

Wurtsmith Opens Gates Saturday for Armed Forces Day

On Saturday, May 16, the 10th annual Armed Forces Day will be celebrated at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, with open house from 8:30 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. The theme for the day, as in past years, will be "Power For Peace."

Plans have been completed to accommodate some 10,000 persons who are expected to attend this year's program. During their tour of the base, they will witness flyovers, a formal military review ceremony, helicopter demonstrations, sentry dog demonstrations and numerous displays of aircraft and equipment used to keep the nation's "Air Arm" strong.

The static displays will be ready for inspection at 8:30 a. m., but Captain Kelly, project officer for the event, stated that the day's activities would officially begin at 11:00 a. m. with a formal review on the base flight line.

Some of the aircraft on static display will include the F-102 supersonic Delta-Dagger, the F-89 Scorpion, TF-102, T-33, F-36L, C-47, H-19 helicopter and a B-47 bomber from Strategic Air Command.

Also for the first time in the history of this Air Defense Command base, an F-104 Starfighter will be on public display. This ultrasonic day fighter currently holds the speed record of 1,404.19 mph along with the altitude record of 19,249 feet. The Starfighter is often referred to as the missile with a man in it.

The standout features planned for the day, as might be expected, will be flying demonstrations by Wurtsmith aircrews.

Without a doubt, the best single item on the flying schedule will be a high-speed pass and maximum performance climb over the field by the supersonic F-102. The aircraft will be piloted by a member of the 18th Fighter Interceptor Squadron.

During the afternoon four F-102s will fly over Bay City (12:30) and Lansing (12:40). Four F-89s will add to Wisconsin's Armed Forces Day Celebration by flying over Green Bay (2:50) and Milwaukee (3:05).

The static displays, with the exception of aircraft, will be set up in two huge maintenance hangars. Persons attending this 1959 Armed Forces Day program will also be given an opportunity to view the extensive construction program that is now underway, in preparation for the coming of the Strategic Air Command to this section of Michigan.

When the gates close at 4:00 p. m., Michigan residents should have a better understanding of the mission of the Air Defense Command and the role this base plays in the overall defense mission.

Also leaving this year is Mrs. Dawn Cheney, who has been girls physical education instructor.

New teachers are as follows: Miss Marilyn Westrich, a former Tawas City resident, will be an instructor in the commercial department. A resident of Stevenson, she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Westrich and a Michigan State University graduate.

Another new commercial instructor will be Steven Sventko, who is teaching this year at Merrill. A graduate of Ferris Institute, he will also be an assistant football coach.

Charles Davenport, who is teaching this year at Leroy, comes to Tawas Area to join the junior high faculty. He will be in the science department.

Miss Joan E. Taylor, a graduate of the University of Dayton, will be the girls physical education instructor here. She was girls physical education coach and instructor for one semester at the university.

John Alexander, who is a member of the Oscoda Area School at present, will join the Tawas Area faculty this fall. A graduate of Central Michigan College, he will teach junior high mathematics.

Herbert Escott, presently at Vermontville, comes to Tawas Area School to teach mathematics and science in junior high. A Michigan State graduate, he will be the assistant varsity football coach.

Mrs. Ruth F. Ross, now teaching in the Oscoda school, will join Tawas Area to teach in the elementary department.

Mrs. Orville Moore, who took a leave of absence in January 1958 from Tawas Area School, will re-join the elementary department.

Mrs. Alice DeFbaugh, presently teaching science in the junior high grades, will teach half-day kindergarten starting in the fall.

Forest Fire Checked, but 200 Acres Burned

A forest fire, fanned by 20-mile-an-hour winds was brought under control in a little more than two hours Tuesday afternoon, but not before it had burned over 200 acres in Huron National Forest.

Starting in the Tawas City dump in Baldwin Township, the fire reached Gray Creek where it was checked by forest service, conservation department crews and volunteer fire-fighters.

A sawmill, freshly-cut timber and a garage were destroyed. Hunting camps in the area were threatened. An area of about a quarter mile wide and nearly a mile long, containing mixed oak and jack pine, was burned over.

