour in length. Police and fire sirens will signify the start of the campaign in both communities.

Heading campaign committees are the Rev. Ralph Edwards and Gordon Hueck in East Tawas; George Myles, Russell Rollin and John Hosbach in Tawas City.

A round-table discussion is scheduled to be aired over WIOS-Radio Thursday, February 12, at 12 o'clock noon. These five men, along with Sergeant Roti, will tell the need for another successful campaign this year.

Some 3,100 return address contribution mailers were sent out to Iosco County residents this week, reports Mr. Myles, who has overall charge of the March of Dimes Campaign in Iosco County for the Tawas Kiwanis Club. Mr. Myles succeeds the late Nathan Barkman, who had charge of this project for years, and John Watkins, who is unable to participate this year because of illness.

The drive will be implemented

this year in the Plainfield Township area by the Hale Lions Club, which has charge of collections there. Serge Thomsson is chairman.

Consistors for collections were placed in business establishments of the Tawas this week. Richard Harwood has charge of this program in East Tawas and E. D. Jacques has charge in Tawas City.

Find Solution to Valley Differences

Differences between the Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee and the United States Forestry Service were settled at a joint meeting last Thursday night.

Two weeks ago the forestry service informed the committee that its contract for operating the winter sports area in Huron National Forest would not be renewed in 1961 because "of the continued inability of this group to operate in a manner consistent with good safety and sanitation standards."

After the meeting, Louis Pommerening, forest supervisor of Cadillac, said that both sides had a better understanding of each other's problems as a result of the discussion. "It was brought out," he said, "that most of the things which were recommended have already been taken care of and some will be undertaken before September 1."

It was suggested that the meetings be held annually because of the need of better liaison between the two groups for a successful operation of the park.

Sunday, April 26, is the date set for the Tawas Area Community Chorus annual spring concert. Emil Sass, president, announced that it would be an evening program held in the Tawas Area High School auditorium.

The 36 member chorus, under the direction of Richard Ferguson, is now rehearsing for the hour and one-half long program. The program is made up of an interesting variety of secular and sacred music, including numbers from "The Peaceable Kingdom" by Randall Thompson, Bach chorals, Russian and American folk songs, a number from Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Carousel" and other well chosen songs.

The chorus is a non-profit community organization which offers the opportunity for local men and women to develop their talents in singing.

It is supported by sponsors, patron members, membership fees and concert admissions.

A registered high school basketball and football official, LaCourse's interest in athletics was instrumental in organizing the booster club which helped the board of education realize a new lighted athletic field at the school.

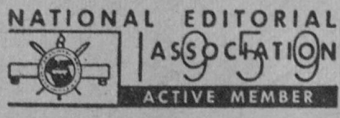
Mrs. LaCourse and their three children will move to Lansing later this spring.

Included on the evening's program will be representatives and senators from the 10th district along with state and national officials.

