No Regrets - Would Still Choose Teaching Profession-

Mrs. Sims to Retire After Long Career

Mrs. Lucy Sims, veteran junior high school teacher at Tawas Area School, finished correcting her last batch of test papers Tuesday and will say farewell to her students and fellow faculty members Thursday—she retires this week after spending 30 years in the teaching profession.

One of Iosco County's veteran school teachers, she has spent all but one year of her teaching career in Tawas schools. During her early career she taught in the one-room country schools, later teaching in both Tawas City and East Tawas and then in the reorganized Tawas Area School system.

The first eight years of her education were in the Greenwood School on Hemlock Road. Writing the state examination at East Tawas, she attended high school there and graduated in a class of 13 in 1913.

She entered the teaching profession after graduation from Iosco County Normal in Tawas City in 1913-14. Her first school was in Grant Township, which she describes as "the happiest two years of my career."

After her marriage she left the profession, but, when a shortage of teachers resulted during World War I, she taught two years, 1919-20, at the Vine School.

In those days, all eighth graders in rural schools wishing to continue their education were required to pass a state examination given and corrected by a county board of examiners. From 1920 to early 1930 she was a member of this board and was examiner at Grant Township Hall for eighth graders in the neighboring communities. In 1930, the state dropped the examination of rural pupils for entrance into

Tawas Braves Win NEM Baseball Title Monday

Tawas Area School's baseball team was crowned champion of the Northeastern Michigan Conference Monday. The Braves won a 1-0 thriller over Roscommon, champion of the western division, to keep their undefeated record for the season intact. The game was played at West Branch.

Herman Rollin, left-handed freshman for Tawas Area's nine, pitched six and one-third innings of no hit, no run baseball. He was finally touched for two singles in the seventh inning, but no runs were scored.

Facing Rollin on the mound was big Jim Papefus for Roscommon. The Bucks' star athlete limited Tawas Area to four hits and it was not until the seventh inning that Tawas came through with the winning run.

After the first two men in the inning were out, Denny Ledsworth reached first on an error, one of five during the day by the Bucks. He made a clean steal of second base and was set up as the potential winning run.

Gary Brackenbury came through with a hard single to

centerfield. Centerfielder Siderman made a good throw to the plate, but Ledsworth, who would have been nipped by three feet, crashed into the catcher. Ledsworth was called out, but when the dust settled at the plate the umpire reversed his decision as the catcher dropped the ball.

This set the stage for Roscommon's last time at bat in the seventh. Rollin, who had struck out 14 batters and walked but two until that time, retired the first batter on an easy tap back to the mound. Papefus then singled sharply to left centerfield to break up the no-hitter. Siderman followed with a liner back to the mound, Rollin deflected the ball and it went for a single. McCutcheon hit a long fly to right field both runners moving up one base after the catch.

The final play of the game came in dramatic fashion. With McBrath, who had struck out twice during the game, at bat and Rollin ahead of him with a two strike count, Papefus broke from third in an attempted steal

Road Contract Awarded to \$41,700 Low Bidder

Contract for construction of 2.3 miles of grading, drainage structures and 22-foot-wide aggregate surfacing on Long Lake Road in Iosco County was awarded during the past week by the state highway department. This project is located 4.5 miles south of the north county line in Plainfield Township.

Low bidder on the project was Robert S. Gilliland, Alpena, at a low bid of \$41,700. Completion date is October 1.

Although the county road commission pays for and supervises the job, the state highway department determined low bidder on which federal funds are to be used.

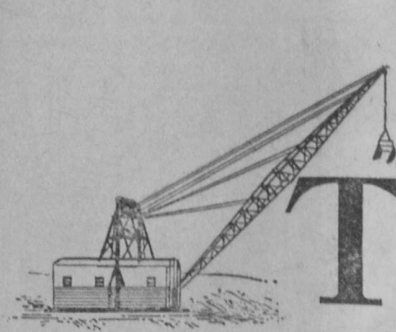
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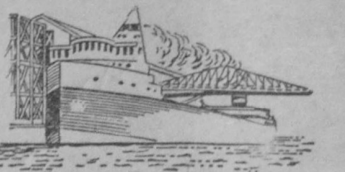

Breckenridge Youth is Killed in US-23 Crash

A 19-year-old Breckenridge youth was killed and two brothers from Whittemore were injured early Wednesday morning when the convertible car in which they were riding rolled over on US-23, 1.2 miles south of the Whitney Drain.

Dead is Gaylord E. Smith, broken neck and crushed chest. Injured were William J. Wolbert, 20, driver, lacerated left leg, bruises, and his 17-year-old brother, Joseph, neck and rib injuries. The two Whittemore boys were released from Tawas Hospital after treatment.

Investigating Michigan State Police officers from East Tawas said that both of Smith's legs were pinned under the smashed vehicle. Police were notified of the accident at 2:58 o'clock.

The driver, who was questioned at the hospital, told officers that a car attempting to pass a truck headed north had blinded him. He ran off the road to the right, attempted to bring the car back on the highway, but lost control. The careening vehicle skidded across the highway to the left shoulder and hit a group of trees, then rolled over.

Coroner Clare Forshee pronounced death due to a broken neck. The body is at the Forshee Funeral Home in Tawing.

