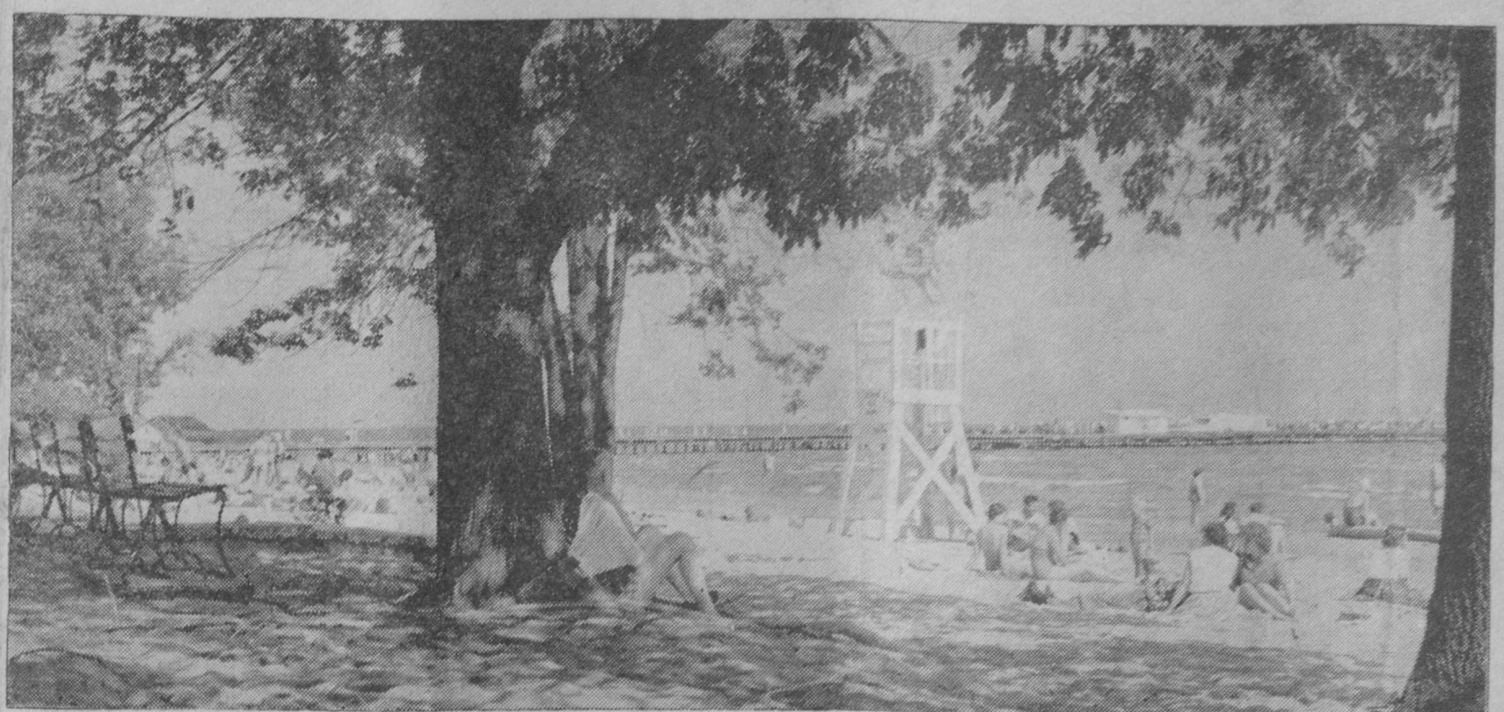

## Clarification of Zoning Ordinance is Authorized

Further study on Tawas City's zoning ordinance is to be made by City Attorney Allan C. Miller following Monday night's meeting of the city council. A request for construction of a new concrete block, garage-type building in the residential district along Bay Drive brought on the action.

Walter Champion, owner of Champion Sign Service, requested permission from the council for construction of a garage-type building near his home to be used as a place for glass tube bending and commercial sign shop. This building would be used in conjunction with his present shop located on US-23.

Champion pointed out that a business of a similar nature was being operated on Bay Drive at a residence and that a boat repair shop was being operated nearby. He said that such a building would allow him to lower his business' overhead during winter months.

After a discussion by the council, during which it was emphasized that this was one of the area's better residential sections, the council requested further clarification of the city zoning ordinance before further action be taken.