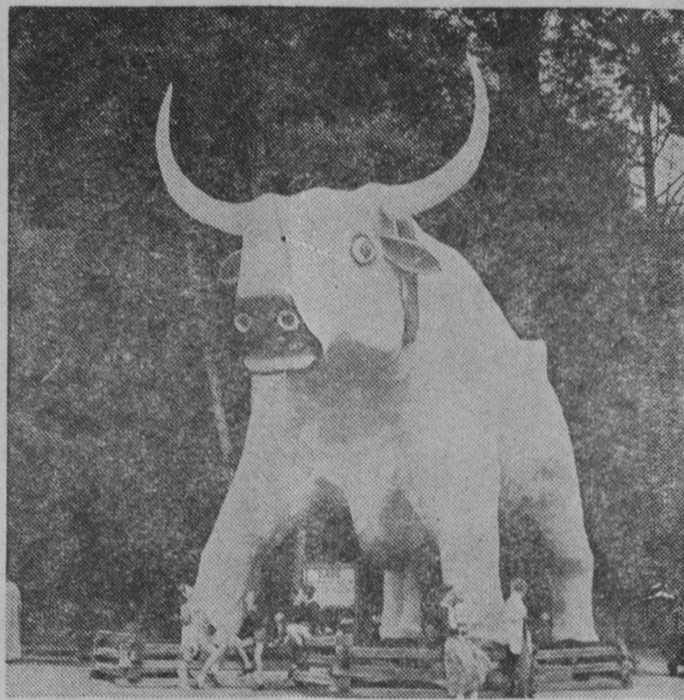

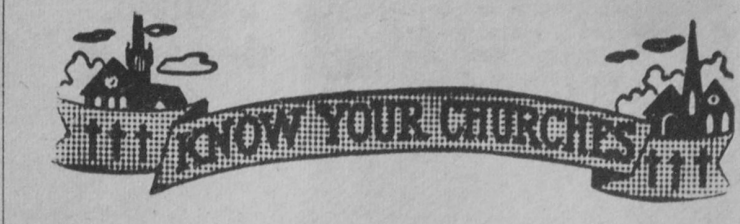

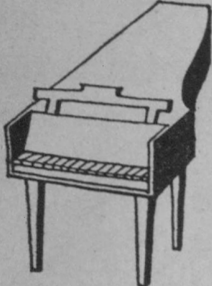

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up last summer and you will get an idea of what kind of a job you did. If the feed is other than a dark or olive green color with little smell and clean sour taste, it was put up too wet or too dry and fermentation was not good.

S. D. Dexter, farm crops scientist at the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station, lists the following types of silage and the causes for the condition.

If it is dark in color and has a sweet tobacco smell plus a slightly sour taste, it was put up too dry and not packed enough. Air got in and the silage heated.

If the silage is light green in color rather damp with a bad smell and bitter taste, it was put up too damp, too fast or it got a lot of rainwater during filling. Sometimes it is this way only on the bottom due to drainage water.

If the color is good but the smell is strong along with some dampness near the top and end surfaces, chances are melting snow or rainwater got into the silage and is damaging an otherwise good feed. It needs protection.

Molding spots indicate air getting in, either through dryness, poor packing or because water is carrying air in with it. Most of these conditions can be corrected at filling time next season.

Some Iosco County farmers are finding leptospirosis a problem. Dr. Lloyd Ferguson, head of the microbiology and public health department at Michigan State University says that since the

cleanup of brucellosis in the state, many cases of leptospirosis have been uncovered which were formerly thought to have been brucellosis. This is because both diseases have similar symptoms of loss in milk production, loss of weight and premature birth of dead calves and pigs. Because of this similarity of symptoms and the resulting confusion, it is suspected leptospirosis has been with us a long time.

No one is sure just how widespread leptospirosis is in Michigan because no state-wide survey has been made. However, blood tests reveal that five to 10 percent of the cattle and hogs in our state may be infected.

There is no sure field test available so you must be alert to livestock health. The leptospirosis animal has its acute stage one week after getting the disease. A young calf may have a high fever and go off feed for two or three days. Some develop blood in the urine and a few die. Two or four weeks later, an abortion may develop. Many farmers overlook the first symptoms and then fail to connect those symptoms with the later abortion and leave the disease free to spread.

Calling a veterinarian when the first symptoms appear, the disease can be controlled by a vaccine. A vaccinated program should be started if leptospirosis is known to be in the area.

Here is a reminder from dairy specialists at Michigan State University: Clean vacuum lines on milking equipment regularly. Dirty lines can slow milking time even when the pump, motor and milking units are in good condition, they say.

Lines should be flushed with a lye solution made of one can of lye in 12 to 14 quarts of water. Suck a quart or two of the hot solution through several of the stall cocks starting with the one closest to the pump. Follow with a hot water rinse and let the pump run with cocks partly open to dry out the line.