Contacted at his home, the father of the two Whittemore boys told officers that the boys had taken their sister home about 2:30 a. m. Apparently the boys were on their way to a restaurant.

Coroner Rules Death Due to Heart Attack

Death of a man who was found lying face down on Bissonette Road Tuesday afternoon was ruled as a heart attack victim by Coroner E. John Moffatt of East Tawas.

The victim, Lawrence Savage, 66, of 10510 Sheridan, Burt, was found on Bissonette Road, one-half mile west of M-65 by Robert Henry of Glennie, a pulp wood cutter.

State police and sheriff's officers back-tracked along Bissonette Road for nearly six miles and found the victim's station wagon with its front wheels buried in the mud. From all appearances, Savage had worked for some time trying to free his vehicle.

The victim's relatives at Burt told investigating officers that Savage had been undergoing treatment for a heart condition.

Midland Firm Awarded Sanitary Sewer Contract

Low bid of Dyer Brothers Construction Company, Midland, for construction of 4,587 feet of sanitary sewer mains in Huron Gardens and North Park Acres was accepted by the Tawas City Council at Monday night's bid opening.

Dyer Brothers' bid of \$27,625.57 was accepted on the recommendation of the Tawas City Water Board and a representative of Spicer Engineering Company. Only other bid turned in was by B. H. Sargent, Incorporated, West Branch, which totaled \$56,406.40.

The estimated cost of this project by the city engineer was \$34,000. A complete review of the bid and specifications for the project was made before the contract was awarded.

This new sanitary sewer system which is to serve the area between North Street and Fifth Avenue and M-55 and Tawas River, is to be paid for by home owners in the two subdivisions. City superintendent, Reginald Blutz, reported that \$16,876.96 in advance payment had already been received from these private owners.

Last step in Tawas City's project to enlarge and modernize its sewer treatment plant will be taken June 22 when bids will be opened on the sale of a \$130,000 general obligation bond issue. The city has received assurance of a federal aid grant for this project and the municipal finance commission gave its approval last week.

Building applications totaling \$49,200 were approved by the Tawas City Department of Public Works during the past week, reports Supt. Reginald Blutz.

Applications approved were as follows:

Gordon Clute, Ninth Avenue, three concrete block additions to industrial building, 107 by 58 feet, \$3 by 19 feet and 30 by 12 foot boiler room. Total estimated cost, which included \$1,500 steam heating system, was \$36,900.

The Tawas Herald, 408 Lake Street, build new 28 by 46 foot concrete block building around present one-story structure. Remove old frame structure when

completed. New addition to have nine-foot clear span ceiling, steel joist, 1 1/2 inch metal deck, fire-wall between new addition and two story building. Estimated cost, to include remodeling of original building, \$8,500.

Edwin Habermehl, Seventh Avenue and Tawas River, construct 24 by 34 concrete block office building for Fuelgas Company, Incorporated. Estimated cost \$3,000.

Ex-Corporal 'Out-Ranked' All

Sixty-one years ago, Louis H. Braddock was a corporal in the United States Army serving during the Spanish American War—on Memorial Day 1959, the ex-corporal "out-ranked" a lieutenant colonel during services honoring the nation's war dead.

Mr. Braddock was honored in Tawas City's observance of Memorial Day by being named commander of the day at services held at the Tawas City Cemetery. He enjoyed his role immensely. Assisting him in carrying out

the duties of commanding the firing squad of Jesse Hodder Post, American Legion, was James Dillon, an air force reserve lieutenant colonel.

The honored commander rode in an open car at the head of the parade of veterans, Tawas Area Band, Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts of America and Brownies. His honor guard was composed of veterans of World War I, who rode in the same car and another which followed.

At the cemetery, Judge-Elect

Allan C. Miller, in his inspiring address, pointed out the fact that Mr. Braddock was one of three veterans of the Spanish American War living in Iosco County. Others are Edward Vaughan and Peter McPhail, both of Oscoda.

Mr. Braddock, now 87 years old, joined Company C of the Second Illinois Volunteer Infantry on April 26, 1898. A native of Michigan, at that time he was working in Chicago.

The day he signed up for service the United States Government

had issued a call to activate all state militia. All men who served during the Spanish American War were volunteers, with the exception of 25,000 enlisted regulars. This fact was emphasized when those called up in the militia had the choice of staying in or going home.