Under the present council interpretation, the ordinance, passed in 1947, would allow home craft and other specifically designated businesses to be located in a class A residential district, but limited the size of advertising signs on the property. This was the first request from the Bay Drive area for commercial operation.

In every case in recent years where a request for commercial construction in a class A residential district was received, it was necessary for the applicant to start legal action toward amending the zoning ordinance to allow such construction in a specified area.

Operation of a commercial enterprise in the home, however, may come under a different section of the ordinance. A full investigation is to be made by Mr. Miller and Supt. Reginald Bublitz and a report is to be made at the next meeting.

In other business, mostly routine, the council authorized opening of Ninth Avenue in its proper location. Arthur Ziehl told the council that the present unimproved street extends over on his property. He stated that the official site of the street should be opened and improved due to construction of new homes in that area.

City Treasurer John Hosbach made his quarterly report to the council. The council appointed

Mrs. Hosbach to act as deputy treasurer to receive payment of taxes.

Asphalt paving of 10,000 feet of city streets in Tawas City started Tuesday by the East Shore Asphalt Paving Company of Alpena. Total cost of the work is \$3,840.

Streets receiving a double seal coat are: First Avenue, from North Street to M-55; Seventh Avenue, from Fourth Street to railroad tracks. Bay Drive, from US-23 to Townline Road, will receive a single seal coat.

Tent space may be obtained if exhibitors contact Mr. Lackie before July 15. Free exhibit space in connection with the midway will be made available to auto and implement dealers.

## Command Change Program July 15th

On Wednesday, July 15, in a formal change of command ceremony, Col. Clifford F. Macomber will become the new commander of Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda.

In a special change of command ceremony, which will feature a parade and flybys by base fighter interceptor aircraft, Major Gen. James C. Jensen, 20th Air Division (SAGE) commander, will officiate as Colonel Macomber replaces Col. Thomas N. Wilson, Wurtsmith commander since August 1957.

The time and date of the change ceremony was arranged so that persons visiting the base during the weekly open house programs would have an opportunity to witness the event.

Wurtsmith's main gate will open to the public at 1:00 p. m., but the actual ceremonies will not get underway until 1:30 p. m. At this time, the honored civilian and military guests will arrive at the reviewing stand.

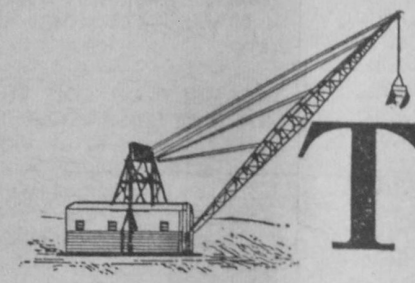
Included among the honored guests, along with General Jen-

sen, will be Congressman Elford A. Cederberg, 10th District, Michigan, who will deliver a short address, and Col. Charles G. Chandler Jr., Detroit Air Defense Sector commander.

As the airman and officers pass in review, a flight of F-102s from the 18th Fighter Interceptor Squadron and a flight of F-89s from the 445th Fighter Interceptor Squadron will pass overhead in an aerial salute to the outgoing and incoming commanders.

A reception for invited guests will be conducted in the service club, immediately following the change of command ceremonies. Colonel Wilson leaves Wurtsmith for a 10-month special training course at the National War College in Washington, D. C. He was one of 29 air force colonels recently selected to attend the school, which is considered by many to be the stepping stone to the rank of brigadier general.

The incoming Wurtsmith commander, who is expected to arrive here July 11, is a 1938 graduate of West Point.

## Near Perfect Weather for Annual Bay Regatta

With only a sudden rain storm marring activities at the end of Sunday afternoon's final heat, the 15th annual Tawas Bay Regatta saw perfect sailing conditions last week-end.

Some 27 sailboats were entered in this event sponsored by the Tawas Bay Yacht Club. The club's new boat basin, located on the lake side of the clubhouse, was a beehive of activity.

At the conclusion of Sunday's racing, trophies were awarded to winners by Charles Schreck, past commodore, who acted as chairman.

First place winners in Lightning class were Edward and William McKinley of Saginaw and Tawas, who took a third and two firsts in their Humbig III.

Other winners in this class were James Schudel of Bay View Yacht Club, Detroit, who had a first and two seconds to his credit. Herm Nickels of Lake Fenton Yacht Club won third place with a second, third and fifth place in the three heats.

