## Company Observes 100th Anniversary—

### Work Started on New A & P Store

The nation's oldest chain retailer, the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company, known to most Americans as A & P, is celebrating its 100th anniversary this year.

And joining those in giving their greetings to the firm are many residents of this area. East Tawas has had an A & P for nearly 40 years. The store is now located in the Ashmun Building on Newman Street, but by June 15 of this year the company hopes to move into its new building now under construction between the East Tawas Recreation and Holland Hotel.

Theme of the company's year-long celebration of the historical milestone is "Thanks, America," according to William DeGrow, store manager at East Tawas.

In launching the anniversary year, the A & P president and board chairman, Ralph W. Burger, challenged the company's 145,000 employees to seek new and better ways to serve the customer.

A & P has grown to seven divisions with more than 4,000 stores in a century of service to generations of housewives.

A & P began in 1859 with a man, an idea and a shipload of tea. The man was George H. Hartford, 26, who had left his home in Augusta, Maine, and had worked briefly in St. Louis before heading east to New York City. His idea was to sell good tea, then the favorite national beverage, to New Yorkers at about a third of the retail price by buying an entire clipper shipload and selling it directly to the public, thus eliminating many in-between steps and costs.

So successful was his venture in selling the first shipload at dockside that he immediately opened his first store at 31 Vesey Street in New York City.

## Tawas City's Tax Base is Set at \$2,118,900 by Board

Tawas City's new tax base was set by the board of review at \$2,118,900 in assessable real and personal properties. Acting on the board were Mayor George Tuttle, Clerk Walter Nelson and Supervisors Clarence Everett, Fred Brabant and Clement Stephenson.

The 1959 total is \$54,600 more than the assessed valuation of \$2,064,300 adopted by the board at its sessions last year.

The board made only minor changes during the four-day review of the \$2,113,900 valuation which originally was assessed by the three supervisors. Their deductions and additions resulted in an increase of \$5,000.

The board of review's breakdown by wards:

First Ward—Real, \$528,500; personal, \$149,100; total personal and real, \$677,600, up \$45,200 over 1958.

Second Ward—Real, \$406,300; personal, \$56,700; total personal and real, \$463,000, down \$3,400 from \$466,400 in 1958.

Third Ward—Real, \$844,700; personal, \$133,600; total personal and real, \$978,300, up \$12,800 over 1958.

Principal gains in the city were recorded in the First Ward through construction of the new Kroger Store and new homes. Losses by the Second Ward resulted mainly through the scrapping of the Western States and the Fletcher Oil Company fire.

By 1880, there were 95 A & P stores scattered from Boston to Milwaukee. In 1901 there were 200 stores. Principal growth of the company came after 1912, the year A & P stores offered all the services that the other food retailers gave. The surge of expansion that was launched in 1912 continued unabated through World War I, through the 1920s and into the beginning of the Great Depression.

In the late 1930s, the super market entered the scene. Beginning with 20 super markets in 1936, it pushed steadily upward, replacing service stores by the score. This transition to super markets continued at a steady pace to a point where today most of the retail outlets are of the super market variety.

#### CHAMBER ANNOUNCES START OF 'BIG DOUBLE CONTEST'

Tawas Chamber of Commerce announces the start of its "Big Double Contest" which is open to all citizens of the Tawas City, East Tawas, Iosco County and US-23 area.

The contest offers a \$25 bond for the best name or slogan for the area and a \$25 bond for the best chamber of commerce insignia. Only one drawing or slogan may be entered per entrant and they must be in the hands of the chamber of commerce before midnight April 15.

Tawas Chamber of Commerce is currently in a membership drive in which it is proposed to sign a minimum of 90 percent of all business people in the Tawas-US-23 area. Campaign manager is the Rev. O. James Crews, well known here as the director of the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials.

Three Republican candidates running for state offices in the April election were in Tawas Tuesday. The men were guests of County School Superintendent Russell A. Rollin at the Tuesday noon Kiwanis meeting.

Visiting this area were Edward G. Durance, Midland, who is a candidate for member of the board of governors of Wayne University; Arthur K. Rouse, Boyne City, candidate for member of the state board of agriculture; and Frederick C. Matthaal, Ann Arbor, candidate for regent of University of Michigan.

Millage was spread as follows: Contingent fund, 12 mills; street, three mills; public debt, 1½ mills; interest and sinking, one-half mill.

Reason for the change was explained by Mayor Tuttle, who said that the park fund had been eliminated from the city's bookkeeping system when it was reorganized last summer. Cost of work on the park now comes directly from the contingent fund.

