## Indian Ceremonials Open Friday Night

Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials, which proved to be one of Northern Michigan's feature attractions last summer, will open its second year engagement here Friday night, June 19, at its open-air stadium nine miles west of Tawas on Plank Road.

The Rev. O. James Crews, director, said Monday that during the first week-end—Friday, Saturday and Sunday—boys and girls under the age of 16 years would be admitted free.

"This plan has been adopted in order that all youngsters of school age will have the opportunity to see the show without paying," the director stated.

Mr. Crews, who only recently returned from the hospital after an illness, expressed great optimism and enthusiasm with the manner in which the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials caught the public's fancy last year, and looks to an even greater season in 1959.

"This year's program will include many new features, new dances, new characters and the cast will be as large or larger than last year," he stated. Last year, the program included some 50 persons.

One feature will be the use of "black light" effects in staging. "We won't go into any details at this time," he said, "but the black light equipment which will be used for special effects cost a considerable amount of money and should furnish spectacular results in our final product."

Another new feature will be the portrayal of the "Legend of Largo Springs," a large springs near Lumbermen's Monument which feeds the AuSable River.

Returning as master of ceremonies this year is Chief Whitebird (George Cook), a Chippewa Indian who has represented his tribe at Indian claims hearings in Washington, D. C. Chief Red Cloud, Ottawa, will again be the

grand council fire chieftain. Mr. Crews, who was adopted into the Chippewa and Ottawa tribes at the close of last summer's season as "Chief Big Heart," said that the stage would be equipped with a Hammond concert organ. Known as the "Voice of the Forest," the organ will be played by his wife, Florence, during the program and at intermission.

New innovations being adopted this year include a transparent shelter to be used in case of showers, a free picnic grove and woodland trail sloop rides. The latter two are expected to be ready July 1.

Mr. Crews will conduct devotional services each Sunday morning at 11 o'clock for the Indians. The public is invited to attend.

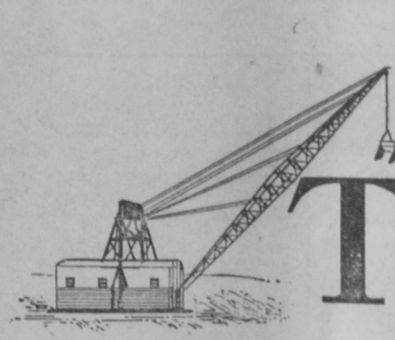
## Mt. Pleasant Lawyer Establishes Office in Dockter Building

## Ask Voters' Approval of \$55,348 Tax Levy

At the June 8 meeting of the Tawas Area Board of Education, it was decided to place on the ballot at the annual school election of July 13, a proposal which would allow the district to levy 2.5 mills for one year only, on the equalized valuation of the school district. This 2.5 mills would amount to a levy of \$55,347.99 on the 1959 taxes.

The funds raised by this tax would be used in the summer of 1960 to remove the furnace from the present East Tawas unit and install it in a new plant which is to be built outside of the main building. The state law requires that the boiler be removed from the building for fire safety when a new furnace or additions are made to the heating capacity of a furnace.

The new boiler will be of suitable capacity to heat not only the

present unit but also to heat a general purpose room which may be built at a future date. This project will also include unit controls for each room in the building. At the present time, the zone control system leaves some rooms overheated while other rooms do not have enough heat.

The existing furnace has been examined and, while it has been declared safe, it was not deemed advisable nor economical to attempt unit control for rooms by utilization of the existing boiler and piping. The new proposed boiler will burn fuel oil.

The board of education has secured St. James Electric Company to install complete new wiring in the East Tawas unit and fluorescent lighting in the classrooms and office. The funds for this project are coming from the general fund. The combination of new wiring and

renovation of the heating plant will give the East Tawas unit excellent instructional facilities for many years to come. When a general purpose room is added, as a place for school and community activities, the East Tawas unit will be equipped for a well rounded elementary program.

It is the intent of the board of education to renovate two basement rooms in the East Tawas unit this summer and have them available for classes when the 1959-60 school year starts in September.

With the afore mentioned improvements, the cost of the heating change over is too great to allow the board to use general operating money for this purpose. Therefore, it is the hope of the board that a favorable vote will be cast for this proposal.

## \$3,840 Street Plan is Adopted by TC Council

Tawas City Council adopted a \$3,840 street improvement program at its regular meeting Monday night. The program calls for 10,000 feet of seal-coating during the summer.