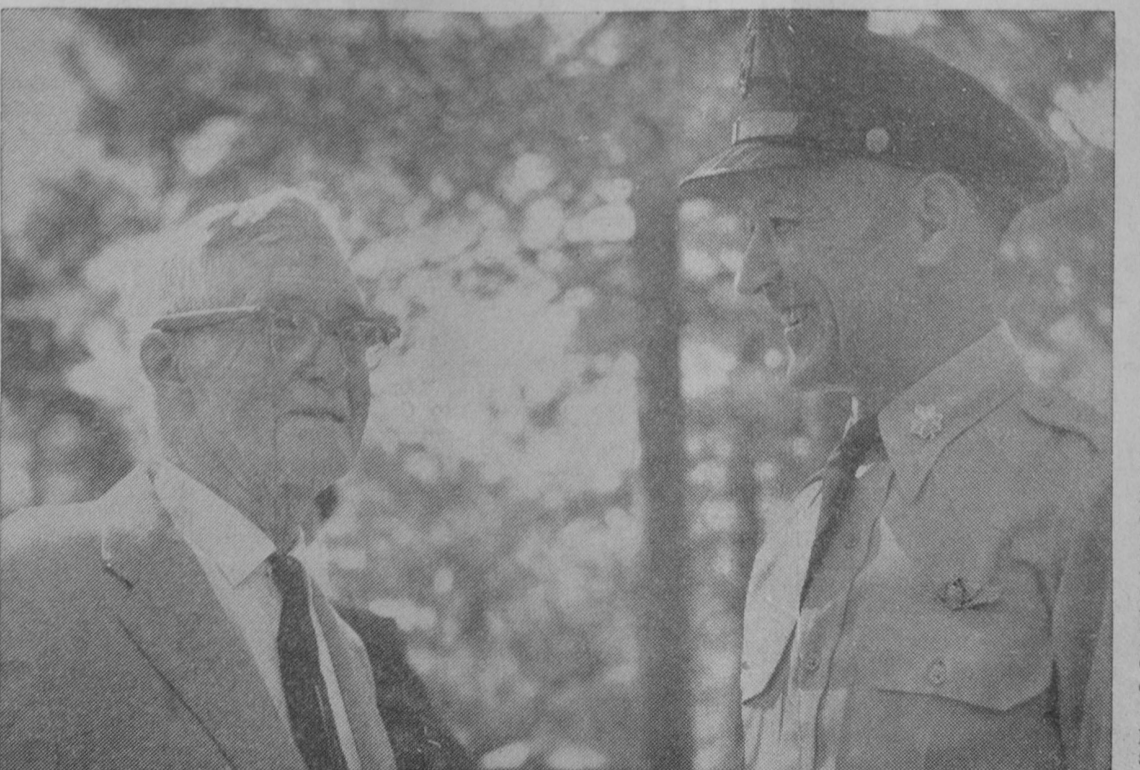
"Some of the men stayed in just long enough to take the train ride to Springfield. I decided I would stick it out," he said.

Later that April, Braddock left with Company C for Jacksonville, Florida, and there joined the Seventh United States Army Corps composed of 28,000 men. After training in Savannah, Georgia, the troops embarked for Havana, Cuba, as an army of occupation.

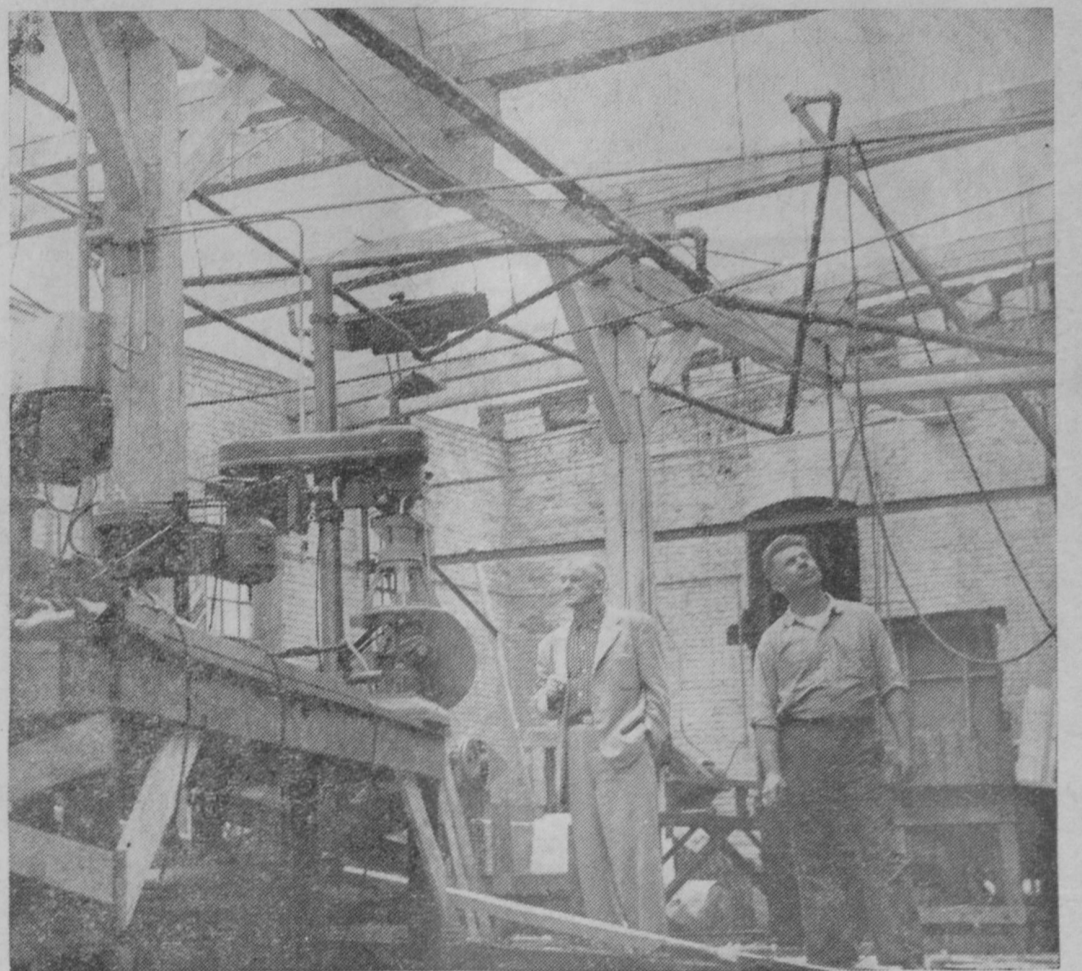
The first day of January 1899 is remembered by the Tawas City man as the day the seventh corps officiated at the ousting of the Spanish Army. "We were all standing in ranks when the defeated Spaniards marched through the streets of Havana and loaded on ships in the harbor."

