## Forest Festival to Start in Full Swing

A full week-end of festivities begins today (Thursday) as the Huron Forest Festival starts in full swing in Iosco County. The event commemorates the 50th anniversary of the Huron National Forest, largest planted forest in the world.

Headlining today's program, designated as Kiwanis Day, will be the dedication of a new Kiwanis memorial at Lumbermen's Monument and a chicken barbecue which follows at the old CCC camp.

This event is under the supervision of Sidney Main of Lake, Kiwanis governor of Michigan, and his staff. Attending this event with Mr. Main will be Alfred La Porte of Standish, lieutenant governor, and Fred Stager of Port Huron, secretary-treasurer.

Tawas and Oscoda Kiwanis Clubs, which are hosts to the visiting Kiwanians, hope to see about 350 people attend the barbecue and dedication ceremony. Cecil Cabbie, general chairman of the festival, said Tuesday that everyone in the area is invited to attend—"the more, the merrier."

Formal dedication of the new monument to be constructed later, will be held in the evening. The new monument will replace the one which was constructed 30 years ago on the site of the Kiwanis plantation, south of Lumbermen's Monument.

Stones from the old monument will be removed and, along with new stones representing cities which have since added Kiwanis clubs, will be incorporated into the new monument.

In charge of the chicken barbecue will be Richard Rose and Harold Hammond. Forest equipment demonstrations will be held there in the afternoon and evening.

Friday will be Huron National Forest Day with Joseph Blake, forest ranger, and his staff in charge of the program. Included will be a forest equipment exhibition at the Tawas City Park. Tour maps will be available at the park showing nine points of interest in the forest.

Signs at various points in the national forest will point out places where the forest service will display equipment.

## Harness Racing is Highlight of Annual Iosco County Fair

Harness racing enthusiasts from all over the state will converge on Hale today for the start of the annual Iosco County Fair racing events.

Six dashes will be run each afternoon on Thursday, Friday and Saturday with a total purse of \$7,200 to be awarded to winning drivers.

Featured race during the fair will be a pace for 17 class eligibles Friday afternoon. There will be two heats for \$800. The feature on Saturday will be a free-for-all trot and pace of two heats.

Among the trainer-drivers participating in the races will be the following local entries:

James Wilson, Hale, with "Tyrona Guy," a trotter which has as its best time two minutes, 12.4 seconds.

Elwood McMurray, Hale, will be racing with "Michigan Pat," two minutes, 6.4 seconds, and "Dominion Boy," two minutes and three seconds.

Clyde Correy of Prescott will be racing "Mark Markle," which has as its best listed time two minutes and 12 seconds, and "Frank A. Abbey," a 30 class pacer.

Archie McCorney of Prescott will enter two pacers, "Vic Van," with a best time of two minutes and 11 seconds, and "Wildwood Princess," two minutes, 14 seconds.

Furnishing top competition for local horses in the 17 class pace Friday will be "Rusty Direct," which comes from two straight wins at the Connaught Raceway in Canada. This horse's best time is listed at two minutes, 7.4 seconds.

According to the trotting and pacing guide published by the United States Trotting Association, McMurray's pacer, "Homer," holds the track record at Hale with a time of two minutes, 13 seconds, posted in 1957. His present pacer, "Michigan Pat," is the record holder of the Big Rapids fair with a time of two minutes, six and four-fifths seconds, posted in 1957. This same horse also holds the record at Alpena with two minutes, eight seconds, in 1956, and at Standish, two minutes, 13 and four-fifths seconds, in 1954.

## Midland Firm to Receive TC Water Main Contract

Dryer Brothers Construction Company of Midland was awarded a contract to construct 4,000 feet of water mains in Tawas City by the water board Monday night.

This construction is the remainder of the revenue bond issue which was authorized by the council last year. It includes sewer main construction on US-23 from Elms Avenue north, Grove Avenue, Ninth Avenue and the Spruce Street extension.

Total cost of labor on the project will be \$6,045.10. Spicer Engineering Company of Saginaw is preparing the contract.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz said that materials had already been purchased by the city and that the contract with Dryer Brothers was for labor alone.

