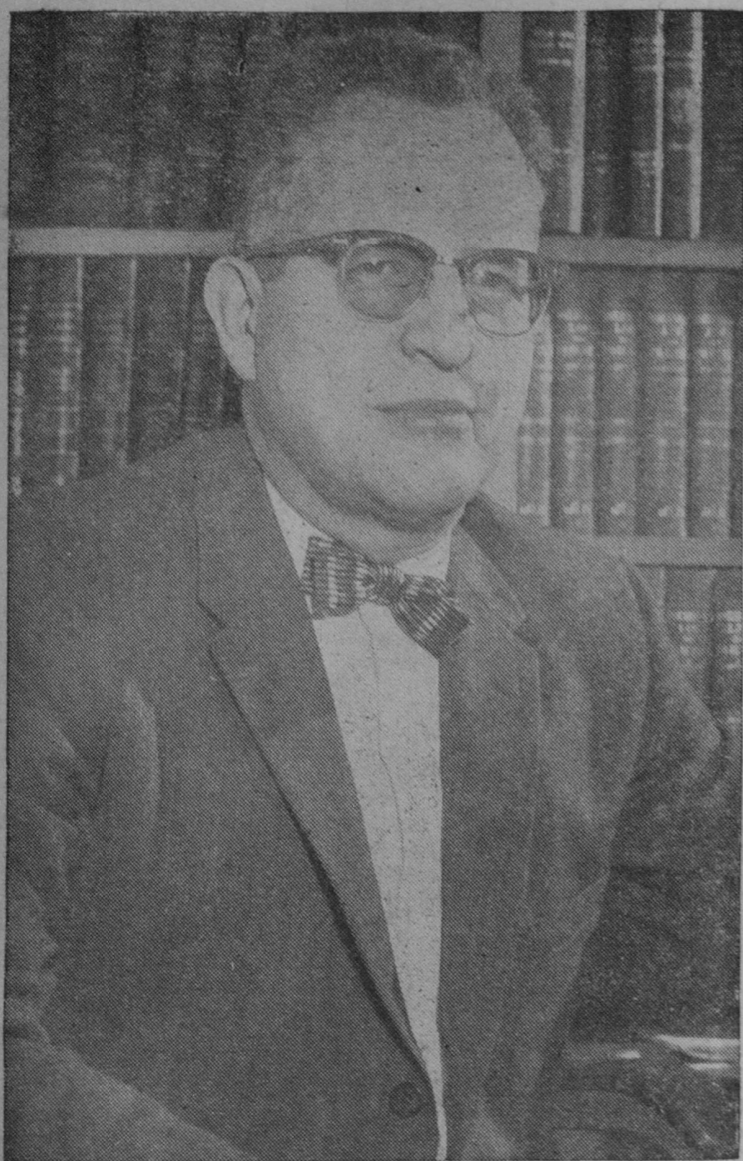

Paul Harvey Takes Over as Prosecuting Attorney

Taking over his new duties as Isosco County prosecuting attorney Friday, January 2, was Paul Harvey, who was elected to that office in last November's general election. Mr. Harvey succeeds William R. Barber, who had served the county in that capacity since January 1955. Illness had forced Mr. Barber to be absent from his office last fall and he named Alfred W. Mason as assistant prosecuting attorney. When Mr. Mason was killed in an automobile accident in October, Mr. Harvey was named assistant prosecuting attorney.

Moving here from Bay City in June of this year, Mr. Harvey established his law office in the Dockert building in Tawas City. He, his wife, Annabelle, and son, James, make their home at 613 Main Street, East Tawas. Other county officers re-elected in November were: George Prescott, clerk; Mrs. Grace L. HUB CAPS STOLEN

Theft of two hub caps from a car owned by Kendall Lovell, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, is being investigated by local law enforcement officers. The theft took place the night of January 3 when Lovell left his car parked in East Tawas. The spinner-type hub caps were valued at \$36.

A hearing which was to have been held Wednesday for the purpose of determining the legal level of Tawas Lake was adjourned for 60 days by Circuit Judge Herman Dehnke.