Several other fires were reported about the same time.

C of C to Launch Campaign Tonight With 'Grand Rally'

A "grand rally" of all business people in the Tawas area will be held May 14 (tonight), 8:00 p. m., at the East Tawas Community Building. "The meeting will be held to launch the biggest publicity campaign in our history," states the Rev. O. James Crews, campaign manager.

In a letter to members and non-members this week, Mr. Crews states: "Throughout the past four months we have been working toward the goal of intensified advertising and publicity of the Tawas area.

"And more, particularly, 90 percent of the businessmen and women uniting their forces toward year-round business with a full-time manager of the chamber of commerce to carry out our aims.

"Such a revolutionary program cannot be accomplished in one year," he states. "We must take one step at a time. Our 1959 budget calls for \$3,500 fixed expenses, \$1,900 semi-fixed expense and \$6,723 advertising expense, with \$7,677 as a proposed improvement factor.

"We have passed the budget amount required to carry out all parts of the chamber program except the full-time man. We need not hurry this. I will continue to work full time, without pay, until the plan is completed."

The campaign manager urges that each member bring a non-member with him. Members should have their advertising copy for the 24-page directory of members. "If you absolutely cannot be present, please send your copy along with your check or money order on your pledge," he urged.

Drivers in US-23 Crash Charged With Homicide

Warrants were issued Tuesday by Prosecuting Attorney Paul Harvey charging the drivers in a two-car collision south of Oscoda on May 1 with homicide. The collision resulted in the death of a 15-year-old Tawas Area High School freshman, Jacquelyn J. Riley of Tawas City.

Jack T. Thomas, 31, of Wurtsmith Air Force Base, driver of the car in which Miss Riley was a passenger, is charged with manslaughter. He is presently confined to Veterans Hospital, Saginaw, recovering from injuries which he received in the accident.

James N. Casey, 18, of Oscoda, driver of the other car involved, is charged with negligent homicide.

In issuing the warrants this week, Mr. Harvey stated that after an investigation of the accident, both he and Township Officer Horace T. Dillon were of the opinion that the accident was the direct result of negligent misconduct on the part of both drivers.

The accident took place on US-23 at Johnson Road south of Oscoda Friday night, May 1. The Casey vehicle had made a left turn onto US-23 from Johnson Road. The Thomas car struck the other vehicle from the rear. Six persons were injured in the resulting crash and Miss Riley died the following Sunday at St. Luke's Hospital, Saginaw.

Maximum sentence for manslaughter, if convicted, is 15 years. Negligent homicide in Michigan is treated as a circuit court misdemeanor.

All persons interested in this alert are asked to make themselves available to take an active part during the two-hour exercise.

Persons acting as injury victims will be transported to the hospital and processed in the same manner that would take place should such a disaster occur.

All Civil Defense personnel are requested to take part and report to the Isosco County Jail not later than 1 o'clock Friday afternoon for briefing.

Tawas City Awaits Word on Bond Issue

Hettiger stated that there were 130 applications now pending in his office. Eight or nine of these applications are to receive preferred treatment because of urgency.

The commission was to have met Tuesday and Hettiger again told Miller that he would ask for quick action on Tawas City's application.

Abercrombie, an avid skin diver, spent a week-end here photographing ice fishing activities on Tawas Bay. Local residents will recall that he donned his skin diving equipment and lowered himself through a hole in the ice to get a "fish eye view" of a Perchville shanty.