The city had planned to construct this water main using its own equipment and personnel, but other projects and regular schedule of work has prevented this. Bublitz stated that the contract by Dryer Brothers was about \$700 lower than what the

city estimated for the labor cost. Dryer Brothers is presently at work constructing water mains in the Huron Gardens and North Park Acres Subdivisions.

## Plans Made for Old Timers Game

Annual baseball reunion and old timers game for the Tawas area will be held Labor Day week-end. It was announced this week. Co-operating in the program will be the Tawas City baseball club and Jesse Hodder American Legion Post.

At a meeting of the Legion post Tuesday night, it was voted to assist the baseball team in this project. A full program is to be announced later.

Tentative plans call for a baseball reunion and get-together at the Legion Hall in Tawas City Saturday night, September 5. An old timers baseball game will be held Sunday, September 6. Times for these events will be announced later.

It is emphasized that this program is for the entire Tawas area and surrounding Iosco communities.

## Judge Re-Called June Calendar Wednesday

Judge Herman Dehnke was scheduled to re-call the circuit court calendar for the June term at the Iosco County Building Wednesday morning. The session was to handle cases which remained from the June term.

## Bill Signed Taking Fees Away from Townships

Governor G. Mennen Williams Monday signed a bill providing for the return of 85 percent of township liquor license fees to sheriff's departments unless the township has a full-time police department.

The Michigan Townships Association last week urged the governor to veto the measure, contending it would reduce enforcement of liquor laws. Many said they cannot afford full-time enforcement. The Michigan Sheriffs Association backed the proposal.

At its July session, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors went on record as opposing the bill and sent a telegram to the governor's office giving its views.

About 3½ million dollars in license fees is returned to local governments — including more than two million dollars to townships which now will lose their share under the new law.

"Many townships were using these moneys not for enforcing liquor control but for street lighting, sidewalks or fire engines," Williams said.

## Membership Drive Kick-Off Held Tuesday for Chamber

Some 19 businessmen and directors turned out for the kick-off of the membership drive for the Tawas Chamber of Commerce Tuesday morning at Ossie's Restaurant in East Tawas.

Records at the chamber of commerce office indicate that in most years, dues were received after July 15.

Other business transacted by the board last week was the prob-

lem of storage for Perchville during the remainder of this year. Mr. Dawson of Timberlane Cottages offered storage in future years on property he owns and is making it available at the present time. As it is necessary for removal of shanties from county property at this time, Dr. E. B. Cavell offered storage space on property owned by him for the rest of this year.

Crews were selected by the captains and a canvass of business places in the area was started that morning. "If we get the membership drive going now we can finish it within a short time," Champion told the group.

The chamber's board of directors was given a unanimous vote of confidence by more than 20 directors, members and visitors who attended the regular meeting last Wednesday night.

A proposal to do away with the present setup of the chamber, by strengthening each businessmen's association to handle dues collections and to assess each city for area promotion, was turned down. With the exception of one member, who refused to vote either way, the group favored continuing the joint chamber of commerce.

Opposition to the chamber of commerce was put forth by T. S. "Ted" Dimmick, who favored strong businessmen's groups. He thought it was unnecessary to have the present office open the year around, thereby doing away with present operation overhead.

In a letter to all area businessmen and potential members of the chamber of commerce, the board of directors pointed out that while membership in 1958 had declined somewhat from the six years previous, collection of dues had not dropped by the same ratio.

Membership and dues collections for the past seven years were as follows: 1952, 225 members paid \$5,215; 1953, 190 mem-

bers paid \$4,857; 1954, 224 members paid \$5,867; 1955, 169 members paid \$5,244; 1956, 168 members paid \$5,201; 1957, 188 members paid \$5,581; 1958, 139 members paid \$4,196.

## Port Gypsum Named Warning Station

Port Gypsum installation of National Gypsum Company, located south of Tawas City, has been officially designated as a Great Lakes warning station. It is under the direct supervision of the weather bureau at Alpena.

Authorization to fly small craft, gale and whole gale warning flags was given last week by the United States Weather Bureau. Radio checks are made four times daily by the United States Coast Guard station at Alpena and this information is relayed to Port Gypsum in the event of possible storms.

Located at the end of the dock, 1,000 feet from shore, this weather warning station consists of a flag tower which rises some 64 feet above water level.