Streets to be paved are as follows:

First Avenue, North Street to M-55, double seal coat; Seventh Avenue, Fourth Street to railroad tracks, double seal coat; Bay Drive, US-23 to Townline Road, single seal coat.

The council adopted a resolution calling for stricter enforcement of truck unloading zones on First Street north of US-23. Letters are to be sent to trucking firms stating that city ordinance No. 138 regulating obstruction of traffic is to be enforced.

The council authorized the department of public works to start purchasing sewer pipe from time to time and stock-pile it for future use on storm sewer construction on Maple and Court Streets.

Supt. Reginald Bublitz reported on surface water conditions in the First Ward and stated that a catch basin and section of storm sewer had been constructed near the residence of Roy DePotty, relieving some of the problems.

He stated that a topographical survey should be made of the entire area to determine further work on this water problem. He reported that during his survey of two weeks ago, it was learned that the storm sewer in that area had filled with sand in several places. Lowering of about 15

catch basins in town was recommended by the council.

Building applications approved during the week were as follows:

Walter Moeller, 116 First Avenue, porch repair, \$65; George Smith Sr., 715 Fourth Street, repair porch, \$75; Edward Coyle, take out window at service station and replace with overhead door, \$125; Hugo Keiser, repair roof on store building, \$400.

## Tom Poling is New Partner in Tawas City Department Store

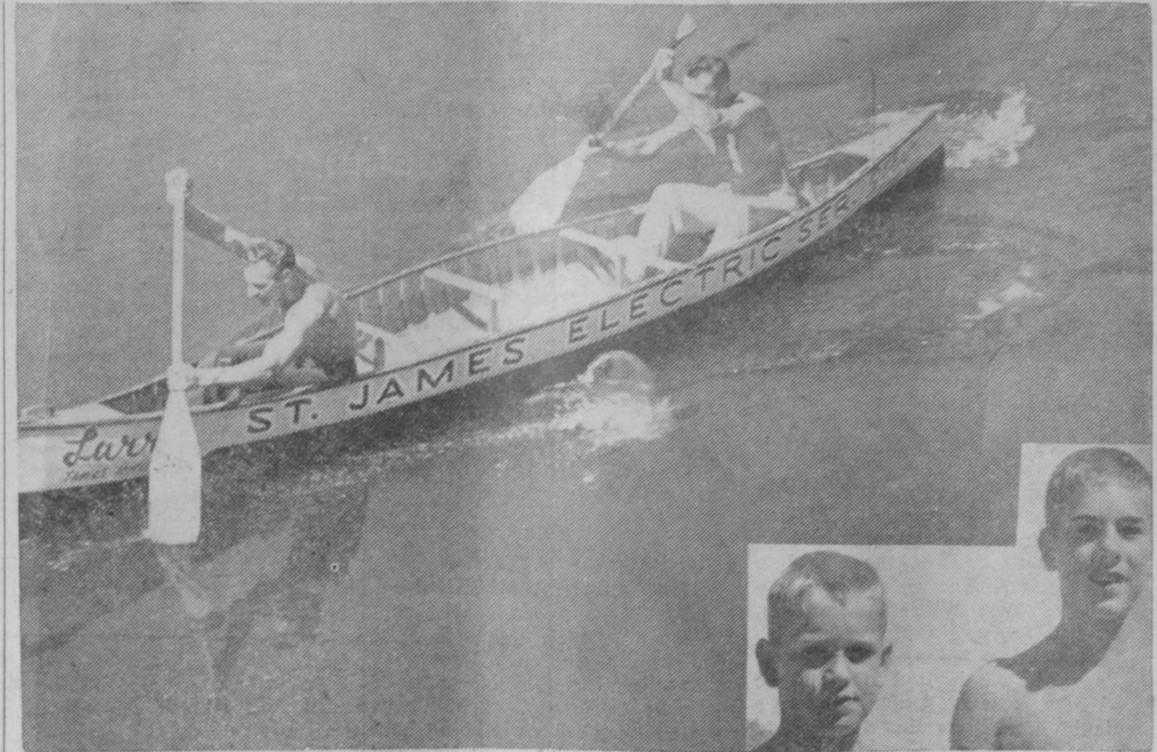
It was announced this week that Tom Poling of West Branch has entered in partnership with Harold Raymond in the Raymond Department Store, Tawas City.

## Kolonich-Kindell Repeat as Tawas River Champions

Steve Kolonich and Larry Kindell, perennial champions of the Tawas River Canoe Race, each added a new trophy to their collection Sunday by crossing the finish line at the mouth of the Tawas River some 45 seconds before the runner-up team, Jerry Wagner and Ralph Sawyer of Oscoda.

