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

Have you learned about "snapped" asparagus? Is it different than any other? The answer is "yes." Asparagus is harvested by snapping off the stalks or by cutting them off. When harvested by snapping, the asparagus breaks off at a tender spot, resulting in a stalk that is tender, full length, with nothing to throw away. It is

simply washed and cooked. When harvested by cutting, the stalks are cut close to the ground. The white or light green part is usually tough or woody, needs to be cut off and so becomes

Snapped asparagus will cost more per pound than cut asparagus but the edible portion cost may be the same. You will have to make your own comparison