Ard Richardson of Tawas was the first place winner in Raven class with a second and two firsts. Richard Cross was the only other entry in this class.

First place trophy in the National One Design competition was awarded to Richard Haglund of East Tawas, who had two seconds and a first to win top honors.

### Kolonich - Kindell Win Rifle River Race

Steve Kolonich and Larry Kindell added further laurels to their 1959 canoe racing record Sunday by winning the second annual Midwest International Canoe Race on the Rifle River.

Kolonich of East Tawas and Kindell of National City, winners of the Tawas River Canoe Race, shaved 45 minutes off last year's record on the Rifle. They covered the 85-mile course in eight hours, 36 minutes.

Second place winners were Ralph Sawyer and Jerry Wagner, both of Oscoda, who finished in eight hours, 43 minutes.

### TBYC to Host District Lightning Regatta

Tawas Bay Yacht Club will be host to the Michigan District Lightning Regatta which will be held on Tawas Bay Friday, Saturday and Sunday of this week. Some 50 to 60 boats are expected to compete, with the top five qualifying for the international championship later in the summer.

This is the third time that the waters of Tawas Bay have been selected as the site for this top sporting event and the second year in succession. Weather and water conditions, as well as the fine facilities of TBYC, were the principal factors which brings the meet to this area two years in a row.

Two races will be run on each of the first two days with the final race Sunday morning. Many of the Lightning skippers who participated in last week's regatta have remained here in preparation for this event.

Henry Cawthra of Detroit, who was named "small boat sailor of the year" in 1958, will be one of the top Lightning skippers participating in the races. Cawthra, who won the district meet in 1957 and 1958, was the international champion last year.

Many other top names in Michigan Lightning class racing circles will be here, among them James Schudel, Herm Nickels and the McKinley brothers, all winners in last week's regatta.

Races will start and finish off the Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas and a public address system there will keep spectators informed as to positions of boats and to explain the races.

### Norman W. Travis Drowned Last Week

Accidental death by drowning was the determination of Coroner E. John Moffatt in the death of Norman Walter Travis, 23, of Hale, who was found last Wednesday morning in a deep pool of water at the National Gypsum Company quarry at National City.

Travis' body was found in about 12 feet of water by Richard McClean, Civil Defense skin diver of Tawas City, who assisted the Isco County Sheriff's Department in the search.

Apparently Travis had gone swimming in the pool, as he was wearing a rubber face mask. Officers said that water in the pool, known as "Quarry Point," was crystal clear and that other persons had used it for swimming.

The sheriff's department was called to the scene by Joseph Rouse, a National Gypsum Company employee, who stated that he had noticed what was apparently an abandoned automobile parked near the pool. It had not been used as a gypsum quarry since the company's new quarry went into operation.

When Rouse investigated the

### New School Will be Site of Annual Election

The new Whittemore-Prescott Area High School will be the scene of the 1959 annual school election of Whittemore-Prescott school district Monday, July 13. The board of education inspected and accepted the building July 1. The election will be the first activity to be held in the new high school.

Running for school office this year are A. Emil Szaanyo of Prescott and Donald Schuster of Sherman Township, for three-year terms. Earl Daugherty of Whittemore is a candidate for the one-year term to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of Colin Perry of Whittemore. All candidates are unopposed.

The poles will be located in the west end of the new high school building in the music-auditorium room. Poles will be open from 10:00 a. m. until 8:00 p. m.

## Judge and Lawyers Take to Boats in Lake Level Hearing

Judge Herman Dehnke, three lawyers and technical experts from the Michigan Department of Conservation took to boating on Tawas Lake Wednesday afternoon. The reason was to clearly define points which were raised during testimony taken during the 1 1/2-day hearing in Isco County Circuit Court which asks for the establishment of the legal level of the lake.

Judge Dehnke suggested the "field trip" at the conclusion of testimony Wednesday morning. He stated: "I don't see how I am going to be sure that I really understand the situation—to properly apply the testimony in this case unless we visit the area.

Somebody is going to have to point out things to me which were raised during testimony."

Hearing on the lake level petition, which was first started by an association of property owners on Tawas Lake and then sent through channels by the Isco County Board of Supervisors, started Monday morning. Testimony was heard from various representatives of the conservation department and property owners on the west and east sides of the lake.

Property owners on the east side of the lake ask that a level of 582.8 feet above sea level, recommended by the department of conservation, be established

as the legal level. Property owners on the west side of the lake, farmers holding large parcels of land, ask that the level be set at 582 feet.