Mayor Tuttle said that the change would reduce the amount of work by supervisors in preparing the annual tax rolls.

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#### Book Circulation is Up 50 Percent at TA School

"Who says, 'Johnny can't read?' This statement is untrue, in so far as Tawas Area High School students are concerned." These were the sentiments expressed this week by Mrs. Ruth Hess, school librarian.

Records show that book circulation has increased 50 percent over last year at the Tawas Area High School library, reports Mrs. Hess.

"Although the students, themselves, have shown a vast interest in books and magazines, term papers and book reports are mainly responsible for much of the increase in the trend toward more and better reading," she asserts.

One building application was approved by the East Tawas City Council at its regular meeting Monday night. Approved was an application submitted by Richter and Eunice Lixey to relocate the entrance and remodel the interior of the Lixey Restaurant on US-23. Cost was estimated at \$800.

Tawas Area School will be closed next week, March 23 through 27, for annual spring vacation.

**Oscoda School Issued \$1,049,744 in Fed. Aid**  
Federal entitlements totaling \$1,049,744 have been issued by the department of health, education and welfare in Chicago for the construction of Oscoda's new high school.

A public meeting for the discussion and explanation of the announced federal grant for high school construction, actual construction, finance and other items of interest was held Monday at the Oscoda elementary school.

School administrators and committees have arrived at a set of plans and specifications which they feel encompass the needs of the area high school. The proposed building would cost approximately \$1,708,640. Oscoda Area School District voters will be asked to vote on a bond issue of approximately \$550,000 to provide the balance of the funds necessary for the structure.

#### \$129,350 Increase in Assessed Valuation Noted at East Tawas

Assessed valuation in the City of East Tawas, to be used as a tax base for 1959, was set at \$2,469,175 by the board of review and City Assessor Deloise Durant. This is a \$129,350 increase over the assessed valuation of last year.

A breakdown of this figure shows that there was \$2,112,475 assessed in real properties and \$356,700 in personal.

City Clerk Fred Lomas reported Tuesday that the increase was due largely to new home construction. Personal valuation was down slightly from 1958.

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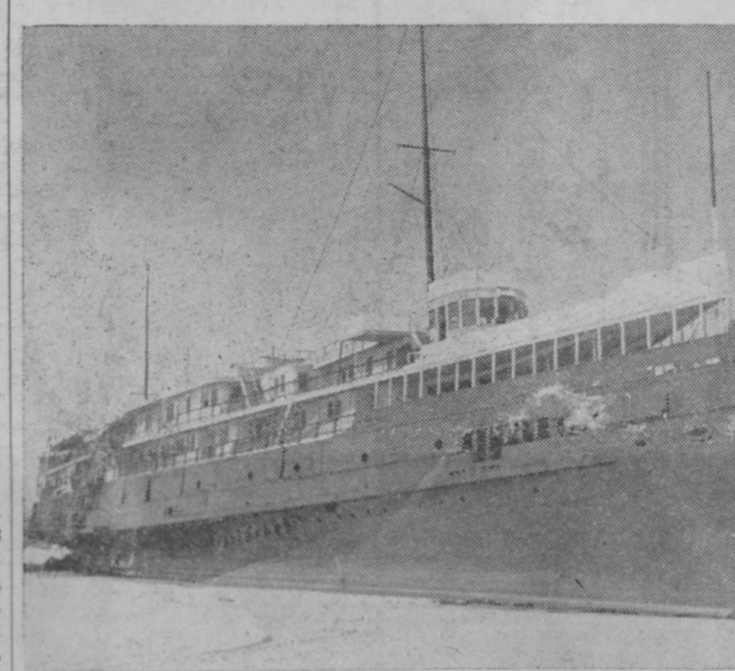

## Scrapping of Western States Ends Era of Paddle Wheels



Frozen stiff in the ice of Tawas Bay is the Western States.

The last of the once-famous Detroit and Cleveland fleet of swift, luxurious Great Lakes passenger ships is making its "last trip." She is the Western States, a 350-foot side-wheeler with 263 staterooms in tiered decks, now moored at the Tawas City dock undergoing scrapping operations.

She is owned by the Bay City Scrap Company, headed by Abraham Monro, who purchased the ship from Marine Salvage Company of Detroit for something over \$30,000.

The scrap company is using acetylene torches and a drag line to tear the Western States to pieces. The steel hull, with its inwards of engines and boilers removed, will be towed to Bay City in the spring and cut into scrap.