If line is rinsed monthly, up to a pail of solution could be drawn in at the last stall cock without plugging the line. Otherwise, it is a good idea to draw no more solution into the line at one time than the capacity of the tank on the milking machine pump.

Charles Sullivan Joins Dairy Group

Charles Sullivan, Hale, has been accepted for membership in The Holstein-Friesian Association of America by recent action of the board of directors.

An all-time high of 2,191 new members were admitted to the national Holstein organization during 1958. They bring total membership to 49,676, a figure without precedent in dairy cattle history.

The association maintains all official pedigree and performance records of registered Holstein cattle in this country. National headquarters are at Brattleboro, Vermont.

More than 200,000 new animals are registered each year in the Holstein-Friesian Herd Book. Over 135,000 are officially transferred to new owners.

In addition, there are approximately 90,000 cows enrolled in the association's production testing programs. More than 44,000 were officially classified for type during 1958.

FARM LOAN SECRETARY GIVES ANNUAL REPORT

Purchase of land, refinancing indebtedness and improvements to land and buildings were among the major purposes for which farmers in this area obtained long-term credit from the Tri-County and Northeastern National Farm Loan Associations of Bay City during the year ended December 31, 1958.

H. W. Beecher, association secretary-treasurer, said the association's loan volume reached \$1,090,600 during the 12-month period. This money was obtained by association members in Saginaw, Bay, Midland, Arenac, Gladwin, Iosco and Ogemaw Counties, the territory served by the association.

Mr. Beecher explained the association is cooperatively owned by its member-borrowers and that this association and 110 similar associations in Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota and North Dakota own the Federal Land Bank of St. Paul, for which they make and service loans. "In other words," said Mr. Beecher, "the St. Paul bank is owned by its borrowers through their national farm loan associations."

Mr. Beecher said the association's outstanding loan account on December 31 stood at \$4,357,581 which compares with \$4,046,054 on the same date in 1957.

National farm loan associations in Michigan closed \$17,162,100 in long-term land bank loans during 1958.

Here is a tip about present-day fashions to be carefully considered—whether you are selecting a pattern for the dress you will make in the workshop this month or whether you are choosing a ready-made garment.

Wide necklines and flat collars are in vogue. Can you wear them becomingly? Or, can you make them becoming by filling them with strands of beads or a scarf? If so, by all means have one.

Many women with small features find that big, open necklines and big collars dwarf their features. It is very difficult, if not impossible, to make a low neckline higher or to make a flat collar roll up narrower and closer to the neck. Remember, the neckline frames the face. If it is not becoming you will not enjoy the garment—fashion or no fashion.

A word about hemlines, too. Skirts now are very short, but from the artistic standpoint, about mid-calf looks well on nearly every woman. And, if you wear clothes for several seasons (who doesn't), be just a bit cautious about having the hem so short that your most frequent gesture is a tug at your skirt to get it to cover your knees.

Clothing style observers say skirts always seem to grow shorter as you wear them, and fashion generally seems to decree longer hemlines about the time many of us get used to very short skirts. By then, alas, we are stuck with them.

Do you know about the "under the boiling point" principle of poached egg cooking?

Bring salted water to the boiling point, then turn off the burner and slip the egg into it. Cover the pan. Let the egg set in the hot water in a warm place until the white coagulates and the yolk thickens but is not hard. This takes three to five minutes, depending upon how cold the egg was.

Salt in the water helps keep the white from spreading. Even so, it is necessary to start with a very good quality egg so the white will have a high proportion of thick white which will not spread too much.