This tower is illuminated at night with flood lights in order that small boat operators may check for possible storms.

VOTE OF CONFIDENCE

LEGISLATION NEEDED

With the ever increasing number of farm tractor accidents and the alarming number of motor bike mishaps which take place on Michigan highways each year, it seems to us that the only remedy to this problem would be legislation at the state level.

In spite of "public opinion" and perhaps lobbying, the state legislature should at least pass a law which would prohibit the carrying of extra passengers on farm tractors and motor bikes.

It may be too much to ask for raising the age limit for operation of a motor bike from 14 to 16. But, by prohibiting the carrying of extra passengers on the bike, it may reduce the number of persons who are injured or killed each year in bike accidents.

Farm tractors are not included under Michigan's motor vehicle code and this would pose a problem. However, it would be in the interest of all farm youngsters that some sort of legislation be forthcoming.

This week, congratulations are in order for the Plainfield Township Fire Department at Hale. This organization, now 20 years old, has grown from a unit which lacked equipment and had only its enthusiasm in 1939, to a well-organized department with modern fire-fighting equipment in 1959.

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# Modern Fire Department Grew From Inauspicious Beginning at Hale

From a 40-gallon soda-acid unit mounted on a trailer to modern, factory-built pumper and equipment—that is the story of the Plainfield Township Fire Department as it observes its 20th anniversary this year.

Organized in 1939, it was pure hyperbole to use the name, "fire department," in those early days. As one veteran fireman recalled this week, "our little soda-acid unit proved pretty useless on numerous occasions. Once, it tipped over just as we reached the scene of a fire—it charged right on the spot and the building burned to the ground."

But, what the department lacked in equipment, the volunteer firemen made up in their enthusiasm. The original unit was still in use as late as 1944 when the Hale Chamber of Commerce and other civic organizations started a drive to purchase suitable equipment.

In 1946, this goal was reached and a brand new pumper and ladder truck was purchased, with the aid of money received from the township. This set the department in motion and a fire hall was constructed in 1947.

Joseph Bannister is the present fire chief. Preceding him as chief were Reginald Caton, Carl Slosser, Hugh Slosser, Dennis Chrivia and Howard Atkinson.

During the past year, the department has expanded considerably. A 1,200-gallon water tanker was purchased, along with 300 feet of new hose, three new fog nozzles which are the latest and best for fire fighting, a second aqua lung with double tanks and two new diving suits for rescue work.

With this latest equipment purchased, the department now has three fire trucks, one pumper and two water tankers. The three trucks combined carry a total of 2,700 gallons of water. By purchasing this third truck, the department will have a much better supply of water at large fires. The pumper carries hose, ladders, pike pole and its new Scott Air Paks, which are breathing masks with air tanks and are used to go into smoke-filled buildings.

In its rescue squad, the department owns a 14-foot aluminum boat with trailer and motor, oars, life preservers, drags, combina-

tion underwater compass and depth gauge, two aqua lungs with double tanks and two diving suits.

The department also has a resuscitator which is used jointly with Lupton and South Branch Fire Departments. It is used mainly for drowning, electric shock and on heart attack patients. Along with this, a portable oxygen tent with two large oxygen tanks are owned by the department.

Also included in department-owned equipment is a portable

generator which is now in the process of mounting on a trailer which would give an electric power supply for lighting or for whatever use it might be required.

Plainfield Township Fire Department is maintained jointly by the township from its general fund and by the department, itself. Last year, the township spent \$2,000 on the department, which, combined with the \$1,200 raised by the department, totaled \$3,200 in expenditures.

The department receives money from various sources. One is by two working agreements it has with other townships. It protects part of Hill Township and all of Grant Township. It also refills and sells fire extinguishers. The department receives money from the federal government when called on for forest fires. In addition, the department has sold spices during the past two years and receipts from the annual picnic go into the department's fund.

The department also received help from the Hale Health Council in 1959. This group contributed \$87 toward the purchase of a new aqua lung.

Last year the department answered 48 calls, or on an average of about one a week. Thirty-seven of these calls were within the township and 11 were out of the township under working agreements or mutual protection agreements. Of the 37 within the township, 11 were building fires, 24 were grass fires, one a resuscitator call and one car fire. Of the 24 grass fires, 18 were the result of careless burning.

