## Tawas Herald Observes 75th Year of Publication

"The Herald comes here to build and help others to build this city and all parts of Iosco County—it will be your friend—Like experienced miners we have pitched our tent and staked our claims. We shall gather the news, like precious particles of gold, and present them smelted, with dross removed, for your use and pleasure."

Although written in the "old fashioned" style of the nineteenth century newsman, these words, taken from a faded copy of Volume One, Number One, of The Tawas Herald, have ever remained as the primary aim of its publishers—usefulness to the community.

With this week's issue, The Tawas Herald marks its 75th year of continuous publication, having been established here in January 1884.

The initial issue of the Herald appeared on January 10 of that year, with W. N. Miller as editor and publisher. During the ensuing years of its history, there have been five names listed as publishers on the masthead, the longest ownership being that of the present publishers.

Following Mr. Miller as publishers were: Michael Murphy, 1890-1893; Leonard J. Patterson, 1893-1913; James E. Ballard, 1913-1923. During Mr. Murphy's ownership, Martin Bay was associated in the business and at one time during Mr. Patterson's ownership, E. D. Schermerhorn was his associate.

P. N. Thornton leased the Herald on September 1, 1923, and purchased it three years later. In 1945, Nelson E. Thornton and W. Neil Thornton joined their father in the business.

In this, the diamond anniversary year of the Herald, the senior partner of the present-day publishing firm looks back on nearly 50 years of association with the Herald.

He recalled this week that it was in June 1912 when he first came to Tawas, going to work for Mr. Patterson as a printer. Prior to that he had published The Hale Advance in western Iosco County, where he received his first start in newspapering. With two years out for publishing The Rose City Review and a 14-month stint with the AEF in France during World

War I, he has been associated continuously with this newspaper.

There have been numerous changes in Iosco County since the winter of 1884 when Mr. Miller loaded his printing equipment on a flat car and set out for Tawas on the old Detroit, Bay City and Alpena Railway—"at 30 miles an hour" without material jar to the print shop," as he put it.

In that first issue, the publisher predicted that "Tawas has grown, is growing and will grow to size, numbers and prosperity as long as a vessel can float upon the beautiful sheet of water known as Tawas Bay."

He continued, "And now that this bay is by railroad connected with the outside world, it is a matter amongst the possibilities to be seen in the near future, that during the hot summer seasons of the year, health and pleasure seekers will delight in visiting the bay to inhale its pure and invigorating air."

He also noted that "southward of Tawas City are the plaster beds and the town of Alabaster. Here is an inexhaustible deposit of the best quality of plaster—large works are operated there manufacturing land and calcine plaster."

All of his predictions have materialized. The tourist and resort business is now the lifeblood of Northern Michigan and, in Iosco County, gypsum quarrying is the principal industry.

There have been changes, too, in The Tawas Herald. It has expanded from its original five-column for-

mat to the standard eight columns. Hand compositors and the traveling printers have long since disappeared, being replaced with Linotypes, faster presses and other modern equipment. Particular emphasis is placed today on pictures, and the Herald operates its own photo engraving plant, along with an offset lithography and letterpress job printing department.

"During its 75-year history, service to the community has always been one of the principal objectives of this newspaper," state today's publishers. "It is entirely proper to point to past accomplishments with pride, but on this diamond anniversary we look to the future for continued growth of this newspaper, its service to the community and the continued growth and prosperity of the area which it serves."

### Latest to Enter Circuit Judge Race—

## Hughes is Fifth Candidate

J. Russell Hughes of Harrisville, Alcona County attorney for more than 12 years, announced his candidacy last week for circuit judge of the 23rd judicial circuit, which includes Iosco, Oscoda and Alcona Counties.

Hughes is one of five attorneys seeking nomination at the February 16 primary election. The names of two candidates will be selected at that time to appear on the November election ballot.

Graduating from the Detroit College of Law in 1934, after having attended Michigan State Normal College at Ypsilanti, the 51-year-old attorney has practiced law in Detroit, Standish and Alcona County.

He was elected prosecuting attorney of Arenac County, serving from 1941 until 1943. At that time, he enlisted in the United States Navy and served 20 months in the Pacific theater, being wounded in the battle of Iwo Jima in 1945.

After leaving military service, Hughes established a general practice at Lincoln in 1946. He was elected prosecuting attorney of Alcona County in 1947 and served in that capacity until 1958.

## Licensee Must Fill Out Own Application for '59

The Michigan Department of State is receiving a number of letters from car owners asking why they have not received their prepared license plate application as they have in the past, George A. Prescott, local branch manager, stated today.

"Due to the legislative economy," Prescott said, "each car owner will have to fill out his or her own application, or have someone do it for them."

"Providing the pre-prepared applications to more than 3,000,000 automobile owners called for specialized machines, operators, stencils, envelopes, paper, addressograph plate files, storage and clerical help and postage for mailing to more than three million people," Prescott stated.

"The curtailment of this long established state service is regretted, but the fact that it will save the State of Michigan about \$250,000 is welcome news to many. Perhaps doing away with some of the public services such as this particular one is the answer to the present problem of how to raise more money by taxation of the public to get the state out of its present indebtedness."