The adjournment was requested by the Michigan Department of Conservation to allow that agency time to make further studies on the west shore of the lake.

Notification of the request was received here this week and it was reported that all parties in the law suit agreed to the adjournment.

Property owners in the Tawas Lake area and the board of supervisors had petitioned the court to establish a legal level to combat low water problems. Property owners on the west side of the lake object to raising the lake to the proposed level because of possible flooding of their property.

Hospital Auxiliary Offers Application Service

As a service to 1959 automobile license plate buyers in Isosco County, the Tawas Hospital Auxiliary has a "booth" at the county building where license plate applications will be filled out for those desiring such service.

As an economy move this year, the state had discontinued the distribution of pre-prepared applications. It has instructed all branch managers to charge a 25-cent fee for filling out applications.

Last week, County Clerk George Prescott stated that he hoped to find a charitable or civic organization which would be interested in furnishing this service at the branch office here. Final details were worked out with the hospital auxiliary this week.

A spokesman for the auxiliary said Friday that there would be a representative of that organization at the county building for filling out applications. Money earned from furnishing this service will go toward purchase of hospital equipment.

MacAndrew Named Valley Supervisor

Gordon MacAndrew, a party fishing boat operator during the summer months at East Tawas, was hired Monday night as supervisor at the Silver Valley Winter Sports park by the winter sports committee.

MacAndrew succeeds former area supervisor, Carl Eklund, who resigned in order to devote more time to his personal business. Costs and plans for a proposed snow-making machine were received from a Massachusetts manufacturer. A representative of the firm was here recently and drew a sketch of snow-making equipment for possible use at Silver Valley. No action was taken, although the plans will be used for future reference.

Edward Seifert Jr. reported to the committee that 14 members of the Silver Valley Ski Patrol worked at the ski area during the past week-end.

The committee announced that anyone who has a fish shanty and would like to have it placed on the ice at Perchville should contact the chamber of commerce office.

New National Installations are Named—

New Quarry Now Operating

National Gypsum Company's massive new quarry, located southwest of Tawas off M-55, went into full production this week and work at the old National City quarry was scheduled to be discontinued late this week.

As final preparations were made for the change-over, it was announced that the new installation has been officially named—henceforth, it will be known as the White Rock Quarry and Port Gypsum, the latter being the company's new lake-loading installation located south of Tawas City.

The new quarry began sending shipments of commercial gypsum rock to its National City board and plaster plant the middle of this week. This movement of raw gypsum is handled by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

Main job of the new quarry during the winter months is to stockpile a supply of gypsum rock at the National City plant for a full year's operation. Next spring, when the lake shipping season

gets underway, the new quarry will supply ore for National Gypsum's new plant at Waukegan, Illinois, which will be in production in June, and a second new gypsum

plant to be built this year at Lorain, Ohio.

Work on opening the new White Rock Quarry and construction of the modern rock handling facilities started coincident with construction on the lake shore loading installation in December 1957. However, preliminary work on developing the quarry site started in November 1956.

Major work on removal of the overburden which covers the layer of gypsum rock started last August. A new Marion walking dragline was assembled and a 200-foot-wide cut was started paralleling Sand Lake Road. This cut, with spoil areas piled along the west and east rims of the quarry, will extend to a distance of some 2,000 feet. When mining operations of this cut are completed, a new pit will be started at the original point, extending to the northeast.

It is estimated that the 90-million ton quarry, and other future mining sites held by the company in Isosco County, will give National Gypsum a 100-year supply of gypsum rock.

The entire operation from the quarry through the processing and loading installation is highly mechanized. The flow is controlled by electronic hook-ups and safety relays which will protect the equipment and remove the danger usually associated with the rock loading and handling.

Ore is extracted by the open pit method of quarrying. After removal of overburden, the gypsum

deposit is broken by drilling and blasting. Shattered rock is loaded by power shovels into 35-ton Dart trucks and moved to the crusher building.

Going through the primary and secondary crushers, the latter being about 50 feet underground, the crushed rock is sent by conveyor belt over Sand Lake Road to the screen house. Here the rock is screened into three sizes—commercial, fines and cement—and is deposited by conveyor belt into three separate stock-piles.