"It is not a question as to whether there should be a dam or whether the water should be prevented from going so low as it has in some of the past years. Rather, it is a question of how high the dam should go and whether it should go so high as to flood some of the lands on the west side of the lake," stated Allan C. Miller, counsel for the west side property owners.

These property owners claim that a level of 582.8 feet would flood some of their pasture lands. The area bordering the lake on that side contains some marketable timber, which would be killed under prolonged flooding conditions. It is considered to be mostly wild land.

F. Duane Ross, who represents the group of property owners on the built-up or east side of the lake, stated that his group was joined, in an unofficial capacity, by Isco sportsmen in the interest of establishing a lake level. They believe that in raising the lake level it would make Tawas Lake a better recreational area for all the public. The property owners, themselves, are interested because apparently when the lake gets low it becomes almost a nuisance. Ross cited the fact that receding waters creates a foul odors, fish are not fit to eat and exposed shore is unsightly.

Apparently, conservation department representatives are attempting to prove, through testimony, that the actual lake basin extends back a considerable distance from the existing shoreline. This land has been used by the owners for many years.

Wednesday's field trip was to give Judge Dehnke the opportunity to view so-called "ice push ridges" mentioned in testimony during the hearing. There are two ridges, one pushed there during the past 50 years and another, some distance beyond, which was created by nature from 75 to 100 years ago. These dates were determined through core samples of trees in that area.

Representing the county's interest in the suit was Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey.

## Clio Man Drowned in Indian Lake Tuesday

The body of a 60-year-old Clio printer, who disappeared while fishing Tuesday evening, was found floating in Indian Lake at 9:10 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Pronounced dead due to drowning by Coroner E. D. Jacques was Marshall D. Lee, who had been vacationing with his wife at the Prough Resort at Indian Lake.

First notification of his disappearance came at 10:20 o'clock Tuesday night when Mr. Prough notified Michigan State Police.

Search and rescue boats from both the state police at East Tawas and Isco County Sheriff's Department were immediately dispatched.

Officers learned that Lee had gone fishing about 6:30 p. m. and at about 9 o'clock Mrs. Lee asked Kenneth Johnson and Douglas Wilson, friends of Mr. Lee, to go out on the lake to look for him. The two men found the "empty" boat about 1,200 feet across the lake north of Lee's cabin.

When officers arrived, attempts had been made to locate the body through the use of lights, but this proved futile.

It is believed by officers that the victim had tilted his outboard motor back and was in the process of filling it. Apparently he went

to the opposite end of the boat to get a gasoline can and possibly lost his balance and fell into the water.

Dragging operations were continued until late Tuesday night and were resumed at daybreak Wednesday.

## Tawas Board Asks Voters to Approve 2.5 Mill Increase

Tawas Area Board of Education will ask electors for permission to levy an additional 2.5 mills on the 1959 tax rolls at the annual school election July 13. This money will enable the board to proceed during the summer of 1960 with a new heating plant at the East Tawas unit.

By raising the money in 1959, it would eliminate the necessity of bonding the school district for the amount necessary to do the work. If bonds were sold, the ultimate cost to the taxpayer would be increased by costs of selling bonds and interest while bonds were retired.

In an advertisement which appears on another page of this newspaper, the Tawas Kiwanis Club and interested citizens of the area urged a "yes" vote on this proposal. An editorial pertaining to this important election will be found on page two.

The advertisement and the editorial emphasize the fact that a "yes" vote on this proposal would eliminate a definite fire hazard which exists today at the East Tawas unit. It was stated that the old furnace, installed in 1926, is located under a classroom and adjacent to a stairway.

Should voters approve the proposal, it would enable the board of education to install a modern, new hot water furnace. It would be located in a fireproof boiler room outside the main building.

Voters will receive two ballots at the polling booths. The other ballot will be to name one trustee on the board of education. Walter Niles, veteran member of the board, qualified recently for placing his name on the ballot.

## 'Yes' Vote Urged on New Heating Plant

Voters of the Tawas Area School District are urged to vote "yes" on the 2½-mill increase for one year to provide for a new furnace and an outside boiler room at the East Tawas unit. Next Monday, July 13, is the date of the annual school election.

An affirmative vote on this proposal would eliminate a definite fire hazard which exists today at the East Tawas unit. The furnace, installed in 1926, is located under a classroom and adjacent to a stairway.

