Object of 13-Hour Search—

Three Fishermen Ride Out Lake Huron Storm

Three downstate fishermen, who spent 32 hours in a 16-foot fiberglass boat last Saturday and Sunday, were reunited with their families Sunday afternoon after spending more than 21 hours adrift on Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron.

The men, Harry Swartz, 39, Davison; his brother, Joseph, 36, of Flint, and Stanley Bojko, 65, of Flint, were the object of an intensive 13-hour land, sea and air rescue search by the United States Coast Guard, United States Air Force and state police.

At 2:15 o'clock Sunday afternoon, the 40-foot coast guard utility boat stationed at the Tawas Point Lifeboat Station towed the distressed boat and the three fishermen to Jerry's Fishing Resort on Tawas Bay.

There, the men were met by their families, who had maintained a constant vigil at the coast guard station since early Sunday morning. The men had ridden out a stormy night on Lake Huron, during which it had rained and the wind kicked up waves three to four feet high.

The men had left the Flint area and started out on what was to have been a morning's fishing excursion to Charity Islands at 6:30 a. m. Saturday. After fishing there several hours, the men started on their return trip to Tawas Point. At 11 o'clock that night, Mrs. Harry Swartz telephoned state police at East Tawas and reported that the men had failed to return from their fishing trip. A check at Jerry's revealed that their car was parked there and the boat was nowhere in sight.

This touched off a search by the United States Coast Guard and the Tawas station's utility boat searched the waters of Tawas and Saginaw Bay throughout the night. At dawn, the searching fleet grew in size with the arrival of additional boats from Bay City and was joined by a coast guard amphibious plane from Traverse City and a helicopter from Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

A search of Charity Islands showed no trace of the fishermen. Shortly after 11:00 a. m., a distressed boat answering to the description of the missing craft was spotted by the coast guard's PBY plane about 25 miles off-shore from Oscoda in the outer shipping channel.

While anxious wives and children of the three missing men awaited word at the coast guard station, the plane circled the distressed boat until the arrival of the 40-foot coast guard boat. A radio message from the rescue vessel confirmed the report that

these were the missing men. On their return to Tawas, none the worse after their long ordeal, the men were swarmed by happy relatives at Jerry's boat harbor. Harry Swartz, owner of the boat, told coast guardsmen that a rubber molding which served as a bumper around the splash rail of the boat came loose and fouled the propeller of his 50-horsepower outboard engine. After running for a considerable distance, the gasoline supply ran out because of the extra drag on the engine.

"We were within three or four miles of Tawas when we ran out of gas," he stated. "It looked as though we were going to make it when we could see the two water towers, but the wind started to blow us away from shore and our anchor would not hold." The men had left the canopy for the runabout on shore prior to shoving off for their fishing trip and, as a result, two of the men suffered minor sunburn. "At no time were we worried," the men assured their families. "It was a good, safe boat and we weathered the storm Saturday night in good shape. We knew that someone would be out looking for us Sunday morning and it gave us a good feeling to see that rescue plane overhead."

July Fourth Holiday Has Second Worst Record for Accidents

With the reminder to motorists that over the years the Fourth of July has been the second worst holiday period in highway fatalities, Michigan State Police hope the tradition can be broken this year with an improved driving record. They are bending all their efforts toward that objective with intensified patrols and lengthened shifts.

The first holiday of the summer season, the Memorial Day weekend, showed a marked increase in the rate of deaths in the state over last year. In the 54-hour period this year, 15 persons were killed and although the same number were killed last year, it was in the longer period of 78 hours.

Last year 15 persons died in 13 fatal accidents over the Fourth of July in the 78-hour week-end. This year, with the Fourth of July falling on Saturday and the shorter 54-hour period, state police fear many may try to squeeze too long a trip into too

Another Controversy Looms Over Silver Valley Operation

Receipt of a five-page letter from the district offices of the United States Forest Service at Cadillac, which outlined maintenance requirements at Silver Valley for the coming year, will probably touch off another controversy between the forest service and the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

The letter, which was read at last Wednesday night's meeting of the chamber of commerce, stated that the list of requirements must be complied with on or before September 1. If not complied with by that time, the chamber's contract for operation of the winter sports area would be revoked.