Removed through a tunnel under the stockpiles, at which time blending of the three sizes takes place, if desired, the rock then proceeds via conveyor belt to the car loading building. Here a shuttle belt spreads the rock over the length of a railroad car which a car puller spots underneath the belt for loading.

The rock is then shipped either to the National City plant, as is the case this winter, or over the Detroit and Mackinac's main line to the spur leading to the lake-loading installation. Special bottom-dump cars for this method of transportation have been purchased by the railroad. Railroad shipments of cement rock are also made throughout Michigan and neighboring states.

A. I. Etkins, Detroit, was the prime contractor for construction of the quarry installation. Sorenson-Gross Construction Company, Flint, was prime contractor for the lake-loading facilities.

City to Cooperate—

Scouts Plan Lighted Rink

Tawas City will soon have a lighted skating rink if all goes according to plans outlined by Troop 74, Boy Scouts of America. Permission was granted for the plan by the city council at Monday night's regular meeting and the city pledged its cooperation in assisting with the work.

Brought to the attention of the council by Alderman John Brugger, the First Ward councilman stated that the troop plans to erect two poles, with flood lights attached, at the Tawas City Park skating rink.

The work would be supervised by Scoutmaster Frank Mark. The city has several flood lights not in use at the present and they are to be utilized in this project.

Permission was also granted to allow the troop to operate a refreshment stand at the rink.

In other business, one building permit was approved by the department of public works during the past week. This application was by Mrs. Charles Schalm for construction of an 18 by 40 ranch type home on Murphy Street. Estimated cost was \$8,500.

Lakeside Motor Sales was given permission to place a temporary office on the Fletcher property for a six-month period. Last month a fire destroyed the building housing the auto sales.

Treasurer Ruth Albertson made her quarterly report to the council. She reports that delinquent city taxes amount to \$8,771.

79 TC Businessmen Get D&B Statement Request

J. H. McDonald, district manager of the Detroit office of Dun and Bradstreet, Incorporated, announced today that 79 businessmen in Tawas City are receiving requests for financial statements during the first week in January.

This mail-out is an annual practice of Dun and Bradstreet. Nearly 3,000,000 requests will be mailed to retailers, wholesalers and manufacturers throughout the country.

The 79 Tawas City businessmen to whom the statement requests are directed are all listed in the Dun and Bradstreet Reference Book. The reference book, incidentally, lists only manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers. It does not include some of the service and professional businesses; such as, beauty and barber shops, stock and real estate brokers.

It is published every 60 days to keep listings current. During the past 60 days, nearly 70,000 new names were added and nearly 65,000 names were removed. Credit ratings were changed during this period on more than 110,000 business concerns.

As one phase in revising credit ratings and keeping them up-to-date, every year the credit reporting agency writes to all businesses who are listed in the reference book to request their balance sheets. Mr. McDonald says that this letter speeds up the flow and processing of some of the facts on which credit ratings are based. "More than 95 percent of all com-

mercial transactions in the United States are made on credit terms," he added. "The purpose of the reference book is to help business men in any part of the country make prompt and accurate credit decisions to ship or sell to businessmen in any other parts of the country."

The credit rating is one of the key factors in approving orders to ship or sell. The rating consists of two symbols. The first, a letter of the alphabet, indicates financial strength or tangible net worth of the business. The second symbol is a number. It reflects a composite appraisal of the background, operations, financial stability and payment record.

Each reference book listing, which includes the rating, is a condensed summary of the information contained in the Dun and Bradstreet credit report. The report includes a history of the business, who owns it, who runs it and how long it has been operating; a description of what the business does and how it does it; a financial section which usually includes the latest financial statement, and a record of how the concern pays its bills.

While credit reports are primarily used by businessmen who want to evaluate the credit risk before shipping or selling, insurance underwriters also use credit reports to review risks, rates and coverage for fire and other types of insurance.

Will Have 32 Years of Service—

Starts Last Year on Bench

Beginning his last year on the circuit court bench of the 23rd judicial circuit is Judge Herman Dehnke of Harrisville. He is one of 16 Michigan circuit judges, representing perhaps three centuries of judicial service among them, who will retire at the end of 1959.