In an advertisement which appears in the Herald this week, the Tawas Kiwanis Club, in urging a "yes" vote, points out the fact that approval by voters would provide a new, safe heating plant located outside the present East Tawas unit. This would do away with the possibility of any disaster such as occurred in a Chicago school. It would also provide uniform controlled heat for the comfort and health of the children.

At present, one section of the building is overheated while the other parts are cold, which only emphasizes the age of the worn-out heating plant. The state fire marshal demands a new heating plant outside the present building when the heating plant is replaced, which is as it should be.

Another important reason for a "yes" vote is that such improvements would make possible the complete utilization of the 13 rooms in the East Tawas unit for elementary education purposes. This will mean that no building expansion program will be required in the immediate future.

It is pointed out that the proposal does not ask to sell bonds. It asks for a 2½-mill increase on taxes for one year. It would save taxpayers the five percent interest charge (which would amount to \$2,750 the first year) and this method of financing would be from 20 to 25 percent less than the cost of paying back general obligation bonds over a long period.

The board of education has been considering this move for the past five years. Final work on the plan was started in November 1958. A favorable vote would allow the board to start immediately toward having plans drawn and advertise for bids for work next summer.

### 10 FEWER KILLED IN JUNE TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

Michigan State Police have reported that according to provisional figures 10 fewer persons were killed in highway accidents in the state in June, the death toll standing at 101 compared with 111 in the same month last year.

But they feared that delayed deaths which always increase the provisional figures may result in June being the third consecutive month to show a gain over the corresponding month last year.

Michigan ran counter to the national five percent increase in fatalities the first quarter of the year, but sharp reverses upward of 40 and 38 percent in April and May, respectively, and the provisional toll in June have brought the accumulated death total for the first six months to 589, or 18 more than the 571 who died last year in the same period.

Final figures for May showed 126 persons killed and 5,176 injured in 14,260 accidents. In addition to the gain in deaths, injuries and accidents were both up nine and eight percent, respectively, compared with May last year. Injuries have now increased in seven of the last eight months and accidents have gained for seven consecutive months.

Mileage traveled during the first four months, the latest figures available, was 9.2 billion, up one percent over the same period last year. The death rate per 100 million miles of travel was 3.9, down three percent.

Rural highway checks by the highway department showed a gain of 7½ percent in travel in May compared with the same month last year and mileage for the first half of the year is up about three percent.

## STATE POLICE MAKE 26,382 ARRESTS IN MAY

Michigan State Police officers made 26,382 arrests in May including 1,979 for criminal offenses, not including 551 juvenile offenders and 20 wayward minors apprehended. The remaining 24,403 arrests were for traffic violations and did not include 701 juvenile traffic offenders.

Troopers made 36,157 property and 5,270 liquor inspections. Complaints totaled 11,815. Department vehicles traveled 2,166,645 miles, 651,472 to investigate criminal and other complaints and 1,390,614 on traffic patrol.

Of 10,419 sets of fingerprints received at the identification bureau at East Lansing headquarters, 5,642 were criminal and 3,935 noncriminal. The bureau identified 42 wanted persons through fingerprints.

There were 1,497 sets of fingerprints of applicants to carry concealed weapons and 81 of the individuals were identified with criminal records.