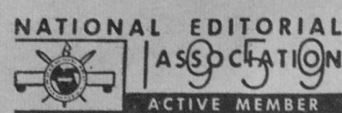

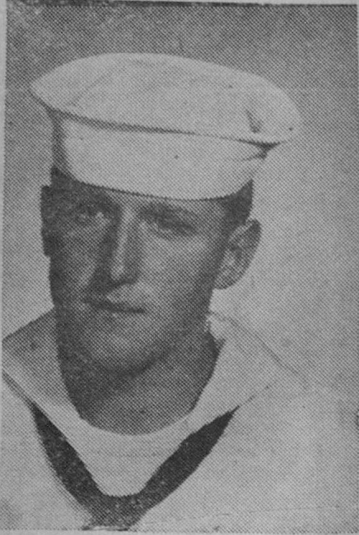

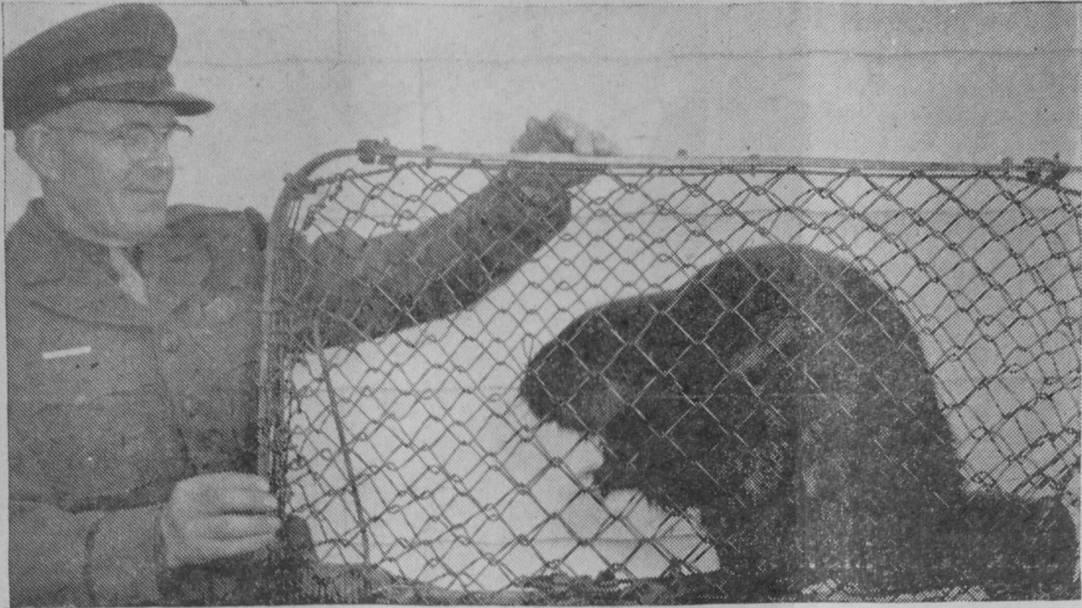

The movie, entitled "Alaskan Adventure," is a 45-minute color film which will take viewers to the 49th state on a fantastic dream trip with 15 Michigan trout fishermen to North America's finest angler's paradise. The film will show jumping rainbows, battling Mackinaws and the arctic grayling for which the Kulik and Brooks River Fishing Camps are noted.

This film is jam-packed with authentic sports fishing action and the numerous thrilling episodes which were encountered while visiting a frontier wilderness fishing camp. It will be followed by another 26-minute series of "Wildlife Extras" taken in Michigan and presented in honor of Michigan Week, May 18-24.

The program is sponsored by the Tawas Area Future Farmers of America. The admission price is \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students.

Communities With Sound Plans Most Likely to Attract Industry

"Communities with sound plans for the future are more likely to attract new industry than communities that have not planned ahead."

Scott Bagby, former Grand Rapids city planner and now planning consultant for several other Michigan communities, made this comment recently after seeing advance proofs of an advertisement entitled "Have We Planned For Growth?" which appears in The Tawas Herald today.

"After all," Bagby said, "industry puts a great deal of emphasis on planning and it only makes sense that an industry looking for a plant location will pick the community that has planned for growth over one that hasn't, all other factors being equal."

Bagby is a strong advocate of the development of industrial parks—large protected areas where new industry may locate and will have adequate room to expand.

"For years, builders have platted areas for new housing developments," Bagby said. "Why shouldn't the same thing be done for industry rather than locate new plants in a helter-skelter pattern?"

"It's important for industries to be located near each other so they can supply each other's needs without having to truck

materials and supplies great distances." Bagby believes industrial parks should provide large areas for basic industries and ring them with smaller sites for supplier plants.

The entire area, of course, is zoned industrial and is separated from residential areas.