The immediate reaction of chamber members, who have

been active in the operation of the winter sports area, was one of complete surprise. It was stated that such demands for maintenance would be impossible to fulfill, and one member estimated that cost of such improvements would be several thousands of dollars.

Last winter, forest service officials from Cadillac and area residents interested in Silver Valley held a special meeting at which it appeared that differences at that time were resolved. It was thought that the most important conclusion to the meeting was a mutual understanding between the two groups over maintenance problems at the winter sports area.

At that time, the people repre-

senting the Tawas area agreed to correct a number of maintenance problems and later carried them out before the park went into operation. These problems, which included correction of safety devices and the like, were of a minor nature.

One of the most costly items on the long list of maintenance requirements this year was a new roof on the toboggan area shelter, major repairs on the interior and installation of a new heating plant. Other requirements included retaining the new shelter with an approved stain, change fences which were constructed last year, rebuild toboggan rental shelter, construct hand rails on bridges.

The official motion of the

chamber's board of directors last Wednesday night was that "forest service demands are not only unreasonable, but have placed the area in the red financially trying to meet the many changes which the service has demanded for the past several years."

The motion stated that the demands were a continuation or contradiction of demands over the past several years. "The only conclusion to be made," the chamber stated, "is that they are trying to freeze the chamber out of that area."

As a result, the chamber is to send a copy of the forestry report and a letter from the Tawas group to Congressman Elford Cederberg soliciting his aid in the matter.