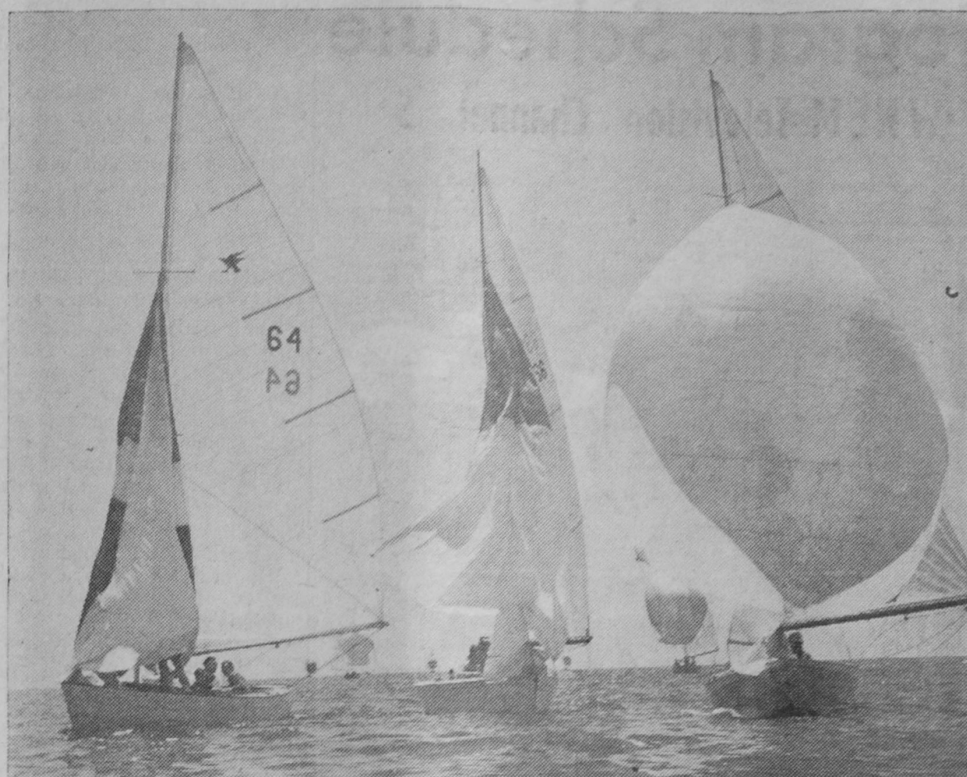

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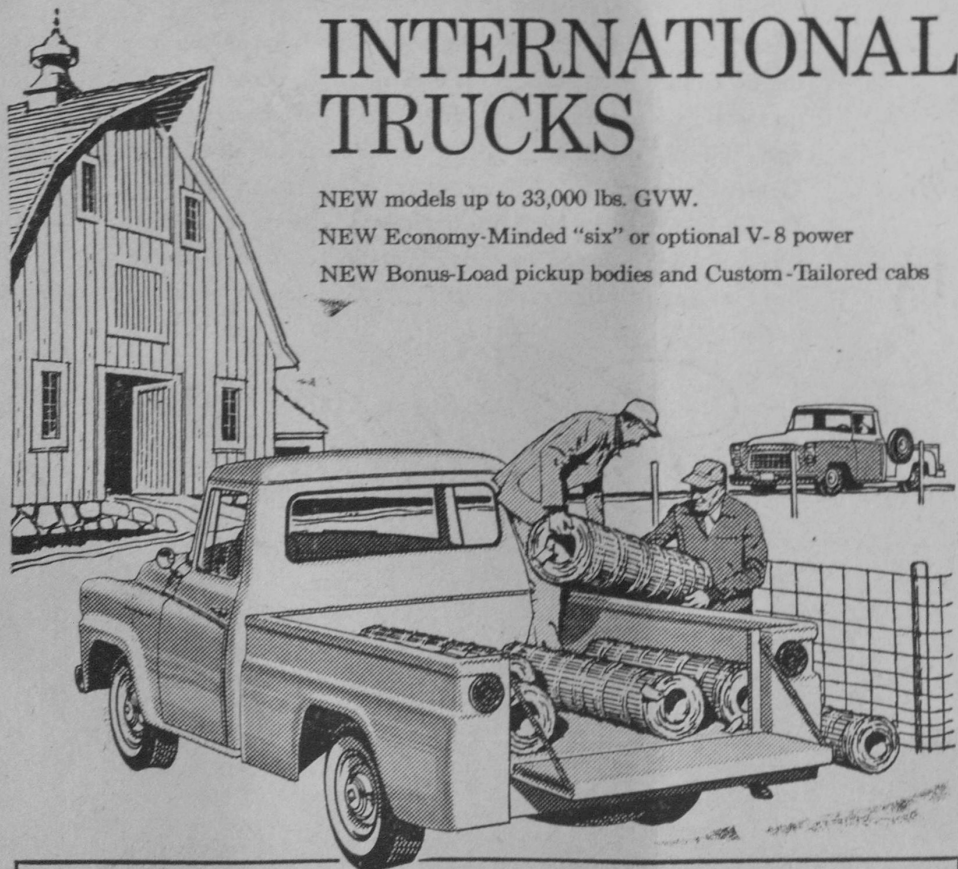

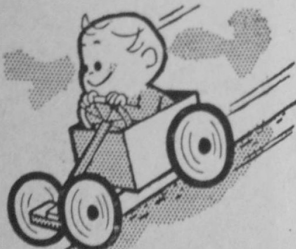

## TB Mobile Unit Schedule Set For Iosco County

Finding tuberculosis in its early stages is one of the goals of the chest X-ray survey to be conducted in Health District No. 2 from July 15 through July 17, according to Doctor E. A. Hast, director of the District No. 2 Health Department.

