

SHOWN DURING FIELD DAYS A total of six hay conditioning field days will be held around the state during June, according to Marvin Davenport, county extension director. The field day in this area is at the Charles Thompson Farm on Indian Reserve Road two miles south of Werth Road, Alpena County. Starting time is

1:30 p. m. on Thursday, June 11. According to Robert White, extension agricultural engineer at Michigan State University, visitors will have a chance to see comparisons of conditioned and unconditioned hay.

The day before the field day, two swaths will be mowed; one will be conditioned. The morning of the field day two additional one will be conditioned.

Visitors will also have a chance former Fenton residents. to see from 10 to 15 different makes of hay conditioning equipment in operation.

Many Michigan farmers are interested in hay conditioning. Conditioning hay will normally reduce field curing time by 40 to 50 percent. Getting hay in the barn faster helps save the nutrients in the forage.