Company C then was assigned to Camp Columbia, an old fort which was still in use during the recent Cuban uprising. Braddock was assigned as a train guard and remained in Cuba until March. Company C boarded a ship for home and he was mustered out at Augusta, Georgia, on April 26, one year to the day that he entered service. "Then we all went home to see if anyone had stolen our girls," commented Mr. Braddock.

At the conclusion of Saturday's program, one of the most impressive ever held here, Mr. Braddock was heard by many as he called out to the now white-haired World War I veterans, "See you next year, boys!"

Roof Ripped Off in Storm; Plant is Closed for Repairs

A freak gust of wind during Sunday's cracking electrical storm blew off a large section of roof at the Feather-Lite Manufacturing Company plant on US-23, disrupting production there this week. Although the lower part of Michigan was alerted for tornados Sunday, this destructive wind was not believed to have been a twister.

Located in the old Detroit and Mackinac roundhouse, the wind "picked up" a 150 by 80 foot section of roof and sent it crashing to the ground at the rear of the building. Debris from the disintegrated roof crunched through the roof of a new addition to the building which contains aluminum extrusion equipment.

Shortly after the storm, Percy Scott, a railroad employee who was working at the time in the adjacent mechanical building, said that he heard the roof rip loose and crash as it plowed into the D&M's turntable. No one

was in the aluminum door and window fabricating company's plant during the storm.

When the roof ripped off, it left exposed to the heavy rain and hail the company's most critical production area. This section contained the processing and fabricating division, which includes electrical powered equipment.

Electric motors on this equipment were drenched with water. Power lines were snapped, hot water pipes in the plant's heating system were ripped loose and heavy posts which had supported the roof were moved about two inches off their foundations. Ray Ledsworth of Consumers Power Company's trouble-shooting crew cut off power lines shortly after the storm and John St. James, local electrician, went to work immediately disintegrating severed power lines in the building.

A quick appraisal of damage Sunday evening by Milton Kotcher, plant manager, was that damage to the equipment and building would run into several thousands of dollars. Still to be reckoned with Monday was the large section of roof which was missing.

Avery Fried of Detroit, president of the company, inspected the damage Monday. He said that "the full extent of the damage will not be known until we start to tear down the equipment. If the main power supply is not damaged badly, we should have our extrusion machinery back in operation by Tuesday."

Metcalf and Leo J. Simon, also of Flint, came to this area to spend the week-end fishing. Both men went to the river from their camp site but Simon returned to the Monument Store for bait. When he returned to the water's edge, he found Metcalf's clothing strewn about the bank.

Investigating sheriff's department officers and state police found a set of footprints leading to the water and started dragging operations immediately. Richard

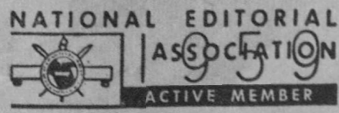
McClean, a Civil Defense skin diver from Tawas City, spent the morning searching the river bottom. The channel was 60 to 80 feet deep near the river bank.

NEW CHAPEL OPENED AT WURTSMITH AIR FORCE BASE

The education wing provides the most modern design and equipment for the expanding religious education program at the base. 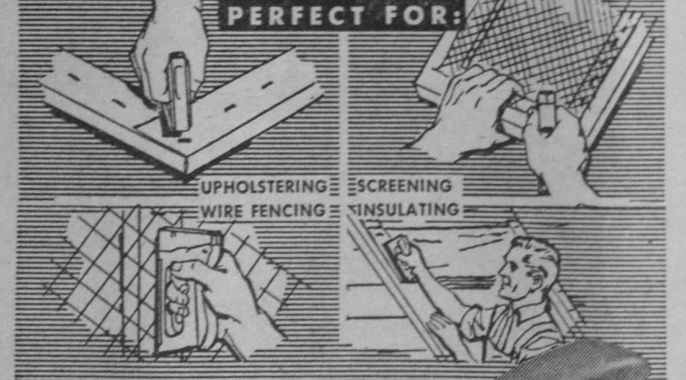