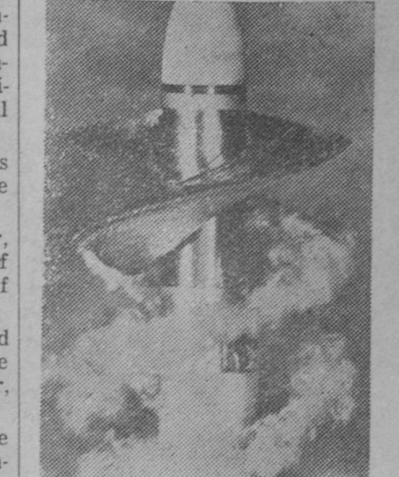

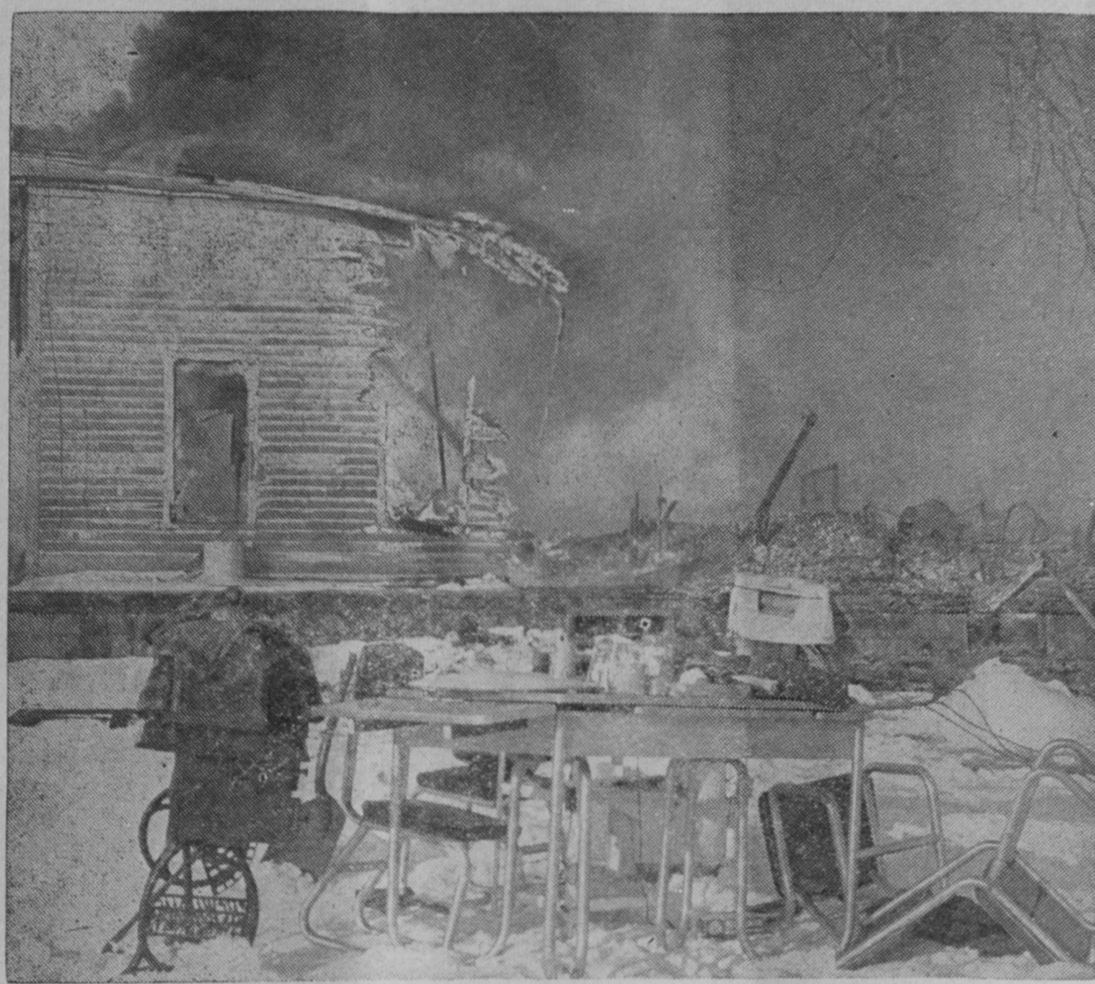

Upon motion by Little supported by Bellville, the report carried upon the following roll call. Ayes: Bellville, Brabant, Kochenderfer, Little, Long, Monroe, Oates, Smith, Stephan, Webb, Werth, O'Farrell. Nays: None.

