

He added that compliance have audience with Spirit, the with the reporting requirements by household employers is generally very good, but in some few cases, the worker has difficulty in establishing rights to benefits due to failure of the employer to file social security tax returns.

The law requires that a household employer report for social security purposes all cash wages of \$50 or more paid in a calendar quarter to a maid, cleaning woman or other household worker. These social security reports are filed with the district director of internal revenue in the month following the end of each calendar quarter. The calendar quarters end with the months of March, June September and December. With these reports, the employer remits 21/2 percent that he holds out of the employee's wages and adds another 21/2 percent as the em ployer's tax, a total of five percent. The reporting procedure is very simple for a household employer. The quarterly report is made on a

simple envelope form that can be completed in a few minutes. "It is from these reports that the central accounting office of the Social Security Administration in Baltimore builds up its record of earnings to the employee's social security insurance account,"