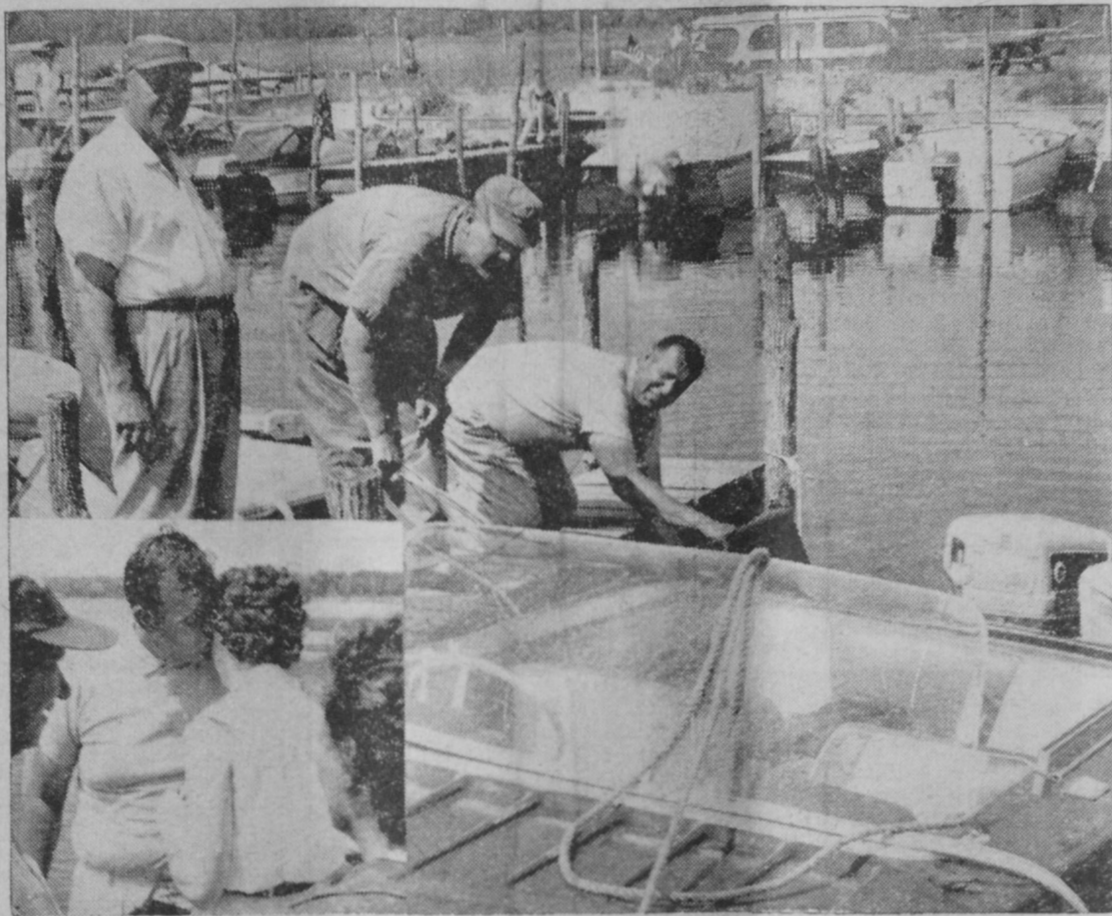

The Michigan State Safety Commission hopes that drivers who have been drinking at holiday gatherings will leave the driving to someone who is completely sober.

A full week-end of entertainment, capped by the choosing of three queens, will feature the July Fourth observance in the Tawas.

The week-end's program will include an old timers' baseball game, traditional fireworks display, annual sailboat regatta on Tawas Bay, beauty and personality contests to select "Miss Tawas," "Miss Tawas City" and "Miss East Tawas," a band concert and outdoor dancing.

Highlight of the Independence Day observance will be the crowning of the three queens in the Tawas City Park Saturday night at 7 o'clock. Some 12 girls are expected to compete for top honors in the contests.

Winners of the queen contests, sponsored by the New Hemlock Beauty Shop and the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, will receive trophies and gifts from business places. Master of ceremonies at the crowning will be Dwight "Lucky" Gadd of Tawas City.

Annual Regatta Set for Week-End

Some 30 sailboats are expected to participate in the 15th annual Tawas Bay Regatta to be held this week-end, July 4 and 5. The races are sponsored by the Tawas Bay Yacht Club.

A spokesman for the yacht club stated Monday that this year's event will be as large or even larger than last year's program. Arrangements are being made to feed and entertain about 300 persons at the clubhouse on coast guard road.

One race will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock and two races will be held Sunday, the first heat starting at 10:00 a. m. and the concluding race at 2:00 p. m. Trophies will be awarded at the conclusion of Sunday afternoon's event.

The Tawas Bay Yacht Club's sailing fleet, consisting of seven Lightnings, five Nationals and two Ravens, will be host to 15 or 16 Lightning class boats. These races will be a warm-up for the district Lightning meet which will be held on Tawas Bay the following week-end. The 110 feet from Bay City may also participate.

The course has been set up this year so that one leg of the triangular course will have a marking buoy near the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas. If wind directions are correct for sailing, the dock may be the site of starts and finishes. Prevailing winds in the bay tend to make this the most popular starting point.

Skippers will be racing for one-year possession of several trophies which have a long-standing history with the Tawas Bay Yacht Club, including the John North cup.

Officers of the club are John Mielock, commodore; Ralph

Meyers, vice commodore; Carl Babcock, rear commodore in charge of the regatta.

Visiting sailors will see and use the new harbor which was constructed during the past few weeks by the Tawas Bay Yacht Club.

As an added attraction in this year's regatta the Tawas Bay Yacht Club will sponsor its junior sailing program. Arrangements are being made to have pram races at the waterways commission dock Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Pending the arrival of sails, there should be around 25 prams in the fleet.

These tiny, photogenic boats, all with different colored sails and hulls, should prove to be an interesting attraction for tourists and area residents alike. This will be one of the highlights of the regatta as the younger set takes to the water to demonstrate the skills learned during instruction programs during the past several months.