Prescott said that people are not complaining nearly as much as was expected when they learned that the state was saving nearly a quarter of a million dollars. "Of course, we were concerned in the branch offices," he continued, "because for years we have filled out applications for people who did not receive them or left them home or lost them, and we thought when people read the signs furnished by the state that department of state employees would charge the nominal fee of 25 cents for filling out applications, that we would be thoroughly castigated, but that is not so. Most applicants willingly fill out the forms at the table in the foyer."

"I am not at all interested in the 25-cent fee," Prescott said, "even though they will be considerable. I would like to interest a local charitable, or civic, interdenominational or non-denominational group in furnishing this service and their keeping the proceeds. I would certainly be pleased to hear from such a group."

"I hope that I have lived up to my pledge to the people of this county to furnish them a courteous and fast public service. We feel as badly here as the public does when a line forms and people have to wait for service. Application blanks are available at the office and there is a convenient table where applicants may complete their forms and sit in comfort. If I do not hear from a group interested in preparing the applications, I will furnish the service myself for those that wish it and donate the proceeds to a local charity or fund."

"Deadline for using 1958 plates is February 28, 1958. Please do not forget to bring your title and please ask questions now. Buy your plates early and avoid that big February rush," he concluded.

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### Investigate Attempted B and E at Kroger's

Michigan State Police are investigating an attempted breaking and entering of the Kroger Store in Tawas City. William Collins, store manager, reported Saturday that a lock on a rear door of the building had been smashed.

Entry of the building was not made, however, because of a steel door which was equipped with two locks. To open the door, it was necessary to use the proper keys on both sides of the door.

Colling told police that this was the third time the lock had been smashed. At first it was believed that one of the company's trucks may have backed into the door, but that was ruled out when the lock was smashed on two other occasions.

## Crash Near Pontiac Killed Two Tawas Men Last Week

Two Tawas City men were killed and three other persons injured last Monday night when the auto in which they were riding shot off a curve and overturned southwest of Pontiac.

Dead on arrival at Pontiac General Hospital were Frederick E. Cadorette, 22, of 229 Sixth Avenue, and Robert J. Ketcherside, 24, of 629 Lake Street.

Driver of the convertible car, Robert L. Lixey, 23, of East Tawas, was treated for minor injuries and released.

Two other passengers, Helga Hoienga, 23, of Tawas City, who sustained two broken legs and internal injuries, and R. William Klenow, 24, of East Tawas, head lacerations and two broken arms, were reported in "fair" condition at Pontiac hospital.

Lixey told investigating Oakland County sheriff's officers that he was driving at about 55 miles per hour. He said he did not know the area very well and that his passengers confused him with their directions.

A reconstruction of the accident by deputies indicated the auto missed the curve completely and shot off the road onto an island. The car struck two ditches, careened down an embankment and rolled over, coming to rest upside down.

The woman passenger was thrown from the auto. The other four persons were pinned in the demolished car and could not be reached until the car could be raised off the ground, according to deputies. A dozen deputies worked for an hour before freeing the victims from the smashed auto.

Funeral arrangements were in charge of the Moffatt Funeral Home, East Tawas.

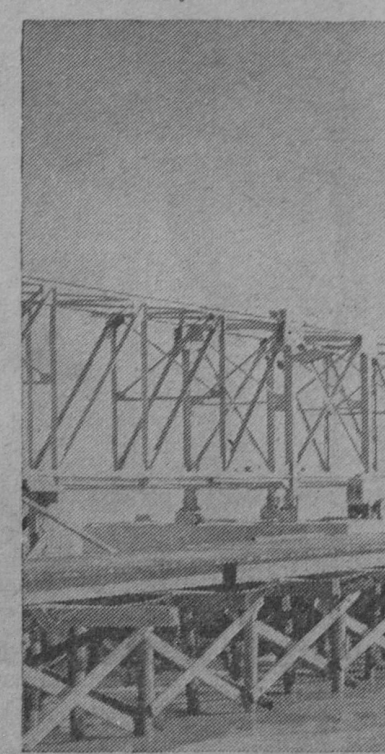

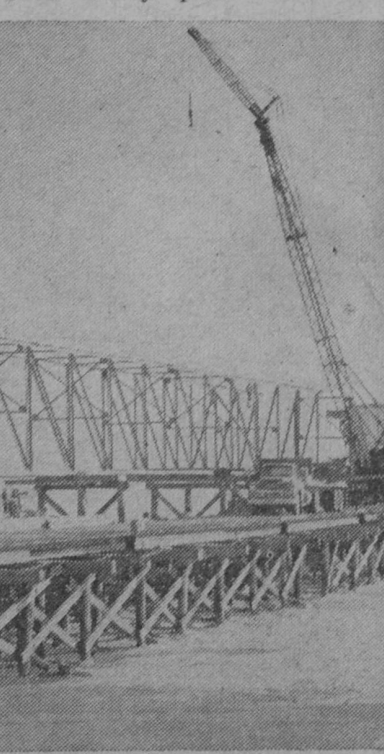