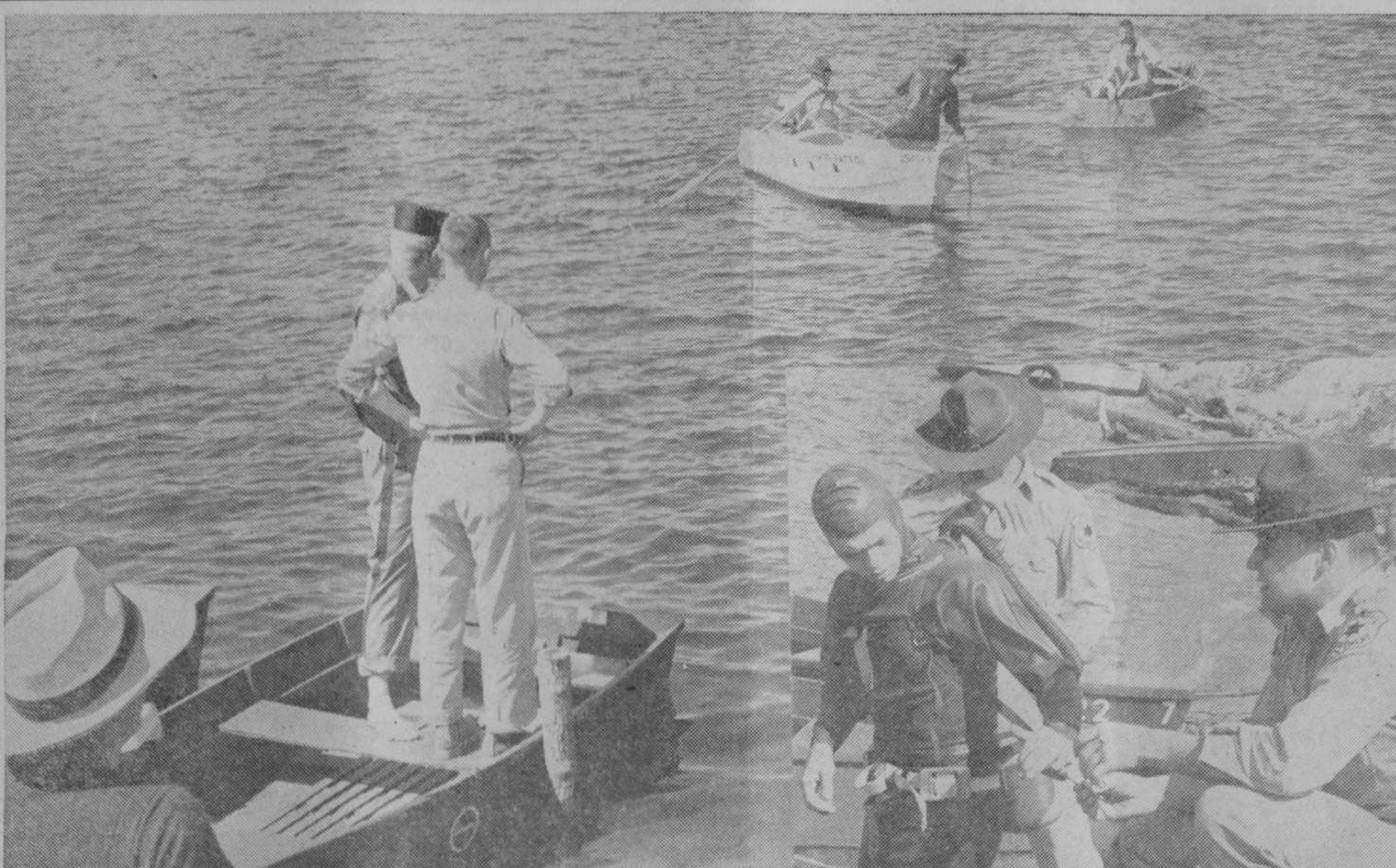

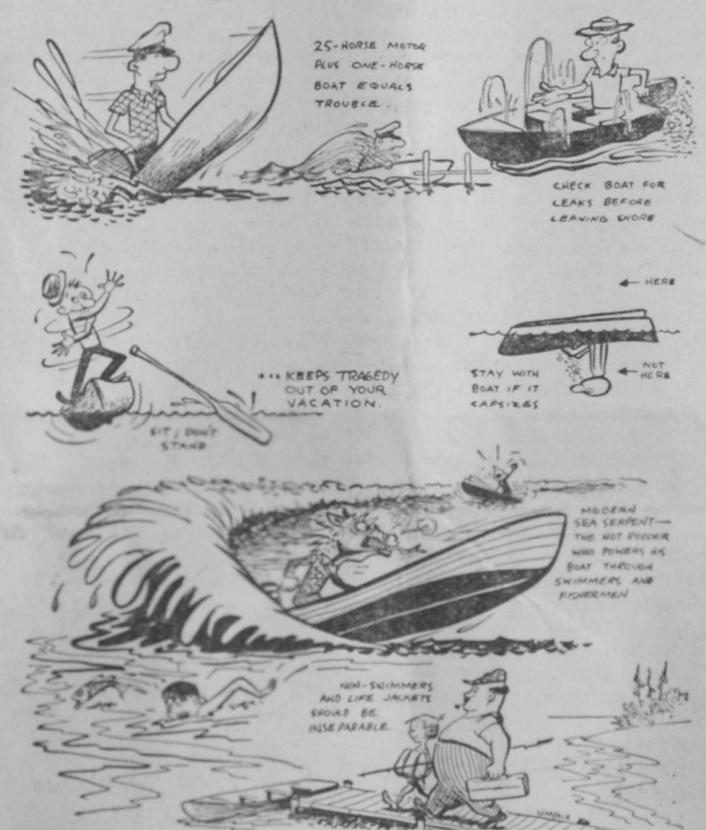

Mr. White for the conservation committee moved that the letters and resolutions from Senator McNamara, Representative Cederberg, the Michigan Conservation Clubs, Farm Bureau and Michigan Conservation Department be filed in the county clerk's office. Upon support by Jordan, the motion carried unanimously.