The fire loss last year was the largest since the department was organized. A large part of this \$59,770 loss was attributed to the Hale Community Building fire.

The firemen practice every Monday night, 52 weeks a year and averages about 20 to 25 members on the roll call at all times. A member who attends regularly could put in as high as 150 hours a year just in practice, plus the time spent at fires each year. All this is done voluntarily and without pay.

Last year the department held a fire school which consisted of three hours of instruction per night for five nights. The department paid \$120 to have Wally Gannon, former fire chief of Muskegon and now an instructor at the University of Michigan. He taught the firemen many new ideas on fire prevention and fire fighting.

All equipment owned by the department will be on display at the county fair which starts today (Thursday) at Hale. Anyone wishing to see the equipment is welcome to visit the department's booth.

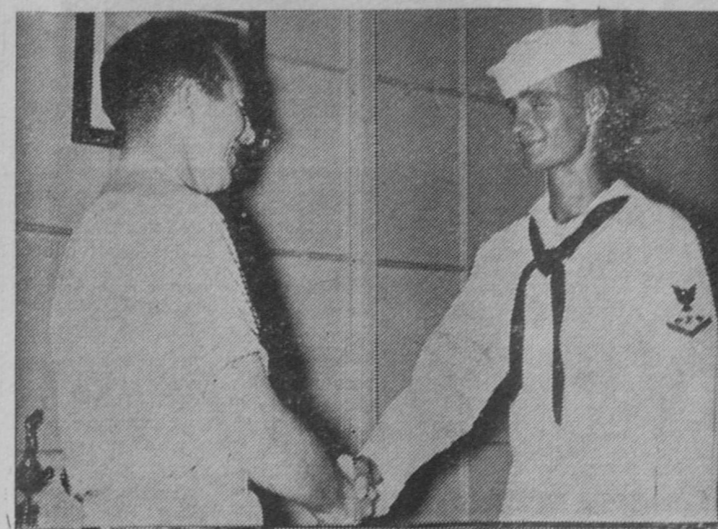

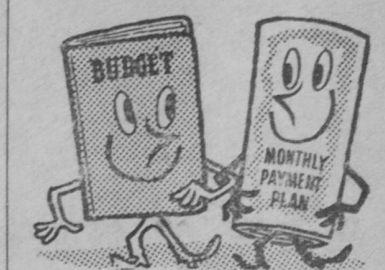
Those interested in a hobby will like "The Rock-Hunter's Field Manual" by Fritzen. This is a guide for amateurs who go prospecting for the fun of it.

Many trees need a weekly drink of water this summer.

Spencer Potter, extension plant pathologist at Michigan State University, says drought often causes unhealthy, brownish leaf coloring. Tree roots grow deep, so the specialist advises soaking soil to a depth of five inches. This usually means running a garden hose above the tree roots for at least one hour.

"Water once every week or 10 days during dry periods," Potter advises. "Too much watering can keep oxygen from reaching the tree roots."

Last winter's heavy snows melted quickly this spring. Runoff was heavy, so little water soaked into the ground.

Many growers water trees through a two to three foot long pipe driven into the ground. Some folks drill holes near the trunk and pour in water. Either way, the water gets right down to the roots.

Pipes or holes should be about two feet apart. Place the pipes in a circle about two feet from the tree trunk. Then make two or three more outside circles, with the last one beneath the edge of the branches.

Water the ground near the tree, then drill the holes. If you use a pipe, put a little gravel in the bottom of each hole to keep fine soil out. The pipe should be one to two inches in diameter.

Hardpan soils absorb moisture slowly. In such soils, growers must pour in a little water, wait a few minutes and then pour in a little more.

Liquid or dry fertilizer can go down watering pipes, according to the specialist. Fertilizing a shade tree is harder work than fertilizing a lawn. But both jobs boost growth vigor.

August is lawn seeding time. The usual dry weather helps in weed control and makes the soil easier to prepare. August 15 to September 1 is the best time. Later seedings will not have time, for enough growth and winter killing may result.

Advice for the best seeding from Carter Harrison, Michigan State University crops specialist, includes:

Slope the grade away from the house and spread and disk in top soil during the first two weeks of August. This will lay the dirt foundation for the seeding.