In addition to finding tuberculosis in its early stages, a chest X-ray also can detect lung cancer and heart conditions.

"Everyone who can possibly do so should take advantage of this opportunity to have a free chest X-ray," Dr. Hast said. "Even healthy people should have their chests X-rayed because in its early stages TB often displays no symptoms."

"An average of one case of active tuberculosis is found for about every 1,800 persons X-rayed," he stated. "It is important for the health of the community that all unknown cases be found in order to prevent the further spread of TB."

The survey is sponsored by the local District No. 2 Health Department, the Michigan Department of Health, the local county medical groups and the Michigan Tuberculosis Association. All persons 18 years of age and over are eligible to have their chest X-rayed.

The mobile unit schedule is as follows: Oscoda Chamber of Commerce Building July 15, 12:00 noon to 6:00 p. m.; East Tawas Community Building July 16, 2:00 p. m. to 8:00 p. m., and July 17, 10:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m.; Prescott school July 17, 1:00 p. m. to 6:00 p. m.

## Farm Events

Afraid your chickens have a disease? You can find out by sending three or four chickens, dead or alive, to the Poultry Diagnostic Service at Michigan State University.

The sooner the better, according to Dr. J. H. Greve, poultry pathologist. Early treatment may help to save your flock.

The service is centered on the campus in Giltner Hall, home of the college of veterinary medicine.

The pathologists make a tentative diagnosis and they will contact you by mail if further tests are needed. If necessary, they will send a program of disease control.

Send in at least three or four birds and try to make them a representative sample of the flock. Do not send culls, since they differ from most of the flock.

Greve says the pathologists need to know several things about each case:

Your name, address and phone number. If possible, give permission to call collect if something important turns up.

My name, Marvin Davenport,

county extension director, East Tawas, Michigan.

Number of birds in your flock, their breed, their age, your hatchery source and the ration being fed.

Details of the illness—tell when it was first noticed, what the symptoms are, how many birds are affected and how many have died.

Medical history of the flock. List any vaccinations or medication the birds have received.

Spray or dust your flowers until they bloom, Julius Hoffman, entomologist at Michigan State University, recommends. Early treatment helps prevent insect damage in late summer and fall.

Also, many pesticides may injure open blooms.

Outguessing pests makes gardening fun. Spray or dust once a week until blooming time. Be sure that you cover the underside of each leaf.

Spider mites like hot weather. Malathion will control these tiny red mites for a few days after application. But kethane, aramite or dimite remain effective longer.

Aphids thrive on cool, moist days. Lindane effectively controls these pests. So do nicotine sprays where they are available.

Rose Chafers appeared around June 1 this year and they will stay through early July. This long-legged, tan beetle has a reddish-brown head, a black undersurface and a black stripe down his back.

Dust against chafers with five percent or 10 percent DDT. Or you may spray with the equivalent of three tablespoons of 50 percent DDT wettable powder per gallon of water.

Chafers fly many miles, so complete control is almost impossible. The creatures may move in soon after you have sprayed. You can

cover prize roses with a protective net.

Do not use DDT on delphiniums, privet or honeysuckle.

Never apply malathion to petunias or members of the Juniperus Virginiana family.

Lecanium scale eggs are now in small, brown blisters on the leaves of oak, arborvitae and other plants, according to Hoffman.

The eggs form a white or pink dust if you break the blister. In a week or two, these eggs will hatch into crawling, sap-sucking insects. Malathion or sevin controls lecanium scale effectively.

Several all-purpose sprays are effective. One type has DDT plus miticide like chlorobenzilate, aramite or malathion. A second type

includes lindane plus either chlorobenzilate or aramite.

Captan controls many flower diseases. Mildex gets rid of mildew on roses.

You can get good commercial all-purpose sprays. Check ingredients on the label. If you have a large garden, you may profit by mixing the ingredients at home.