Then the six-ship fleet of the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Company will be dead, and with it an era that stretched back into the gaslights. D and C began operating the Great Lakes 108 years ago.

The Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Company ceased to operate ships in 1950 and became a financial holding company. With the others gone or going to the scrap heap, a bid was made in 1955 to keep the Western States afloat in all her bygone elegance.

She was towed to Tawas City from Detroit and a considerable amount of money poured into her in a refurbishing job to become what may have been the world's first "hotel."

The idea did not pan out, so now, standing on ice, men with acetylene torches have cut off her two giant paddle wheels and are removing tons of metal from the interior.

Soon the Western States will be Great Lakes history, along with her sister ships: The Greater Buffalo, the City of Cleveland III, City of Detroit III, the Greater Detroit and Eastern States—the last of the paddle wheelers on the Great Lakes. An era is rapidly coming to an end.

## Council Votes Pay Hike for Treasurer-Aldermen

A salary increase of \$100 per year for the city treasurer and \$1-per-meeting increase for city aldermen were approved by the Tawas City Council at its regular meeting Monday night.

Salary of the city clerk, \$600 per year, is to remain the same as in 1958. This was passed by a five to one vote, the only dissenter being Alderman Earl Davis. Other salaries not changed were those of the mayor, at \$100 per year, and fire chief, who draws \$50.

Aldermen will receive \$3 per meeting attended effective at the start of fiscal 1959, a boost of \$1 over the old salary. The motion, entered by Alderman Howard Hutton, passed by a five to one vote. The lone "no" vote was cast by Alderman John Brugger.

In other business, three building applications were approved by the department of public works during the past week. These included: Carl Babcock and William Borosch, rebuilding and remodeling the former Robert Rollin house on Fourth Street, to include addition of one room, estimated cost \$2,000; Milton Kotcher, 701 Lake, construct open porch and stairway at Driftwood Steak House, estimated cost \$500; Mrs. Arthur Cadorette, 229 Sixth Avenue, re-side house and install two windows, estimated cost \$700.

Alderman Davis reported on arrangements for the meeting of the Michigan Municipal League which will be held at the Barnes Hotel April 23. Tawas City is to host the conference.

**RETURNED TO IOSCO TO FACE CHARGES**  
Henry Senter, 26, who was extradited to Michigan from California to face charges of embezzlement, was arraigned before Justice A. J. Goulet Tuesday morning. Senter waived examination and was bound over to circuit court. Bond was set at \$3,000.

Senter, who was held by San Francisco authorities for the Iosco County Sheriff's Department, was returned here by Undersheriff Leon Putnam and Deputy Sheriff Gene Ballinger.

He faces charges of embezzling a bulldozer and truck from Russell Tomlinson.

**The Worst is Still to Come, Warns Bublitz**  
"Roads are going to become worse before they get better." This was the observation of Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz in his report on the condition of city streets at Monday night's council meeting.

Bublitz predicts that the already disintegrating city streets would be in a worsened condition once the frost leaves the ground.

City crews were out early Tuesday morning filling in "chuck holes" which have developed in city streets. The holes are caused by heaving frost and thawing conditions.

"We expect that the black top patches will pop out in short order," said Bublitz, "but this is about the only measure that can be taken at this time of year to save our streets."

Bay Drive was barricaded to through traffic Tuesday morning because of its rapid deterioration in past days. Warning flares have been set out at the more dangerous chuck holes in other streets.

The city council urges all motorists to drive at slow speeds and with extreme caution on back streets. "Good common sense may save money in road repairs and, at the same time, save wear and tear on automobiles," was the way one councilman expressed it.

#### Former East Tawas Man to Retire from US Navy

Chief Petty Officer William S. McLeod, son of Mrs. Byron Brooks of Tawas City, will retire from the United States Navy in June after 20 years of service. He attended high school at East Tawas.

Chief McLeod, who enlisted when 19 years of age, has served the past several years in the navy's special weapons group and worked in advanced overseas weapons.

He owns a television and appliance store in San Diego, California, and is a graduate of the RCA Color Television School.

## Airman is Iosco's First Auto Fatality

Iosco County's first traffic fatality was recorded early last Friday morning when A3-c James O. Jones, 28, of Wurtsmith Air Force Base was instantly killed in a two-car collision on US-23 near the east city limits of East Tawas. Two Oscoda men were injured in the crash.

Jones, who was riding alone, was attached to the 445th Fighter Interceptor Squadron at Wurtsmith. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse O. Jones, reside in Metropolis, Illinois.