Pick the seed. Bluegrass is well adapted for open, sunny areas, on fertile loams and clays. On sandy lawns or those of low fertility, red fescue is better. Combinations are effective on mixed soils or lawns with both shade and sun.

Use a fertilizer with lots of nitrogen. An analysis of 12-6-6, 10-6-4 or 10-10-10 should be applied at the rate of 15 to 25 pounds per 1,000 square feet.

Finish the seed bed smooth.

Allow the seed to germinate and start growing before water is applied, but after they start, do not let the seedlings wilt.

Have you been to the fair? Do not forget, this is the week to go.

July is lamb serving month. Why? Because the spring crop of lambs is now coming to market, making that meat in plentiful supply.

There is barbecued breast of lamb done over charcoal just as you do spareribs. It should be brown and crisp, done all the way through. Serve with a tomato and onion salad and green peppers which may be broiled or sauteed, if you prefer them cooked.

Lamb shoulder is ideal for shish kabob cooking. Cut it into 1½ inch square pieces, marinate for two hours and thread onto skewers alternately with slices of tomato, onion, green pepper and mushroom caps. Cook over charcoal, turning to brown on all sides and baste often with melted butter.

"Lamburgers" on toasted buns with baked beans and tossed green salad makes the meal fit for a king. Add a slice of cheese to the lamburger, if you like.

Have you been combining fruit juices for punch and come up with a muddy appearing product? Canned pineapple juice is often the culprit, especially if added to grape, blackberry or

raspberry juices. Alkaline water added to juices of low acidity may also give a muddy effect.

For red color, lemon juice will brighten a red juice. A blue color can be intensified by using canned pineapple juice. Avoid mixing red and yellow or blue if you want the most attractive colors.

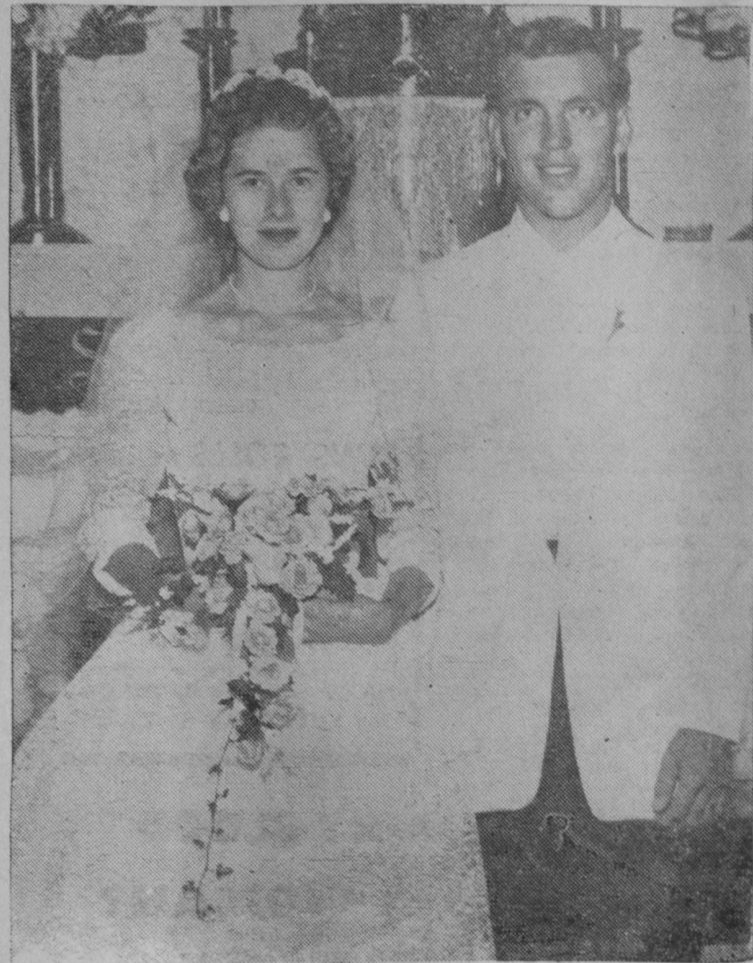

### SPARSE RAINFALL HOLDS LAKE LEVELS DOWN

June's sparse rainfall sent hopes plunging for normal water levels in Michigan's inland lakes this summer.