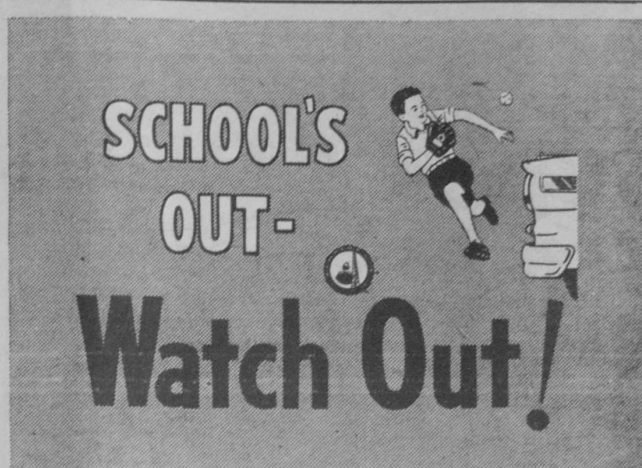

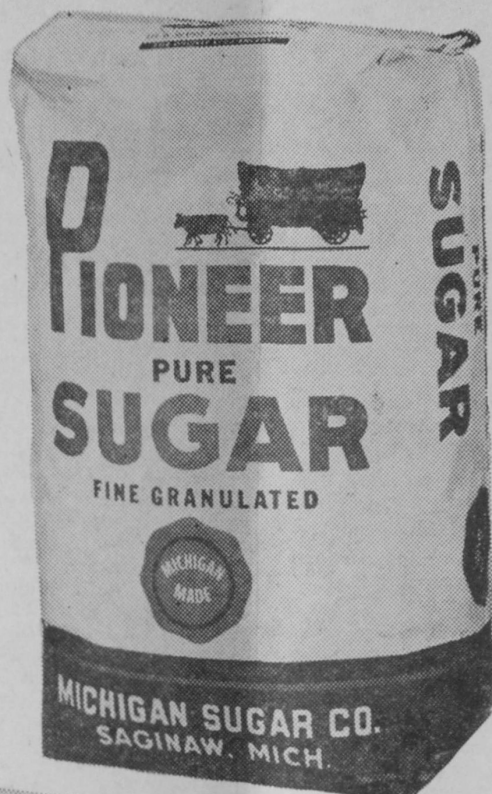

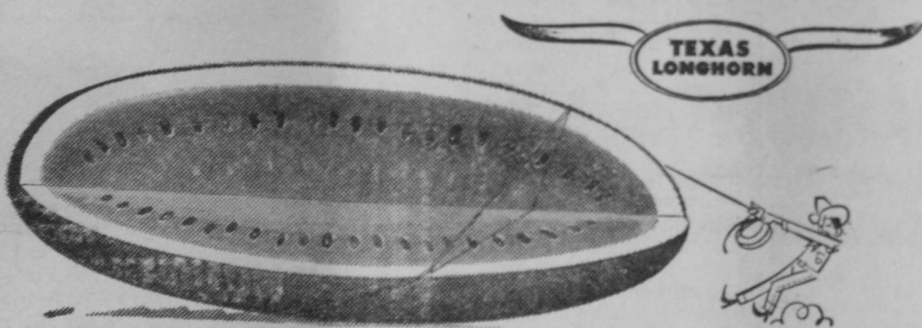

## Tawas Area Offers Two Summer Courses in Driving

## MAY RECEIVE COMPENSATION DURING SUMMER MONTHS

All school teachers eligible for social security benefits may apply for compensation for the summer months, according to Thomas J. Northey, special assistant in research for the Michigan Education Association.

Any woman teacher, age 62 or over, and any man teacher, age 65 or over, who has met the work requirements for social security is advised to contact his local social security office at once to apply for such benefits during June, July and August.

However, teachers are not eligible if they earn more than \$100 during each of these months, Northey said. Teachers who qualify may be eligible even though they are paid on a 12-month basis since they earned the money during the school year, he said. Northey's findings were confirmed by the Lansing social security office.

## TAWAS HOSPITAL Fourth Polio Vaccine Dose Recommended 1 Year After Series

Dr. E. A. Hastly, director of District Health Department No. 2, announced this week that authorities are in agreement that the primary objective of poliomyelitis vaccine series is to see that every one receives three properly spaced doses. However, considering the affect of polio across the country and the fact that a small percentage of persons do not get an adequate response to all three of the shots of vaccine, an additional dose of 1cc. is recommended one year after completion of the primary series of three. "This might properly be called the fourth shot booster dose," Dr. Hastly stated.