Mr. O'Farrell for the judiciary committee stated that the committee had requested Judge H. Read Smith to address the board and explain in more detail his recent communication to this group in regard to the care of the county senile and insane persons. Judge Smith informed the board that the county will have to make some arrangements to take care of its senile and insane persons. State institutions are becoming more selective of those they will take in due to adverse publicity, a situation which places the load squarely on the counties of residence. Judge Smith advised the board to have some kind of a committee start deliberation as to how the problem may be resolved. He further suggested that the board should authorize the welfare commission to make arrangements elsewhere for the care of these people while the study is being made.

It was moved by Werth supported by Brabant that the welfare commission be authorized to make arrangements elsewhere for the care of the county's senile and insane persons and that a joint committee be appointed consisting of supervisors of the boards of district health unit No. 2, comprising Iosco, Ogemaw, Oscoda and Alcona Counties, to make a thorough study for a proposed construction of a home that might serve the district jointly. The motion carried unanimously.

Sheriff O'Farrell gave a resume of the business of his office for the past year. The report was referred to the finance committee.

Mr. Harvey addressed the board in regard to the standard resolution presented to the board for the establishment of a county Civil Defense organization. The idea being that the resolution under which the county is presently operating is no longer acceptable to the state headquarters. Mr. Harvey informed the board that he could find nothing objectionable in the standardized resolution and that the board could well adopt it. Mr. Harvey further stated that it might be a good idea for the person keeping the records of Civil Defense purchases and sales in this county appear before the board for questioning. It was arranged to have Undersheriff Putnam appear for this purpose at 3:00.

Mr. Stickey gave the following report of the drain commissioner's office. To the Board of Supervisors of the County of Iosco Gentlemen:

In compliance with the provisions of Sec. XI of Chap. 11, of Act No. 316, of the Public Acts of 1923, I have the honor to submit my annual report as county drain commissioner of said County of Iosco covering the period from the 1st day of January A. D. 1958 to the 31st day of December A. D. 1958.

The following named drains were left unfinished at the date of my last report, (or were found unfinished when I entered upon the duties of my office):

1. No drains left unfinished during 1958.
2. No drains begun during 1958.

During the past year this office has received numerous requests for inspection of drainage problems in various sections of the county.

An inadequate section of culvert tubing at the lower end of the Townline Drain was replaced through an agreement between Alabaster Township and the county highway department, thus eliminating a very evident traffic hazard at that point.

In two other cases—in Tawas Township and in Alabaster Township more efficient drainage was realized when the highway department lowered culvert tubes.

Permission was granted Dr. James Curtis to blind drain a ditch through his property in Alabaster Township under certain specified conditions.

It is expected that a request to clean out a portion of the lower section of the Parent Drain in Sherman Township will be forthcoming.

Court action on the establishment of legal level of Tawas Lake is still pending.

In most of the other cases inspected, it was found that as they did not tie in with established drains, this office could act only in an advisory capacity until such time as formal applications are made.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT OF DRAIN FUNDS