Police Emphasize Water Safety

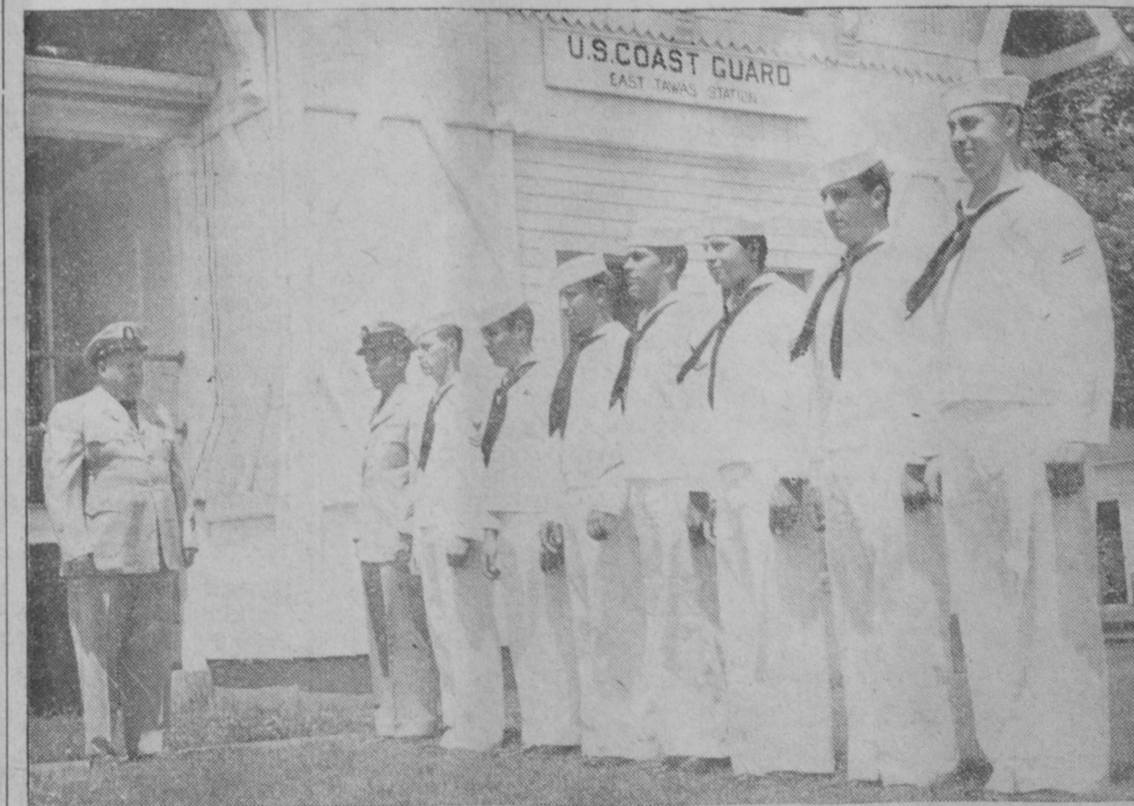
With 72 persons drowned and 43 injured in 100 water accidents reported so far this year, Michigan State Police are cautioning water enthusiasts to emphasize safety on the crowded lakes and rivers over the Fourth of July week-end.

If good weather prevails, water fronts and beaches will probably get their heaviest crowds of the season and recreationists are urged to follow the safety rules for their own protection.

Persons involved in boating accidents are now required by law to report them to the nearest police agency if there has been death, injury or property damage exceeding \$50. These reports and other statistics on water mishaps are compiled by the state police.

Included in the 72 drownings were 10 boat operators, nine boat passengers, one skin diver, one water skier, 11 swimmers, six children who wandered into water unnoticed by others and seven youngsters who drowned after slipping or falling from banks, docks or other objects while fishing or playing.

The other deaths included: One fell off a ship while working on it, 10 suicides, two were found dead in a submerged automobile, three fell from bridges, two rolled into the water in a ditch after drinking and falling asleep, two fell through the ice, one was trapped in a caisson on a dock and another from a river bank and four unidentified were found floating.