It was moved by Jordan supported by White that the following letter from the General Services Administration be published with the minutes. Honorable Elford A. Cederberg House of Representatives Washington 25, D. C.

Dear Mr. Cederberg: The Coast Guard Light Station at Tawas Point, Michigan, which was the subject of your letter of April 1, 1959, has not been reported to the General Services Administration by the Treasury Department as excess property. If it is so reported, we will first ascertain whether there is an appropriate further federal requirement for its use. If none is found, the property will be available for disposal in accordance with the provisions of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949. The

act authorizes the disposal of surplus real property for various public uses, including, among others, health, education, park, recreation, historic monument sites and airport.

Section 203 (k) of the act authorizes the Administrator of General Services, in his discretion, to assign to the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare for disposal of such surplus real property, including buildings, fixtures and equipment situated thereon, as is recommended by the secretary as being needed for schools, classrooms or other educational use. It also authorizes the secretary to sell or lease such real property for educational purposes to states and their political subdivisions, or municipalities and tax-supported educational institutions and to other nonprofit educational institutions which have been held exempt from taxation under Section 101 (6) of the Internal Revenue Code, and, in fixing the sale or lease value of the property, to take into consideration any benefits which have accrued or may accrue to the United States from the use of such property by any state, political subdivision, municipality or institution.

Subsection (h) of section 13 of the Surplus Property Act of 1944 (42 Stat. 350) as amended, which is continued in effect by section 602 (a) of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949, provides for the conveyance to any state, political subdivision, instrumentally thereof, or municipality, surplus land, including improvements and equipment located thereon, which in the determination of the Secretary of the Interior is suitable and desirable for use as a public park or public recreational area. Conveyances for use for such purposes pursuant to this authority are made at a price equal to 50 percent of the fair value of the property conveyed based on the highest and best use of the property at the time it is offered for disposal, regardless of its former character or use.

The 1949 act provides for the disposition of surplus real property without advertising, subject to obtaining such competition as is feasible under the circumstances, if the disposal will be to states, territories, possessions, political subdivisions thereof, or tax-supported agencies therein, and the estimated fair market value of the property and other satisfactory terms of disposal are obtained by negotiation. However, unless a negotiated sale under the authority of this section is found to be in the public interest, GSA seeks competitive bidding in the sale of surplus property either by inviting sealed bids or by conducting sales by auction.

We have advised GSA Regional Commissioner John W. Chapman Jr., 575 U. S. Courthouse, 219 South Clark Street, Chicago 4, Illinois, who has regional responsibility for the disposal of surplus real property in the State of Michigan, of the county's interest in the property and have requested that he discuss the matter with the county officials in the event that any portion of the property is determined to be surplus to the needs of the federal government.

Dear Sir: The roads and bridges committee of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors has requested that I reply to your letter to them under date of May 7, 1959, with respect to the Bissonette Road.

The final paragraph of your letter recites the following: "In view of the fact that the project (the AuSable River Bridge) was constructed to permit closure of Bissonette Road." I have personally reviewed these records with the committee and we can find no record anywhere that this statement was true. Indeed, the question of closure appears never to have been raised, and no proceeding was ever undertaken to close the road under the appropriate Michigan statutes.

It is our certain feeling that if this bridge had been built to permit closure of the road, the work would never have been done until the legal proceedings had been accomplished. It is therefore our conclusion that the other reasons cited in your letter, that is the facilitation of crash rescue operations, was in fact the moving reason for building the bridge. This, at least, is all that appears in the records.

It is the position of the county that Bissonette Road was never legally closed and that the expropriation of this road must be accounted for by the air force or other appropriate agency of the federal government.

Mr. Upton for the judiciary committee moved that no action be taken on the referrals to the judiciary committee from Gratiot and VanBuren Counties regarding Senate Bill No. 1086 and Senate Bill No. 1160; there being no copies of the bill available for study and the resolutions lacking sufficient information. The motion was supported by Wilkusi and carried unanimously.

Mr. White read the following report of the conservation committee. Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

The conservation committee has considered the petition of the property owners abutting on Floyd Lake requesting that the lake be dammed to raise the lake level 12 inches or more. It appears to this committee that the intended purpose of this petition was that appropriate proceedings should be undertaken in the circuit court to determine and maintain the normal levels of the waters in Floyd Lake.

The form of the petition fell somewhat short of expressing this purpose, and it does not appear that the petitioners represent more than 51 percent of the abutting property owners.

However, it is the consensus of this committee that it would be desirable and in the best interests of the county and of the abutting

property owners, for the purpose of maintaining property values and for preserving the natural resources of the state that a proceeding should be undertaken in circuit court for this county to determine and maintain the normal levels of Floyd Lake.

Therefore, it is recommended that the prosecuting attorney be instructed to institute such a proceeding.