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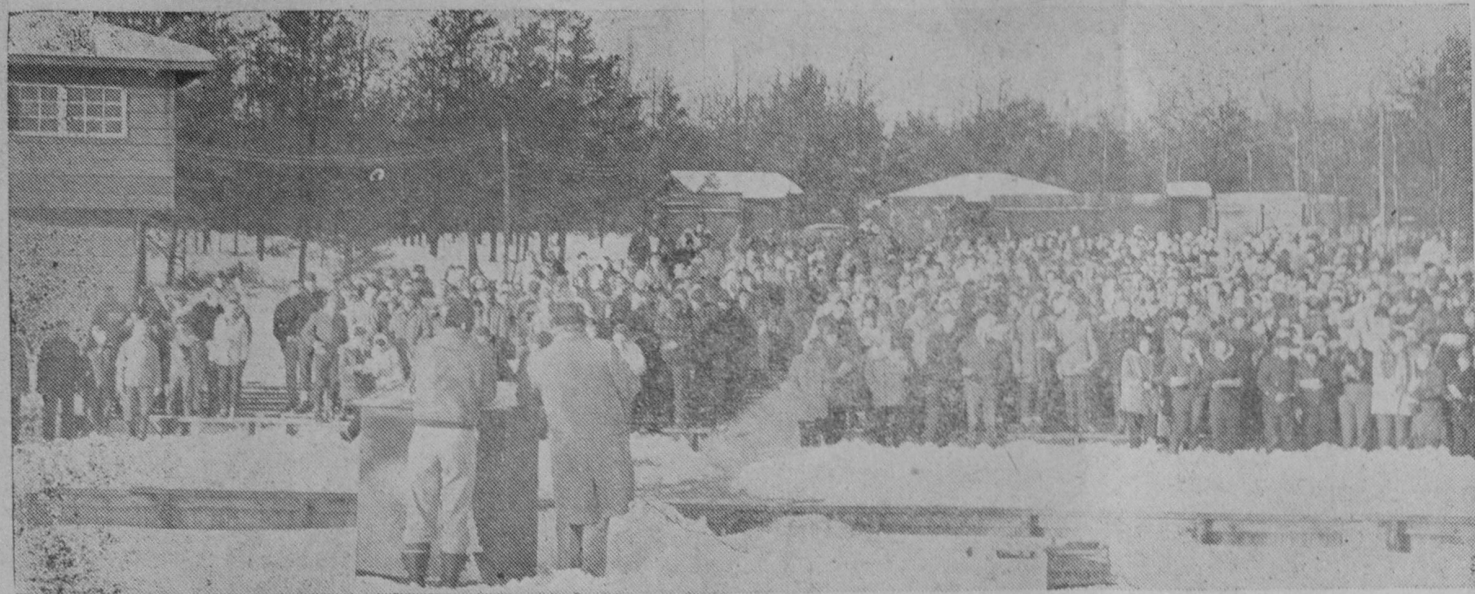

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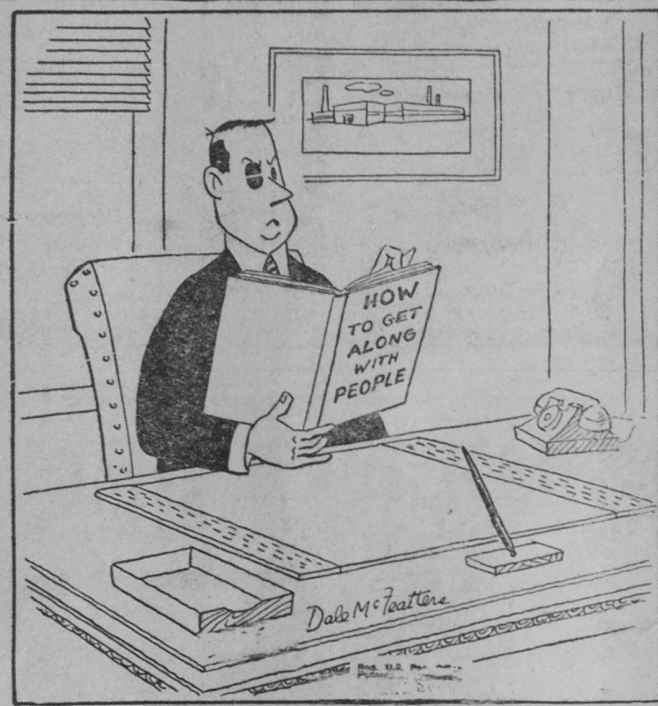

ond, gasoline stations and sporting goods stores; the third would include attractions, such as the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials, and the fourth would be all other stores, businesses and professional men.