Rainfall in June was below normal throughout most of the state, according to information compiled from United States Geological Survey and United States Weather Bureau reports. Only the eastern and western tips of the Upper Peninsula received above-normal rainfall during the month.

As a result, inland lake levels continued to drop in the southern Lower Peninsula. They were 0.2 to 0.4 feet below the 15-year median for June.

Lake levels in the northern Lower Peninsula have also shown a general decline. In most areas, levels are 0.1 to 0.5 feet below the 10-year median.

In the Upper Peninsula, lake levels are slightly below normal.

### Panel Proposes Basic Schedule for Salk Vaccine

A panel composed of representatives of the American Medical Association, defense department, public health service and other experts, including Dr. Jonas Salk, recently proposed a basic schedule of four injections of Salk vaccine for all individuals under 40 years of age. A booster dose of one cc is advocated for all persons under 40 who have completed the basic three dose schedule at least one year before.

For infants under six months, a series of three injections of one cc each, spaced one month apart starting as early as two months of age, and a fourth shot seven to 12 months after the third.

Pregnant women should receive the fourth injection prior to the polo season, which is right now. The vaccine not only provides added protection against polio for the mother but also provides a passive immunity for the unborn child.

Surveys show that in groups of children, the possibility of contracting paralytic polio has been reduced about 90 percent for the fully vaccinated as compared with the non-vaccinated children of the same age group. The great majority of the paralytic polio cases last year were among the unvaccinated children.

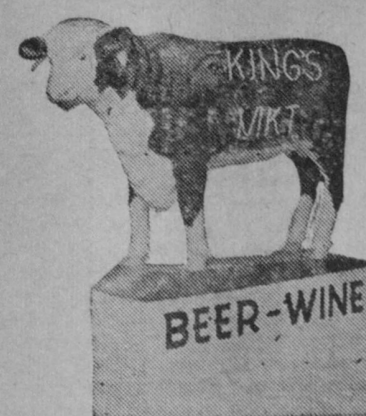

Joseph Barkman of East Tawas, whose interest in historical pictures and publications of local nature has led to a large collection, located a book in his library this week which tells of the history of the Huron National Forest.

The book, "Yearbook of Agriculture," published by the United States Department of Agriculture in 1928, tells of forest planting in the Huron National Forest.

With the Huron observing its 50th anniversary this week, a few paragraphs from this article are reprinted below.

"Fifty years ago Michigan was the largest lumber-producing state in the union. Today it has within its boundaries the largest forest-planting project. Wasteful methods of logging, followed by forest fires, have stripped most of the 19,000,000 acres of timber land in the state of their forests and today there are 12,000,000 acres of nonproductive cut-over lands.

"The federal government owns about 170,000 acres, mostly of this type of land, located in two national forests—the Huron in Iosco, Alcona and Oscoda Counties in the eastern part of the Lower Peninsula, and the Michigan in the eastern part of the Upper Peninsula. Both of these forests are located in the plains or barrens—gently rolling hills having a very fine sand of lake wash and glacial formation which is almost entirely free from clay and gravel.

"In 1911, the forest service started to plant trees in the Huron National Forest, the first plantation consisting of 114 acres. It was found that small coniferous seedlings could be established if planted in furrows. The furrows break up the natural vegetation and make basins for the accumulation of moisture so that the little trees have a chance to survive during the mid-summer droughts.

"In 1927, 4,246 acres of sand plains in the Huron National Forest were planted, making a total of 20,727 acres that have been reforested. Trees are now being raised to increase this program and starting in 1930, an area of 10,000 acres will be planted annually in the Huron Forest. At present there are about 140,000 acres to plant, but additional land is being purchased by the forest service to add to this forest until its ultimate size will be about 550,000 acres. As most of the land that is being purchased is barren, it is evident that planting will be continued here for many years to come."

The article told of the methods used in planting, which consisted of plowing the furrows with the aid of teams of horses. An average of about 2,800 trees, or four acres, were planted per man day. Two-year-old Norway pine seedlings, about three or four inches in height, were used. From 50 to 75 men were used during the planting season.