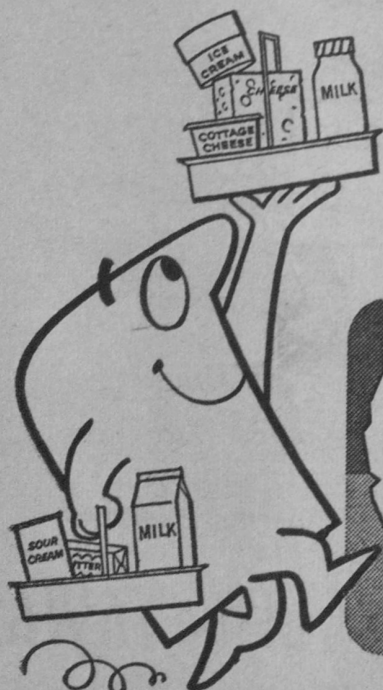

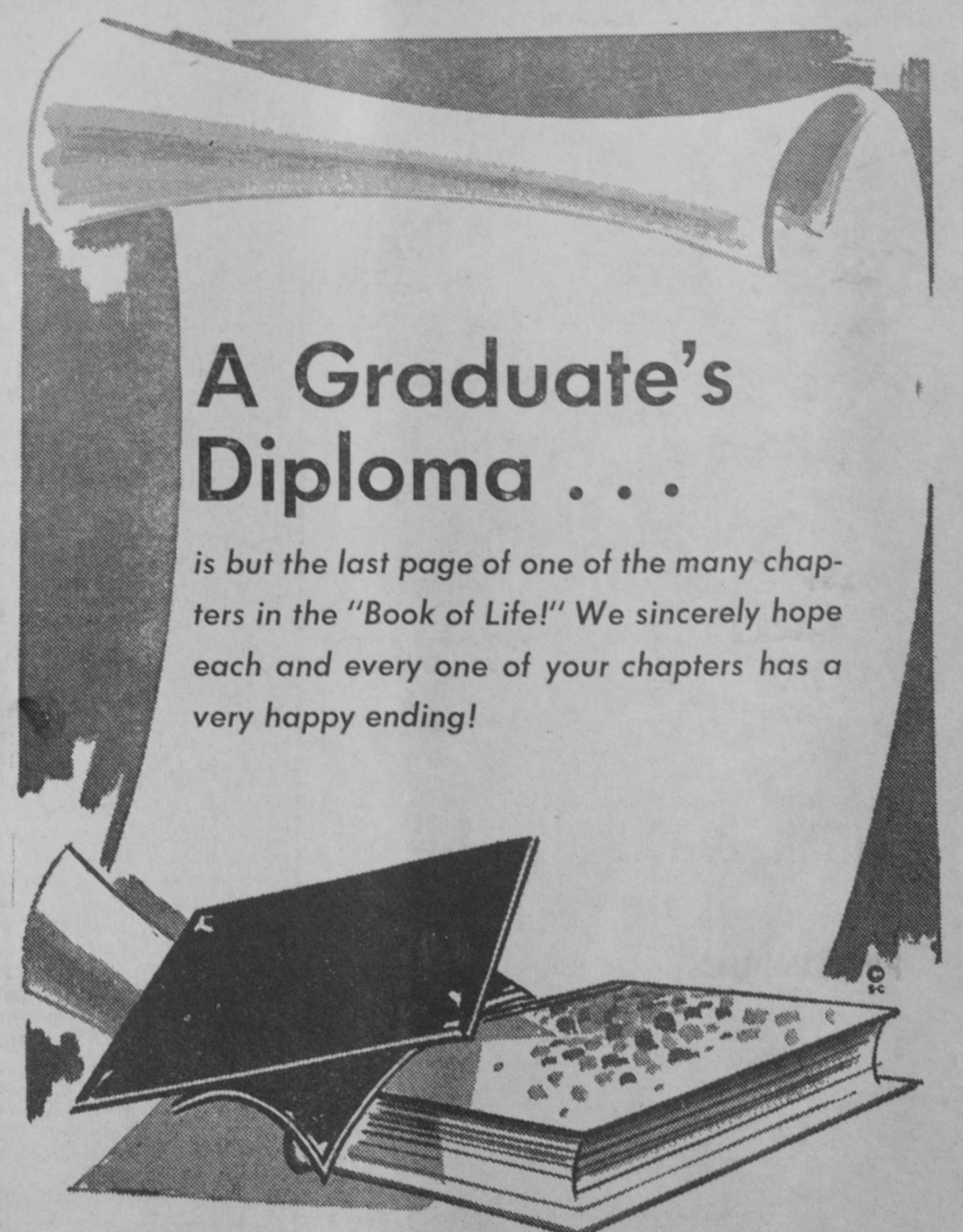

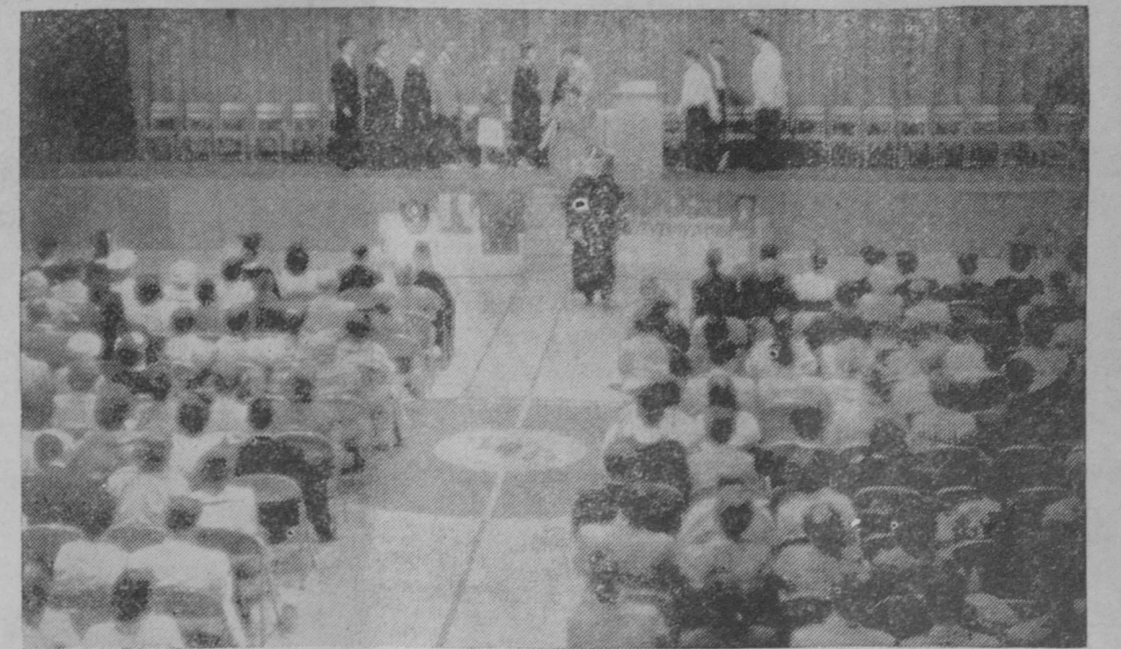

HAY CONDITIONING TOOLS SHOWN DURING FIELD DAYS

A total of six hay conditioning field days will be held around the state during June, according to Marvin Davenport, county extension director. The field day in this area is at the Charles Thompson Farm on Indian Reserve Road, two miles south of Werth Road, Alpena County. Starting time is 1:30 p. m. on Thursday, June 11.

According to Robert White, extension agricultural engineer at Michigan State University, visitors will have a chance to see comparisons of conditioned and unconditioned hay.

The day before the field day, two swaths will be mowed; one will be conditioned. The morning of the field day two additional swaths will be mowed and again one will be conditioned.

Visitors will also have a chance to see from 10 to 15 different makes of hay conditioning equipment in operation.

Many Michigan farmers are interested in hay conditioning. Conditioning hay will normally reduce field curing time by 40 to 50 percent. Getting hay in the barn faster helps save the nutrients in the forage.

CIVIL DEFENSE PROPERTY NOT FOR PRIVATE USE

Charles Kurtzrock, deputy director of Civil Defense for Isosco County, announced this week that political subdivisions participating in the federal surplus property program must not allow any of the property to remain in the custody of a private individual or contractor.

Kurtzrock stated that, according to a letter from the Michigan Office of Civil Defense, no property donated for Civil Defense under the federal surplus program is authorized for private use.

Ralph M. Sheehan, Civil Defense director of Michigan, said in the letter, "Experience has demonstrated such arrangements all too often result in the unauthorized use which reflects discredit upon the whole program."

\$581 WORTH OF EQUIPMENT STOLEN FROM BOAT

Theft of approximately \$581 worth of fishing equipment is being investigated this week by Isosco County Sheriff's Department and Michigan State Police.

William Kelsey of Saginaw, owner, told sheriff department officers that his 10-horsepower outboard motor, five fishing rods, four reels, two tackle boxes and two swivel chairs were stolen sometime May 24 from his boat at Old Mill Point on the AuSable River.