"We would set up a figure for dues in open quorum, recognizing the fact that we raise enough money to smash with competitive advertising into every part of the United States by an expert to take the detail load off the man actually engaged in business."

One of the principal objections voiced by President Cabbie was the 20 percent charge for collecting membership dues and setting up rules as to how much each and everyone should be assessed.

The chamber president's thinking was supported by Hugo J. Keiser, who said that he did not like the paid collection at all. He suggested that Mr. Crews give a little of his time and knowhow to set up collections and let the chamber carry out a campaign.

Harold Gould said that he would like to see a chamber of commerce with a membership of 500. "The only way that fact can be accomplished is for someone to go out and sell the chamber. I think the only way we are going to have a chamber that will be successful is to pay someone to go out and build it up. I have felt for several years that this is the only way we can do it and still have our chamber. It would take the load off the president and the executive board so they will operate more efficiently by not having to go out and do all the leg work."

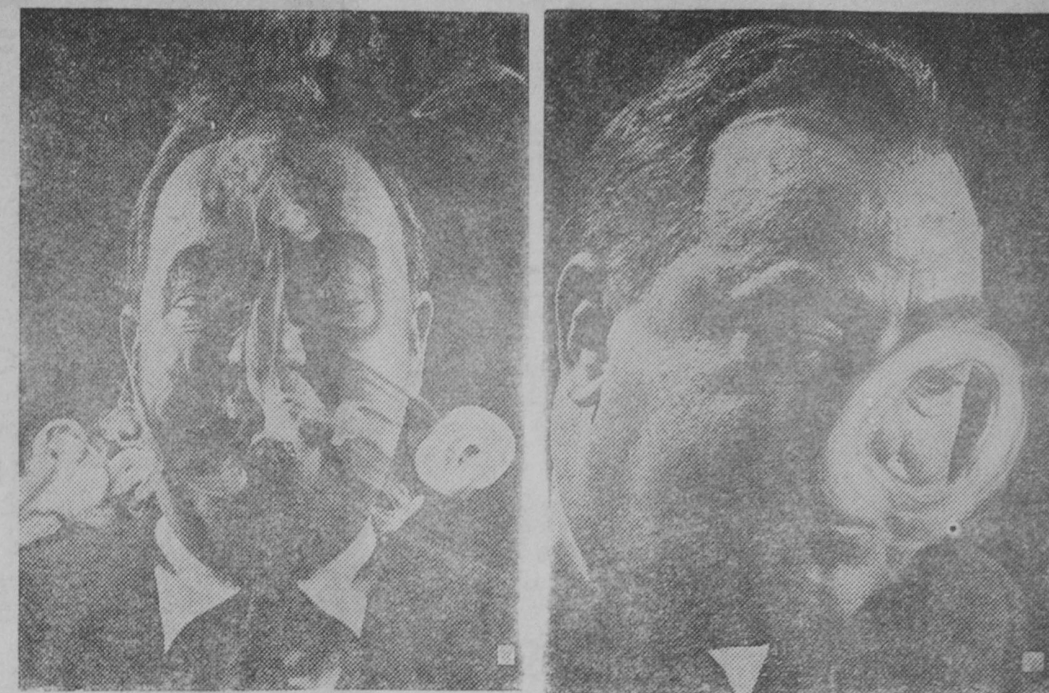
Retired Circuit Court Stenographer Dies in Florida

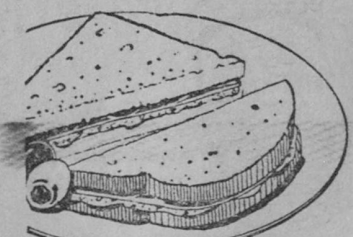