Supervisors' Proceedings

JUNE SESSION

June 17, 1959

Pursuant to May adjournment, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order in June session at 9:30 a. m. by the chairman who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Ashton, Bellville, Blust, Brabant, Burgess, Everett, Jordan, Little, Long, Oates, Rodman, Seifert, Smith, Stephan, Upton, Webb, White, Wilkusi. Nays: None.

Mr. Little presented the following resolution requested by the clerk to be read to the State Association of County Clerks at the July convention. Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors of Iosco County, cordially invite the Michigan Association of County Clerks to hold their next annual convention in the Tawas in this county. This is a thriving resort area with the finest of facilities to accommodate your annual convention and the surrounding county affords a diversity of industry, agriculture, forest and a military reservation of unsurpassed development in the state, which should be of interest to all of the members of your association.

The clerk requested approval of the previous month's session as published. Upon motion by Jordan supported by Brabant, the minutes were unanimously approved as published.

Communications were read and referred to proper committees by the chair.

Marvin Davenport, county extension agent, addressed the board and presented them with an excellent detailed report on agriculture in Iosco County. The board expressed its appreciation to Mr. Davenport for the work involved in compiling such a report.

Mr. Davenport requested an expense allowance for attendance at the national convention of extension agents which will be held in Kansas City, Missouri, next month. Referred to the finance committee.

Mr. Little gave a brief report of the tax allocation meeting and the millages allocated.

The clerk again addressed the board regarding an allowance to ward Blue Cross premiums for county employees. Referred to the finance committee.

Committees were ordered to their respective duties, balance of the board to be at ease, subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 11:45, a resolution was read from the Baldwin Township board requesting that this board reconsider its stand on the Tawas Point property and that the Michigan Department of Conservation be urged to acquire and develop this land for public use.

Considerable discussion followed.

Mr. Werth stated that acquisition by the conservation department might be all right but that Iosco County should ask for some concrete plans from them as to what they plan to do if they acquire this acreage.

Mr. Burgess stated that his township's concern was that the land be kept out of private ownership and acquired first by the county or if the financial burden for development and purchase proved to be too much for the county to carry, then the conservation department should be asked to assist in securing this property for public use. Mr. Burgess then stated that he would like to take the resolution back to his township board for revamping before presenting it for a vote.

Upon motion supported and prevailing, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session and Mr. Rodman took his seat.

The chairman referred the request for an appropriation from the Alpena Child Guidance Clinic to the finance committee stating that this clinic was a state sponsored branch of the same unit presently being used by this county at Saginaw.

Mr. Everett read the following report of the building and grounds committee.

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

Your building and grounds committee to whom was referred the correspondence from the Area Employment Expansion Committee, headed by Prentiss Brown, recommends that this board go on record as favoring Senate Bill S-722 and that notice of this resolution be sent to our congressmen and to Prentiss Brown.

Mr. Everett read the following resolution of the building and grounds committee.

We also recommend that each supervisor bring to the attention of our chairman the name and location of any new industry locating in this area in order that the above resolution can be carried out successfully. Further recommend that a copy of this resolution be sent to all chambers of commerce in this county.

Mr. Everett brought up the question of the purchase of a water cooler for the foyer of the county building and quoted some prices he had received to the board.

After discussion, it was moved by Everett supported by Brabant that the building and grounds committee be authorized to purchase a four gallon electric water cooler for the county building at a price of \$193 plus \$20 installation costs from Frank Ahonen Plumbing Service. The motion carried on the following roll call.

WHEREAS, the County of Iosco has submitted a project application for development, including land acquisition and constructing a turf airport at the Iosco County airport, and will receive from the Federal Aviation Agency a grant agreement for Project No. 9-20-061-01, and

WHEREAS, it will be necessary to expedite the acceptance of the grant agreement since the offer will undoubtedly expire on June 30, 1959.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Iosco is hereby authorized and directed to execute said grant agreement on behalf of the County of Iosco, and the county clerk is hereby authorized and directed to impress the official seal of the County of Iosco and to attest to said execution.