The Tawas duo, who now have won this race four of its six-year running, completed the course starting from Tawas Lake in 45 minutes and 15 seconds, finishing in front of a field of 23 teams.

Kolonich and Kindell were marked down as front runners right from the very start of the race from Grove's Landing, although Wagner and Sawyer made a very strong bid to pass them after rounding the buoy in front of Cliff's Landing. Both of these teams are world champion canoeists, Kolonich and Kindell winning the championships in 1958 on the AuSable River and Wagner and Sawyer the 1957 champions of the same race.

Only a few feet separated the two teams as they maintained a terrific paddling pace on their return trip past Grove's, but the winners built up a slight edge of a few yards shortly before entering the Tawas River.

After that, Kolonich and Kindell maintained their furious pace down the Tawas River, receiving cheers from the hundreds of spectators who took up positions at every vantage point along the way.

For their efforts, Kolonich and Kindell won first prize money of \$75. Wagner and Sawyer won \$25. In third place was the Holly team of the Widging brothers.

Only 15 seconds separated the fourth place team, Gary Kolonich and Edward Wojahn of Tawas, from being in the money. They crossed the finish line in 46 minutes, 45 seconds.

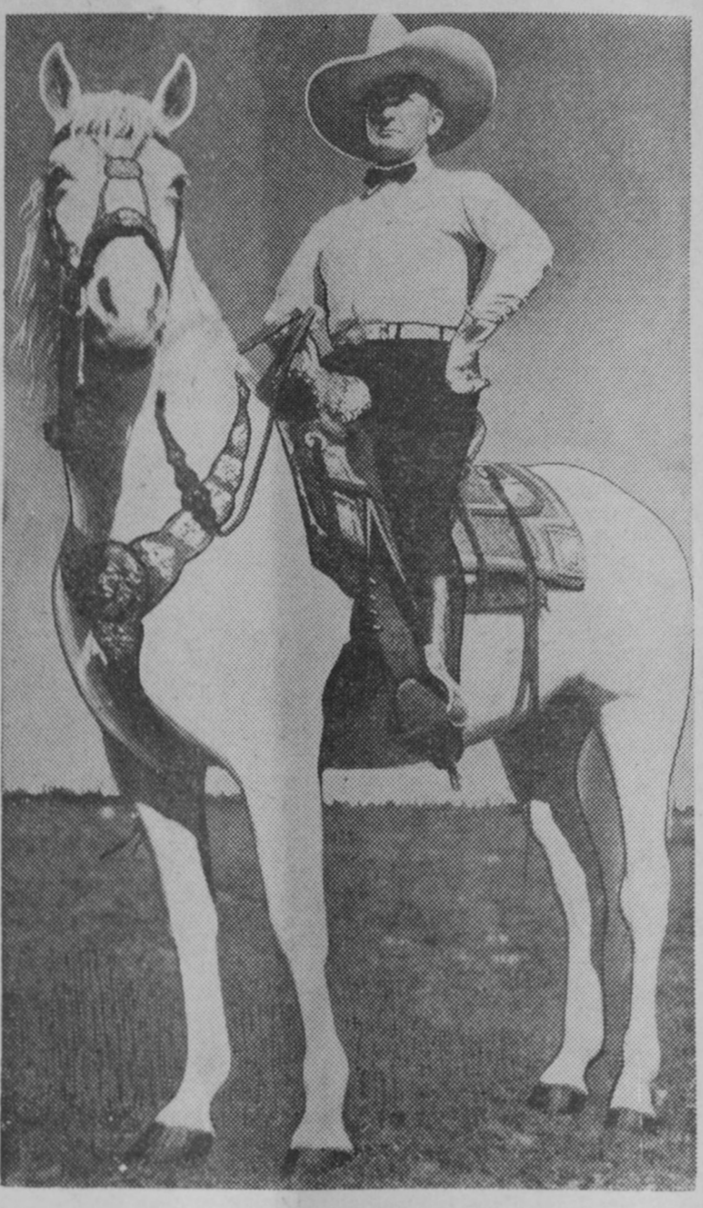

A bill to overhaul the veteran's pension system is now before congress. In the proposed law, pensions would be based on the veteran's needs.

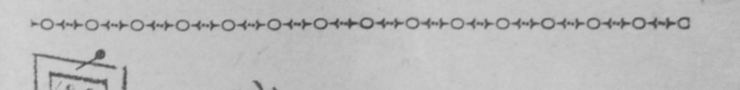