The 16 judges are retiring because of a constitutional prohibition against running for re-election after age 70 or under state law governing judges' retirement.

The impending retirement of Judge Dehnke, one of Michigan's best known circuit judges, has thrown the race wide open for judge in this circuit. Five attorneys have filed as candidates for this position, which comprise the Counties of Alcona, Oscoda and Isosco.

Dehnke, 72, a one-time rural school teacher who gained a reputation as a thorough and relentless investigator after turning to law, will be remembered best in Michigan for his handling of the one-man Macomb County grand jury which started in 1946.

Operating with only \$15,000 for expenses, two "country lawyers" as assistants and four state police detectives, he ended a regime

which had controlled gambling and vice in Macomb County for a decade.

Although it was through that inquiry that Judge Dehnke gained

most state-wide prominence, he is a highly-rated jurist who served 10 times as a one-man grand juror.

Five times he found no cause for criminal prosecution or the removal of officials from office.

Other times, however, his dedicated digging paid off. In 1931 he headed an investigation into the Macomb County Drain Commission which resulted in the prosecution of a state political leader; in 1939, he was assigned to investigate the embezzlement of \$69,000 from a church endowment fund; systematically padding of expense accounts by Gogebic County officials drew the attention of Judge Dehnke in 1942.

His last grand jury assignment was in 1949, when he investigated governmental affairs in Saginaw County.

When he finishes his present term at the end of 1959, Judge Dehnke will have been on the 23rd judicial circuit bench for 32 years. In 1927, he was appointed to fill the vacancy of Judge Albert Widdis, who resigned. Since being elected judge in the spring of 1928, Judge Dehnke has run without opposition.

County Receives \$7,580 From National Forests

National forests returned \$171,010.43 in cash to the counties in Michigan for the last fiscal year. L. A. Pommerening, forest supervisor, announced the distribution of the 25 percent fund this year. The Lower Michigan National Forest returned \$43,875.17 to the 15 counties in this area, said Pommerening.

forest area of 102,688 acres in the Huron, received an allocation of \$7,580.

"People ask what forest rangers and other field men do at this time of year—no trees, no road building, no picnic grounds to clean up," states Pommerening.

"Winter is the season we do the field work for timber sales. Tens of thousands of trees have to be individually marked for cutting, many miles of cutting boundaries posted, volume estimates made, logging roads laid out and the best cutting prescription determined.

"A report for each timber tract includes stumpage value appraisal, the bid invitation and the prospectus for bidders. No logging is done by the forest service, but logging by the purchaser is supervised. Damage to uncut trees must be prevented. Damage to recreation values and to watersheds must be kept to the minimum. The purchaser must cut all the trees that are designated and must make payments in advance of cutting.

"Timber sales volumes and receipts will increase as the young stands of natural and planted trees become merchantable," concluded Pommerening.

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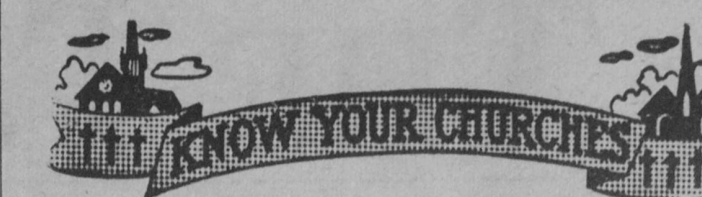