Ratification of the acceptance of the grant agreement shall be made at the next meeting of this body.

Mr. Smith asked the board for a letter from this board supporting the efforts of the Osceola-AuSable volunteer fire department in taking over the AuSable River Canoe Race.

Mr. Everett moved that this board go on record complimenting the Osceola-AuSable volunteer firemen for their effort in taking over the AuSable River Canoe Race and that this board wholeheartedly support their efforts.

Upon support by Oates, the motion carried unanimously. The clerk was instructed to send a copy of the motion to that department.

The chair then called for the special order of business scheduled for 2:00 p. m.; that of appointing a member of the canvassing board, a vacancy created by the resignation of Gordon Everett.

Mr. Werth nominated C. L. McLean.

Mr. White moved that the nominations be closed and the entire vote be cast for C. L. McLean. The motion was supported by Brabant and carried unanimously. The clerk was instructed to notify Mr. McLean of his appointment.

Committees were ordered to duties, subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 3:20 p. m., Mr. Upton for the judiciary committee, stated that the committee had no recommendation to make to this board on the Mackinac County resolution in regard to dog licensing by local taxing units and the Ingham County resolution concerning annexation of townships by cities through circuit court action.

Mr. Burgess rose to state that the Ingham referral was too important to townships to pass with no recommendation. He stated that he had studied Senate Bill 1191, which if passed, would permit cities to annex townships by circuit court petition and action and do away with the present system of voting by the people of the townships concerned, where by they could express their feelings about annexation. He firmly believed that this board should go on record as opposing passage of such a bill and moved

that this board so indicate its opposition and that a copy of the action be forwarded to Senator Prescott and Representative Mielock. The motion was supported by Smith and carried unanimously.

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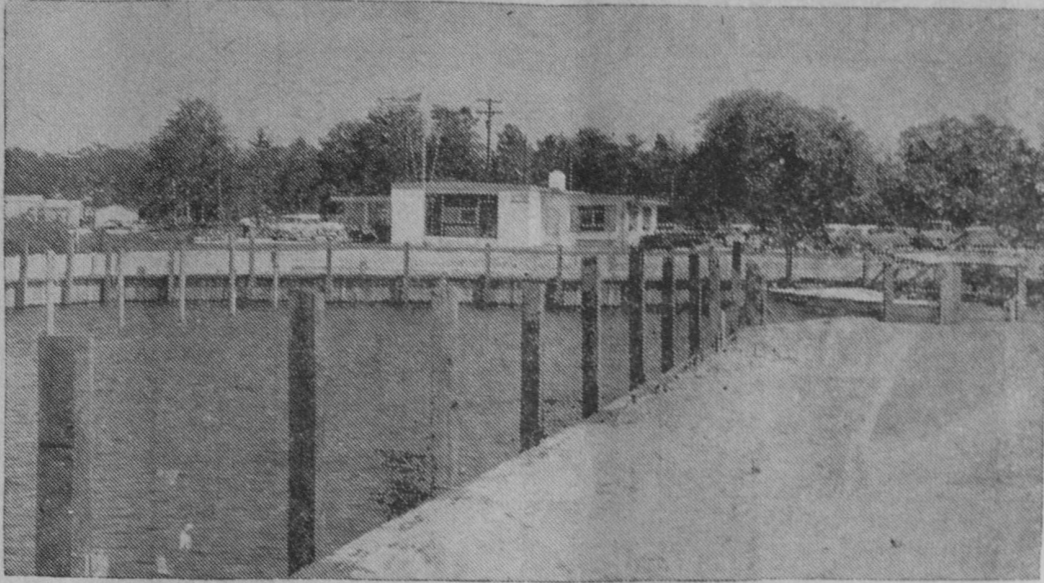

short a time, resulting in more accidents and deaths.
State police will be assisted by 129 National Guardsmen and will pay particular attention to the routes of heaviest travel and high accident rates. Pass days have been canceled and patrol shifts lengthened from eight to 10 hours from 6:00 p. m. Friday to midnight Sunday. Sheriffs will have 96 guardsmen helping them.
If the weather is good, authorities believe a new high traffic record for the holiday may be approached, which means multiplied exposure to accidents. Chances for dying in an accident over a holiday increase by about one-fourth.
"Deaths have been increasing this year, which should be a warning," said Commissioner Joseph A. Childs. "It is up to the drivers as to whether they want a safe holiday or a bad one. But if they want a safe one there is only one way—safe driving."