But more than just land is necessary to attract new industry, Bagby said.

Financial planning is an essential part of a community's plan for the future if it is to provide the additional services that will be needed as the community grows—schools, streets, water, sewage and other facilities.

"Communities also should keep one important thing in mind when they are out searching for a new industry," Bagby added. "Industry is more important for the jobs it provides than the taxes it pays."

"Unfortunately, some communities think of an industry in terms of taxes only while they should be thinking of the jobs that have been created by the industry."

When the meal is on the table, let us raise our glass of milk in a toast to the state which produced all this food. Let us toast Michigan. (Hope you are hungry, this is really a "hearty meal.")

Are there girls (boys, too) in your neighborhood who will be looking for jobs as waitresses or waiters this summer? Would they like to learn how to be ready for this kind of work? Then, perhaps you can tell them there is an opportunity in the making for teaching such a class. It will help in making arrangements to know how many and who would like to come.

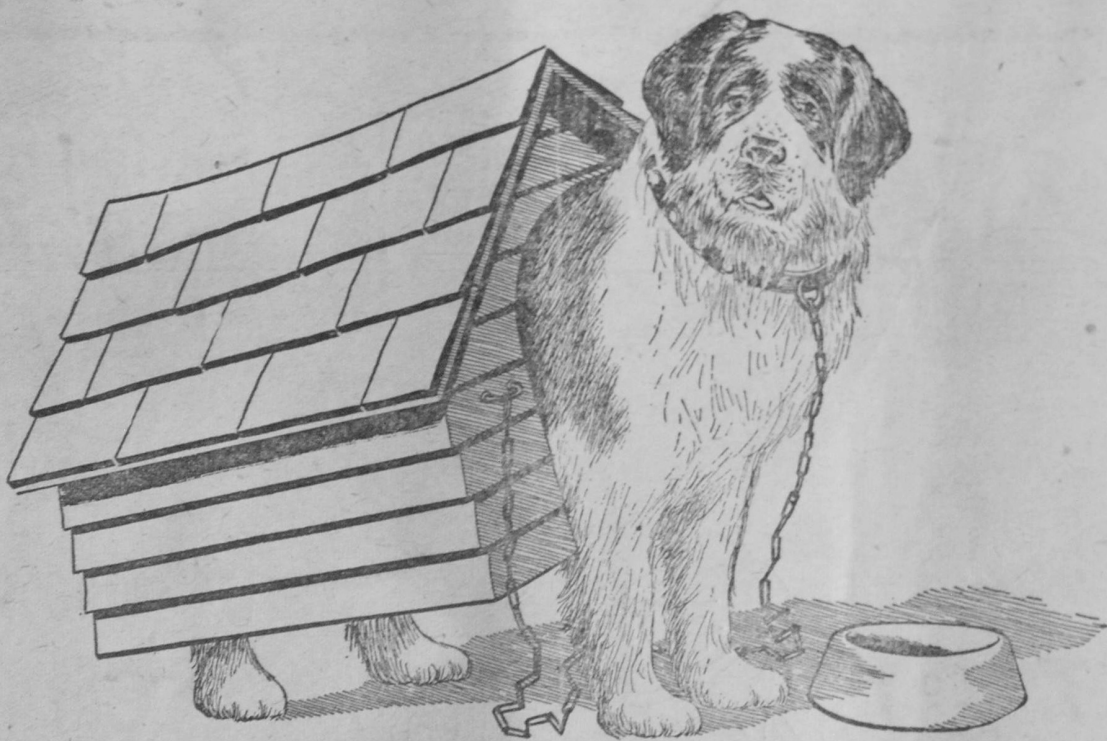

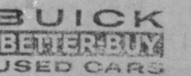

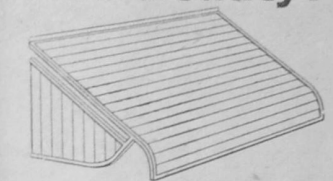
Tawas tied the game in the third inning when, after two men were out, Sass was safe on an error by Hribek. He stole second and scored on a single by Ledsworth.