Treated at Tawas Hospital were Howard Hilderbrand and Leonard Bade. Hilderbrand, driver of the second car, received nose, arm and chest injuries.

Bade received arm and head injuries. Hilderbrand and Bade, driving toward Oscoda, told officers that they saw the Jones car coming toward them and attempted to pull off the highway. The Jones car struck the Hilderbrand car in the middle.

## Board Takes Steps to Secure Airport Site

Iosco County Board of Supervisors passed a resolution Wednesday asking the federal government to turn over to the county approximately 200 acres of jack pine land northeast of East Tawas for use as an airport. At the same time, the board authorized the state department of aeronautics to proceed with the purchase of 80 acres of private land for airport use.

Relocation of the county airport has been under consideration for some time and the board met with Wurtsmith Air Force Base officials to discuss any problems that might arise due to its location near flight patterns of that military base.

A spokesman for the board said that Wurtsmith officials were in accord with the county's plan for a new airport. One of Wurtsmith's return flight patterns would be changed so as not to conflict with the proposed county airport.

Iosco County has until July 1 to finalize plans for the new airport. After that time, if not started, it would lose its federal allocation. The federal government would match every dollar that the county and state allocates for such construction. This would mean that Iosco County would receive \$3 for every \$1 it spends on the proposed airport.

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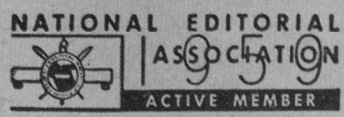

### NO GRACE PERIOD ON DELINQUENT GI LOANS

Despite what some veterans may believe, there is no grace period for the late payment of installments on GI loans, Lloyd H. Jameson, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Detroit, said today.

Thus, he added, veterans should make their GI loan payments on

or before the date they are due. Failure to do so may prove costly, he pointed out, since GI lenders may make an extra service charge when payments are received late.

Mr. Jameson warned that veterans who gain the reputation of being "chronic delinquents" will find their lenders taking that fact into account if the veterans should ever need an extension of repayment time on their GI loans.

In addition to their loss of credit standing, veterans who become delinquent in their payments may ultimately be faced with the loss of the property acquired with their GI loans, Mr. Jameson said.

### SOCIAL SECURITY AGENT WILL BE HERE MARCH 26

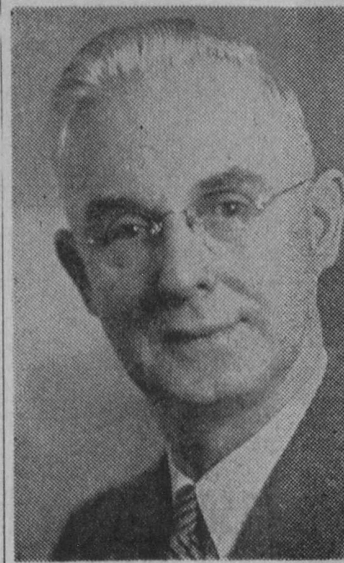
Some household workers may lose out on social security benefits because the housewife neglects to make social security reports on their cash wages. This was pointed out by Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City social security office. He added that compliance with the reporting requirements by household employers is generally very good, but in some few cases, the worker has difficulty in establishing rights to benefits due to failure of the employer to file social security tax returns.

The law requires that a household employer report for social security purposes all cash wages of \$50 or more paid in a calendar quarter to a maid, cleaning woman or other household worker. These social security reports are filed with the district director of internal revenue in the month following the end of each calendar quarter. The calendar quarters end with the months of March, June, September and December. With these reports, the employer remits 2 1/2 percent that he holds out of the employee's wages and adds another 2 1/2 percent as the employer's tax, a total of five percent. The reporting procedure is very simple for a household employer. The quarterly report is made on a simple envelope form that can be completed in a few minutes.

"It is from these reports that the central accounting office of the Social Security Administration in Baltimore builds up its record of earnings to the employee's social security insurance account," Mr. Ellifritz stated.

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at St. John the Baptist Catholic Church, Ypsilanti. Interment was in St. John's Cemetery.

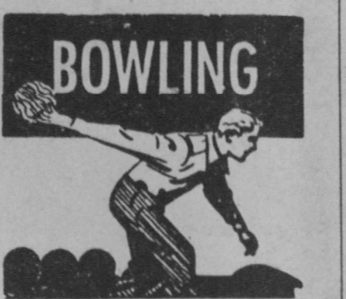