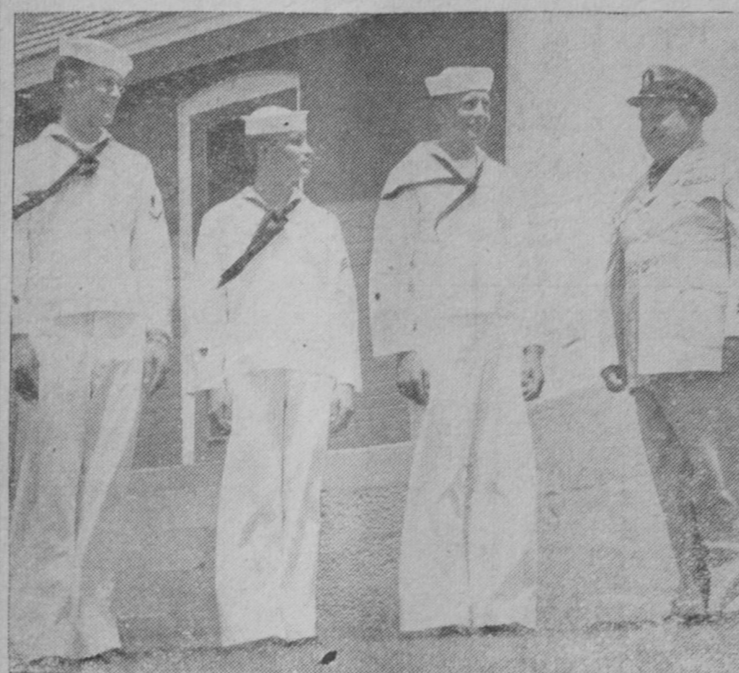

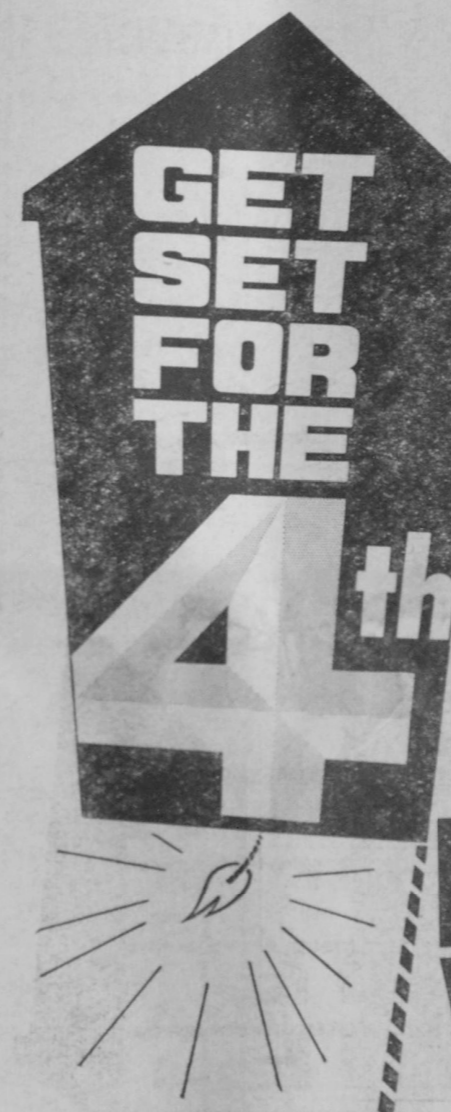