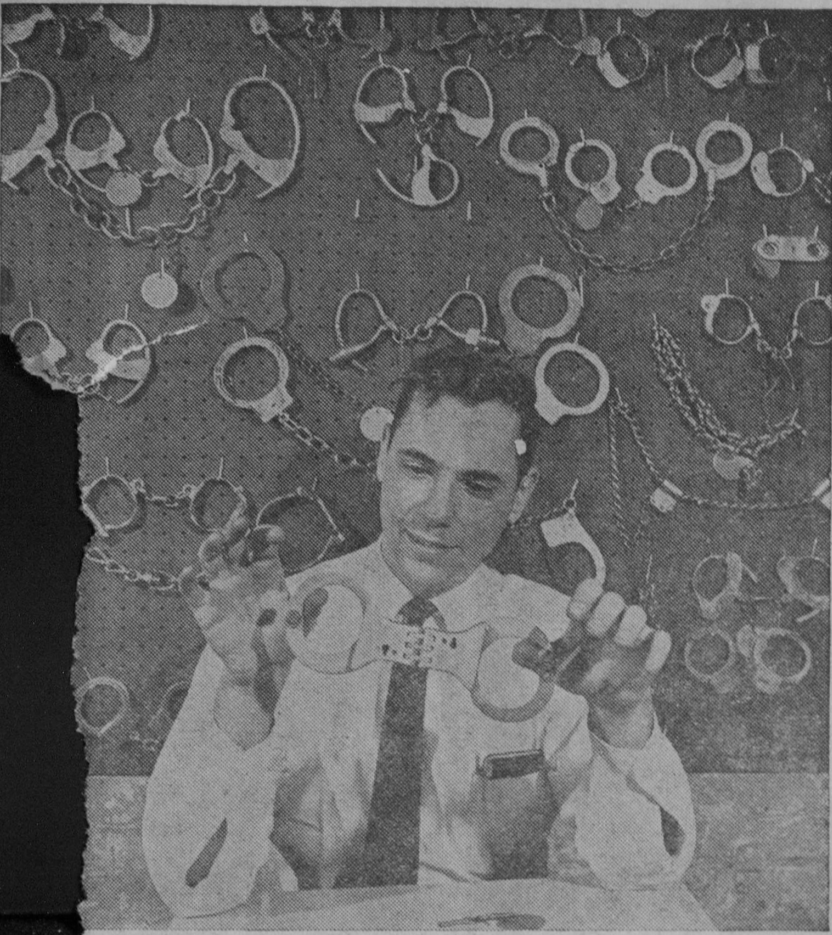

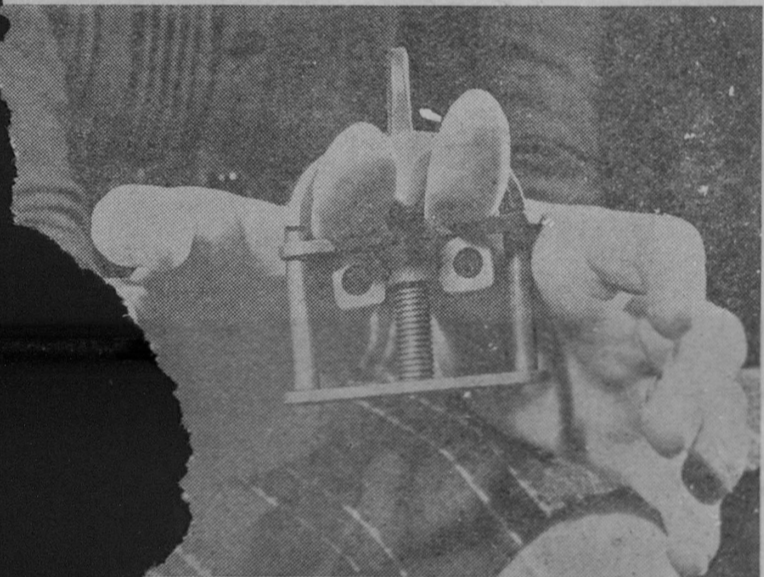


Cuff collector Patterson Smith holds modern German handcuffs against back-

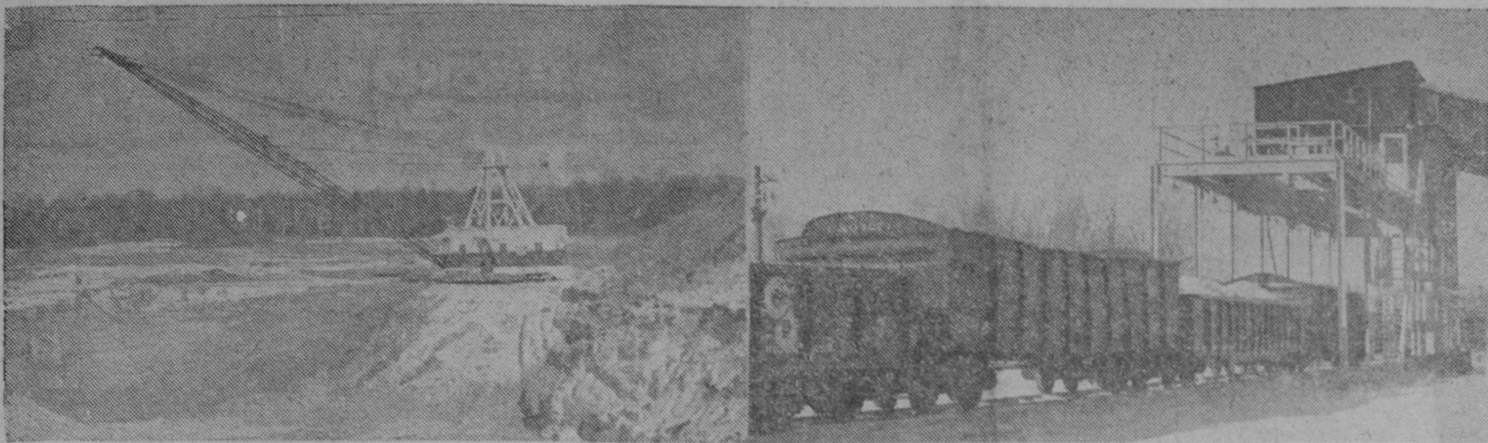

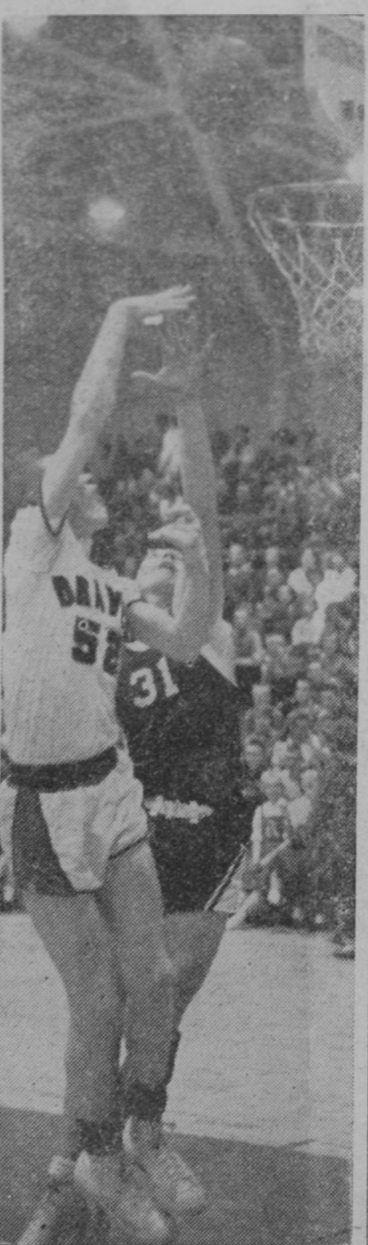

Tawas Area was able to hold its own in the third quarter, Roscommon taking a one-point scoring edge, 12-11, and in the final frame the Braves out-scored the winners, 15-7. Coach Earl Haight of Roscommon substituted two of his bench riders in that quarter, but quickly brought back his two starters when Tawas came within five points of closing the gap.

Roscommon was definitely hot during the game, hitting on 50 percent of its field goal attempts. In the second quarter, as an example, the Bucks connected on 10 out of 16 buckets.

Two of Coach Bill McIntosh's offensive firebrands, Bill Mick and Ray Moore, hit in double figures, but the height advantage of Roscommon told the story. Mick led both teams in scoring with 21 points and Moore had 10. Papenfus, jump-shot and tip-in artist for the Bucks, led his well balanced scoring mates with 18 points.

The Junior Braves lost its game in four low-scoring quarters. In the final quarter, Howard Adams' quint equaled the score it posted during the first three frames.