Officers found that the boat had been cut loose and had drifted downstream about one mile. Chains locking the motor had been cut with a torch.

City to Investigate Drainage Problems in First Ward

Home owners in the North Street area of the First Ward were assured Monday night by the Tawas City Council that steps would be taken to investigate the drainage problem in that area.

Four property owners were present and stated that they thought much of the difficulty could be overcome by construction of a ditch to the Tawas River which would take care of most of the drainage problem during the spring.

Joseph Stepanski of Second Avenue stated that a number of ditches in that area had been filled by construction of driveways. In other sections, culverts are either too high or else plugged, the property owners stated.

"Water was so high at one time this spring that we had a family of ducks nesting in our back yard," was the comment of one property owner.

Elevations are to be taken in ditches area to determine if opening of ditches or a storm sewer would handle the ground water. One storm sewer is already located along North Street, but never has proven too successful. A report is to be made at the next meeting.

In other business, the council took action to lower the bond of Bay City Scrap Company from \$10,000 to \$300 and return securities now held in escrow in the Peoples State Bank. These bonds were posted by the company to guarantee that the lake bottom and beach in the Tawas City Park would be cleaned of debris during the scrapping of the Western States.

It was emphasized that the scrap company had done an excellent job of cleaning up after scrapping operations. Supt. Reginald Bublitz reported that he and Conservation Officer Arthur Leitz had made an inspection of the area last week. Several pieces of metal which remained on the bottom were removed Monday.

Treasurer Ruth Albertson, whose resignation was effective May 31, made her last monthly report to the council. She and her children will join her husband, Delbert, this week in Waukegan, Illinois, where he is employed by National Gypsum Company. John Hosbach, who was appointed to fill her vacancy, was present at the meeting and officially took over the duties of treasurer Monday night.
